BISD will gain about \$10 million in property values

Brackett Independent School District will gain between \$8 million and \$10 million in property values this year.

Whatever the increase, the district can either lower the tax rate and generate as much money as it did last year, or maintain the current rate and generate more revenue, Board President Tim Ward explained at last week's school board meeting.

He and another board member, Gloria Garcia, are BISD representatives on the Kinney County Appraisal Board District.

However, the increase in property value will also mean the district will have to "cough up \$11,000 more" to the Kinney County Appraisal District, he added.

"With the re-distribution of the participation of the entities, I mean the financial part, it's going to reflect a budget increase on the part of the school district.

"The other (taxing entities) will receive somewhat of a reduction. The reason for this is because in previous years it was not calculated properly and it is based upon the levy. The school district has the largest levy of all, the county has the second, followed by the city, MUDD and Spofford, the entitites that are involved with the appraisal district, said Ward.

He added that "upon recalculations of the levy, those participating in it, the school district should have been carrying a larger percentage of the expenses of the operation of the Appraisal District through the years. The district has

In the appeal, The Appraisal District contested figures for Kinney County contained in the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division Ratio Study.

"The annual property value study is conducted by the property tax division of the state comptroller's office. The study is important to state and local communities because it ensures equity in school funding," explained Bill

Haenn, chief appraiser. "The appraisal district is supposed to appraise things at market value. The state compares values assessed by the appraisal district to what they feel the value should be. It's like a report card for the appraisal district. "If the the funding. If they don't match, the locals come up with the fund-

"Data checked by the state comptroller's office was from pre-2000. The \$375,00 funding for the school district was in jeopardy because "basically, the prices or the value of rural land is what hurt the most. We protested the state's numbers with the help of local ranchers and reversed the agricultural value the state had assigned - it was way too high, not representative of Kinney County. By law, values need to be in the 95 percentile range but in the study, they were 70 percent, now it's 100

had a considerable break through the years now we have to cough up \$11,000 more, that's the bad news. The good news is we can say that we had a break for 20 years and it was not because of an error in calculations, it wasn't contrived to benefit the school district."

Ward said,"Last year it was right at \$158,00. I think it's \$500 less than last year. According to recalculations of levies, the school district will pay more than last year but it won't be as much because we're going to pay with funds from the offset budget. Those are among the pluses, funds to offset the budget.

Stephenson added, "We would pay \$81,124.14."

Ward and Superintendent Taylor Stephenson praised the Appraisal District for helping the school district particularly this year.

Specifically, two months ago, thanks to the efforts of the Kinney County Appraisal District, the BISD was guaranteed \$375,000 in state funding. That amount would have been lost to the district had the Appraisal District not appealed

We did this at no cost to the school district. We believed it was an Appraisal District problem, and

"The meat of the report was a farm and ranch survey of about 20 local landowners. The state reviewed the numbers and determined that we did achieve local value - the school gets its funding. 



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

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Lynn McNew talks to Rotarians about the importance of music in education of children

Mrs. Lynn McNew spoke at the July 13 Brackettville Rotary Club meeting about the importance of music in the education of children. Ms. McNew has recently retired as a Brackettville Elementary School teacher, but has continued to substitute in the school system. She received her degree from Western Illinois University and pursued a Masters in Music at Northwestern, but after teaching music in the public schools for 15 years, she returned to Texas Tech University to earn a certificate in Elementary Education.

She taught as an elementary school teacher, but continued to teach music both in public schools and as a private music instructor.

Ms. McNew had realized that the shortage of money allotted to public education was forcing administrations to make choices.

A value was placed on each subject and greater concentration was focused on the traditional basics of English, Math and History. Add to that the time needed to teach computer competency and the stress placed on learning a foreign language, and one sees music education tending to be pushed out of the public schools or low on the hierarchy of subjects selected.

This is ironic, because the benefits of music education are beginning to be recognized more clearly. Studies are revealing that music education taught in the early grades helps develop the brain in such a way that facilitates the ability to read.

Ted Judd, in a speech entitled "A Neurologist Looks at Musical Behavior", comes to the conclusion that involvement in music involves many parts of the interconnected brain.

Dr. Jean Houston of the Foundation for Mind Research says that children without access to an arts program are actually damaging their brain. They are not being exposed to nonverbal modalities, which help them learn skills like reading, writing and math much more easily.

Ms. McNew mentioned that she used to play classical music CDs during study periods and sees the use of arts throughout the curriculum as a tool for better learning is an area that must expand.


She complimented superintendent Taylor Stephenson for being supportive of the arts, and believes that the arts will play a major roll in the future success of the education system.
