## Brackett ISD Board approves audit

The Brackett Independent School District School Board approved the Annual Audit as it was presented by Chuck Gruenwald of Coleman, Horton and Company during its regular meeting on Tuesday, October 10.

The audit was performed for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of BISS as a whole.

"The audit also includes a look at all financial transactions to make sure you are in compliance with the law as far as spending goes," said Superintendent Taylor Stephenson.

At year-end, BISS had \$12.3 million worth of assets, an increase

of over \$400,000 from last year. The general fund balance is \$2.4 million.

Expenditures were only \$4.3 million while revenues were \$4.7 million. After a transfer of \$60,000 to the debt service fund, the net increase was over \$350,000.

"I would say that after auditing six other schools this year, your school has done very well," said Gruenwald.

Stephenson was very satisfied with the results of the audit.

"They gave us a nice, glowing report, which pleased us. We want it to be that way," said Stephenson.

In other business, the Board approved the sale of a mobile home on Fort Clark being held in trust

by the Kinney County Appraisal District, due to delinquent taxes. The property was struck from the rolls in 1998.

Changes made to class rank rules in the BHS Student Handbook were also approved by the Board. The new rules will be included in next year's handbook. Until that time, the parent's of freshmen students will be notified of the changes by mail.

Board members agreed that the new draft is a much more organized and simple document.

"This is a much better document. It is going to be a lot easier to evaluate class rank on the basis of this form than the one we had," said Stephenson.

## Involvement in the Texas Farm Bureau Organization pays off

One of the primary interests of Rotary International is education, and the local club was treated to a mini-experience of learning through an extra curricular activity provided by Michael Hall, principal of Brackettville High School. On Thursday, October twelfth, he brought the Junior Choir to the Rotary meeting to sing and demonstrate some of what he teaches.

He explained that this was not the Senior High Show Choir, but a group of youngsters without prior

musical experience. Hall said youngsters today are inundated with music through TV, radio, recordings, and the Internet. They hear music, but few of the young people have gotten involved in producing it by singing or playing an instrument. This means their experience is primarily through audio input. The result is that many of them are "pitch deaf." They may try to sing a C and hit some place else entirely. This ability can be learned, however.

Hall is also interested in the physiology of singing. At the first meeting of the group, Mr. Hall

instructed them to yell "Hey" at him. As he put it, you never heard such a wimpy sound. They were yelling with breath from the upper part of their lungs.

Sound can originate from the upper chest, in the head, or from the diaphragm. He taught them how to draw a breath into their diaphragm, and then he had them yell again. This time the sound was music different; it was loud and strong. He had explained that the diaphragm is a donut shaped muscle that can contract to expel breath like a bellows. Learning to breathe from the diaphragm is es-

### Agents seize 647 pounds of marijuana

Del Rio, Texas - U.S. Border Patrol Agents from the Comstock Station seized 647 pounds of marijuana Monday evening, October 9.

Agents patrolling Highway 90 approximately 14 miles west of Comstock were alerted to possible illegal immigrants. They proceeded to the area and came upon several individuals sitting next to 12 large white sacks. The sacks contained 647 pounds of marijuana with a street value of \$517,600.

The marijuana, and individuals apprehended were turned over to the Multi-Agency Drug Task Force.

## Senator Hutchison salutes Texas National Guard for a job well done

Washington, D.C. - U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison saluted the officers and soldiers of the Texas National Guard's 49th Armored Division today for their exemplary service in Bosnia as the mission draws to a close.

"I want to thank each and every one of these Guard members for a job well done," Senator

Hutchison said. "They answered their country's call, and all of Texas can be proud of the way in which these soldiers represented our state and nation."

The 49th Armored Division is returning to Texas this week after serving in Bosnia for eight months. At a formal ceremony today at Camp Eagle in Tuzla, Bosnia, the 49th Armored Division transferred authority for command of the Stabilization Force mission in Bosnia to regular Army troops of the U.S. Army's 3rd Infantry Division.

"The 49th made history this year in Bosnia," Senator Hutchison said. "They are the first National Guard unit to be placed in command of active duty forces deployed overseas since World War II."

Senator Hutchison led a delegation of Texas members of Congress to Kosovo and Bosnia last Spring, the highlight of which was Easter services with Texas soldiers at Camp Eagle.

"We saw first hand the spirit that these part-time soldiers brought to this full-time deployment," the Senator said. "They, their families and their civilian employers have all sacrificed a great deal to support this mission to Bosnia."

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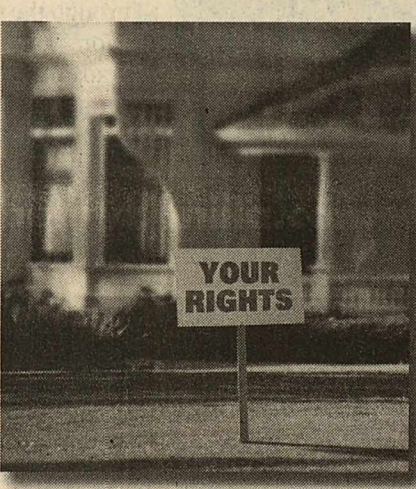
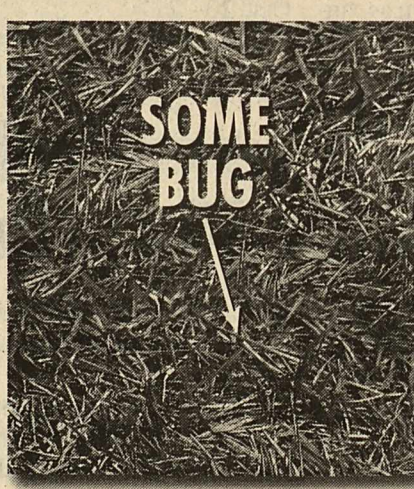

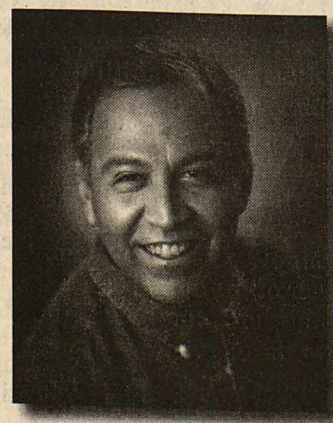

We welcome all to join us at our next meeting at the Adult center on the Nov. 9. at 9:30 a.m.

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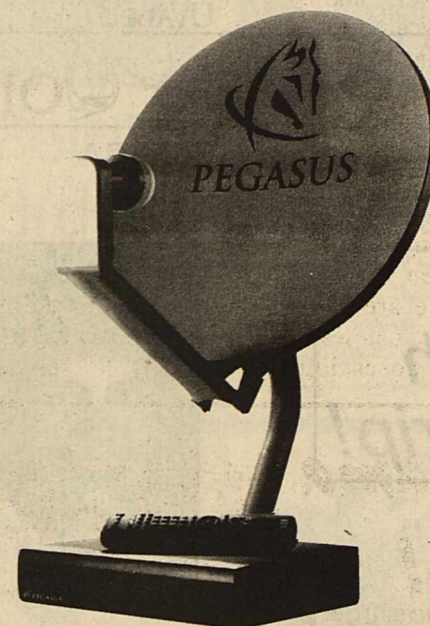

Jesus often cast out devils such in Luke 8:26-37 "Jesus asked him, what is thy name? and he said, "Legion: because many devils were entered into him. (...For he had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man,...) Then went the devils out of the man, and entered into the swine; and the herd ran violently down a steep place into the lake, and were choked." In each case you see Jesus and his disciples delivering people from spirits, not stoning them.

In Mark 16:17-18 "And these signs shall follow them that believe; In my name shall they cast out devils;..." Test the spirits by observing if that person professes with his or her life that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh and is their Lord and Savior. (I John 4:2-3) Anything else is not of God.

As the choices that Saul made affected all his family and his nation, be careful of the choices you make. They often affect not only yourself, but also your family. Choose the truth of God's word. Seek his wisdom. He is eager to give you direction himself. Stand in faith, rest in hope, walk in love.
