We then drove them into the stock pens and loaded them, having our only trouble with a few steers whose horns were too long to go through the

Bob Estes, the fiscal agent for the school district, pointed out that the school's present debt total is now \$772,000. This is payable through 1987.

Sorley, who presided at the meeting, expressed appreciation to those who attended. He explained that eight classrooms were built three years ago. These were expected to supply the need of increased enrollment for five years, but they were all in use in two years, he said, in explaining how the school enrollment is increas-

Spears was the next speaker. He pointed out the survey made by Architect Maeker which indicates continued increase in school enrollment. The survey was based on population figures, he pointed out. "We know we postal receipts and pastenroll- have a problem and ask you to ment. Spears showed graphs indicating the growth picture in past years. "Our average daily attendance doubled since the school year of '53-'54," Spears explained.

According to the superintendent's figures, the peak enrollment last year was 697. This fall the high was 715.

"The school board is anxious cilities with the money available," Spears said, "and we are now in a position of not knowing what action to take next. We're not here to cram anything down your throats," tell us how to solve it.

Maeker explained the school's enrollment growth by pointing out that there has been an increase of 27 students per year for the past 13 years. He pointed out that it would be more economically feasible to build grade schools classrooms at another location than to build a new high school. According to long range plans presented, the present school plant would eventually be used by high and junior high with the first six grades in another location.

Pointed out was that the cafeteria is now operating at full capacity. This was one reason given for not building additional classrooms on the present campus. Also, playground area is now limited and construction of more classrooms at the present site would make this situation worse.

Brought out, too, was the fact that the school's athletic facilities are inferior to other schools with comparable en-

Spears said that every room in the building is being used except one and it is located between the vocational agriculture shop and the band hall.

> May also announced the intention of Santa Fe to relocate the loading dock, now standing just east of Third Street, to a more suitable place, thus providing the city leeway to control drainage in that area.

Cost of installing gates at the two railroad crossings is estimated between \$20,000 and \$25,000, according to Pritchard and May. Although no commitments were made by either Santa Fe or the city, May said that in Amarillo the cost was split 50-50 between the two.

Also suggested was the possibility of receiving funds from the State Highway Department since the crossing on Third

pass at Third Street; closing both crossings and providing an overpass or underpass at Eighth Street: and installation of a hanging traffic light in center of the street.

An underpass would cost between \$100,00 and \$200,000, the railroad men estimated, depending on various construction problems, and an overpass probably would cost less. However, clearance in an underpass is 16 feet while clearance for trains, by state law, for an overpass is between 22 and 27

For an overpass, some Federal aid might be forthcoming, officials said, and also, a drainage problem would not be present in construction of such.

For construction of either, the state would have to be asked to make a traffic survey count, May said, and since Third Street is a state highway, permission will have to be granted by the state for the installation of gates.

May said that the principle danger of gates is that the driver is not expecting them, sees bnly the flashing lights and proceeds only to be caught by the gates as they descend. However, he pointed out that the gates are light and most people are strong enough to lift them from the top of the automobile should one come down unexpectedly.

fore the gates begin their descent. Gates are down in about 20 seconds, depending on speed of the train, before a train approaches and will stay down if another train is approaching.

Hastings said that in the 11 years he has been agent in Bovina, four people have been killed at the crossings, two recently, although there have been a number of accidents.

Most accidents are principally the result of carelessness of drivers, or the failure of drivers to educate themselves in safety rules to follow while crossing railroad tracks, especially where there are two main tracks as in Bovina.



Trip To Spain, Morocco, Portugal

(Editor's Note: Mrs. Joe Mc- | found our train and jumped on Millian continues her report of a trip made by her and husband to interesting points of Spain, Morroco and Portugal, Thefollowing is the third installation of the series. -- DM)

We waited until 4 p.m. for the motorcar to Madrid. The trip was very pleasant, and we enjoyed looking at the pretty countryside. There was a great deal of farming along the way, but much of it looked hopeless without irrigation and on very rocky hillsides. Most of the plowing is done with crude wooden plows pulled by mules. We also saw some mules pumping water by walking around the wells in circles. There were some grape vineyards, a little cotton, corn fields and many olive trees. (Olive oil is used a great deal in Spain for cooking and salad dressings.) In both Spain and Morocco we saw many sheep and goats being herded on the

Our motorcar got into Madrid about 6:30 p.m. We were hoping to catch the 7:00 bus out to Terrejon AFB so we could mail some film, buy some more drinks, etc. for our train rides, and eat supper at the snackbar. It was 6:45 by the time we got off the train and finally found a taxi; we were afraid we trip. wouldn't be able to catch the bus at 7:00. We found a place to leave our bags for a few hours and just barely made the bus. It rained very hard all the way out to Torrejon and all the time we were there. We were planning to catch the next bus back to Madrid at 8:20 (according to the schedule we had), so we were running around splashing in the rain. We ate hotdogs and drank milkshakes and were all set to catch the bus at 8:15.

button from naval orange. Dinner, two eyes from Irish potato Friday; Breakfast, two lobster antennae, Lunch, one guppy fin.







established in Bovina in September, 1965, and little known to most residents, is a separate business from the Bovina

It not only "puts out" the Blade, but three other weekly newspapers as well, a monthly newspaper and a high school paper twice each month.

After all news copy, advertising, etc. is made ready tor The Blade in the front office, Dolph Moten Publishing takes over, as it does for Curry County Times and State Line Tribune in Farwell, both weekly newspapers published by Mr. and Mrs. John L. Getz; the weekly Mach Meter of Cannon Air Force Base in Clovis, published by Dolph Moten; the monthly New Mexico Food and Beverage News of Albuquerque, N.M. published by Joe Sylvester Covell; and the twice-monthly La Sesalpha, newspaper of Clovis High School.

In addition, Dolph Moten Publishing also makes upcirculars and mailers on a near-regular basis from over the Eastern New Mexico-West Texas area. Some limited preparation for job printing is also done, although the purpose is primarily for newspaper publication.

At the Bovina office, the straight matter is set on a machine called a Justowriter, operated by Mrs. Frances Collier, who also is production manager of Dolph Moten Publishing. The Justowriter punches codes on tape, is transferred to a Reproducer, which types the copy as it appears in the newspaper.

Advertising is pasted up by Mrs. Lou Garth of Farwell for all the publications.

Headlines and large type for advertising is set by Miss Letha Fletcher of Friona on two machines that operate strictly for that purpose.

All the staff work together to make up the pages of the news-

After the make-up is finished in Bovina the pages are taken to Friona where they are printed on the press of Plains Publishers, owned by W. H. Graham, Jr. of Lovington, N.M. and man-



NOTICE TO PARENTS Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1967 but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 31 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following: 1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank.

2. Call in person at the School Tax Office and get a census blank and fill it out. Remember, if your child will be six years old next September 1, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older next September 1 he should be counted now, All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.


Joe and I slept a while this morning after we changed trains, we could each stretch out on a side of the compartment, so it was very comfortable. Neither of us slept too well last night.
