

The 2001 Big Bend Seminars By Henry Lutz Program features timely new classes as well as several longtime favorites. The new seminars include a course on the topic of wildfires. Two seminars that have appeared in the past will be taught by new instructors, who will bring new perspectives: author and travel guide Alan Tennant will take over the snake seminar, April 21, and Big Bend National Park Wildlife Biologist Raymond Skiles will black bears.

In the past year wildfires scorched huge areas of the western United States and consumed large amounts of human effort and money. Although Big Bend was spared major fires in 2000, it has had its share in the recent past. This year the Big Bend Natural History Association introduces "Wildfire in the Park," taught by Bill Bourbon of the park's Fire Management office. The course will cover the natural role of fire the wilderness, how human activities affect the ignition, spread, and control of fires, and the effects fire has had in Big Bend.





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
