## STOCKHOLDERS ARE TOLD—

### Wheat Growers Elevator To Be Operating Soon

"We expect to have the elevator in operation by June 20," A. C. Teter, manager of Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc., told those present at the annual stockholders' meeting Monday night in the American Legion Hall.

A portion of the elevator's storage space and its headhouse were destroyed by fire last November. About 65 people attended the meeting.

Raymond Schueler of Rhea was elected to serve a three year term on the firm's board of directors. Other members of the board are M. E. Ezell, secretary; Durwood Bell, secretary; Buck Ellison and A. R. McCutchan.

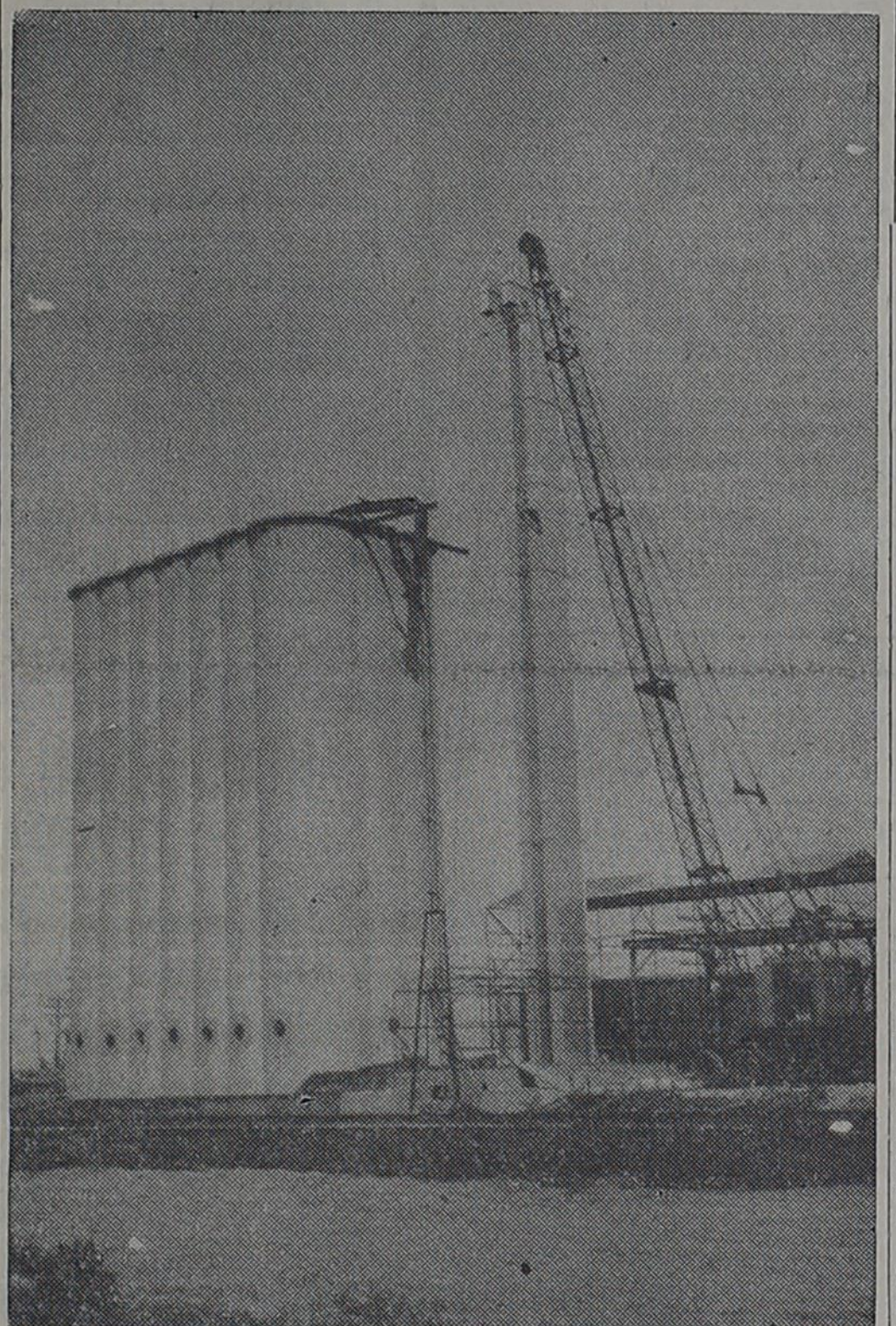
Teter told the group that the business had enjoyed an increase in

volume as well as in its number of patrons during 1955. He also said the fire loss had been satisfied by the insurance company and that there was no loss to any customer.

"Our present building project will increase our handling capacity as well as our storage space three fold," Teter went on to say. The building project is expected to be complete by September 15.

H. H. Delozier, auditor for the business, also spoke. He reported that the ratio of assets and liabilities were highest in history and that the indebtedness to Houston Bank for Co-ops had been retired.

## 30 County Men At Weed Meeting

About 30 Parmer County men and boys met in the Bovina Legion Hall last Thursday night. They were members of, and workers with, the Farm Bureau weed committee. Instructions for mapping bindweed plots and reporting them to the proper places were discussed and handed to the workers.

Bruce Parr, chairman, in charge of the meeting, explained plans for cutting the county map into sections for each team to carry in making its survey. He also had some bindweed plants to help impress the appearance of the weed upon the minds of the workers. County Agent Joe Jones discussed recommended amounts of sodium chlorate and method of applying it to infested areas. Five pounds per square rod was the minimum recommended volume, and the SCD has acquired three five-foot spreaders to be rented to farmers for application of chemicals. It had not been determined where the spreaders would be kept available from at the time of the meeting.

James Whitfield, ASC office manager, was also present and explained procedure for farmers to follow in getting ACP financial assistance in treating bindweed on

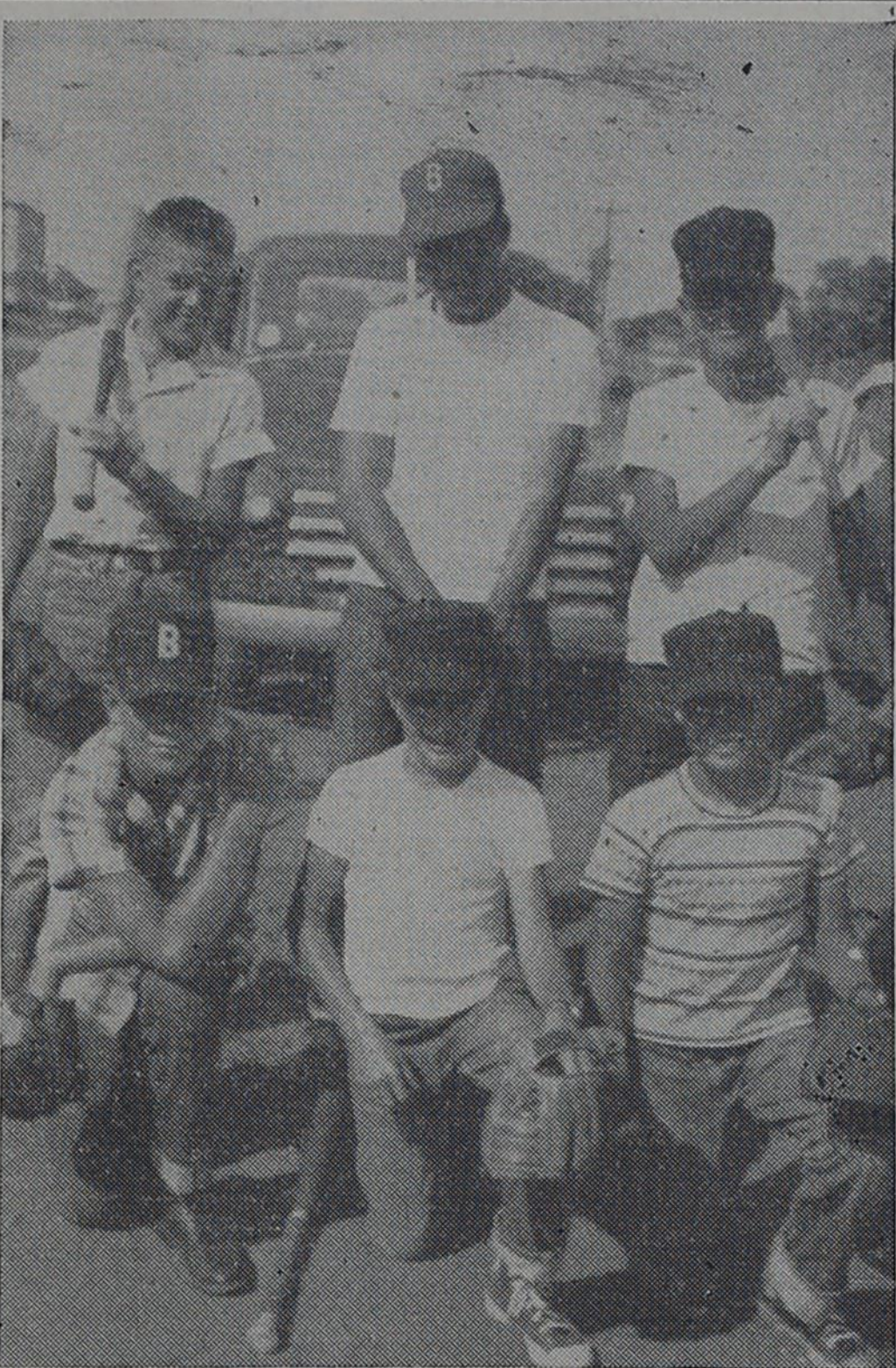
farm land. He emphasized two points: application must be made at the ASC office before treatment is begun; assistance is available for bindweed only, and plots reported for assistance will be checked by the ASC office.

Parr said that instruction sheets for obtaining assistance from commissioners on county rights-of-way, ASC for farm land, and other details would be available in the next few days from either the Farm Bureau office or the county agent's office.

Workers besides the committee-men include another farmer, an FFA boy and a 4-H boy for each half of a commissioner's precinct.

## OVER CROP—

### Wheat Farmers Not Excited This Year

With the 1956 wheat harvest for the Bovina area almost here, most wheat farmers aren't excited about their crop's expected production. In other words, this isn't figured to be a bumper crop year.

Dryland wheat, though there will be some made in various sections of the area, will, in most cases, be below average.

On the brighter side of the picture, however, some of the best irrigated wheat ever is expected to be made.

Harry Johnson of Shirley Grain Company says its "still too early" for him to make any predictions concerning whether this year's crop will average, above or below.

He did say that a few loads of dryland wheat were beginning to come in. Henry Ivy of Lazbuddie brought in the first load of wheat last week.

J. P. Macon, owner of Macon Elevator, says he feels this year's harvest will fall a little below average largely because of the scarcity of good dryland grain.

The harvest is expected to go into full swing next week. Some fields will be ready for cutting the latter part of this week. Only a very small percentage of the crop has already been harvested.

All in all, the general feeling is that the 1956 crop as a whole will be moderately successful but "it could've been better."

## TIED FOR FIRST PLACE—

### Bulls Stampede Past Friona, 7-5

Bovina's battling Bulls, playing possibly their best game of the season, stampeded past the league-leading Friona Chiefs Sunday afternoon on the local diamond.

Darrel Read, starting his first game of the season on the mound, for the Bulls, scattered seven hits along the nine inning route.

The game wasn't as close as the score indicates. The Bulls led throughout the game and were never in serious danger of losing the lead.

Bovina drew first blood in the first inning when, with two outs, Charles Don Smith singled and Billie Malcom tripled him home. They picked up another counter in the third when Robert McCormick doubled and Eddie Smith plated him with a single.

The Chiefs made the score 2-1 in the fourth when Davis was safe on a fielder's choice, went to second on an error and came home when a Bull outfielder misjudged a fly ball hit by Burris.

Bovina added two more tallies in the fifth when McCormick walked, Smith singled him to third and Dolph Moten squeeze bunted McCormick home and Smith to second. Smith came home on a wild throw by Carroll Howell, Friona first baseman, after Martin had grounded out.

Friona scored again in the sixth on two singles to make the score 4-2.

The Bulls made their last tallies in the sixth inning. Smith was safe on an error by Eddie Smith. Malcom hit a ground ball to the second baseman and in an attempt to get a double play both runners were safe. Read then tripled to deep right field to plate both runners and came home on Eddie Smith's third hit of the day—a single to left. Smith was thrown out trying to stretch his single to a double.

The losers rallied for three runs in the eighth. Oliver led off with a home run to right. Three errors by the Bull defense and another hit by Davis—his third of the day produced the other two runs.

Davis pitched six complete innings and was the losing pitcher. Stan Barret relieved Davis at the end of the sixth and pitched hitless ball the rest of the way, but the damage had already been done. Davis gave up a total of eight hits, walked three and struck out four. The Chiefs made three errors behind him. Barret struck out three of the six men he faced.

Eddie Smith with three hits, all singles, led the Bull hitters. Malcom had two, a triple and a single. McCormick, Charles Don Smith and Read had one each.

Moten, Adrian Martin, Billy

Richards, Art Mast and Jerry Rogers went hitless.

Read struck out 10 men, and walked one.

The win pulled Bovina up to a tie with Friona for first place in the Central Plains League. The teams have lost only to each other and their records stand 5-1. They will meet one more time in regular season play.

Next Sunday the Bulls play Vega at Vega. In the first game between these two teams, Bovina won 9-3.
