Yarborough's Our Choice

As we see it, the two leading candidates in the forthcoming gubernatorial election are Ralph W. Yarborough and Price Daniel. Possibly, one of the other four candidates—J. J. Holmes, W. Lee O'Daniel, Reuben Senterfitt and J. Everts Haley—have a chance to get in the running. We don't think so.

Our choice is Ralph W. Yarborough.

Yarborough, who calls himself the democratic candidate for governor, and we agree, has been telling the people of the State of Texas about the corruption in Austin for four years. The Veterans' land scandal and the insurance scandal, among other things made a lot of folks wish they had believed him earlier. They don't have any doubt now that we need a change in state government.

In Price Daniel, we would be getting a change as far as men are concerned, but Daniel is backed by the same group as Land Scandal Shivers has been during his tenure in office.

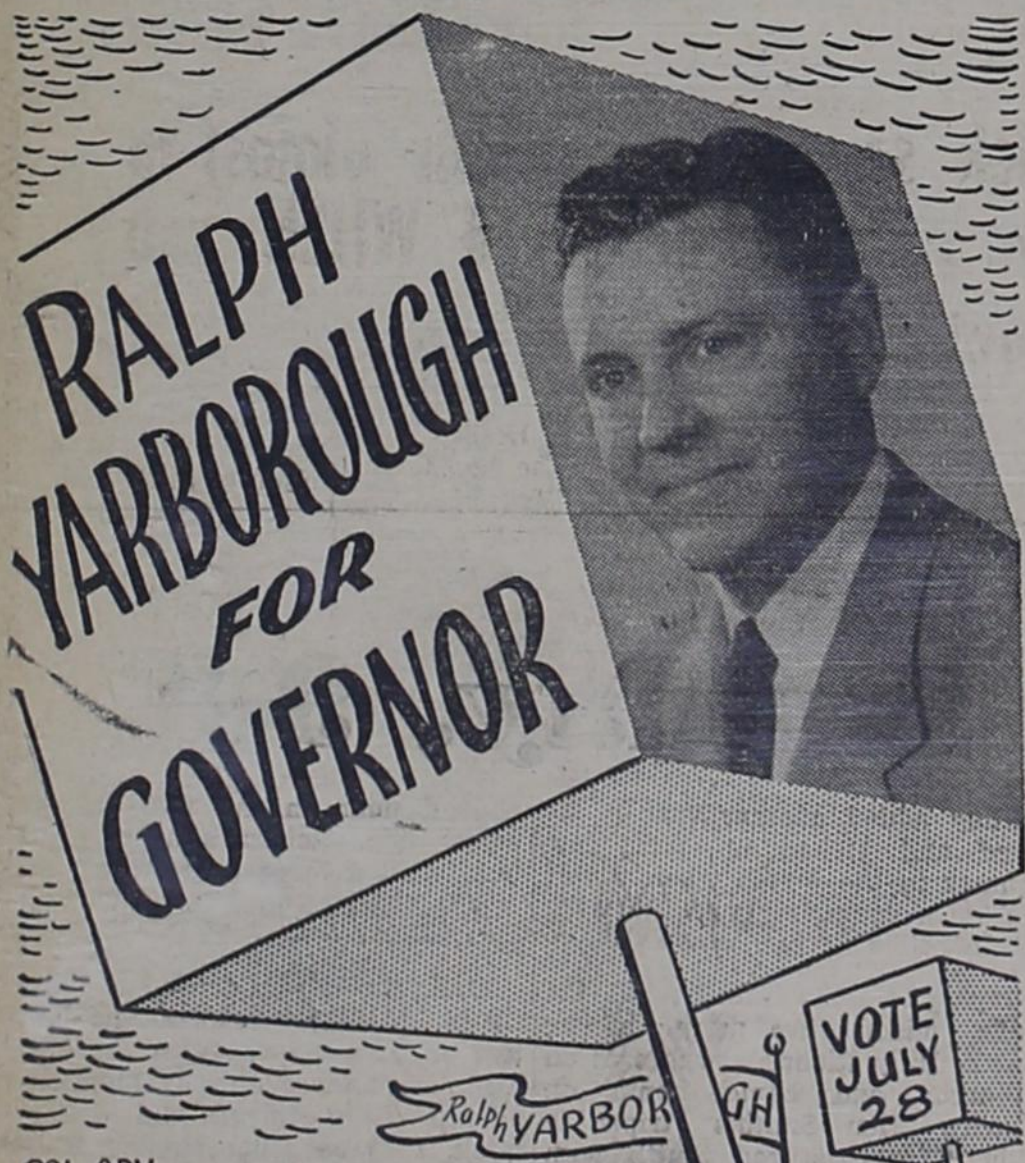
Included in the important things that Yarborough opposes are sales taxes and state income taxes.

Only three candidates in the gubernatorial race seem to be in the running in this section of the

country. Just sitting back and looking at these three objectively, have come to these conclusions.

Now take, 'ole J. Everts. He's an admitted historian. And seems to me that part of his platform dates back in history, too.

And then there's Yarborough. . . . Well, you've got to admire his tenacity to his desire to become governor, anyway.

Now Price Daniels seems, in my opinion, to be the best man for governor. He proved he was interested in this section of the country by his support of the grain sorghum legislation, and he would, I think, work for free enterprise. He hasn't made integration or "dirty government" an overblown issue in his campaign, as some gubernatorial candidates. In short, Daniels seems to give the indi-

vidual credit for his intelligence, that is, he sets his campaign up to appeal to your reason, not your emotion.

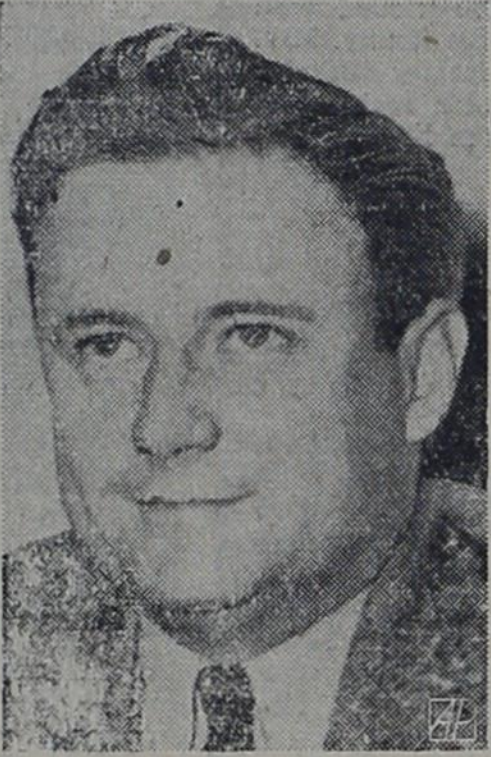

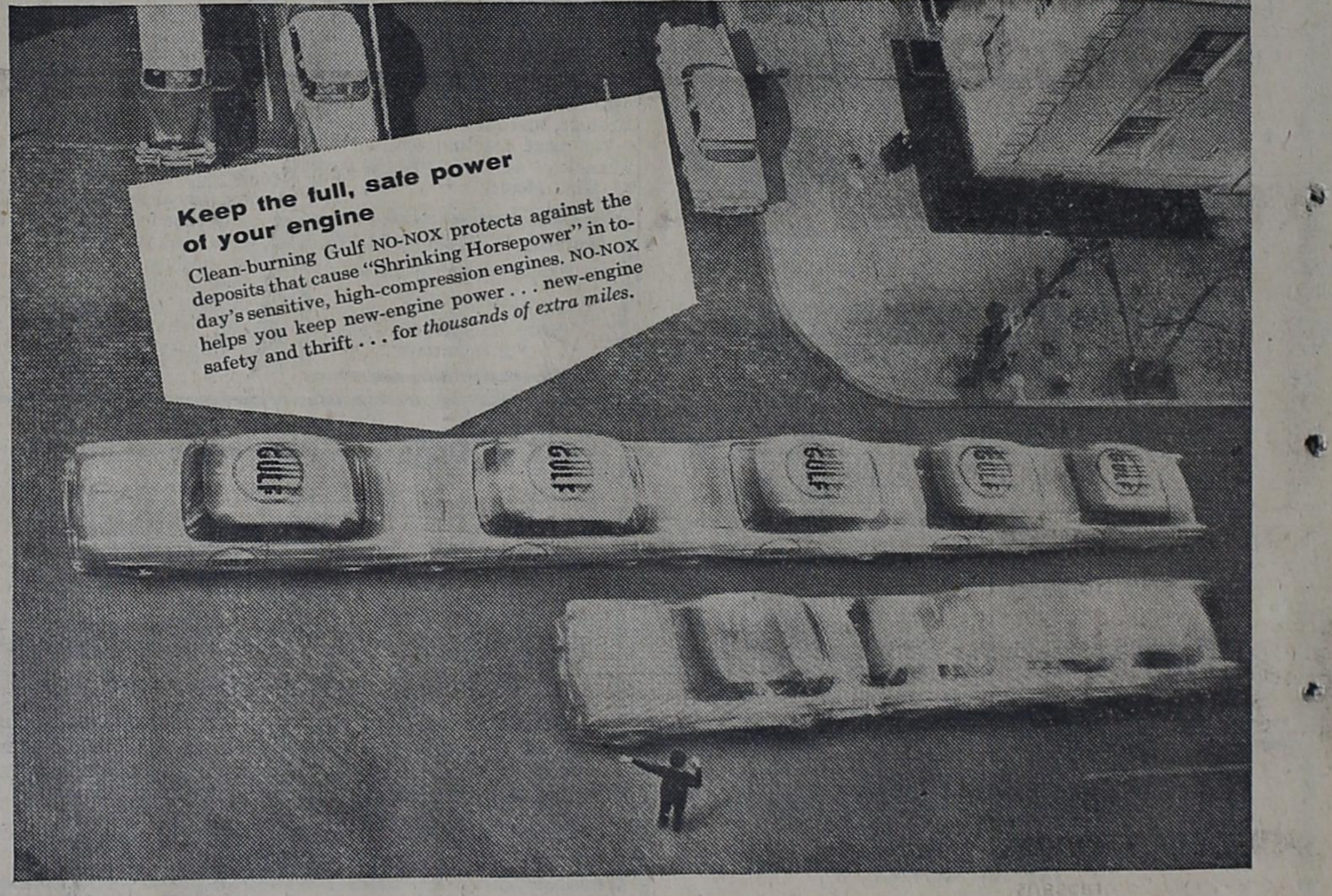
