



Local water district board again fails to meet ethical obligation to citizens

The Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District will try to pass its rules for the second time Tuesday as it holds another public hearing. As with the first hearing, Darlene Shahan, board secretary, published the notice of the agenda in the Del Rio News-Herald. It was published last Sunday — two days prior to the deadline for The Brackett News. The date for the hearing was set over two weeks ago. Shahan had ample time to publish the notice in the local newspaper. While publishing the notice in the News-Herald meets the district's legal obligations, we feel it does not meet its ethical obligations to the citizens it represents.

Water district rules limit rights of local property owners By Harvey Heiser

During the last two weeks, the Board of Directors of the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District has met twice and has strongly indicated, by the words and actions at those meetings, that they intend to adopt and to enforce procedural and substantive rules that limit the right of any property owner in Kinney County to drill water wells and to use water produced from those wells.

Some of the concerned residents and property owners have tried to bring to the board's attention that the laws of the state of Texas allow this taking of property rights only under specific conditions and after a carefully prepared groundwater management plan is developed, reviewed and approved by various authorities.

Some of the members of the board seem intent on disregarding those laws and on adopting those confiscatory rules without following the clear direction and intent of the Texas Water Code.

If the board does adopt the rules that were discussed at its workshop last Thursday, that action will likely lead to lawsuits and substantial legal fees that will be passed on to the taxpayers and water users of Kinney County. If damages are assessed by the court, those costs will also be passed along to the county's taxpayers.

Listed below are some state statutes worth considering. The bold italics are for emphasis and are not shown in Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code:

1. Permits for Wells. "The district may impose more restrictive permit conditions ... if the limitations: ... (2) bear a reasonable relationship to the existing district management plan; and (3) are reasonably necessary to protect existing use.

2. Management Plan. "Following notice and hearing, the district shall, in coordination with surface water management entities on a regional basis, develop a comprehensive management plan, which addresses the following management goals, as applicable: (1) providing the most efficient use of groundwater, (2) controlling and preventing waste of groundwater, (3) controlling and preventing subsidence, (4) addressing conjunctive surface water management issues, (5) addressing natural resource issues, (6) addressing drought conditions, and (7) addressing conservation." (Section 36.1071 (a) Texas Water Code)

3. "After January 5, 2002, a district management plan, or any amendments to a district management plan, shall be developed by the district using the district's best available data and forwarded to the regional water planning group for consideration in their planning process." (Section 36.1071 (b) Texas Wa-

4. "In the management plan described under Subsection (a), the district shall: ... (2) specify, in as much detail as possible, the actions, procedures, performance, and avoidance that are or may be necessary to effect the plan, including specifications and proposed rules." (Section 36.1071 (e) (2) Texas Water Code)

5. "In the management plan described under Subsection (a), the district shall: ... (3) include estimates of the following: (A) the existing total usable amount of groundwater in the district, (B) the amount of groundwater being used within the district on an annual basis, (c) the annual amount of recharge ... (D) the projected water supply and demand for water within the district, and (4) address water supply needs in a manner that is not in conflict with the appropriate approved regional water plan..." From the soil, water and sediment samples, bacteria are collected and grown in agar plates. They are identified to species and then the genetic material is extracted from the cells through commercially prepared processing kits.

The second step is to mix the genetic material with a color marker fluid and do gel electrophoresis separation. The marker and the fluid are injected into a "well" at the end of a gel and an electric current is passed through the gel. Depending on the electron charge of the elements with the genetic material, pieces are drawn along the current and trapped in the gel for analysis.

The third step is to "read the ribbons" of genetic material for any changes through polymerase chain reaction (PCR) analysis.


"After the PCR, we collect the data. That is the stage that indicates if there have been any changes. We know the pattern of the non-resistant bacteria. If it doesn't match, then we know there has been a change," said Causey.

This research is another piece of understanding how rapidly bacteria develop resistance to antibiotic substances. Scientists can then better anticipate the effects of these changes when making decisions regarding the use of antibiotics in the environ-

Causey, a West Texas native, grew up in Brackettville and McCamey. She has been teaching at Fort Davis High School for seven years. Along with teaching biology and ecology to her students, she also teaches English courses at the high school. Her research will lead to a master's of science degree in biology at Sul Ross.

For Causey, part of the reward in her laboratory research this summer has been in the opportunity to discuss bacteria and microbiology with her peers.


