## Accident claims four lives

Three Brackettville residents and a passenger died early Monday morning when their pick-up truck collided with a tractor-Bridge.

Nick Falcon, 28, Julie Lopez-Garcia, 28, and her onemonth-old son, Christian Nicholas Falcon, were pronounced dead at the scene, as well as Roger Bundy.

Bundy, a 54-year-old homeless man, was a passenger in Falcon's 1999 Dodge pick-up truck.


