As Elder reported, critics of Madla's legislation complain that the bill would undermine local control and open the door for water speculators to raid rural water resources.

In a perfect world, one could lament legislative intervention in Austin can attest, the Legislature isn't shy about intervening in local issues when provoked.

The merits of Madla's bill will be debated fiercely. What's clear in this, however, is a crying need for stronger conflict-of-indistricts. Authority carries responsibility, and directors of groundwater districts must understand that their decisions on protecting a precious resource

Mount McKinley in Alaska, over 20,000 feet high, is the highest peak in North America.




