Water district grants rehearing on its rules

The Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District Board of Directors granted motions for rehearings on its rules Monday during a special meet-

The rehearing will be held on May 9 at 5:30 p.m.

Directors Don Hood, Chuck Hall, Chris Ring, Cecil Smith, Hadley Wardlaw and Bob Young voted to grant the motions. Board member Darlene Shahan was absent from the meeting.

Hood's motion was that "all pending motions for rehearing on the rules be granted, but only to the extent that the board shall set a rehearing and consider amendments to the rules and not to the extent that the rules adopted Jan. 7 are withdrawn or otherwise affected as requested in the pending motions.

The bill was introduced by Sen. Frank Madla, who said the local water district "has had some difficulties and some problems that I felt needed to be addressed."

"In creating the district, there were two important objectives that were emphasized," he said. "The first was that the district would be funded through ad-valorem taxes and export fees, rather than production fees paid by the local landowners. The second objective was that local landowners and that local water utilities would be protected by preserving their historic use and their groundwater rights."

Currently, the district is being supported by ad-valorem taxes and production fees.

NOTICE OF ACCEPTANCE OF APPLICATIONS FOR FEDERAL AGRICULTURE ASSISTANCE FUNDS

In accordance with Public Law 108-10, Section 209, the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) is administering the distribution to agricultural producers of \$10 million in federal agriculture assistance funds from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation. On May 1, 2003, TDA will begin accepting agriculture assistance fund applications at local water irrigation district offices and other designated locations in the Rio Grande Valley from agricultural producers who rely on irrigation water from the Rio Grande and who were impacted by decreases in water allocations due to Mexico's noncompliance with the 1944 U.S. - Mexico Water Treaty during the 2002 crop year.

Eligibility Criteria. To be eligible for agriculture assistance funds:

1. An agricultural producer's farming acreage must be located in: Cameron, Hidalgo, Kinney, Maverick, Starr, Webb, Val Verde, Willacy or Zapata counties;

2. The acreage on which the agricultural producer is farming must have been eligible for water allocations for agricultural use in the Rio Grande Watermaster system through irrigation water rights either individually or through a water irrigation district (eligible acreage) during the 2002

3. An agricultural producer must have had the right to farm eligible acreage on January 1, 2002. Producers meeting established eligibility criteria are eligible to receive assistance under this program, regardless of crop variety or intended agricultural use. The distribution of assistance will be based upon the number of acres eligible for allocation of water for agricultural use.

Submitting an Application. Applications will be accepted beginning May 1, 2003.

Applications forms are available at local water irrigation district offices, at local Texas Cooperative Extension (TCE) offices, at local Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices and from the Rio Grande Watermaster, as well as on TDA's Web site at: www.agr.state.tx.us. Applications submitted from a producer directly to TDA will not be accepted. Applications from producers purchasing water from a water irrigation district must be submitted to TDA through the producer's local water irrigation district office. Individual water rights holders (independents) in counties where there are water irrigation district offices must submit applications at their local water irrigation district office. Independents in counties where there are no water irrigation district offices (Kinney, Starr, Webb, Val Verde and Zapata counties) may submit applications at their county FSA office or at the closest water irrigation district office. Applicants must submit their application to their local water irrigation district offices or other designated locations in order to have the amount of acreage eligible for assistance certified at those offices. Eligible acreage for independents will be certified using records provided by the Rio Grande Watermaster. Local water irrigation district offices and other designated locations will then be responsible for forwarding completed applications to TDA for processing. Applicants will also be required to complete an application for a State of Texas Payee ID number, as part of the application for the agriculture assistance funds, if they do not already have this number on record with the Office of the State Comptroller. These forms will be provided by TDA as part of the application packet.

Deadline for Submission of Applications.

The deadline for submitting an application for agriculture assistance to water irrigation district offices or other designated locations for certification is by close of business on June 16, 2003. TDA will distribute funds after all valid applications are processed.
