



Citizens petition county tax hike

Kinney County citizens are petitioning the county's 12 percent tax hike.

J.J. Guidry, editor of The Brackett News and a former city councilman, presented the petition, signed by 362 citizens, during Monday's Commissioners Court meeting.

The petition is for a countywide election to determine whether or not to reduce the county tax rate for the current year to the rollback tax rate.

"I think it is obvious that the average income in Kinney Coun-ty hasn't increased 12 percent so we don't feel it's fair that the county's taxes increase 12 percent," Guidry said. "We're confident we could have obtained many more signatures, but we wanted to get the petition to the court in a timely manner.

According to the state tax code, the Commissioners Court now has 20 days to "determine

Both chambers adjourned sine die Sunday, dav." ending the Legislature's third special session of the year.

Democrats said they will continue to fight the new congressional map.

The map "decimates deep South Texas, the deep border region, and it disenfranchises millions," said Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo. "At the risk of sounding like Scarlett, tomorrow is another day."

Republicans were savoring their hard-fought success.

The Senate adjourned before 7:30 p.m., more than three and a half hours after the House did.

The end of the legislative battle over redistricting came months after it began and two days before Tuesday's required end of this year's third special session.

"I feel a sense of relief," McClendon said. "This session has been completely uncalled-for, and I am glad we are adjourning and can save the taxpayers two days of expenditures."

Rep. Elizabeth Ames Jones, R-San Antonio, said, "I'm glad it's over."

The new map is expected to give the GOP a majority in the state's delegation in the U.S. House, in which Texas Democrats now hold a 17-15 majority.

Some have estimated the measure could result in as many as seven new Republican victories. But House Speaker Tom Craddick, R-Midland, has said he expects no more than a total of 20 Republicans under the redrawn districts.

"Redistricting is important if we're going to have the people of Texas represented fairly," said Craddick, who succeeded in seeing creation of a congressional seat that will be anchored in his home city.

Texas is part of a bigger national fight, said political scientist Bruce Buchanan of the University of Texas at Austin.

'Most people see the Texas issue as a subset of a larger fight for dominance in American politics," he said. "Republicans more systematically and so far effectively have mobilized resources to try to secure their tenuous hold on power."

Republicans hold 229 of the 435 seats in the U.S. House, in which there is one independent.

Texas Democrats have vigorously fought redistricting with efforts including two walkouts, fleeing first to Oklahoma and then to New Mexico to break a quorum and keep legislative business from being conducted.
