Fort Clark Springs: A new city?

Members to discuss city issue Aug. 14

Fort Clark Springs members will be able to discuss the issue of incorporating into a municipality at Town Hall meeting on

Aug. 14. A member discussion during Saturday's monthly Board of Directors meeting turned into a question-and-answer session between Maurice Kerzee and the board.

"We will address this whole issue on Aug. 14," said Tom Saylor, president of the board. "It will be the only subject discussed at the meeting.

Kerzee asked the directors: "If this is not the place to do it, before our representatives, where is the place to do it?"

"He just told you several times we're going to have a meeting in August," Director Ray Reyna said. "Everybody will be able to present their side.


Kerzee said he wanted the minutes to reflect that he was "kicked out of this meeting and I failed to talk with this board."

Kerzee was not kicked out of the meeting, but the directors did choose to adjourn after his questions led to personal attacks on individuals in attendance.

"You didn't address the board you did not make a presentation," Saylor told Kerzee. "I'm not going to get into an argument with you here. We're not going to debate this issue. We'll do that later."

Kerzee was questioning the board about the adhoc committee studying the feasibility of forming a city within Fort Clark

Help lower speed limit on 90

U.S. 90, you'll suddenly dip actions. down into a deep valley full of small businesses, slow drivers and children. No signs clearly warn you of the stop light at the intersection of U.S. 90 and Ann Street. You may discover that you just don't have time to stop when the light changes.

It's not just a Brackettville action. issue, either. Cars speeding west towards Del Rio have careened past Fort Clark drivers, rolling peacefully across the highway to the Post Office or grocery store.

In fact, on U.S. Highway 90 in Brackettville, there have been three traffic accidents involving fatalities in recent memory.

The new correctional facility being built will only add to our heavy east-west traffic, and add more people turning in the "valley of danger" that our current traffic rules have created.

The real problem is we're driving too fast - if you've been driving faster than the posted speed limit, that's a big problem. But even if you've been keeping the speed limit, if you and at least 85 percent of the recorded traffic drive a given speed, the speed limit will be



The Texas Department of Transportation performs an engineering study to see how fast everyone is driving - and computes the 85 percent average. But even if the latest engineering study doesn't reduce the speed limit, we can still take

The Texas Transportation Commission has the authority to mandate speed changes if the speed limit "is unreasonable or unsafe" after examining the engineering study.

We can make sure the commissioners know our concerns face to face at their monthly meeting in Austin. The whole process of appeal to the commission takes about 180 days. I am sure we'll want to ask our legislative representatives to attend the hearing with us.

Please sign petitions you will find at local business and The Brackett News office, and get ready for a trip to Austin to confront those who can make a change for the good of our community. We'll need more than loud voices, we'll need voters. Roger Baker

Your vote matters!

The great American heroine Susan B. Anthony once said, "Suffrage is the pivotal right." Today, voting is still one of the most significant rights extended to United States citizens. This presidential election year provides an excellent opportunity to exercise this right.

Under British rule, the American colonists were forced to pay taxes to Great Britain, yet they had no one to represent their interests in Parliament. The colonists rebelled against this policy of "taxation without representation," fought a major war to win independence, and then founded the United States of America as a republic. This form of government would allow the citizens to elect people who would then represent their interests in Congress.

For many, the new government was an improvement over British rule, but not all could enjoy this new, hard-fought right. Initially, only white, male, property owners could vote. It was nearly 200 years before all American citizens over the age of 18 had the right to

Less than a century ago, women could not legally vote. The Women's Suffrage Movement, led by Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton throughout the latter part of the 19th Century, argued women should also have a say in who represented them. In 1920, the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution finally granted women the right to vote.

While black men were enfranchised by the 15th Amendment at the end of the Civil War, many African Americans still were obstructed from casting their votes in several states until the mid-1960s. A major element of the Civil Rights Movement focused on getting African Americans registered to vote and calling an end to tactics, such as poll taxes and property ownership requirements, which created hurdles for many blacks from being able to vote. It was not until 1965, not quite 50 years ago, that African Americans were able to freely exercise their right to vote.

During the height of the Vietnam War, Americans expressed their concern over the idea that men could be drafted to fight in a war at 18, yet could not vote until they turned 21. With the passing of the 26th Amendment in 1971, nearly every U.S. citizen over the age of 18 could register to vote

Surprisingly, however, less than half of the voting age population votes. Many Americans may have forgotten the historical significance of being able to vote or believe their votes don't matter. Others neglect to register in time to vote in an elec-

For instance, in Texas you must be registered to vote at least 30 days prior to the election. This means if you are not registered by Oct. 3, you will have forfeited your right to cast a vote for our next president on Election Day, Nov. 2.

Don't pass up your opportunity to vote. Registration is as easy as going to your local Department of Motor Vehicles.

For information about polling locations and other local election details, you can contact the Office of the Texas Secretary of State at www.sos.state.tx.us or call them at (800) 252-VOTE.

If you know you won't be in your home district on Election Day, you can still cast your vote. Just be sure to contact your county election official in advance to request an early or absentee ballot.

Also, the Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP) serves military and non-military citizens abroad by helping them register and vote by absentee

History is ripe with tales of elections that were decided by close margins - even a single vote in some cases — so remember your vote does count. Voting is more than a right, it's a responsibility.

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Hash brown casserole is well worth the effort

I certainly do love potatoes. Fix them anyway you like and I'll fill my plate.

I tried this recipe this week. It's just a little different from an old standby. It takes a while to cook, but I think I'll serve it again.

Cracker Barrel Hash **Brown Casserole**

1 26-ounce bag frozen country-style hash browns

2 cups shredded Colby Cheese

1/4-1/2 cup minced onion

2 tablespoons butter, melted dash garlic powder

salt if desired 1/4 teaspoon ground black pep-

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Combine the frozen hash browns, cheese and onion in a

large bowl. Mix the milk, beef stock, half of melted butter, garlic powder, salt and pepper in another bowl. Mix well and pour over the po-

tato mixture and blend well. I use vinyl or latex gloves to be able to break up the frozen pieces for better consistency, and then mix with my hands.

Heat the remaining butter in a large ovenproof skillet (9 or 10 inches) over high heat.

When the skillet is hot, spoon in the potato mixture. Cook, stirring occasionally, until hot and all of the cheese has melted. It 1/2 cup beef stock or canned takes about seven minutes.

Put the skillet into the oven and bake for 45 minutes to an hour, or until the surface of the hash browns are dark brown. The finished dish is nice and

Just a note: Upon removing the frozen hash browns from the freezer, gently, but firmly, break large pieces of frozen potatoes into small ones before opening the bag, by pressing the bag on the counter edge or top, or what

ever works for you. To mix the casserole well, potato pieces should not be in clumps larger than 11/2 inches, which can be crushed with fingers later without a problem.



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



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
