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## Livestock show readies for 62 exhibitors this weekend

Local officials are ready for the more than 60 exhibitors expected for the Silver Anniversary of the Kinney County 4-H and FFA Livestock Show.

The event is Friday and Saturday in the Kinney County Civic Center.

Members of the local 4-H and FFA, both juniors and seniors will participate in the two day event.

The event begins with the weigh in of all market animals from 7 a.m. to noon on Friday.

Showing begins Friday with rabbit classes at 2 p.m., steer classes at 4, meat goat doe kids at 4:30, commercial ewe lambs at 5 and swine at 5:30.

Showing continues on Saturday with market lamb classes at 8 a.m. and market goat classes at 9:30 a.m.

The livestock show includes a barbecue lunch at noon on Saturday, followed by awards presentations at 1:30 and the premium sale at 2.

The auction raises funds for scholarships and various programs through the 4-H and FFA.

## Solis honored for years of service to elections

The Kinney County commissioner's court presented a distinguished service award to Paulita Solis.

Solis received the award of appreciation for her 45 years of service to elections in Kinney's Pct. 4.

The presentation was made during the Kinney County Commissioner's Court Monday by Pct. 4 Commissioner Pat Melancon.

Melancon lauded Solis for her dedication and knowledge of the ever changing election laws.

Precinct 4 election judge Gil Raymer said "I am amazed at her knowledge of the election laws. I was a novice (in 1996) but had worked elections elsewhere.

"Even though I relied on Paulita's knowledge of Texas voting procedure, I didn't know at the time just how long she had been serving the county.

"During the last election I learned of her performance for the county. I then approached Pct. 4 Commissioner Melancon to see if the County could recognize her for her service. It is so fitting for a person that performs a service for not only our county but for our great country," Raymer added.

Solis noted she was honored with the presentation and still intends to continue helping with elections.

In other county news, the court approved the development of a tax exemption policy which encourages owners of Recorded Texas Historic Landmark properties to restore, preserve and maintain such properties as per the Texas property Tax Code.

The court also approved the

addition to the existing county jail. The addition will have three offices and evidence storage.

The court also approved the appointment of Rene Diaz, who is County Judge Herb Senne's administrative assistant, as the Kinney County Civic Center Manager.

## Strayhorn estimates budget is \$400 million in black

Says the shortfall is in Governor's leadership

AUSTIN - Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn today released the biennial revenue estimate, saying a scant \$400 million extra will be available after meeting current spending levels of state government over the next two years.

Strayhorn reported to the 79th Legislature that the state will have \$64.7 billion in general revenue available for her certification of the budget for the 2006-2007 biennium. Revenue available from all funds of state government, including federal funds, will total \$130.5 billion.

The 79th Legislature will have \$6.4 billion more in general revenue than was appropriated by the 78th Legislature. However, Strayhorn said \$6 billion of that new money would be needed to maintain today's spending levels through fiscal year 2007.

"Our state's great economic engine is improving," Strayhorn said. "We have experienced 16 months of positive sales tax

growth. Seven of the 10 economic indicators I watch every day are up. "I expect to see a continuation of growth trends in 2005 and into the next biennium," she said. "Growth in the economy reflected in my estimate will be solid and sustained. I am projecting growth in the gross state product of 3.5 percent in fiscal year 2005, and 3.2 percent in both 2006 and 2007."

Strayhorn warned that while writing a budget is hard work, "The issue that will define this session is school finance."

"I say no matter how strong our economy is, fixing our broken school finance system cannot be done within our existing revenue estimate," she said. "The governor needs to show the people of Texas a real school finance reform plan that will cut skyrocketing local property taxes, have the state pick up more of the tab, and have equity.

"We must drive more of ev-

ery education dollar directly into the classroom with the teachers and the students where it belongs," Strayhorn said. "And we need to say out loud: We need more money for education."

"Texas has just enough money to continue following Gov. Perry in doing a poor job for our citizens," she said. "It means that we could continue to follow the governor in balancing the budget right on the backs of our school teachers and our most vulnerable Texans with billions and billions of dollars in fees, charges, and out-of-pocket expenses—and avoid hard decisions about the future. That's the governor's record, but that's not what hard-working Texans want. That's not the Texas way and it cannot continue.

"There is no shortfall when it comes to the budget," Strayhorn said. "There is a shortfall when it comes to the governor's leadership."

## Commissioner's Court approves agreement

Spofford nets \$603,323 TxDOT grant

The Kinney County Commissioner's Court signed an approval Thursday by the Texas Transportation Commission for projects along the Texas-Mexico border region.

The action is follow up to Gov. Rick Perry's request in July to the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue bonds that will fund the construction projects.

TxDOT began accepting project proposals immediately after that.

"We will continue to fulfill our role in helping to improve transportation for those living in areas where better roadways are desperately needed," said Jim Randall, TxDOT's director of transportation planning and programming.

Unpaved and deteriorated roads in many of the state's border colonia communities cause transportation and drainage problems. In 2001, Texas voters approved a \$175 million bond package to support the road improvement program.

Border colonia residents will continue to see roadway improvements come their way with

the approval Thursday by the Texas Transportation Commission for projects along the Texas-Mexico border region.

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## Mayes: City's debt dropping

In her report to the Brackettville City Council, City Secretary Bonnie Mayes reported that the debt owed to West Texas Gas is at \$5,007.13.

She notes that when she was hired, the city owed approximately \$61,000.

Also in her report she noted that persons from outside the county were leaving trash outside the city's transfer station on Highway 90 West.

In regards to the Kinney County Civic Center, Mayes also reported that the water meter "has not been read since who knows when."

She also said that it would take an approximate \$10,000 for the city to clean the brush area and have it in compliance with Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). Council member Matt Bland said attempts to open the old brush area on Texas Highway 2804 were in the works.

The council also approved all

municipal holidays for 2005. The first is Monday, Jan. 17 in observance of Martin Luther King Jr.

Then Feb. 21 for President's Day; March 2 for Texas Independence; March 25 is Good Friday; May 30 is Memorial Day, June 19 for Juneteenth; July 4 Independence Day; Sept. 5 Labor Day; Nov. 11 Veterans Day; Nov. 24 and 25 for Thanksgiving Day; Dec. 26 for Christmas. The employees will also receive their birthday as a holiday.

On these dates, city hall as well as the transfer station, will be closed.

Council member Tomas Gomez noted that perhaps closing the transfer station four days in a row would not be the best situation.

The council is also planning a workshop to revise and review its personnel policy.


The workshop is slated for Tuesday, Jan. 18 at 6:30 p.m.

## Glory in War

What is death with honor? What is dying in performance of your duty? Why do we place the term glory alongside the horror of bloody war?

War is terrible. There is no possible way to describe combat to someone who has never experienced it. There is no glory in combat. At the time there is only fear, and duty, and instinct, and training. No, that's wrong. Often there is no fear. There is no time for fear. Training takes over and your mind only focuses on what has to be done and not on the consequences of those actions. Fear comes after the shooting has stopped. Strange, isn't it?

What should our reactions be to the death of a comrade in arms, or a beloved child who died defending a nation, or the death of a friend, or of a person under our command? Should we be happy that they died with honor? Should we feel elation at the glory they brought upon themselves? Hell, no!

Death in combat is a terrible thing. It is ugly — uglier than most of us can imagine. The smell of blood and guts and feces and urine can permeate the air. The smell of death is never forgotten by those who have experienced it. And they have no wonderful, warm, fuzzy feelings about those who they killed or those that died beside them. Death is not easy.

What should we feel? Pride? Anguish? Revulsion? Yes, and more.

Death is not easy. It isn't meant to be easy. It is meant to be ugly. We should feel bad about death. However, we should understand that the young men and women who die in combat, almost to a person, knew the risks, accepted the risks, and were willing to die for something they believed in. We should not lessen their sacrifice by turning our sadness into rage at their deaths. We should honor their decision to serve.

Glory is an aftereffect of war. Glory is given to the warriors, both the dead and the survivors, by those who weren't there. Anyone searching for glory in combat is a fool, a dangerous fool. Death should never be easy to accept, but it should be allowed to be meaningful.

Their sacrifice is not meaningless — not even in a meaningless cause. Their sacrifice is what makes us hate war and want to avoid it at all costs. Honor them! Mourn for them!

Love them! But don't make the mistake of blaming them for serving. Vietnam was a mistake! It was a mistake by those who sent the soldiers there to die, and a mistake by those who reviled those young patriots when they returned from war.

We were never there to win,

and no one has ever won a war that had limits and boundaries. The only way to win a war is to find the enemy and kill him. If he steps across a line on a map, you go after him and kill him there. There is no safety zone. Our reasons for Vietnam were righteous, the way we fought it was tragic.

Iraq is not a mistake! We are there for a high moral cause. We are there to right more than one wrong. The reasons we went are now immaterial. Were they right or wrong? Who cares? We did a good thing. We should have known that it would turn into a cesspool. That is what happens when a Muslim nation, under a dictator is released from bondage. Part of the people see it as an opportunity to build a great nation; part see it as an opportunity to take their turn in the seat of power; and some see it as an opportunity to let Allah have his way and turn the country into a misguided theocracy.

We are not going to leave Iraq as a functioning democracy. It ain't gonna happen. I'm sorry to say it, but civil war in Iraq is a forgone conclusion. Democracy of the type we enjoy in the United States will not work in a Muslim country. The Muslims/Arabs have been fighting themselves and others since Ishmael had children. God himself told us so, and he was right. If they have no enemies to fight, they will fight each other. Now we are there and they have someone to fight. They don't care why we're there, just our presence is sufficient to justify a Jihad. When we leave they will again choose up sides and fight each other.

We have lost many young soldiers in Iraq. They died for a just cause. Is that supposed to make it easier to bear? No! But it is supposed to make it count for something.

Honor the memory of our warriors and give them love and support. They are heroes, treat them as such! I am not going to close with a Bible verse today. Instead I will leave you with these quotes.

"People sleep peacefully in their beds at night only because rough men stand ready to do violence on their behalf." - George Orwell

"War is an ugly thing, but not the ugliest of things. The ugliest is the man who thinks nothing is worth fighting and dying for and lets men better and braver than himself protect him." - John Stuart Mill, 1859.

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

### Squash Dressing





One of the questions I am frequently asked is, "How should I donate?"

The answer is, of course, very carefully.

I'm not too keen on organizations that are solely run by the U.N., but after the oil for food issues are straightened out, I might be willing to listen again.

I like religious charities for obvious reasons, but not all of them.

Here is the way I check on a group before I give.

First, I look at reputation. Reputation is more than just a headline; it includes a charity's years of service and freedom from excessive spending.

The Salvation Army is a good example of a religious charity with a stellar reputation and years of service.

I also look at how much the charity spends on its own overhead.

Usually, a maximum of 25 percent should go to overhead - many charitable organizations get by on far less.

If a charity doesn't publish these figures, they won't get a check from me.

The American Red Cross excels at charitable management, spending less than 8 percent on overhead and fundraising.

I look at the IRS filings of religious groups, too.

Most church organizations file an IRS Form 990 that among other things explains who runs the organization and how much they receive.

I'm not ready to send my money to an organization that pays millions of dollars to its directors.

I also have an issue with organizations whose board of directors consists of a single family - not much oversight there!

The independent groups ECFA, GuideStar, and Charity Navigator all have websites that

will help you spot the wolves among the sheep.

For those of us attending church regularly, your denomination probably already has a funding mechanism to get the money to where it is needed.

Supporting your church group is a good idea because you can hold them accountable. Don't have a denominational group?

You can send a tax-deductible check to the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) at 475 Riverside Drive, Room 330, New York, NY 10115 (write Advance No. 274305 in the memo section of the check.).

You can also call Toll Free 1-800-554-8583 to donate over the phone.

One hundred percent of the donation goes to the affected areas.

## Governor signs proclamation

Texas, Colorado agree on concealed handguns

Texas Gov. Rick Perry has signed a proclamation allowing citizens with concealed handgun licenses issued by Colorado to legally carry concealed handguns in Texas.

Based on this proclamation, Colorado law allows Texas citizens with concealed handgun licenses to legally carry concealed handguns in Colorado.

This action has the same effect as a reciprocal agreement. This is the 15<sup>th</sup> reciprocity agreement Texas has reached with another state. (These agree-

ments were made possible by 1997 and 2003 changes to the Texas concealed handgun law.)

Texas also has reciprocity agreements with Arkansas, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Montana, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Utah and Wyoming.

"Texans should remember that laws vary from state to state, and before traveling, license holders should educate themselves." DPS Director Col. Thomas Davis Jr. said.


