



Kinney Water District Accused of Ignoring own permit rules

BRACKETTVILLE — If only they could go back. That's what Kinney County are now saying interested in following their own and were carrying out some about their decision to vote in a water district here.

"Everyone knows what's going on here," Terrill says. "They're trying to stop water marketing, and to do that they made a decision to issue historic use permits in the smallest amount possible."

Terrill does not represent any so-called "water marketers," yet he contends his clients got "slaughtered" in the permitting process because the board disregarded its own rules.

Toledo Boulware, who has a 4100-acre farm of which 3000 acres were irrigated during the historic period. Boulware claimed a little more than 17,000 acre-feet of water. Walthour recommended a little more than 15,000 acre-feet, but the district voted to give him approximately 6600 acre-feet.

"Boulware got cut by almost 9000 acre-feet, or about 44 permended," Terrill says.

It appears the board tended to agree, but Terrill says that in doing so, the board strayed from its own rules. Nowhere in the rules is there mention of irrigation efficiency as a basis for permitting of historic or existing use, he points out.

"The property that is now owned by Justin Burk was irrigated back in the 1960s using unlined ditches and furrow A case in point, he says, is flood," Terrill notes. "The protesters and the board have attempted to apply modern standards of waste to what was not wasteful back in the 1960s. Not only was it not wasteful, it was customary. That was the norm.'


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

Attorney General Abbott alleged Blockbuster's advertising ment with Texas and 46 other campaign failed to clearly disclose that a consumer who rented a video or game from Blockbuster and kept it out more than seven days after its due date ciated with a rental that has been would be charged the selling price of the video or game.

If the consumer later wanted to return the item, he would be charged a "restocking" fee of at least \$1.25.

Abbott also alleged Blockbuster didn't sufficiently disclose that the "No Late Fees" program was offered only at participating stores - a fact that caused some customers to rent items under the false impression they would not have to pay late fees.

"Advertisers may not use catchy slogans if those slogans are misleading," Attorney General Abbott said.

Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income-such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10% to 50% penalty may be imposed.

Are there any advantages to you?

Tour homes will be open dur- museums and places of interest The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value change and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2004. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2005.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2005 renditions is April 15. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owns a home on January 1 and uses it as a primary residence on that date is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemp-

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 or disabled exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The county, city or junior college may adopt a tax ceiling to lock in 2005 taxes as the highest amount for 65 and older or disabled homeowners.) The over-65 homeowner's school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. The age 65 or older homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's school tax ceiling, to a new home

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2004, you won't need to reapply for 2005 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home-or if you've moved to a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 2005. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the age 65 or older exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled, you need to file for the

Water district accused of ignoring its own rules

Jim McDaniel farms in the water-rich Pinto Valley. McDaniel has an artesian well capable of pumping 1000 gallons a minute.

Branded a water marketer, McDaniel has been right smack in the middle of the water controversy from the very begin-

He says he does not have any plans to stop farming in the near future, but at the same time he admits that if he chooses to quit farming at some point, he wants the right to do what he wishes with his water so long as he does not harm his neighbors.

The board voted to cut McDaniel's permit for existing use by about a third and his historic use 61 percent. In the end, he was permitted 1308 acre-feet.

"I can still probably get by in a wet year," McDaniel says, "but in a dry year I'm dead. I'll get to June and then I'll have to get on my knees in front of this board to ask for more water so I can finish out my crop."

McDaniel has also leased the Gilbert Woodward family farm which overlies the Edwards Trinity and Austin Chaulk aquifers. The absentee landowner asked McDaniel to handle his permit application.

McDaniel hired an attorney to assist him with the permitting process on his own farm, in part because he had to prove up use on artesian wells. "The majority of the board members didn't seem to be bothered by that, though. I asked to address the board, and they wouldn't even let me state my objection on the record. That's how interested they were in engaging in reasoned discussion. Then they proceeded right to a vote, and they voted to cut my clients significantly without giving any thought to the objections I outlined in the pleading. They already had their minds made

There have been numerous complaints of conflict of interest, such as board members publicly protesting some applications and in some cases even offering testimony from the dais during hearings.

"It's unethical," Terrill says, "because these board members been filed with the Attorney are sitting as fact finders, and yet they've clearly shown that they have no impartiality.'

Jim and Jennifer McDaniel have filed an ethics violations against two board members. In part, the violations have to do with members of Save Our Water who also happen to be district board members, running for the tape. He has yet to receive reelection on a campaign to save the county's water.

Terrill understands why the McDaniels are upset.

"Those board members announced their predisposition for the outcome of some of the cases before the board voted, and in some cases before the board even heard testimony from particular applicants," Terrill says.

Tully Shahan, the husband of the district's general manager, is the county attorney, and as such he has prosecutorial discretion over open government charges against the district. Shahan also represents the commissioners court, which fills vacancies on the district board.

Until November, a majority of the district board was appointed by the commissioners it. court. The first vacancy was filled by Tully Shahan's brotherin-law, Hadley Wardlaw, with whom Darlene and Tully Shahan share an interest in the Shahan family ranch. The third vacancy was filled by Chris Ring, Tully Shahan's next-door neighbor.

Tully Shahan also has served as attorney for the district, his family and other clients appearing before the district, and the Kinney County Farmers and Ranchers Coalition, an unincorporated nonprofit organization which falls in line with the SOW group. Members include both Darlene and Tully Shahan, and board members Hadley Wardlaw and Chris Ring.

On many occasions the board has voted against the advice of its own legal counsel. Consequently, they've had difficulty maintaining legal counsel and are currently without counsel.

The district also has a debt trict. problem, and Terrill says it appears the district is attempting to transfer some of that debt to the permit applicants by making them pay for the entire permitting procedure, including costs incurred by the district.

"The applicants are already paying for their own attorney and consultants, and now they're trying to stick the applicants with the district's lawyers' fees and their consultant's fees, Terrill says.

Now some of those same petitioners have gone back to the EAA asking to be admitted. That topic was on the agenda at the most recent Edwards authority meeting, and the 17-member board voted unanimously to take in Kinney County if the legislature dissolves the Kinney County dis-

Many of the Kinney County permit applicants favor inclusion into the EAA. Not everyone in Kinney County is happy about the idea, of course. Among the strongest opponents are the Shahans. The only other option is a legal battle, she says, and many landowners, like her and husband Richard, have already spent substantial amounts on legal fees just to get through the permitting process.

Neil Kerr is one of the few applicants who chose not to hire a lawyer to help him in the permitting process.

'Maybe it was wrong that I didn't get a lawyer to fight them for taking my water away, but I'll be damned if I'm going to go back into debt up to my eyeballs," Kerr says. "That should not be what the water process is

Kerr was permitted about three acre-feet per acre.

"Maybe I should be happy with that, but the rules say I am entitled to what I used back then," Kerr says. "I realize that water is precious, and that we have to conserve it, but I know for years my farm was farmed at a much more intense level than we farm now with no detriment to Kinney County.

"Some of the board members want to compare Kinney County farmers to farmers in Uvalde who mostly drip irrigate with pivots," he continues. "A lot of them were given help to finance pivots. If the district is going to cut our water, are they going to give us a no-interest loan so we can put in a \$100,000 pivot system?

Like many of the other permit applicants, Kerr doesn't see how inclusion into the EAA would negatively affect him.

"I was initially in favor of a district because I thought it would protect us, but it seems all it's done is take our water

McDaniel believes joining the EAA is their only hope at this point

'I'd rather deal with a devil I don't know than a devil I do know," McDaniel remarks. "A couple of years ago I was quoted as saying 'no way in heck I wanted to be in the Edwards, but now I'm saying 'please take

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber-not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2005 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.
