Citizens want answers Questions posed to city officials

At the last city council meeting, local citizen Beverly Garcia posed questions to the Brackettville City Council. Mayor Joe Garza asked Garcia to present her questions in writing.

At the last meeting, before it was cancelled, Garcia presented her questions.

Questions by Beverly Garcia were regarding the most recent Financial Statement prepared by Hardin & Newsome, CPA's dated April 30, 2005.

In it, she questioned the salary of City Secretary Bonnie Mayes which totaled \$14,531.25 year to date (YTD).

Garcia wrote, "This amount will equate to \$24,910 over the 12-month fiscal period. When was a pay increase approved for Ms. Mayes? The approved budget for fiscal year 2004-2005 approved a salary of \$22,500 for

this fiscal year. Which also means the council will not be able to provide any pay increase until a new budget is approved."

Brush Area Expense of \$25,478.09 YTD were also questioned by Garcia.

"We would like to have a \$25,478 in brush area expenses explained to us, especially, since we have no brush area. Also, have all of the fines and penalties been paid regarding the brush area or are we to expect more expenses in this area?"

Also questioned was street repair. "The City Council approved expenditures of \$2,857 for Street Repair in the 2004-2005 budget and further amended the budget to include an additional \$3,000 thereby approving \$5,857 for street repair. To date, \$232 has been spent on street repair, we would like for the

council to explain how these monies were spent other than street repair since we presently have a deficit balance YTD of \$34,587?" she asked.

The Capital Outlay YTD of \$59,275 was also brought to the attention of council and the mayor

"The 2004-2005 Budget did not include any proposed expenditures in Capital Outlay. We would like for the city council to provide a full account for these expenditures of \$59,275 as they were not included in the fiscal 2004-2005 budget," she said.

Revenue Gas Sales YTD \$116,121 in Utility Accounts and Revenue Service Charges/Late Fees \$12,942 was the next issue

"Please explain why these factors were not taken into consid-

eration prior to approval to disconnect gas services for the City of Brackettville. Do the council members read the financial reports or do you depend entirely upon the recommendations of the city secretary who has never offered an expert opinion(s) nor supporting documentation to support her recommendations?"

The city's Maintenance & Repairs current month expenditures for April as well as expenditures of \$40,129.

"I would like for the council to explain the sudden escalation of expenditures from March 2005 YTD and April expenditures of \$40,129. How did the city incur nearly \$20,000 in expenses within a 30 day period when on average the monthly expenditures are approximately \$3,300. Were these expenditures gas related? Water related? Sewer related? Which council members approved this sudden increase of nearly \$17,000 and why?"

Garcia also said the Net Income shows a loss and noted "The April 30, 2005 financial statement reflects a net loss for the month of April of \$25,686 and a YTD net loss of \$34,587."

She then asks "Why does the Mayor and City Council continue to inform the public that things are gradually getting better when our financial statements reflect that should we continue along the same path that we are on now, we will continue to lose approximately \$4,941 each month and can expect a net loss by September 30, 2005 of \$59,292?"

Garcia went on to say "I would suggest that the City Council begin to clean City Hall internally as it appears the defi-

cit is internal rather than external.

"We are a far cry from the theoretical: budget surplus of \$126,000 which was approved by Councilman Welch, Councilman Bland, Councilwoman Tipps, Councilwoman Garza and Mayor Garza in September."

She also noted "Councilman Gomez abstained from voting to approve the 'theoretical' budget. She then wrapped up with "I would like these questions answered at the next regularly scheduled council meeting in July 2005 by the City Council persons who were elected as public servants to serve the public, as only the City Council is accountable for the city funds entrusted to them and for the employees that are employed by them." Mayor Garza said he would get back to her on that.

Tests verify bovine found with BSE is originally from Texas

The US Department of Agriculture announced June 29 that genetic testing has verified that a 12-year-old cow that tested positive for Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy or BSE originated from a Texas beef cattle herd.

Tissues for laboratory testing were initially collected from the animal in November 2004, and the carcass was incinerated and did not enter the human food, animal feed or fertilizer supply system.

While tests in November indicated the animal did not have BSE, retesting in England in June confirmed the animal had the disease.

The Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency, and USDA have jointly assigned a state-federal team to conduct the epidemiological investigation and response.

"The TAHC and US Department of Agriculture's Veterinary Services are working with a complement of experts from federal and state animal health, food safety, public health and feed regulatory agencies to ensure the continued safety and wholesomeness of our meat supply," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas state veterinarian and executive direc-

tor of the TAHC, the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency. Epidemiological investigations are thorough and focus on verifying the herd of origin, and when, where and how the animal and potentially, any herd mates, were exposed to the abnormal prion, or disease agent, that causes BSE."

Additionally, epidemiology investigations trace the infected animal's movement and herd mates.

Animals potentially exposed to the disease will be depopulated, with proper disposal. The animals will not be introduced into the human or animal food chain."

The USDA's BSE testing protocol requires testing of emaciated or injured cattle, cattle that exhibit central nervous system disorder, cattle unable to rise or to walk normally, and cattle that die of unknown causes.

Since June 1, 2004, brain tissue samples from more than 394,000 cattle have been tested in the U.S. and were negative for BSE.

Of those, 38,320 were tested in Texas, Dr. Hillman noted. BSE surveillance has been conducted in the U.S. since 1990.

The U.S. has taken preventive measures against the introduction of BSE since 1989.

No quorum causes cancellation

Because of the lack of a quorum, the city council cancelled it's last special-called meeting. The meeting was to discuss a report from the City Secretary Bonnie Mayes regarding her travel from the date of her employment in August 2004 to now.

The report was to include the use of the city's vehicle as well

as copies of all hotel, gas, parking, meals, registration and any other pertinent receipts documenting the expenditure of public funds. Also on that agenda was the signing of city checks for expenditures, payroll, etc. by city employees. Attending that meeting were council members Mary V. Flores, Lydia Tipps,

Mayor Joe N. Garza and council member Matt Bland. Not attending were members Tully Welch and Francisca "Chica" Garza. The council was to have met at 6:30, but were waiting until 6:40 to see if Francisca would arrive. It was later noted by Mayor Garza that Francisca would not be attending the meeting.

It was suggested the council meet July 5, but city attorney Eddie Morales noted that perhaps waiting one more week, the council would be able to put all items on the July 12 meeting.

Mayor Garza asked Flores if that was acceptable to her, she said yes. Flores originally requested the meeting.

King co-authors private property protection act

AUSTIN - State Representative Tracy O. King, (D-Batesville) has agreed to sign on as a co-author to House Joint Resolution 19. HJR 19 is a proposed amendment to the State Constitution limiting a local governmental entity's power of eminent domain, preventing them from using this power for primarily economic development projects.

Last week, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that it is permissible for a landowner to sell their private property to the government through the eminent domain process for economic development purposes.

The Supreme Court case, Kelo v. The City of New London involved a 1998 case where the City of New London, Connecticut condemned several private residences to allow for a redevelopment plan in conjunction with the construction of a major pharmaceutical research facility. Traditionally, eminent domain has been used only for the construction of highways, streets or other similar public projects. The Court's ruling

made provisions for the individual States to pass laws restricting the use of eminent domain in that State.

"This dramatic shift in the interpretation of public use by the Supreme Court is alarming to all Texans who work hard for what they have," King remarked of the ruling.

"I have always been a supporter of private property rights and will continue to work towards protecting those rights."

Several members of the Texas House of Representatives have submitted a letter to the Governor requesting he add this issue to the call of the current special session, allowing the legislature to consider the matter.

In order for the constitutional amendment to appear on the November ballot, it is critical that the issue be addressed without delay.

Some new classic recipes, some old standards

Don't be dismayed by the long seemingly rambling appearing after today's recipes for two. Keep this list of hints - helps - tips for future use. Some new, some old.

Spicy Peanut Chicken

2 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves, cut in 1/2 inch strips, 2 tsp. fresh lime juice, 2 garlic cloves, pressed, 3 tbsp. soy sauce, 1/4 tsp. red pepper flakes, 1 1/2 tbsp. peanut oil or cooking oil, 1/4 tsp. fresh grated ginger root, 14 1/2 oz. can chicken stock, 3 or 4 tbsp. peanut butter (preferably old fashioned style), and 1 green onion.

Place chicken breast, lime juice, only one of the garlic cloves, soy sauce, only 2 tbsp. soy sauce and red pepper flakes in resealable plastic bag. Marinate in refrigerator at least 4 hours.

In medium fry pan, saute remaining garlic clove in peanut oil. When slightly browned, add chicken strips and cook until almost done. Add half the marinade (be sure and get the "goodies" and not just the liquid), the remaining 1 tbsp. soy sauce, gin-

ger, chicken stock and peanut butter.

Stir to mix together. Heat over medium-low heat and stir while warming. Sauce will thicken as warmed. Stirring will prevent sticking to pan on bottom. Top with green onion to serve.

Chicken to Die For

1 large garlic clove, pressed, 1 slice bacon, chopped, 6 oz. mushrooms, sliced, 3 tbsp. flour, 1/2 chicken, cut into parts, 1 cup whipping cream, 1/4 tsp. rosemary and 1/4 cup pitted Greek or Calamata olives, chopped. In medium size fry pan, saute garlic and bacon until bacon is cooked; add mushrooms and cook until slightly softened. Remove from heat and set aside. Put flour in plastic bag, add chicken parts, toss/turn to coat well.

Brown chicken in pan drippings; cook thoroughly. Remove chicken and set aside. Put cream in pan and return bacon mixture along with rosemary and olives. Cook over medium heat until it becomes thickened. Add chicken and warm to serving temperature.

Stuffed Zucchini

2 medium zucchini, 1/4 cup chopped onion, 1/4 cup dry bread crumbs, 1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning, 2 tbsp. grated parmesan cheese, 1 egg, beaten, 1 small garlic clove, pressed, 1/2 lb. seasoned ground sausage, cooked and drained, 1/4 tsp. thyme, 1/4 tsp. oregano, salt and pepper to taste/ as desired, 1/3 cup-shredded cheddar cheese.

Bring large sauce pan of water to boil. Add zucchini and cook just until tender (about 15 minutes) Remove from water with slotted spoon. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line an 8x8 inch baking dish with foil. Cool zucchini slightly, cut length wise and scoop out pulp. Mix the zucchini pulp in a medium bowl with the remaining ingredients. Spoon mixture into zucchini shells.

Place in baking dish and bake 20 minutes until golden brown on top. Serves 2-3.

Helpful Hints

*Tomatoes added to roasts will help to naturally tenderize them. Tomatoes contain an acid that works well to break down meats.

*When frying meat, sprinkle paprika over it to turn it golden brown.

*Lemon juice rubbed on fish before cooking will enhance the flavor and help maintain a good color.

*To keep hot oil from splattering sprinkle a little salt or flour in the pan before frying.

*A few drops of lemon juice added to simmering rice will keep the grains separated.

*Green pepper may change the flavor of frozen casseroles. Clove, garlic and pepper flavors get stronger when frozen while sage, onion and salt get milder.

*To dress up buttered, cooked veggies, sprinkle them with toasted chopped nuts or sesame seeds, canned french-fried onions or slightly crushed seasoned croquons.

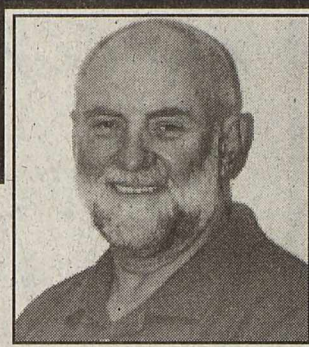

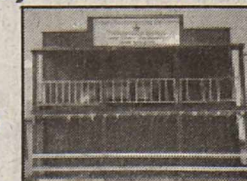
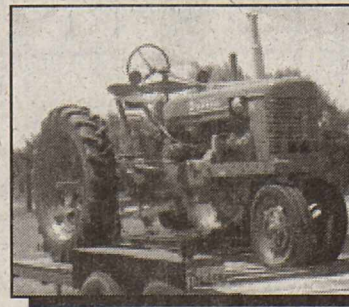
