**Wellness program addresses student obesity**

Brackett Independent School District (BISD) board of trustees adopted a wellness program in their regular meeting on Feb. 13. School Nurse Francine Collins presented information that the board was required to enact in order to be in compliance with the federal Child Nutrition and WIC Reauthorization Act of 2004. An outline of the policy was originally presented to Collins last year by the Texas Association of School Board (TASB). Collins then formed a local School Health Advisory Committee (SHAC) that reviewed the suggested policy and made necessary revisions that would reflect the individual needs of BISD. The committee included Superintendent Paula Renken, Principal Alma Gutierrez, Principal Stoney Burks, Principal Frank Taylor, Parent Kathy Calk, Librarian Sony Cruz, Parent Jill Duncan, Food Services

Manager Honey Bee Gomez, Teacher Steven Hutcherson, Social Worker Nathan Lafrenz, Counselor Lorenzo Ortiz and Teacher Ricky Creel.

The TASB outline suggests that, "The District shall follow nutrition guidelines that advance student health and reduce childhood obesity and shall promote the general wellness of all students through nutrition education, physical activity and other school based activities."

The local SHAC suggested teachers be provided education and guidelines on the use of food as a reward in the classroom.

Recommendations for nutrition education included:

- Students being educated on adopting and maintaining healthy eating behaviors.
- Food service staff and teachers promote nutrition messages in and out of the classroom
- Nutritional information should be shared with family members and the community.

"I want to commend the school district because many of the things that we're supposed to have in place by the fall of 2006-2007 are already happening in this school. A lot of the cafeteria food that Honey Bee is working on and the physical activity is already written into our curriculum so this school has a big head start. Honey Bee has stopped ordering some good-

**City Council called meeting to discuss financial statements**

City Council called a special meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 21 to discuss the financial statements. The council reviewed the gas and water utility service financial statements and the December 2005 financial statements.

The gas situation was discussed at length. Juan Lerma with Gas Incorporated out of Corpus Christi, recently surveyed some of the gas lines. Lerma stated that the leaks and the meters that were not working properly was caused by a lack of maintenance. He also stated that within seven miles of line, there were 83 leaks, some of those in the line and some in the meters.

Year to date financial statements reflect, gas purchases of \$58,427 and gas sales of

\$43,679. This is a loss of \$14,748. This amount does not reflect any additional expense the city may have incurred related to the sale of natural gas.

Lerma also said the leaks and meters could have caused the deficit.

Mayor Joe Garza stated, "The city should not be operating in a deficit."

City secretary, Bonnie Mayes explained that many of the deficits on the financials were due to unexpected rate increases in utilities.

Garza suggested the secretary bring the bills to every council meeting for the council's review.

The Council also approved Randy Castilla as a licensed water operator for one year.

**Operation Streamline II making progress**

**More than 100 El Salvadorans Prosecuted and Removed**

Del Rio, TX - U.S. Customs and Border Protection's (CBP) Border Patrol in Del Rio, Texas reached a milestone, Monday, as more than 100 El Salvadorans were set up for deportation and returned to their home country, since the inception of Operation Streamline II.

This multi-agency law enforcement initiative was launched at the beginning of December 2005 and focuses on prosecuting every illegal alien apprehended within a "target area". Participating agencies in this operation include CBP Border Patrol, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Detention and Removal, Federal Pre-trial Services, U.S. Attorney's Office and the U.S. Marshals Service.

Operation Streamline II tar-

gets aliens who enter the country illegally through a high-traffic area within the Del Rio Border Patrol Sector's area of responsibility. Those illegal aliens who are not released due to humanitarian reasons will face prosecution for illegal entry. The maximum penalty for violation of this law is 180 days incarceration. While the illegal alien is undergoing criminal proceedings, the individual will also be processed for removal from the United States.

This operation is in direct support of the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Secure Border Initiative and replaces catch-and-release with catch-and return. Returning illegal aliens to their home country has proven to be an ex-

remely effective deterrent as those seeking to enter the U.S. illegally often will not have the funds or the incentive to try again.

Since the inception of Operation Streamline II on December 12, 2005, more than 430 El Salvadorans have been detained for prosecution in the Del Rio Sector.


U.S. Customs and Border Protection is the unified border agency within the Department of Homeland Security charged with the management, control, and protection of our Nation's borders at and between the official ports of entry. CBP is charged with keeping terrorists and terrorist weapons out of the country while enforcing hundreds of U.S. laws.

Howard Payne University announced that Brackettville native Patrick Rose was named to the American Southwest Conference Academic All-Conference Team for football in the 2005 season.



ies and has \$1,900 to spend on fresh fruit and vegetables," said Collins.

SHAC's final recommendation suggested the district provide physical activity that includes those who do not participate in competitive sports and include family members in physical activity.

BISD addresses this recommendation with an existing daily physical education program for every grade level.

The elementary program led by Coach Ricky Creel includes an open invitation to family members to join students on a walk to promote family fitness. This program was started at the beginning of the current school year.

In the campus report given by Jones Elementary Principal Alma Gutierrez, third, fourth and fifth grade teachers and students were preparing for the

In addition, the amount was not for the month of December but for the fiscal YTD.

The difference between the city's YTD natural gas purchases of \$58,427 and YTD natural gas sales of \$43,679 is \$14,748.

This amount does not reflect

any additional expense the city may have incurred related to the sale of natural gas.

The story also incorrectly identified City Attorney Katrina Longoria as Eddie Morales.

Both attorneys work for the same firm and represent the city. However, Longoria was in attendance during the meeting, Morales was not.



One of the most important political battles in Texas this year is beginning to emerge in Central Texas. The four seats up for election to the Texas Third Court of Appeals are lining up to be the most important judiciary battles in the state for 2006. Texas Liberal Democrats are plotting their comeback in judicial elections with this court's elections. Conservatives must rise to the challenge.

The Third Court hears all legislative and administrative appeals originating from state government. It is literally the "front gate" to the Texas Supreme Court; it is where many of these types of cases are heard before reaching the Texas Supreme Court. Republicans hold a 4-2 majority on the Third Court; three of the four Republican seats stand for election this year along with an open Democrat seat.

Some consider the 2006 Third Court of Appeals races similar to the battle for the Texas Supreme Court in the early 1990s when Democrats spent millions of dollars before the collapse of the Democrat Party in statewide elections. Now the Democrats have targeted a project called "Four for the Third" to attempt to capture a majority on this very important court.

Place 2 is held by appointed Republican Justice Alan Waldrop. Waldrop was a respected civil defense lawyer prior to his appointment to the court by Governor Perry. Liberal Democrat Jim Coronado, an Austin Criminal District Court magistrate, is challenging him.

Republican Justice David Puryear holds Place 5. Puryear became a Republican when being a Republican was not cool, switching parties as a matter of principle. Having authored over 700 opinions, he has become the most productive Justice on this court; Puryear is the engine that drives this court. He will be challenged this year by Liberal Democrat Mina A. Brees.


Place 6 is held by Republican Justice Bob Pemberton, a former legal counsel in the Governor's office. He won a narrow victory over Diane Henson in 2004 for an unexpired term. His Democrat opponent this year is Austin attorney Bree Buchanan as he fights for a full six-year term on the Court.

Democrat Henson is now running for the Place 3 seat vacated by Democrat Justice Bea Ann Smith. Henson, an early favorite of liberals, has been endorsed by the Austin Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus. The Republican candidate will be the winner of a four-person race. The early standout is former State District Judge Will Wilson, Jr., a Clements appointee and the son of former Attorney General Will Wilson, Sr. Wilson has captured the endorsement of the Texas Alliance for Life and the Texas Medical Association with a reputation as a strict constructionist who supports the election of judges.

Democrats will be beating the anti-Tom Delay drum in an effort to whip Travis County liberals into frenzy to win these seats. The remainder of this district - San Angelo to LaGrange and Temple to New Braunfels - is conservative, and the Democrats will be trying to mask their true ideology.

The voters residing outside of Austin will not look kindly on a Democrat ticket composed of "a bunch of Austin liberals." However, We the People must battle with our time, our money, and our enthusiasm the hundreds of thousands of liberal dollars that Democrats plan to pump into these races.

Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test.

Junior High Principal Stoney Burks recognized seventh grader Michael Flores for an act of honest behavior. Flores was presented with a certificate and a round of applause from the audience.

Flores was sorting through a box of props that had been loaned to the theatre arts class for a production in Dec. 2005 when he found six Christmas ornaments containing \$50 each.

The ornaments were gifts for the owners family members and the young Flores made sure the ornaments, valued at \$300, were returned promptly.

Michael is the son of Mike and Glenda Flores.

Burks also advised the board that a fight involving six female students had occurred and that all were disciplined. Five received in school suspension and one was suspended and sent to the Academy. Two teachers responded to the fight. One teacher was carried to the floor

while attempting to separate the girls. The other teacher received minor injuries.

Superintendent Paula Renken advised the board charges had been filed with the Kinney County Sheriff's Department and court action was pending.

Board Vice President Sandra Meil ordered the May 13 school board election.

Meil and Mark Frerich are the only board members up for reelection this year.

The deadline for filing for a position is Mar. 13. Applications

can be picked up at the BISD Central Office on Ann Street.

Renken presented the board a revised pay scale for auxiliary employees. The board unanimously adopted the pay scale.

Auxiliary employee positions include bus drivers, custodial staff, clerical employees and other like positions. Pay scale adjustments will be made during the 06-07 school year.

A copy of the revised pay scale and information can be obtained at the BISD Central Office.

Renken also asked the board for permission to purchase a used Suburban to transport children to and from school.

Brackett ISD must transport a handful of students to their homes in Spofford and to several ranches outside of town and the use of a school bus is not always practical. The use of a smaller vehicle is ideal according to Renken.

According to the Texas Education Code Section 34.002 and 34.003, only vehicles that carry 10 or fewer passengers can be

used as a route bus. Fines can be levied against districts that use the 15 passenger vans for activities other than student extracurricular events and teacher training.

The next school board meeting will be March 20.

### Border Patrol seize \$15.2 million

CBP Border Patrol agents of the Del Rio Sector seized 4,211 pounds of marijuana during the first two weeks of February. Enforcement efforts throughout the Sector resulted in 15 separate seizures in unrelated incidents. Agents detained 15 suspects in relation to the seizures. The suspects and marijuana, valued at \$3,368,800 were turned over to appropriate agencies for prosecution. Recent seizures ranged from two ounces to 900 pounds. Marijuana seizures within the Del Rio Sector for fiscal year 2006 (beginning Oct. 1, 2005), to date, have totaled 19,054 pounds, valued at \$15.2 million.

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



The Mountain Laurel Garden Club held their regular monthly meeting Feb. 9.


Nineteen members and three guests gave audience to Carol Parks of Ground Zero, a water conservation group.

**Creamed Spinach**  
2 (10 ounce) packages frozen chopped spinach  
3 tbsp. melted butter or margarine  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup milk  
1 tsp. worcestershire sauce salt and pepper to taste  
1 cup medium cheddar cheese, shredded  
1 additional tbsp. butter or margarine  
Cook spinach according to directions, but remove when it has just thawed. Drain thoroughly, mashing out any excess liquid. Add melted butter, milk, soup, onion, worcestershire, salt and pepper. Simmer in sauce pan for about 5 minutes, stirring oc-

asionally to prevent sticking. Turn into a buttered 1 1/2 - 2 quart casserole; sprinkle cheese over the top, dot with remaining, (unmelted) butter. Bake approximately 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

**Serves 6**  
**5 Minute Blueberry Pie**  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 tbsp. cornstarch  
3/4 cup water  
4 cups fresh or frozen blueberries, thawed  
\* 1 Graham cracker crust (9 inch)  
Whipped topping, optional

In saucepan, combine sugar and cornstarch; stir in water until smooth. Bring to a boil over medium heat; cook and stir continuously for 2 minutes. Add blueberries. Cook for 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour into pie shell. Chill. Garnish with whipped topping if desired.

\* Pre-bake pie crust according to directions for crisp texture when serving. Cool before filling.

For easier and cleaner slices of pie, always cut second slice/piece before removing the first piece.


