Stephenson studies aerospace technology at space camp

Micheal Stephenson attended the Texas High School Aerospace Scholars Camp at the Johnson Space Center June 25-30.

Stephenson, age 17 and a rising senior at Brackett High School, was selected by Senator Frank Madla to attend the specialized camp in the fall of 2005.

Before Stephenson was officially eligible to attend the

camp, he had to complete ten on-line lessons to ready him for the week long space adventure.

The scholars were grouped into four teams, Getting There (RED), Living There (WHITE), Working There (BLUE) and Mission Integration (GRAY).

Stephenson was assigned to the Living There (White) team.

The teams worked cooperatively to design a feasible manned mission to Mars.

At the end of the week they presented details of their mission to NASA engineers, administrators, astronauts, state legislators, parents, and other VIPs.

According to NASA's website, the teams also participated in competitive activities.

The young people competed against each other in various engineering activities that included a budget where funds could be earned or lost.

Throughout the week, each team competed in rocket launches, landers and oral presentations. The overall goal was to send a rover to Mars and back.

The team with the most funds left over at the end of the week, won the competition.

During this week of camp, the Mission Integration Team (Gray) won the competition.

Stephenson and his team members were given private

tours through various NASA buildings, typically not accessible to the public.

Students got the opportunity to see a vast array of careers in the areas of math, science, engineering, and technology.

"Everything at NASA is so much more advanced. Seeing it all first hand was totally different than just hearing about it," said Stephenson.

While the program is currently only open to scholars in Texas, NASA is working to start a similar camp in Washington, D.C.

Stephenson is the son of Patrick Stephenson; nephew to Shirley and grandson to Mary, all of Fort Clark Springs.

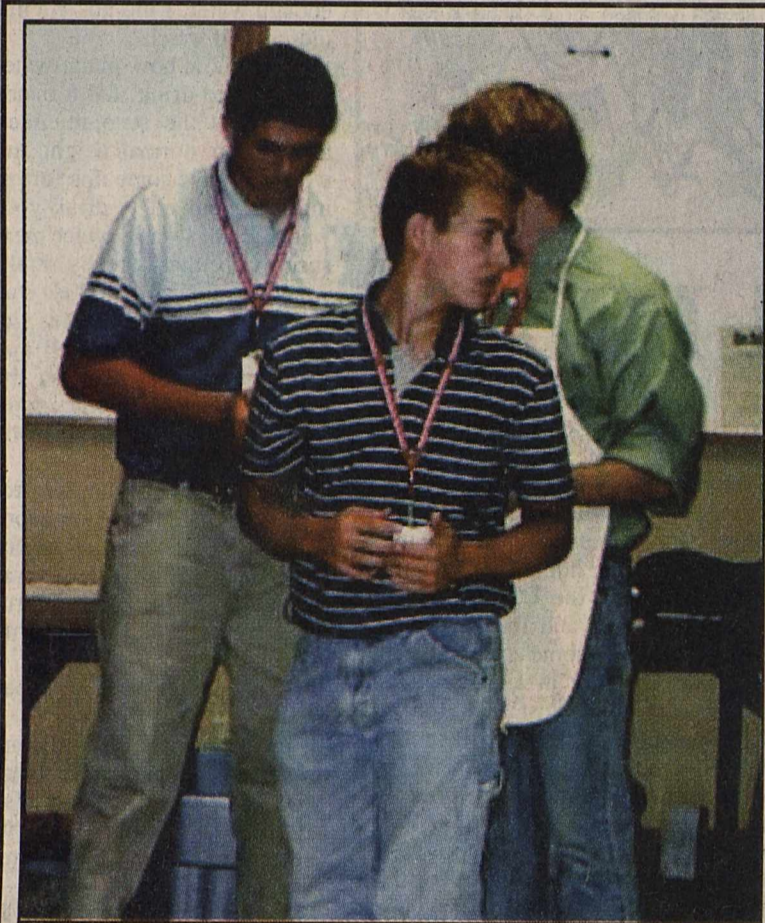

The group toured the south-west United States, including Texas, Nevada, Utah and Arizona. The sites studied by the GeoForce Academy students were Zion Canyon, the Grand Canyon, Waputki National Monument, Sunset Crater and Glenn Canyon Dam.

GeoForce offers students the chance to receive scholarships, but they are also given a good paying job during the summer.

At the end of the week, an examination was given and Moore scored a perfect 100 percent.

"I know Samantha and I personally had a great time on the

trip and I think that everyone else that went had a fantastic time as well. The GeoForce program also allows us to meet new people. I myself am ready for our next trip. Samantha and I are extremely grateful to the people who created this opportunity for us. I find it very moving that there are people out in the world that care about our future. I feel very lucky to be in the program. It was a tremendous amount of fun and it was also a wonderful learning experience. If we could bring new people in the program, I know we would," said Schroeder.

County Jail receives certificate of compliance

The Kinney County Jail was presented with a certificate of compliance from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards on May 23.

Texas Jail Inspector Russell Biehle reported, "This facility was inspected on May 23, 2006. There were no deficiencies noted and upon review of this report

by the Executive Director of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, a certificate of Compliance will be issued per the requirements of VTCA, Chapter 511 and Texas Minimum Jail Standard."

Biehle reviewed random record samples at the North Street facility to ensure admission and release procedures were being strictly followed. Other areas under inspection included

health services, sanitation of facility, food services, inmate exercise program and work assignments.

The inspections are planned and completed on an annual basis.

All Texas jail facilities are required to be in compliance with state mandates or risk losing their ability to house prisoners, a large source or revenue for most counties.

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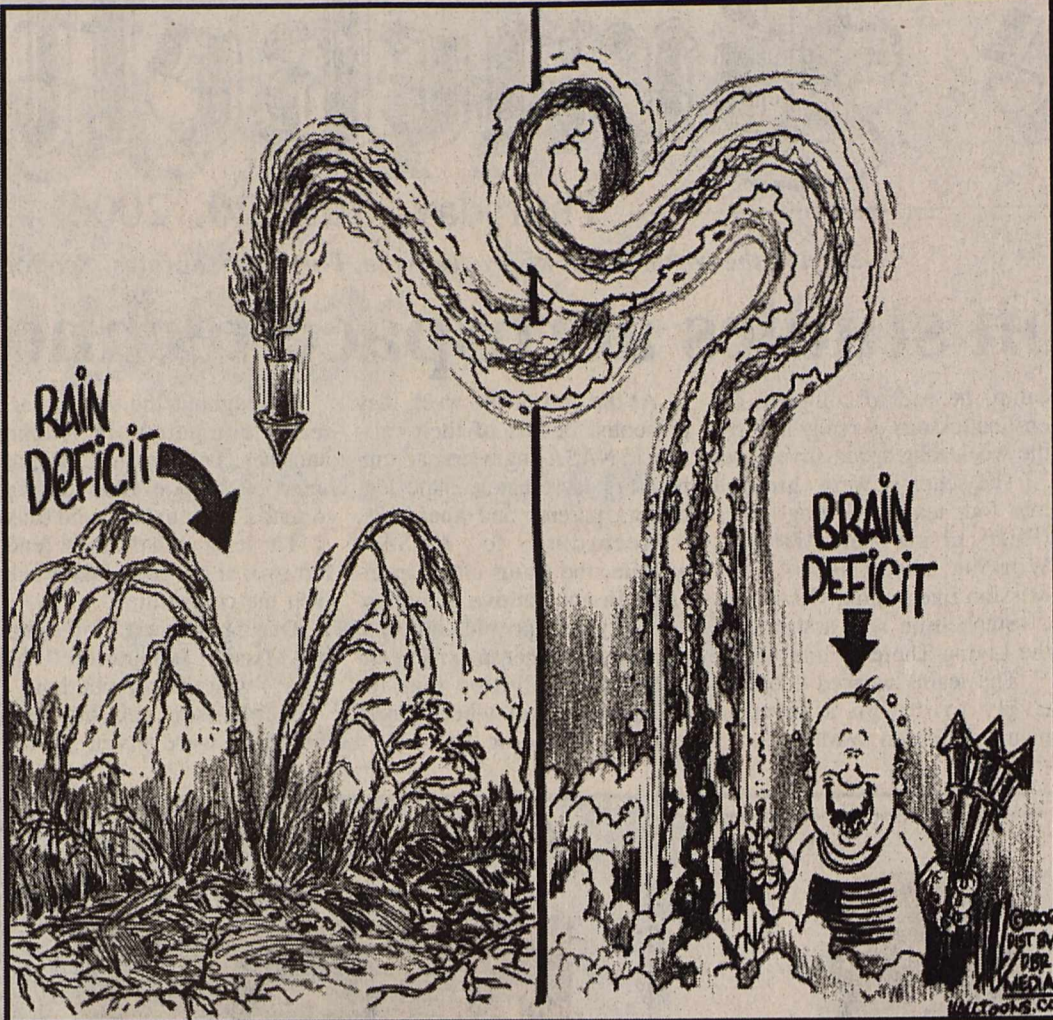

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Drink Up!

Have you lost your get up and go and you don't know where it got up and went? Many of us have this problem. The answer to this problem may surprise you!!!

You are dehydrated! Yes you heard me. You are not drinking enough water; I did not say liquids, I said water.

You know how much water you need to drink. 8 - 8 ounce glasses, is the recommended amount for normal height and weight. I have some tips for reminding yourself to drink your water. Look at the 8 ounce measuring cup; that is really small, when you think about this. One lady I know uses a nice tea cup for her water. It is small and makes her feel good when she uses it. Here are some more ways to remind yourself to drink your water.

1. Put up Post-It notes to remind you; Bright red or neon. Any color to get your attention.
2. Get 4-16 oz bottles of water and set them out each morning. Refill each night.
3. Drink water with all your meals.
4. If you have a hard time drinking water, use a pretty glass or favorite cup. You can also drink out of a straw. Try it. Water goes down much faster when you suck it up.
5. Keep a bottle of water in your car, by your chair, and by your bed.
6. When you think you are hungry, drink a glass of water first.
7. If you can't keep up with the number of ounces you are drinking, keep a pile of pennies for every 8 oz glasses. Move them from one pile to the next, each time you drink a glass of water. I used polished rocks from my candle rock garden on my entrance table. Each time I fill up my water bottle I move a rock.
8. Take a pretty bottle that can hold 64 ounces. I used to have a big round green wine bottle that I filled with 12 oz glasses. Each time I poured the water into the bottle, I made a mark on the side to calibrate it. That way, any time during the day, I could count how many ounces I had drunk for the day.
9. My favorite glass was a 12 ounce stemmed water glass. I felt special drinking water from this glass.
10. Drink water at the top of every hour. Eventually you will not have to go potty as often. One other thing: Every time you go to the bathroom, then drink some more water.
11. If you have the flu or respiratory infection. The water will help to break up the phlegm and wash the impurities out of your system. You will cough up this stuff. It is my best medicine for a cold, flu, or stomach virus.
12. If you can't remember to drink your water. Send yourself 8 emails and leave them in your inbox to remind you! Delete as you drink your water!

Please keep in mind that too much of a good thing is bad. Do not drink more than 12 ounces in a 30 minute period of time. There is such a thing as water intoxication. Your kidneys can shut down. Baby steps and incorporate water drinking into your routines. This will be good for you and it may just give you the energy to get your routines done. One other benefit from drinking water, your skin will not be as dry or wrinkled. Water is the best moisturizer you can buy! This is one simple way to love yourself. Take the time to drink your water. When you retire

When you retire, some of your regular expenses are going to go down. But others are going to go up - and topping the "going up" list is health care. Well before you retire, make sure you've got the resources necessary to deal with those doctor's visits and prescription drugs.

How expensive will health care be for you during your retirement years? Here's a number to consider: A 65-year-old couple retiring today will need, on average, \$200,000 set aside to pay for medical costs in retirement, according to a recent study by Fidelity Investments. And this number doesn't even include the cost of over-the-counter medicines, most dental procedures and, most importantly, long-term care (such as in-home health care or an extended stay in a nursing home).

Of course, the \$200,000 figure is just an average; your costs may be considerably different. For example, you might have

retiree health coverage from your former employer, although this seems to be becoming less likely, given the fact that more and more companies are scaling back on precisely these benefits.

To prepare yourself for the six-figure sums you might need to pay for health care, consider these suggestions:

•Stay healthy. Obviously, you can neither prevent all illnesses nor suspend the natural aging process. However, by eating right, exercising regularly and reducing stress, you can improve your health and possibly reduce the odds of incurring high medical costs in retirement.

•Contribute to a Health Savings Account (HSA). If you have access to this type of plan at work, consider using it. Your money has the potential to grow tax deferred, and you can withdraw funds from your account tax free, provided withdrawals are used for qualified medical expenses. Keep in mind, though, that the contribution limits to HSAs are relatively low, so your savings will probably not grow enough to cover all, or even most, of your medical costs. Yet, every dollar can help.

•Plan ahead for long-term care. If you are fortunate, you will never have to enter a nurs-

ing home or require the services of a home health care professional. Still, you never know. People who reach age 65 have a 40 percent chance of entering a nursing home, according to a study by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services - and in some areas, just one year's stay in a nursing home can easily cost \$100,000. To avoid incurring these catastrophic expenses, consider putting a long-term care protection plan in place.

•Boost your savings. It's easier said than done, but try to put away as much as you can while you're working. Fully fund your IRA each year, and put as much as you can afford into your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. If you "max out" on your IRA and 401(k), you might want to invest in an annuity, which provides the potential for tax-deferred growth of earnings and can be structured to pay an income stream that you can't outlive.

No one can predict the future. But by recognizing the likely costs of health care during your retirement years, and by taking the steps necessary to deal with these expenses, you can hopefully avoid some unhealthy surprises down the road.

Who Cares About Iran or North Korea?

Communist North Korea - 6,000 miles away from the United States - has despotic dictator Kim Jong Il as leader, little electricity, and periodic famine.

It admits to having at least one working nuclear weapon and multiple ballistic missile types.

The largest one - Taep' o dong 2, with a range of 3700 to 5600 miles - can carry a 1700 lb. warhead.

Fired from North Korea, it still misses most of the United States.

Over 7,000 miles away, Islamic Iran - ruled by religious leaders known for their Muslim fanaticism and oppression - has the Shahab 3 missile capable of carrying a 2,600 lb. warhead with a maximum range of only 750 miles.

Working with the North Koreans and using the Taep' o dong 2 as a model, the Iranians have, however, developed the Shahab 6 missile with a range of 3700 miles.

In fact, Iran, already known to have mounted SCUD type ballistic missiles on cargo vessels, is probably working out the technical difficulties prior to mounting a longer-range Shahab 3 or 6 missile on a cargo ship. You may say, "But we don't know that Iran has a working nuclear weapon yet, and North Korea probably only has one or two." True enough. A rogue state, however, only needs one nuclear weapon detonated at high altitude to create an electromagnetic pulse, or "EMP," as well as radiation and blast effects.

That range is also far short of reaching the United States. Even with their longest-range missiles, the Iranians cannot reach the United States while the North Koreans can only reach parts of the West Coast.

Let's sing a round of "Kumbayah" since the U. S. need not worry or does it? Most certainly, it does.

Although these rogue nations do not have Intercontinental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) capability as do the United States, Russia, China, the United Kingdom, or France, they can take their short-range missiles, mount them on cargo ships, and launch them from sea, near the U. S. coast.

Range and accuracy problems are non-existent under that scenario as is the need for a much larger missile to carry a heavy nuclear payload from hostile territory to the U. S.

That is exactly the worry of Pentagon planners since at least 2000.

With a despotic dictator who murders his own people and religious zealots who want to die, the U. S. cannot count on MAD.

The United States had better count on intelligence and vigilance, and if those fail, unmitigated vengeance.

Back-to-School Basics

School Classes begin August 21, 2006

In preparation for an excellent 2006-2007 school year, BISD posts the following school information:

Student Dress Code

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption and minimize safety hazards. All students are expected to dress modestly, decently and in good taste. While attending classes or representing the school on official trips, a neat, orderly and well-groomed appearance shall be expected of each student.

The following pertain to all students and are not allowed:

- Wearing or possessing any apparel, accessory, or manner of grooming that denotes gang related membership, hate groups, or cults.
- Fads and styles in dress which differ extremely from conventionally accepted standards are prohibited.
- Mesh, nylon, or athletic shorts are not permitted in the classroom. These type shorts may be worn during P.E. classes only.
- No sagging clothes, size appropriate pants - Pants must be worn on waist. (No baggy pants will be allowed)
- Sleeveless shirts with large armholes (including but not limited to athletic sports jerseys) are not allowed.
- Wearing clothing that is inappropriately revealing of the physical body or which displays offensive writing or gestures (such as see-through clothing, suggestive writing, pornography, immoral questions, advertising of illicit drugs or alcoholic beverages).
- Underclothing worn as outer wear, tank tops, or halter type tops. (Straps on all shirts, blouses and clothing topees must be a minimum of 2 1/1".)
- Clothing that reveals midriff (bare skin above the waist) or chest.
- Wearing of sunglasses /shades in buildings, unless prescribed by a doctor.
- Wearing caps, hats, bandanas, or skullcaps, inside school facilities during school related activities, such as assemblies, programs, and during class time.
- Bare feet. (No student will be permitted to attend class or school related activities without shoes.)
- Haircuts that are distracting in color or style.
- Body, tongue, or facial jewelry piercing
- Boys are prohibited from wearing earrings. Only girls are allowed to wear earrings
- Cut-Offs, parachute shorts, short-shorts, or gym type shorts. (Shorts are allowed with the following exception: must have a minimum length of 3" from the top of the knee while standing, or 6" from the floor while kneeling.)
- Spandex or rolled-up jeans.
- Tattoos. (Cannot be exposed. These must be covered while attending school activities.)

Flexible School Year Plan

This program will provide districts with the flexibility to reduce instructional days for students who are performing satisfactorily and the opportunity to provide targeted instruction to students who have greater educational needs.

OPTIONAL FLEXIBLE YEAR PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS - (Brackett High School and Brackett Junior High)

1. Pass all TAKS tests administered during the school year.
2. Pass all courses taken with a grade of 75 or above. (based on the final grade for the course)
3. No more than 10 total absences with a maximum of 3 unexcused absences during the school year.
4. No more than one discipline incident that results in either in-school or out of school suspension.
5. No discipline incident that requires placement in the district alternative education program (DAEP)

OPTIONAL FLEXIBLE YEAR PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS - (Jones Elementary and Intermediate)

Students who meet the following criteria will be eligible for the 170 day school calendar. All other students will be required to attend 180 days.

1. 3rd - 6th grade - Pass all TAKS tests administered during the school year
2. K - 2nd - developed in all TPRI Screenings and Tasks
3. Pass all courses taken with a grade of 75 or above (based on the final grade)
4. No more than 10 total absences with a maximum of 3 unexcused absences during the school year.

In an effort to provide every child in our community the opportunity to participate in an enriched learning environment at the age of 4, Brackett Independent School District is offering Open Enrollment for Pre-Kinder. If you are interested, please pick up an enrollment form at the Jones Elementary Office. You will also need the following when enrolling your child:

- birth certificate
- social security card
- immunization record
- proof of residence

New Jones Elementary/Intermediate Pick Up and Drop Off Procedures

Students need to be dropped off and picked up from one of the following locations:

- Students may be dropped off in the back parking lot or in front of Jones Elementary School. **Parents will be allowed to drive in the back parking lot when dropping off and picking up students.**
- All students except afternoon Pre-K and Tutorials will be dismissed in the back parking lot at 3:00 p.m.
- Afternoon Pre-K and Tutorials will be dismissed at 3:30 p.m. in front of the school across from Lopez Bakery
- All families will be assigned a number to be used during pick up time in order to expedite pick up procedures - expect the assigned number decal in the mail the 2nd week of August.

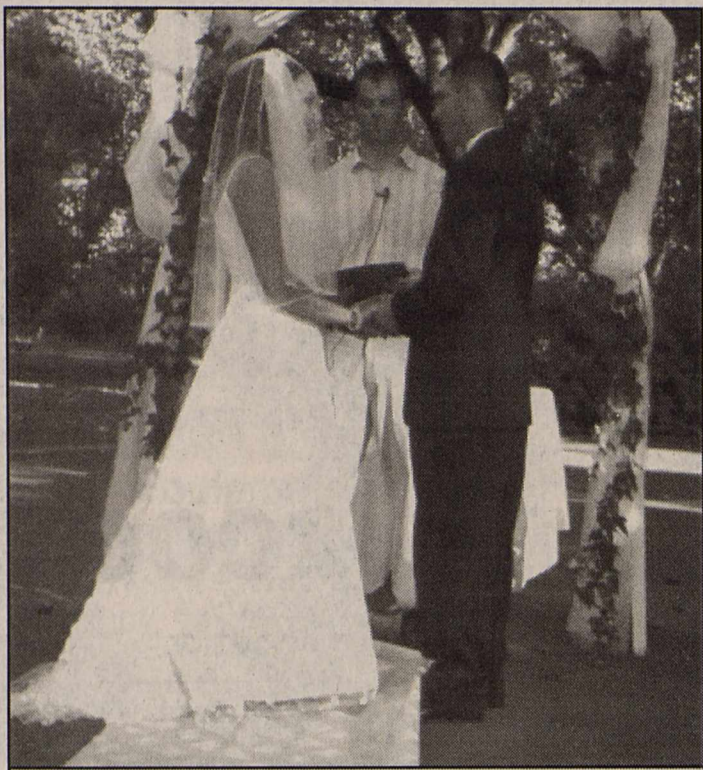

Juan Salas, who served for 14 months in Iraq, established the program with the help of his school, Manhattanville College, when he returned from the war. The goal of the program is to show support for troops serving in hardship areas - Iraq, Afghanistan, Africa - by establishing pen-pal relationships with them. When a person enrolls in the My Soldier program, they agree to adopt a soldier. "Manhattanville My Soldier program is a fun way to spend quality family time together" according to program cofounder Juan Salas who is an active duty Army Sergeant and Manhattanville College student. "Our website www.mysoldier.com allows you to register for a soldier to write to. Additionally it contains guidelines for letter writing and care package preparation with some fun themes such as "Taste of Home - A to Z." Within one week of registering, all registrants receive e-mail with the name and address of a soldier contact. When a person enrolls in the My Soldier program, they agree to adopt a soldier. They receive a "starter kit" with guidelines for writing letters to their deployed United States Armed Service person and a "My Soldier bracelet" to publicly show their support for American troops. Typically, the soldier then replies and direct correspondence begins (about 60% of soldiers respond, but 100% appreciate getting the letters). Participants may also choose to send care packages, which are greatly appreciated (but not expected) by the soldiers. The program is free, but donations are encouraged. As the family gets to know the soldier they establish friendships and connections that teach children the values of service and community and the knowledge that one person can make a difference. A wonderful, empowering message for a child is that he or she is important enough to have an impact on someone or something else. "Since Manhattanville College launched My Soldier on Veteran's Day, 2004, we have had over 250,000 people sign up!" said Richard Berman "We have had every scenario of family participating imaginable. Parents, children, siblings, foster parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins. They may come from different generations and in various combinations." Chicken Parmesan Serves Four (Super Quick)
1 box (16oz.) frozen, breaded chicken patties

1 cup fire - roasted tomato and garlic pasta sauce

1 cup shredded mozzarella and Asiago cheese with roasted garlic Heat oven as chicken package directs. Line a rimmed baking sheet with foil.

Place patties on baking sheets; bake 5 min. less than package directs. Spoon 1/4 cup of sauce over each patty; top with 1/4 cup of cheese. Bake 5 min. or until cheese melts.

Other topping: Stir 1/4 cup sliced olives and 1 tsp. capers into the pasta sauce, or substitute thin slices of mozzarella for shredded cheese blend, or serve with pasta tossed with more of the pasta sauce or with just a green salad.

10 Minute Cream Cheese Spread

Place block of cream cheese on plate. Coat generously with toasted sesame seeds. Let come to room temperature; drizzle with 2 tbsp. Soy sauce. Also good with Teriyaki Sauce, Thai sweet chili sauce or sweet and sour sauce.

Stuffed Figs

19 Fresh Figs
1/4 cup honey
1/2 cup Ricotta cheese
1/4 cup natural almonds, toasted and chopped

On a plate, mash ripest figs with fork; add honey and mix in well. Using sharp knife, remove stems and make deep X in top of each remaining figs. Do not cut through. Spread each fig apart to make petals. In small bowl combine, cheese and almonds.

Using back of spoon, press mashed figs mixture through sieve into a 1 cup. measurer. Spoon cheese mixture into figs. Arrange figs on plate and drizzle with the fig honey mixture. Additional whole figs may be necessary.

Chocolate Crispy Cake
(For all who love candy)

4 oz. semisweet chocolate, broken into pieces
2 Tbsp. butter or margarine
1 bag (10 1/2 oz.) Miniature marshmallows
6 cups rice crispy cereal

1 cup salted dry - roasted peanuts

1 cup M&M Mini Baking Bits
Spray 10 cup fluted caking pan (such as Bundt) with cooking spray. In a large bowl, heat chocolate and butter in microwave; stir chocolate mixture until melted and smooth. Add marshmallows to mixture. Heat in microwave on high 1 min. longer; stir until marshmallows are melted and mixture is smooth.

Add cereal, peanuts, and M&M's to chocolate mixture. Stir until all ingredients are coated and mixture is well combined. Transfer cereal mixture to prepared pan pressing mixture down with fingertips. Let stand at least 1 hour to set chocolate. (In warm weather, refrigerate to set cake.) To unmold, with knife or metal spatula loosen cake from the side of pan; invert onto serving plate. Sarah His wife in her nineties had a child named Isaac and he inherited the promises made to his father, (Genesis 17:15&16).

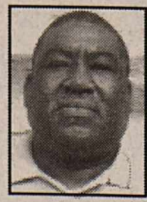
In the last days great numbers of people and nations will come up against Israel and try to annihilate it, (Psalm 83:1-8, Matthew 23:3-14).

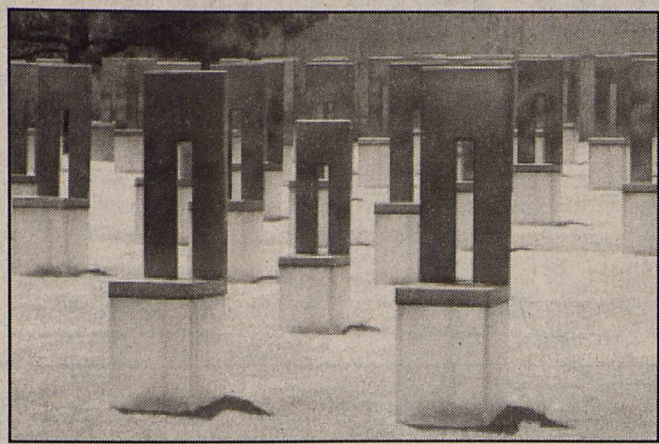

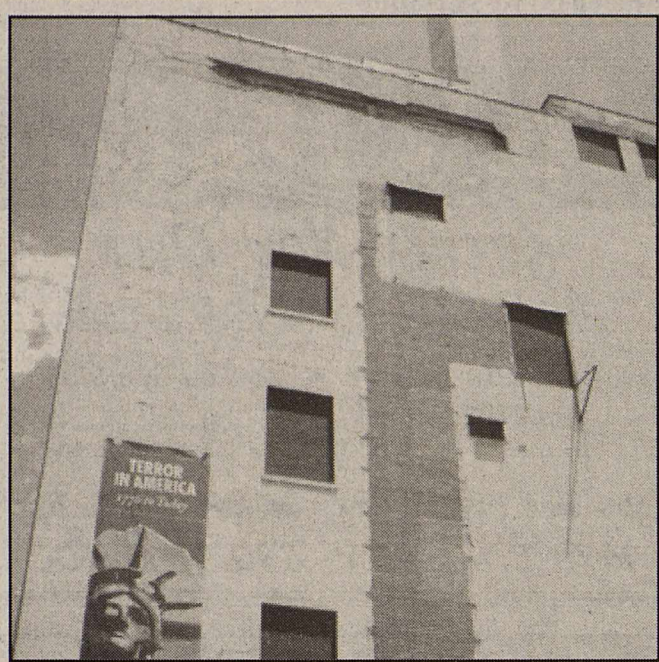

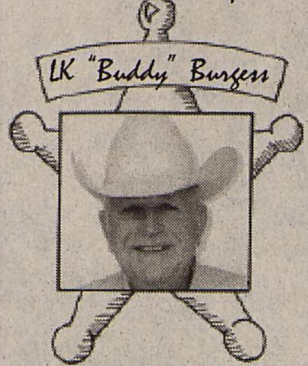

Her scars are just a reminder of everything that she's beat.

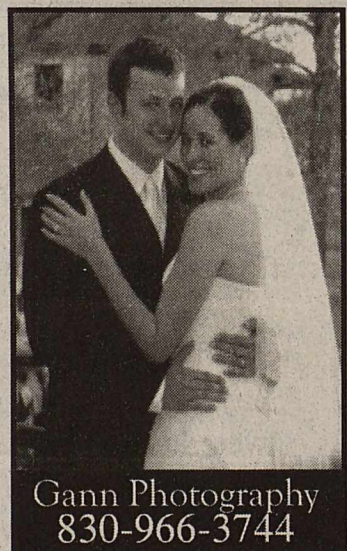
And though her wings are fragile, she is far from weak.

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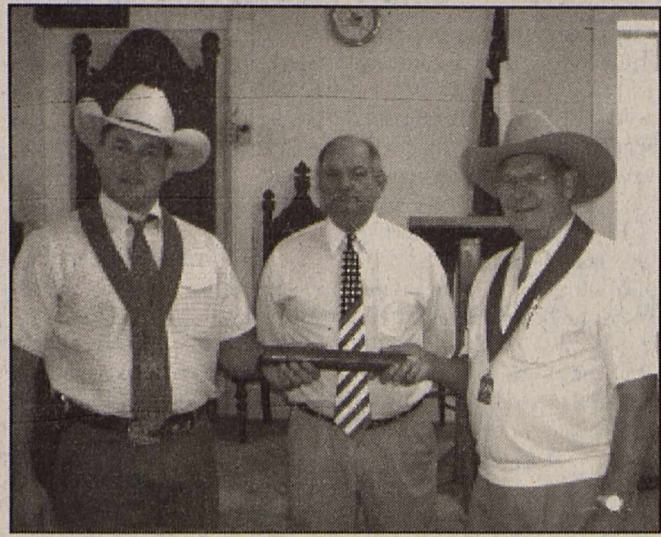
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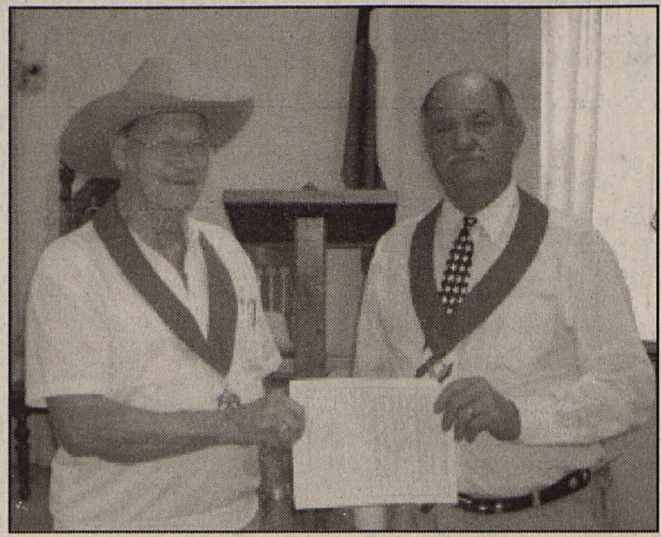

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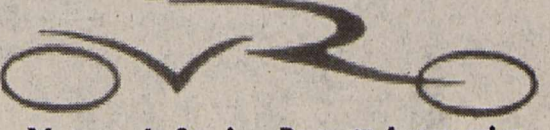

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Food and Drug Administration approves vaccine for HPV

The FDA recently made great strides toward reducing HPV infection rates and thereby reducing the incidence of cervical cancer, with the approval of the first-ever HPV vaccine. The human papillomavirus or HPV is the most common sexually transmitted infection in the United States and is most common in adolescents and young adults. It has been found to lead to cervical cancer, a life-

threatening disease that is expected to strike nearly 10,000 women in America this year.

It is important to note, however, that studies have found that to be most effective, the vaccine should be given before a person is sexually active. As a cytopathologist who reads Pap tests everyday, I know that women who are sexually active still need to continue to get regular Pap tests. In addition, for women 30 years of age and older, it is appropriate that they also have HPV test, as using both tests

for women in this age group even further increases the chances for identifying precancerous changes.

And while the vaccine protects against a significant number of genital warts and cervical cancers, it does not protect against all cancers. As a result, even vaccinated women will need to continue to

have a Pap test.

The advent of this new vaccine is significant. But as a cytopathologist who identifies and diagnoses cervical cancer, HPV and other diseases each day, I know that continued regular screening for women who are or who have been sexually active is critical.

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West Texas ranchers aid in falcon reintroduction



VAN HORN, Texas — On July 18, the Peregrine Fund, a non-profit organization based in Boise, Idaho, will resume its efforts to restore the endangered northern aplomado falcon to West Texas skies. With support from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Texas Hawking Association and private ranchers, the Fund will release 28 captive-bred falcons.

The young falcons, about 35 days old, will be placed at "hack sites" on July 18 to become acclimated to their surroundings for several days before being released, a standard practice for falcon reintroduction. At the release sites, falcons will be placed in protective boxes on top of hack towers and fed for five to seven days. The hack boxes will be opened for the birds to escape in late July or early August. This will take place on the Moon Ranch, Miller Ranch and Rancho Del Cielo in Jeff Davis County. "Our release efforts have been so successful in South Texas, with 46 aplomado falcon pairs now

established there, that we are now concentrating all our releases in West Texas" said J. Peter Jenny, Peregrine Fund vice president. "The habitat in West Texas is excellent for this species and landowners have been extremely supportive of our reintroduction efforts. The pay off is we are now beginning to see falcon pairs establishing territories in West Texas. We are extremely pleased to have the opportunity to release falcons on private ranches, made possible because of the Safe Harbor Program."

"As ranchers, we're looking forward to having aplomado falcons back in West Texas," said Jon Means, partner in the Means Ranch Company, which owns the Moon Ranch. "We've been partners in this program since 2002 and it's been a pleasure working with The Peregrine Fund folks." The Means family has been ranching in West Texas for five generations. The Texas Hawking Association is donating \$1,000 to the Fund to support the West Texas aplomado falcon reintroduction project. The 200-member group includes people who train falcons and other birds of prey for hunting. (Falconers must have state and federal permits to practice their art.)

"To be a falconer is to be a conservationist," said Steve Oleson, Texas Hawking Association

president. "As an organization, we want to do our part to help all species flourish. Our first target years ago was getting peregrine falcon numbers back up, and our members helped the Peregrine Fund with that successful effort. Now we're focusing on a Texas resident, the aplomado falcon. A few peregrines nest in Texas, but most just migrate through. The aplomado is here year-round. It's not a bird traditionally used in falconry, but we want to have them back as part of natural Texas, just to be able to see them on the wing."

"The key to this partnership is the private land stewards who are providing the habitat," said Robert L. Cook, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department executive director. "The work of the nonprofit partners and government biologists here is important, to be sure, but without ranchers willing to host falcon releases and protect habitat to support them, these beautiful birds would not be coming back in our state." The release of aplomado falcons is being conducted under a "Safe Harbor" agreement between landowners, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and The Peregrine Fund.

The agreement encourages private landowners to participate in the restoration of the endangered bird by exempting additional provisions or liabilities under the En-

dangered Species Act. Property owners who maintain a baseline number of aplomado falcons and agree to the release of falcons would be free to use or develop other areas of their property, even if the use results in "incidental take" of a falcon. There are currently more than 2 million acres in Texas enrolled in the aplomado falcon Safe Harbor Program.

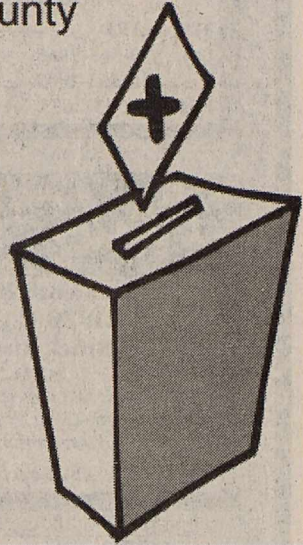
The aplomado falcon is the one remaining falcon on the endangered species list and a top priority of The Peregrine Fund. By the 1950s, it was no longer found in the United States until 1995, when a pair of falcons raised and released by biologists from The Peregrine Fund nested. At the end of 2005, 46 pairs were known to exist in the wild, two of those on the Moon Ranch.

Since July 1, 2002, landowners in 42 western Texas counties have been eligible to sign on to the Safe Harbor Agreement. These include Andrews, Brewster, Cochran, Crane, Crockett, Culberson, Dawson, Dimmit, Duval, Ector, Edwards, El Paso, Frio, Gaines, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Jim Hogg, Kinney, La Salle, Loving, Martin, Maverick, McMullen, Medina, Midland, Pecos, Presidio, Real, Reeves, Starr, Sutton, Terrel, Terry, Upton, Uvalde, Val Verde, Ward, Webb, Yoakum, Winkler, Zapata and Zavala Counties.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns today announced that agricultural producers throughout the nation can nominate eligible candidates to serve on USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees beginning today through Aug. 1, 2006 for the county committee elections to be held in the fall.

"Farmers and ranchers have an important opportunity to ensure that their FSA county committees represent them by participating in the county committee election process," said Johanns. "I encourage agricultural producers across the country to nominate eligible candidates, especially minorities and women, to serve on their local county committees and to vote this fall."

Farmers and ranchers who serve on county committees help make decisions necessary to administer federal farm programs offered in their communities. County committees make decisions on agricultural issues such

as commodity price support loans and payments, conservation programs, disaster payments and employing county executive directors.

Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in programs administered by FSA and live in the local administrative area conducting an election may be nominated for candidacy for a committee. Farmers and ranchers can obtain a complete list of eligibility requirements by visiting a local USDA Service Center or online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/publications/facts/html/coelig06.htm>.

Individuals may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Additionally, community based organizations representing minorities and women may nominate candidates. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign nomination form FSA-669A. The form includes a statement that the nominee agrees to serve if elected.

Farmers and ranchers should keep the following important dates

in mind during the 2006 county committee election process:

- *The nomination period begins June 15 and August 1 is the deadline to file nomination forms at the local USDA Service Center.
- *USDA will mail ballots to eligible voters by November 3. The last day to return voted bal-

lots to the local USDA Service Center is December 4.

- *Newly elected county committee members take office Jan. 1, 2007.
- The Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act established the county committee system in 1936. Today, there are close to 8,000 FSA county com-

mittee members serving three-year terms in more than 2,300 county offices. "Make a Difference: Nominate and Vote!" is the theme of the 2006 county committee election process.

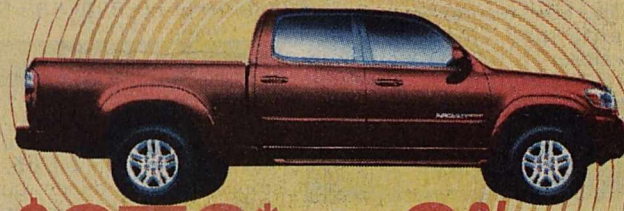
