FCS to allow deer management hunts

Director for the Fort Clark Springs Association voted and approved a series of weekend game management hunts at their regular board meeting on Oct. 21.

"These hunts are just a starting point. It will take a lot of things to create a successful management program," said Kurt Partlow.

Partlow is the coordinator for the first hunts sponsored by the Fort in more than five years.

Area game officials have noted the Fort is acting responsibly by addressing their overpopulation issues before it reaches a crisis point.

The hunts are scheduled for Dec. 15-17, 22-24, 29-31 as well as Jan. 5-7, 2007.

Rules and Regulations for the Fort Clark Deer Hunt 2006/2007: 1. Each hunter must have a valid Texas hunting license. 2. The hunter must be a member of Fort Clark Springs, or the guest or relative of a member. 3. All hunters must check in at Fort Clark Springs Association Shafter Hall for briefing, sing in and drawing for blinds -- Arrival times: Morning hunt - 4:30 a.m. Afternoon Hunt - 2:30 p.m. Late arrivals will not be seated. 4. The donation of 100 dollars for members and 200 dollars for guest of members (payable in advance) is required for one day

only. You may take your limit. If you choose to hunt a second day, reservation will depend on time slot availability. 5. Since the purpose of the hunt is to reduce the deer population on Fort Clark, only white tail does, culls bucks of six points or less and only one axis doe will be taken; absolutely no axis bucks. A fine of 1,000 dollar for a white tail buck over six points, and 1,500 dollar fine for axis bucks. This will be enforced, and deer will be confiscated. 6. We do not guarantee a deer. 7. Signing of a Hold Harmless Agreement releasing Fort Clark Springs Association and the Volunteer Committee from any liability is required. 8. Reading and signing of the Safety Rules and Guidelines set forth for this harvest is required. 9. Hunting is allowed only in designated ground blinds -- behind the airstrip where roads are cut and in the zoo farm area. 10. The hunter will be taken to the blind at approximately 5:30 a.m. for Morning Hunt and 2:30 p.m. for Afternoon Hunt. You will not be allowed to leave the blind. You are to wait in the blind until you are picked up. All game, will be checked, tagged, and recorded. No field dressing of deer is allowed. 11. The hunter is allowed to shoot no more than 75 yard to have a quick humane

kill. 12. No shooting across boundary of fences will be tolerated. 13. Security and Maintenance will patrol the areas and block the roads. 14. You should make certain your gun has recently been "sighted in" and is in good working condition. 15. No smoking in deer blinds. No dogs allowed. No littering on Fort Clark property. 16. No alcoholic beverages allowed. No one in an intoxicated state will be allowed to hunt. 17. All hunters must abide by all Texas Parks and Wildlife hunting regulations. 18. All hunters must wear "hunter orange" caps and vests. 19. If for some reason, you do not show for your scheduled harvest, your money will not be refunded.



TxDOT planning HWY 90 turnlanes

The Texas Department of Transportation held a pre-construction meeting in Carrizo Springs Nov. 28, to discuss 4.11 miles of road improvement slated for various highways in the Laredo region.

Construction activities in Kinney County will include the construction of left turn lanes

including pavement widening, asphalt pavement and pavement markings on Hwy. 90 at FM 334 (Ann Street) and Hwy. 90 at Keene Street (By Don's Funeral Chapel).

Many residents, including Jewel F. Robinson, former owner of *The Brackett News*, have fought hard for city, county and

state officials to address the safety issues created by vehicles stopping on the two lane highway while waiting to turn left. Several fatal vehicle accidents have been attributed to the lack of turn lanes and high rates of speed.

The construction contract has been awarded to Price Construction of Big Springs.



New tax laws may aid your investment strategy

If you're an investor, you'll want to pay close attention to some of the provisions of a bill that President Bush signed into law on May 17.

The new legislation extends the lower tax rates on capital gains and stock dividends, temporarily removes restrictions on transfers from traditional to Roth IRAs and raises the exemption level on the alternative minimum tax (AMT). Clearly, the new laws can have a big impact on your investment strategies over the next few years.

Let's take a look at the tax law changes and see how they might affect you.

Extension of 15 percent rate on dividends and capital gains. Until a few years ago, dividends were taxed at your personal income tax rate. But changes in tax laws resulted in a 15 percent tax rate on dividends through 2008. This rate has now been

extended through the end of 2010. Also, the maximum long-term capital gains rate will remain at 15 percent through 2010; this rate, too, was slated to expire at the end of 2008. For taxpayers in the 10-percent and 15-percent brackets, long-term capital gains will be taxed at 5 percent for the 2006 and 2007 tax years and at 0 percent for 2008-2010. Clearly, these changes give you some incentives to look for high-quality, dividend-paying stocks and to hold your stocks for at least one year - long enough to receive the best capital gains rate when you sell. Some stocks have paid and increased dividends for 25 straight years, or more. These companies are typically well-run businesses that strive to reward their investors. (Keep in mind, though, that no company is obligated to pay dividends and may lower, or discontinue, dividends at any time.)

Removal of restrictions on conversions to Roth IRA. Starting in 2010, you can convert your traditional IRA to a Roth IRA, regardless of your income level. Currently, only taxpayers with adjusted gross incomes of \$100,000 or less can make this conversion. The amount you

transfer will be included in your gross income, so you'll have to pay taxes on it, but you can spread the taxes out over two years if you make the rollover in 2010. This traditional-to-Roth conversion may benefit you in at least two important ways. First, qualified withdrawals from a Roth IRA are not taxable. And second, you won't have to start taking distributions from your Roth IRA at age 70-1/2, as you must with a traditional IRA and a 401(k).

Increased Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT) exemption. For many years, many taxpayers have been shielded from the AMT by its large exemption, but this exemption has not been adjusted for inflation, so, as wages and earnings rise each year, more and more people will be subject to the AMT. Recent cuts in income tax rates also mean that more people may face the AMT. The new tax bill provides AMT relief by raising the amount of the exemption to \$62,550 for joint filers, \$42,500 for singles and \$31,275 for married persons filing separate returns. This new exemption level applies only to the 2006 tax year, so when 2007 rolls around, watch for the results of new legislation.

So, there you have it - news you can use about the new tax laws. Consult with your investment professional and tax advisor to see how you can benefit from these changes.

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


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

In the end what is there to say, except for the obvious that our kids dug themselves a deep hole in the first half, played a hell of a second half and came up just a bit short against a very good Shiner team. Despite being shut out in the second half the Comanches did just enough to eke out a 22-19 win this past Saturday at New Braunfels in the opening round of the Class 1A District 1 regional playoff tournament, and here's how it happened....

Shiner took the opening kickoff and went to work on its own 15. On 1st and ten tailback Cody Franke took the handoff on a reverse and raced along the sideline nearest the home bleachers (where the Shiner faithful had congregated) all the way to the Brackett 16. On the next play Shiner back Adam Kalich took it in for the first points of the game. The point after failed, but the Comanches led 6-0.

Afterwards, the two teams exchanged punts and the Tigers took over in great shape at the Shiner 39. After three plays Brackett had only managed to gain five yards, so on fourth and four head coach Greg Voyles rolled the dice and tailback Travis Bonner responded with a 9-yard burst up to the Shiner 25. Again the Tigers moved ahead in fits and starts, but not enough to produce a first down. On 3rd and 1 at the 16, senior quarterback Robert Davis (who would account for 161 of Brackettville's 273 rushing yards) kept the drive alive with an 8-yard run. Travis Bonner cashed in on 1st and goal from the eight, Jacob Schroeder tacked on the point after and the Tigers were up 7-6.

The Brackett defense stepped up on Shiner's next possession, stifling the Comanche offense and forcing a punt. The Tigers had the football on the Comanche 45, but once again the turnover bug appeared at a most inopportune time. On 1st and ten at the Shiner 45 the Comanche's forced an Ivan Pinales fumble, and from there they mounted an 11-play drive, capped off by a 21-yard Adam Kalich touchdown run. The two-point attempt failed, but Shiner had retaken the lead 12-7.

The Tigers had to punt on their next possession and the Comanche's were in the drivers' seat once again at their own 37. Shiner again moved into Brackett territory but the drive appeared to stall at the 24- that is, until wideout Derick Richter entered the equation. On 4th and 8 Shiner

quarterback Matt Hibbs fired a dart to a streaking Richter who took it the rest of the way, and the Comanche's led 19-7. Brackett coughed up the ball yet again on a 2nd and 15 at their own 33, and Shiner answered with a 38-yard field goal as time expired in the first half to boost their lead to 22-7.

I don't know what was said in the Brackett locker room at half-time, but whatever it was, it worked. The Tigers took over at their own 20 to open the second half and moved quickly into scoring position at the Shiner 6. Robert Davis punctuated an impressive drive with a 6-yard touchdown burst on 1st and goal, the black and gold-clad Brackett contingent erupted, and just like that the Tigers were back in the game, advantage Shiner, 22-13.

Shiner had the ball back but couldn't capitalize, and opted to punt on 4th and 1 at their own 45. The Brackett offense took over, and marched methodically to the Comanche 23. On 2nd and 15 Robert Davis took the football and a host of Shiner defenders on a rocky ride up to the eight yard line. Davis punched it in several plays later on 1st and goal from the one. The point after failed and Brackett trailed by three, 22-19, with just under ten minutes left in the fourth quarter.

The defense again did its part and stymied the potent Comanche ground game, forcing a punt. Brackett took over at its own 22, but time was working against them. Three successive false start penalties pinned the Tigers back exactly where they had started, on their own 22. On 4th and 16 at the 29 Travis Bonner took the handoff and clawed his way up to the 40, but it was too little, and too late. Shiner took over on downs, Matt Hibbs took a knee, and the game was over. At this point I want to congratulate all of our coaches and players for their moxie and competitive spirit this season, and particularly during the course of this hard-fought game. You guys played your guts out, and you have nothing to be ashamed of. You did this town proud. Seniors, good luck and God Speed wherever your life's ambitions may direct you. I hope you're all back for homecoming next year (who knows, I may even persuade you to suit up one more time for old times' sake- I won't say anything if you don't).
