

Our success in FLYing comes at the heels of two important words: Persistence and Consistence. When we look at our own history we see an inconsistency in how we looked at our housework. Use them as a learning experience and keep plugging

Every mistake I have made in my life helps me to grow and become wiser! If I had given up I would not have become FlyLady. If we don't learn from our mistakes we are destined to make the same ones again and again! So looking back on that fateful January 1, 1999, I realize that I had never established a habit and I had been too hard on myself. That day I determined that I would be nice to me and practice one habit. Shining my sink was all I had to do for the whole month!

Let's just say I was persistent in my quest to get organized and along with that persistence I used the consistency of doing one thing every day to help me find the peace that I knew was out there! It worked for me and it has worked hundreds of thousands of people as well. When you find something that works you stick with it. We don't try to reinvent the light bulb every time we screw one in a socket; we trust it and don't waste our time trying to improve on it. We are very creative people and we love to do things our way or shall I say try to make better a system. As you establish the basic habits you are going to begin to feel your light shining brightly! You can't skip the most important steps of Persistence and Consistency.



 your parents' parents, and their parents, and their parents.

In some middle and junior high schools, students in history classes have to make family trees as assignments. This is not only a good idea to make history personal for every student, but it's a great way to learn more about your extended family.

Several years ago, I started a family genealogy (jee-nee-OL-uh-jee) project to find out more about my ancestors. "Genealogy" is the study of family and history. My greatgrandfather (my grandfather's father) was a mystery in our family.

The family had heard he was an orphan

in New Orleans and left the orphanac join the Confederate Army during the Civil War. But, the story goes, because he was so young (16), the army would not make him a soldier, or even a drummer boy.







WTG has markers placed along the pipeline routes, but because of possible damage or vandalism, these markers (signs) may not be apparent at all points along the pipelines routes, we request that all persons who anticipate digging, excavating, boring, drilling, or blasting in the vicinity of our facilities call 1-888-334-4912.

A West Texas Gas employee will be available, free of charge, to check your area, locate our facilities and mark a safe area. In addition, state law requires each excavator to contact a

one call locate service. This one call service will then notify each operator of buried utilites that you intend to dig in an area that may contain buried utilites (water, gas, electric, telephone, etc.) This service and call are free. Contact the Texas Excavation Safety Service at 1-800-344-8377.

Please notify West Texas Gas if the following situations occur in relation to a pipeline or other facilities we operate:

THE ESCAPE OF GAS FROM A PIPELINE - This may be letected by smell, hissing sound, or an unexplained areas of dead vegetation in the vicinty of our facilities.

VANDALSIM OR THEFT OF PIPELINE MARKERS **Emergencies:**


