Fort Clark votes in former city manager

Former Eagle Pass city manager, Felix Cerna, clinched one of the two open positions on the Fort Clark Springs Board of Directors at the association's thirty-sixth annual meeting on March 31.

Cerna garnered 706 votes out of the 1,319 official ballots counted by the accounting firm of Glenn, Graf & Bowers in Del Rio.

Larry O'Keefe, the only incumbent, took the second open slot and was re-elected with 686 votes. O'Keefe was appointed to the board in May, 2006, after

Robert Windle resigned.

Charles Winfree gathered 666 votes, while Edward Dillon followed with 504 votes.

Write in candidates Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck, Abe Lincoln, Jose Lambaria and Gilford Raymer all received one vote each.

Mickey Mouse was not available for comment after the results were announced.

Director of Operations Ron Pellin reported the Association was, "in sound financial health," and its net worth increased to \$2,440,019; an increase of

\$471,000, since 2002.

Three amendments to the Fort Clark Springs Association, Inc. Declaration of Protective Restrictions were put before the voting membership on this year's ballot and all three were defeated by an overwhelming majority.

Proposition One advocated the board of directors increase from a five member panel to seven members. The measure was voted down with 723 votes against; 576 votes in favor.

Proposition Two and Three pertained to changing Part V,

Section 6, of the Protective Restrictions.

Proposition Two would have changed the regular assessment base to \$480; up from the current \$396. This proposition was defeated 805 votes against; 494 votes in favor.

Proposition Three suggested the board of directors increase the regular assessment up to 10% per calendar year or use the Consumer Price Index, whichever is greater. This measure was also suppressed with a vote of 825 votes against; 364 votes in favor.

Even though Randy Gallo-way of the accounting firm of Hardin & Newsome reported the overall financial status of as "positive," the board members, without the ability to collect more assessments, will have to consider new ways, including reductions in member services, to meet its financial obligations. The cost of fuel, insurance, the future of minimum wage and trash disposal were named as some of the biggest concerns to the Fort's bottom line.

"We will have to live within our means, there are no other choices," said Pellin.

As in year's past, the Fort recognized its volunteers including the Architectural, Planning, Recreation, RV, Golf and Nominating committees.

The "Employee of the Year" honors were bestowed on Golf Maintenance Supervisor

The girls golf team finished second at the district 30-A tournament Monday at The Buckhorn Golf Club in Comfort.

Leading the way was Junior Ashley Stephenson who finished 4th individually with a round of 98. Other members of the team include Whitney Gum 104, Laura Meyer 109, Laura Swinson 120, and Meghann Davis 128.

The Sabinal Girls won the team title, but with the second place finish the girls team will be advancing to the regional tournament.

The boys golf team won the District 30-A team title on Monday at the Buckhorn Golf Club in Comfort.

This is the third straight district title for the boys, who are also the defending 1A Region IV Champions.

Leading the boys was Junior Lane Nowlin who took home Medalist honors with a fine

Also, playing for Brackett as individuals were Chris Blake 85, Clint Conrad 86, and Cody Kirkland 109.

The boys also head back to the Regional Tournament in Brenham in hopes of defending their title.

Las Moras Invitational celebrates 18 years

Eighteen years ago an entrepreneurial Texan from San Angelo decided that Fort Clark Springs Men's Golf Association needed a golf tournament. His name was Roony Gibbs and, at the time, he was the manager of the pro shop and the golf course.

According to Hoagy Nelson, our Fort Clark golf Historian, Gibbs could sometimes be found mowing the greens or scheduling tee times or raking bunkers. Nelson tells the story of the un-

flappable Gibbs asking him to mow around a green and Nelson took on the task and promptly cut off a sprinkler head. Gibbs response: "No problem. We have more."

Upon deciding that Fort Clark needed a tournament he discussed his idea with a number of golf enthusiasts who, with the aid of some adult beverage, nodded their heads in unison and the Las Moras Tournament at historic Fort Clark Springs was born.

Hats of to Ron Pellin

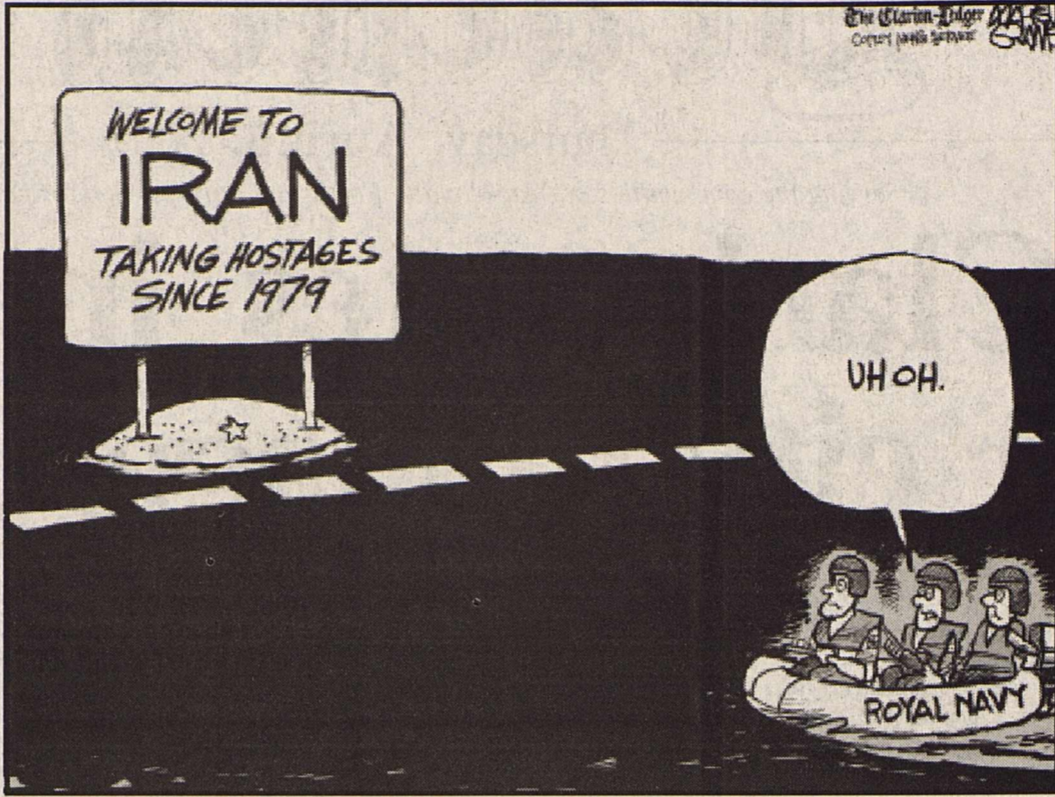
It was indeed a wonderful annual association meeting that was held on Saturday.

Status of Edwards Aquifer dye testing

Dear Editor:

Technicians from George Veni & Associates began contacting, and collecting water samples from Kinney County landowners and Las Moras Springs in December 2006.

Actual dye injections began on Friday, March 9, 2007, at two locations.

The first injections were at Alamo cave on the Tully Shahan ranch at approximately 9:00 A.M. Members and professional representatives of the KCGCD Board were denied the opportunity of witnessing this test because there were not the "list of invited guests" the Shahans had prepared. The Brackett News representative was not invited.

The 2nd injection took place at HF&F ranch approximately 12:00 noon in a sinkhole on Elm Creek. Members of the KCGCD and their professional representatives were invited to witness this dye injection.

The Brackett News and Vic Hilderbran were also invited. Geray Schindel represented the EAA. Samples were obtained by the Veni technicians immediately

after the injections. Different dyes were used at each location.

Witnesses sampling, by Consultant Jack Boxell, began on Tuesday, March 13th.

Some of the sample locations were not accessible because of the previous rain. Samples were obtained from Las Moras Spring, City of Brackettville, Mud Creek and Pinto Creek at Hwy. 90, Chris Ring Ranch and the Shahan Ranch.

Wet roads prevented access to a Chris Ring and FH&H site. This week the representative of the District learned that they still didn't have access to the Shahan Ranch.

The representatives do not know what equipment for sampling is installed or where it is installed.

These representatives have been selected to represent you and our County to witness the collection of scientific evidence that will help determine the amount of acre footage of groundwater recharge that is available from out groundwater watersheds that will be beneficial to Kinney County in the future.

"What's in the past is in the past"- lets move forward in a coordinated effort by everyone.

Sampling on Tuesday, March 27th & 28th, was witnessed by Dr. Joe Goebel, Grant Synder and Jack Boxell.

Some of the sample locations were not accessible because of the previous rain. Samples were obtained from Las Moras Spring, City of Brackettville, Mud Creek and Pinto Creek at Hwy. 90, Chris Ring Ranch and the Shahan Ranch.
