Water district mediates lawsuits

The Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District (KCGCD) came to a possible settlement in the state and federal legal cases pending against them in a voluntary mediation session on July 17.

The players in the multiple cases pending against the District are:

- In July, 2005, a petition was filed by "Plaintiffs": Toledo P. Boulware, Individually and as Trustee, Dos Angeles, L.P., Zach and Kayla Davis, DMC Partners, Ltd., Willie Jo Dooley, LP, Hayden G. and Doris Y. Haby, Hayden G. Haby, Jr. and Dennette Haby Coates, Ben Jones, Jr. Estate, Ben Jones, Sr. Estate, 4-S Ranch, McDaniel Farms, Inc. and Jewel F. Robinson. The case

challenged the district's authority to assess and collect certain fees in regards to the permitting process and for its failure to issue the permits in a timely manner once a decision about their permits had been made.

- Declared "Intervenor" on behalf of the water district, John Boerschig and Tully Shahan participated in the mediation as they both protested the Plaintiffs permits and the amount of water former general manager and consultant Steve Walthour proposed the district allow. An intervenor is a person that claims they have an interest in the outcome of a case before the court.

- Groundwater director Beth Ann Smith charged the District and former General Manager Darlene Shahan denied her access to documents that should have been available to her in her capacity as a director.

- In a federal case, filed in September 2006, against the district, Ranchers Hugh and Dennette Haby Coates charged the District, several past and present directors and former general manager Darlene Shahan violated their civil rights by willfully interfering with their rights to pump water.

All sides met in San Antonio at the office of Louis T.

Rosenberg, the water district's new legal advisor, to try and hammer out a compromise and potentially put a cap on the district's mounting legal bills and obligations.

"The parties worked very hard during mediation," said Attorney Ed McCarthy, who represents 7 of the 13 plaintiffs in the state case, but gave no other statements about Tuesday's events.

Also holding his cards close to his vest was KCGCD Board President Lloyd Lee Davis, saying he wanted the board to have a chance to review the proposed compromises before speaking

publicly.

Davis did however thank Rosenberg, KCGCD Director Ed Dillon and General Manager Diana Ward, "for their efforts in making this mediation successful."

All sides proposed to withdraw their pending petitions and not pursue the matters in court in the future.

The district tentatively agreed to pay legal fees to the Plaintiffs up to \$550,000, and permit them their historic water use, that in most cases was up to three times as much as originally permitted by the district.

Intervenor, Boerschig and Shahan, were also granted their requests to increase their permitted amount of water to higher historic use figures. These amounts were also up to three times higher.

The settlement will have to be formally accepted by a majority of the KCGCD board and signed off on by District Judge Mickey Pennington before becoming final.

County Judge Fritter resigns

Johnny Fritter tendered his resignation as Kinney County Judge on July 17.

Fritter, the former Chief Deputy for the sheriff's department, entered into office with a three to one vote margin over incumbent Herb Senne in January of this year.

Shortly after the Primary Elec-

tion in March, 2006, Fritter fell ill and spent time recovering, thus supporting his claims for resigning due to personal health issues.

State Election Code, Title 12, Chapter 201 reads: 201.023. RESIGNATION. If an officer submits a resignation,

whether to be effective immediately or at a future date, a vacancy occurs on the date the resignation is accepted by the appropriate authority or on the eighth day after the date of its receipt by the authority, whichever is earlier.

County commissioners will now have to appoint an appropriate replacement adjudicator and then the appointee will serve until January 1, 2009.

The court will continue to operate as usual with the special appointment, but an election for a new judge will be ordered.

Persons interested in serving as the county judge will have to register to run by a deadline set in December, 2007.

Then the candidate must participate in party primary in March, 2008, followed by the General Election in November.

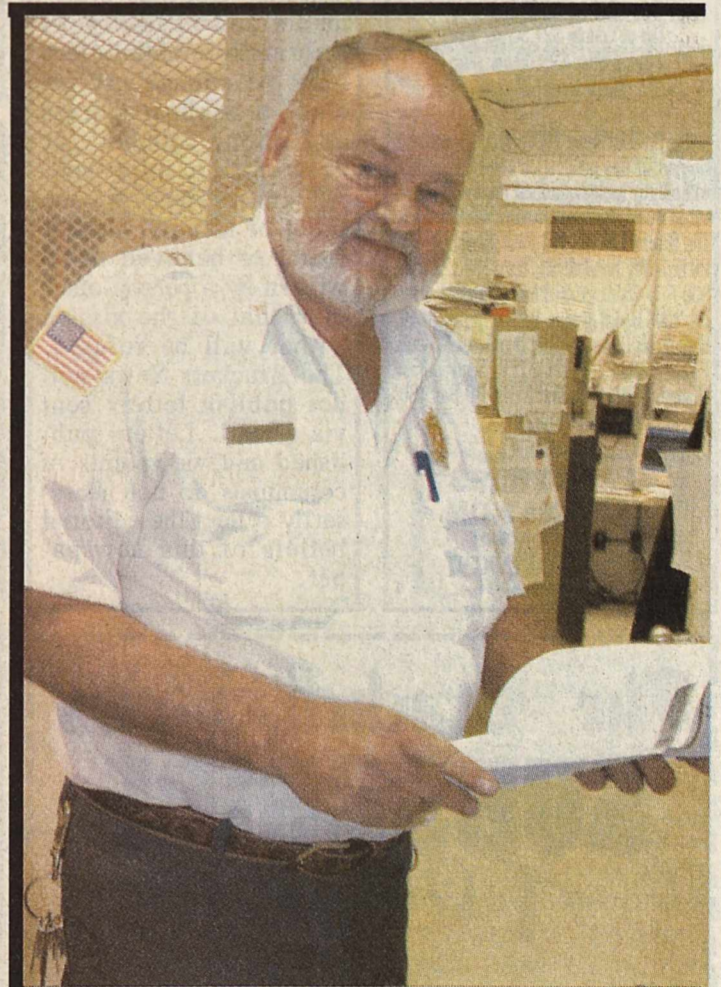
The judge-elect will then be sworn in on the closest business day to January 1, 2009.

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Don't Let External Events Keep You from Investing

If you look for reasons not to invest right now, you could find them - global unrest, high gas prices and so on. Yet, if you wait until "things settle down" before investing, you'll have difficulty achieving your financial goals, because there will always be some external events that could keep you out of the market - if you let them. But the smartest investors look beyond today's headlines - and when tomorrow arrives, they are often rewarded for their patience and perseverance.

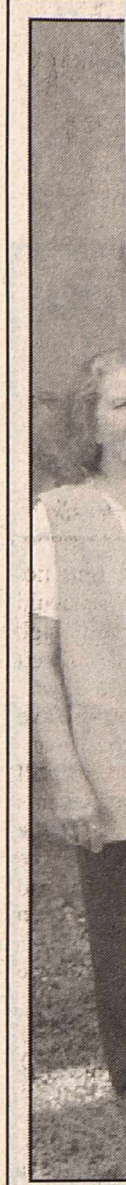
Want proof? Look at every major event of the past century that could have given investors the jitters, such as assassinations, wars and political crises. You will find that after just a few years - and in some cases, a few months - the stock market not only gained back the ground it initially lost, but moved to new heights.

For a dramatic illustration of this pattern, consider the aftermath of the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001. Immediately following this event, the stock market closed for several days. When it reopened, the Dow Jones Industrial Average immediately fell 684 points. By Sept. 24, the Dow was off 14.3 percent, its worst weekly percentage loss in 61 years. For 2001, the Dow lost 7.1 percent, closing the year at 10,021. But if you fast-forward five years to 2006, the Dow had recouped its losses several times over, closing the year at 12,463 - a 24 percent gain since the 2001 close.

In short, while it is true that past performance is no guarantee of future results, history has shown that the stock market has been resilient enough to overcome even the most cataclysmic of events. So don't head to the investment "sidelines" in reaction to troubling news. You may need to change your investment strategy in response to some events - but, by and large, they should be events related specifically to your individual situation or your existing investments. Consider the following scenarios:

You move closer to retirement. During much of your working years, you're trying to build financial resources for retirement. Consequently, you'll need to invest a sizable amount of your portfolio in growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks. As you move closer to retirement, and even during retirement, you'll still need some exposure to stocks, because you'll need their growth potential to keep ahead of inflation. However, you may want to work with your financial advisor to rebalance your portfolio to provide more income-producing opportunities, which may come from bonds, certificates of deposit or even dividend-paying stocks.

You see a change in your existing investments. Many people sell some of their investments due to short-term price fluctuations. This is generally not a good idea, because long-term performance is what counts. However, if you notice other changes in your holdings, it may be time to make some moves. For example, if you own stock in a company whose management or business objectives have changed, or whose products or services no longer seem competitive, you may be better off by selling your shares and moving on to new opportunities. You may find other reasons associated with your life or your portfolio to make changes - but don't be swayed by the events of the day. If you invest wisely, and keep on investing, the future can be bright.

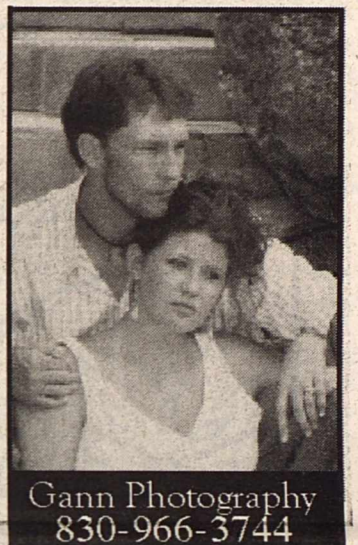
Kinney 4-H Fourth of July Float

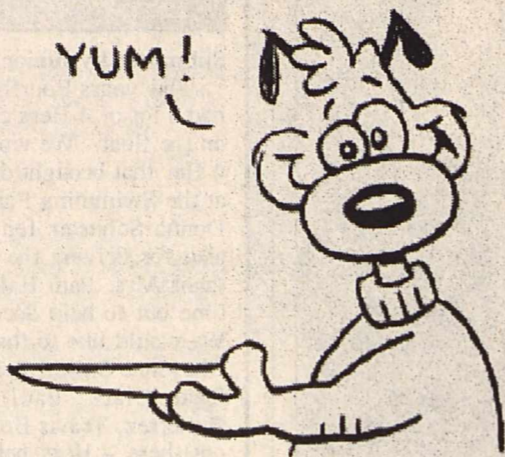

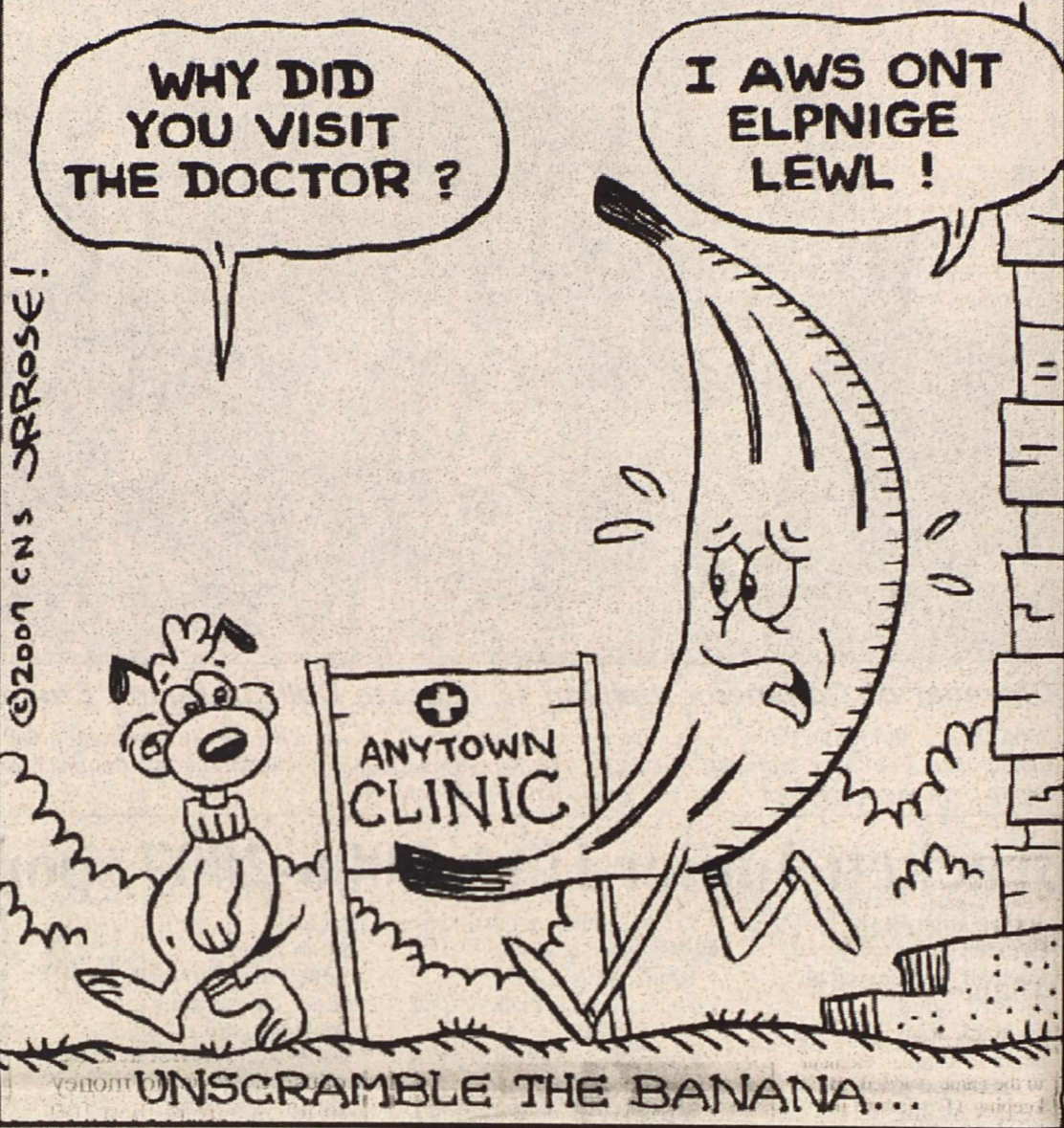

Hitting it low in the wind

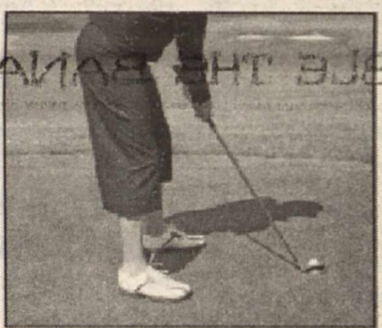
When playing in the wind, a whole new element to the game is added. By keeping a few factors in mind, you will find it more comfortable to play in the wind, as well as enjoy better results.

• Instead of simply using an extra club in the wind, take two extra clubs for safe measure. This will allow you to swing easier. The harder you swing, the higher the ball will go. Swinging easier will keep the ball lower.

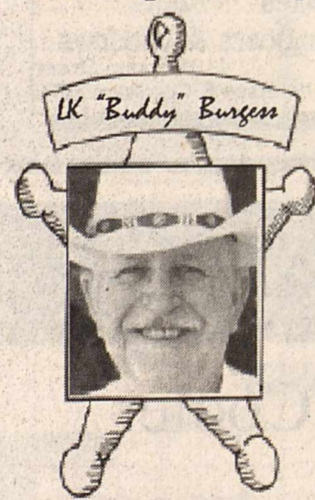
• Grip down about 2 inches (as seen in photo). That will also help to keep the ball low.

• Slightly shorten your backswing and follow-through. This will encourage your swing to be a little more shallow, which will also play a part in keeping the ball from going too high in the wind.

By keeping all of these factors in mind the next time you play in the wind, you can enjoy a better understanding as to what to expect out of your shots. The wind will become less intimidating and your scores will improve, which is always a bonus.
