According to the District, the 40-question exam was based on what should have been a student's cumulative knowledge ing the exam, and 40 percent of of science and science laboratory experience. Jones Elementary students have not had the opportunity to participate in a laboratory environment and were not prepared to meet the challenge the test presented.

"We need to close the gap in the sub-classes," said BISD Superintendent Paula Renken as she explained how a \$50,000 grant and a solid plan from Jones Elementary Principal Alma Gutierrez and staff will improve scores not only in science, but in mathematics as well.

In the meeting Renken did not attempt to skirt the negative rating and publicly stated the administrators for all four campuses will be held responsible if scores do not improve.

Even though the overall rating for the elementary school was derogatory, the school would have fared much better if the test subjects had been rated individually: the reading score would have been Recognized; the writing score would have been Exemplary and the mathematics score would have been Acceptable.

Sales Tax Holiday this weekend

King reminds Texas shoppers of later sales tax holiday weekend

August 17-19

Representative Tracy O. King (D-Batesville) announced that a measure passed by the 80th Legislature will allow Texas consumers to enjoy a later sales tax holiday this year.

The holiday usually occurs the first weekend of August, but legislators voted to move it to the third weekend of the month to keep up with the later start date for many Texas schools.

On August 17, 18, and 19, shoppers will be able to purchase certain items tax-free. The law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from state and local sales taxes, but there are some exceptions. 



More suggestions next week...believe me they get better! Leigh V.



Doctor's Note After An Absence for Illness

Upon return to school, a student absent for more than 3 consecutive days because of a personal illness must bring a statement from a doctor or health clinic verifying the illness or condition that caused the student's extended absences from school.

Medical Absences During School Day: A medical absence does not count against the student. For the student to receive a medical absence the following must be documented: student must sign in and/or our of school in the office, student must bring a note from the health care professional they had an appointment with, and the note must be dated the same day as the student signed in and/or out of school. Therefore, the student must have been in attendance for part of the same school day in order to receive a Medical Absence. Perfect attendance awards will be presented to any student who qualifies for the award in any grade level. Students must be in attendance for the whole school day and not miss any class to receive a perfect attendance award.

At the end of the first four weeks of a grading period, parents will be given a written progress report if their child's performance in any core subject is near or below 75, or is below the expected level of performance. If the student receives a grade lower than 70 in any class or subject at the end of a grading period, the parent will be requested to schedule a conference with the teacher of that class or subject.

Cafeteria Services
