Rogelio Estrada of Brackettville was indicted for driving under the influence. Estrada has been previously convicted of Driving While Intoxi-

Leonel Olivares, of Quemado, Texas was indicted for possession of marijuana of more than 4 ounces but less than 5 pounds.

The remaining 7 indictments were either not billed or the true bill warrants that have not yet been served.

Alamo Village Reunion

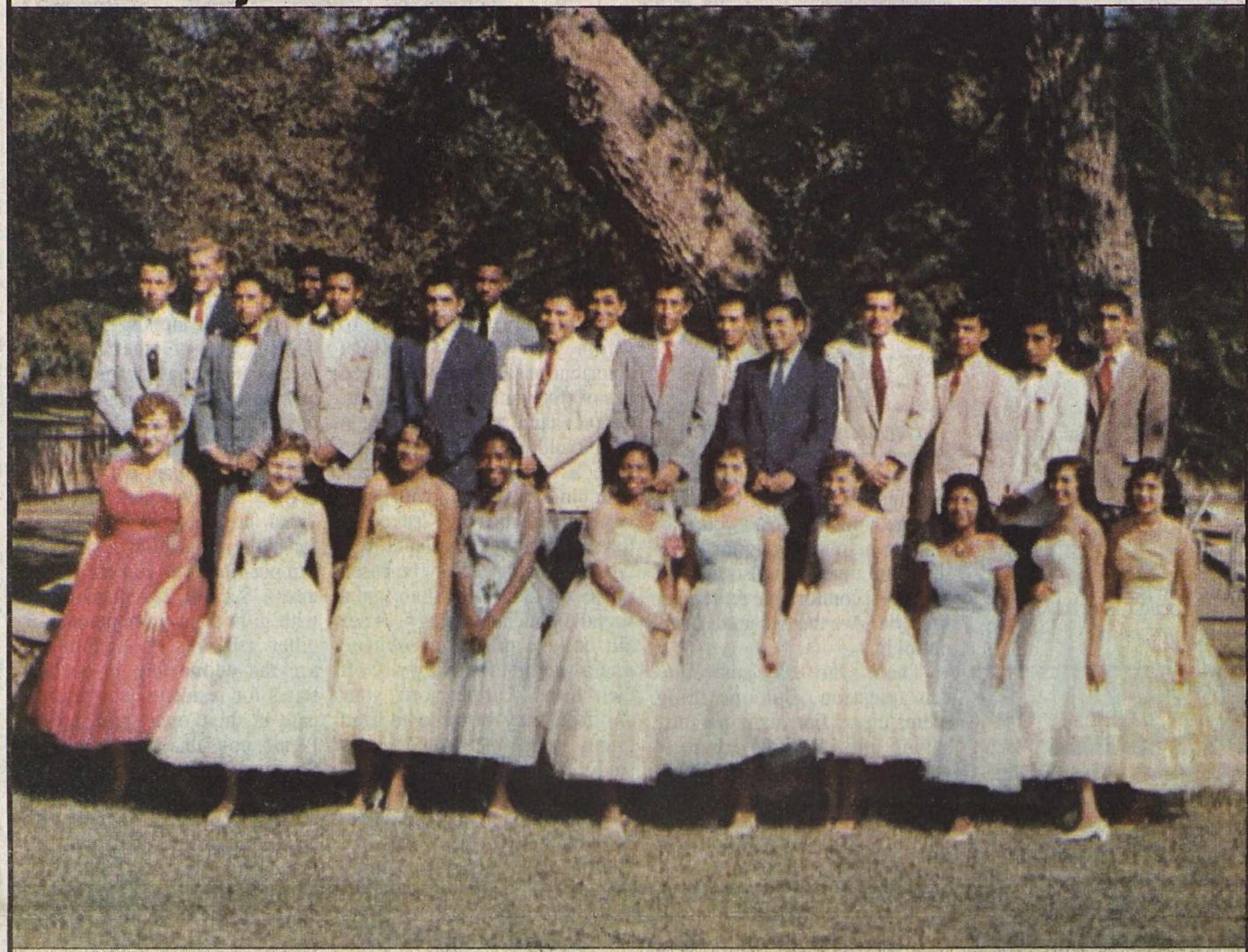

Celebrate Constitution Day

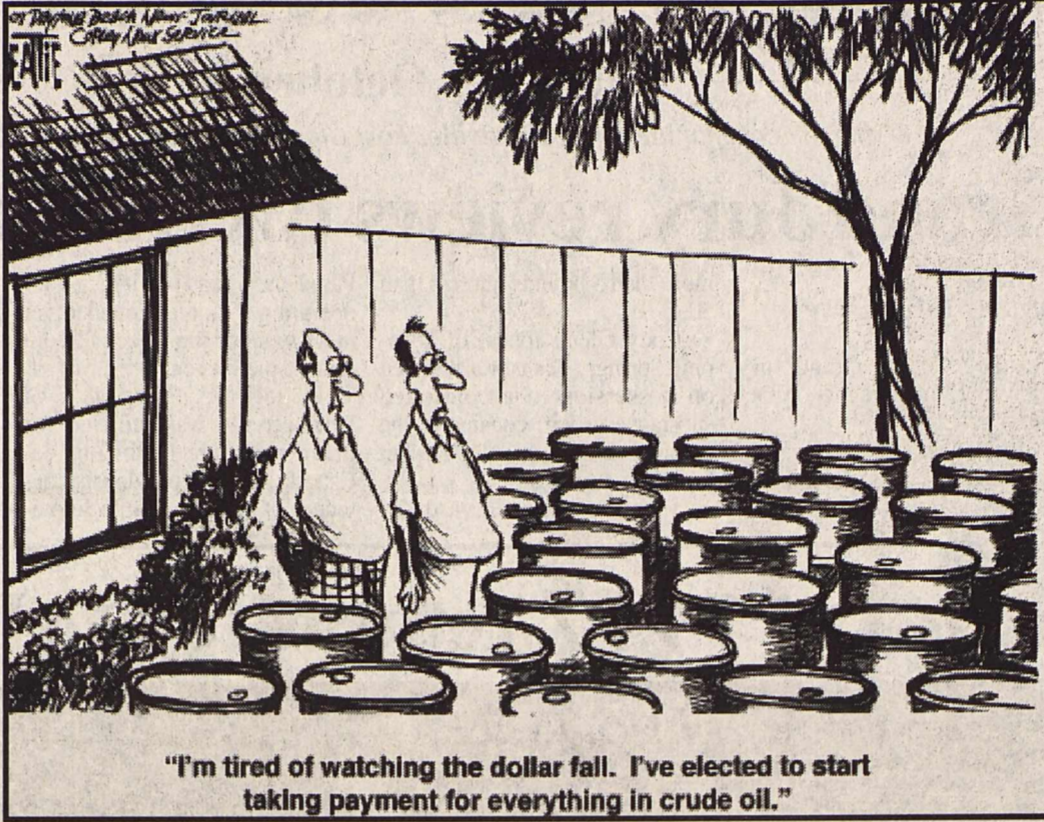
The Fab Five of the First Amendment
Part 4 of 5: Right to Peaceful Assembly

Think it's no BIG DEAL? There was once a time when you could be arrested for gathering on a public street. Once thought of as the lesser of the Five Fundamental Freedoms, Assembly has really gotten some major respect from the Supreme Court. Originally, the right to assemble was considered less important than the right to petition. Did you know that getting together to chill with friends at the mall is protected by the First Amendment? Getting together to share ideas, coming together to share common beliefs and act upon those beliefs has given the right to assemble major street credit.

Fighting for the right to vote, civil rights and protesting war is protected by the right to assemble. Even going to church or helping with the American Red Cross is protected. And know this...Picketing is protected when it is for a lawful purpose and is conducted in an orderly manner and publicizes some type of grievance. Many groups and organizations use assembly as a way to get the word out.

The right of every single United States citizen to peacefully:

- Parade and Gather
- Demonstrate support or opposition of public policy
- Express one's views
- is guaranteed by the freedom of speech and the right to peaceably assemble.

Strike a balance between saving for retirement, college

If you have young children, you may want them to attend college someday - and you may want to help them pay for it. At the same time, you also need to save for a comfortable retirement lifestyle. Are the two goals compatible?

There's no easy answer to this question. But one thing seems clear: For many parents, saving and investing for their children's future is every bit as important - and maybe more so - than saving and investing for their own. In fact, two-thirds of parents said they would postpone retirement if necessary to help pay for their children's college education, according to a survey by Alliance Bernstein Investments, Inc.

Parents have good reason to believe that investing in a college education will pay off for their children: Over the course of their lifetimes, college graduates will earn, on average, about \$1 million more than high school graduates, according to

the U.S. Census Bureau.

So, since a college education appears to be quite valuable, shouldn't you do everything you can to help pay for it?

Ultimately, you'll have to weigh your potential college contributions against your need to save for your own retirement. On one hand, you'd like to help your children as much as possible; as a parent, you don't want your children saddled with enormous debts when they leave college. But on the other hand, that type of reluctance may be based more on emotion than on a sound financial strategy. After all, college graduates seem to find a way to eventually pay off their loans. Furthermore, your children may be able to find grants, scholarships and work-study opportunities. Many students can earn a decent amount of money at summer jobs, too.

Nonetheless, you still may feel obligated to pay something toward your children's college education. But if you're going to help pay for college, be smart about it. For example, think twice before borrowing from your 401(k). Such a move will slow the growth potential of your retirement funds and it could prove costly in other ways, too. For one thing, if you leave your job, voluntarily or involuntarily, you'll need to repay your 401(k) loan completely, usually

within 60 days. If you can't, the balance will be considered a taxable distribution - and you may even have to pay a 10 percent penalty on it.

Instead of tapping into your 401(k), IRA or other accounts you've designated for retirement, look for other ways to help build your children's college funds. You might decide to open a Section 529 plan, which offers tax-free earnings potential, provided the money is used to pay for higher education costs. You can put whatever you can afford into a Section 529 plan, along with gifts from grandparents or other relatives. Contributions are tax-deductible in certain states for residents who participate in their own state's plan. Please note that a 529 College Savings Plan could reduce a beneficiary's ability to qualify for financial aid. You might also want to consider a Coverdell Education Savings Account, which offers another tax-advantaged way to save for college.

As you already know, much of your life involves balancing acts of one type or another, so you should be able to handle one more - college for your kids against a comfortable retirement for you. By making the right moves, though, you may be able to reach an "equilibrium" that works for everyone.

Should I buy life insurance on my child's life?

This is a question that I have heard debated many times over the years. For some, the thought of "profiting" from the death of a child is morally reprehensible. For others, the overwhelming need for financial security overrides any moral trepidation.

Over the years, I have dealt with people at both ends of this spectrum. Today my advice to all is this: "Yes, life insurance should be purchased on your child's life."

The main reason for buying life insurance on anyone's life is to replace income "lost" or pay for expenses caused by the death of the insured person.

If your child dies, there's no lost income, but there will be funeral, burial, medical and related expenses that could run to thousands of dollars, which might cause a financial hardship to the parents of the deceased child.

My most memorable experience with life insurance on a child's life occurred more than 20 years ago.

The parents of a perfectly healthy (by all appearances and verifiable medical history) five-year old girl purchased a \$10,000 policy on the child's life.

They paid the first monthly premium with the application. The policy was issued and ready for delivery two weeks later, but the entire family was nowhere to be found.

One of their neighbors informed us that the family was at the Le Bonheur Children's Medical Center in Memphis, Tennessee, where the child was waiting for a donor for a liver transplant.

Two transplants were attempted. Both transplants failed and the child died. The claim against the policy was honored and the parents received the \$10,000.

Another reason for buying life insurance on a child's life is to guard against the possibility that, when the child is older, he or she might not be able to buy life insurance because of intervening illness or other circumstance.

A children's term rider on a parent's policy can also protect against this possibility.

Still another reason for buying life insurance on a child's life is part of a program to teach the child financial responsibility.

Typically the insurance is whole life or universal life insurance, ownership of which is transferred to the child when he or she turns 21.

Most insurance advisors recommend that families spend their insurance budget to buy life and disability income insurance on the parents first, before considering insurance on children's lives.

Death of a parent, particularly an income-earner, could have financial consequences that are devastating compared to the financial effects from a child's death.

This is good advice, especially when you consider that the child's coverage can take the form of a very inexpensive rider on one of the parents' policies.

Yes, you should buy life insurance on your child's life. Moreover, you should not delay the purchase.

The uncertainty of life's future events dictates immediate action. Accidents and illnesses do not postpone themselves until we are "ready" for them. Life is a hard teacher. It usually gives us the test first and the lesson later.

Tigers beat Mustangs 27-22

The Brackett Tigers picked up their first win of the year Friday night, as they edged the host Natalia Mustangs 27-22 on Homecoming Night in Natalia. It was a helluva game as they say, made compelling by big plays, big penalties, a bizarre offensive series at the end of the first half (one that produced six points for the Mustangs), and (uh) problematic special teams play (more on that later). Brackett had the ball first and marched down to the eight yard line, but there the drive fizzled, and on fourth and goal at the eight Jacob Schroeder was called upon to provide the first points of the game. The kick was partly blocked, but it cleared the up-rights, and the Tigers led 3-0.

The Mustangs, meanwhile, were (how to put this delicately) really, really bad on offense. Their first two drives netted them two sacks, three quarterback keepers for negative yardage, and a pass that was almost picked off by defensive back Sam Stewart. Brackett took over on their own 32 to begin their third possession of the game. The Tigers capped a 12-play, 50-yard drive with another field goal by Schroeder from 35 yards out (it would have been good from 40 or more) and they were up by six with just over eight minutes left in the second quarter.

Again, the Mustang offense sputtered and they had to punt. Travis Bonner took the short kick all the way back to the Natalia 24, and on first and 10 at the 24 Bonner lofted a pass to wideout Moises Gonzalez, who stood all alone in the end zone. He reeled it in for the score, Jacob Schroeder tacked on the extra point, and with 5:48 to go before halftime it was Brackett up by a 13-0 margin.

Natalia had the ball again, and the same bad karma that had accompanied all of their previous possessions, so they had to kick it away once more. The Tigers took possession and moved quickly up to the Mustang 10 yard line, paced by a couple of big runs by Travis Bonner, and so, on 2nd down and seven at the ten yard line he called his own number and took it in for six. The point after failed, but it was 19-0, and the rout was on, (or so we thought).

Natalia got the ball back in the waning minutes of the first half and mounted their first serious drive of the night, with most of the offense provided by quarterback RJ Rodriguez. On a 1st and ten at the 30 he took off on a 20-yard scamper up to midfield. On the next play he connected on a 34-yard hookup to wide receiver John Martinez down to the Brackett 18.

The Mustangs hit pay dirt a couple of plays later, and a controversy ensued, as the Brackett coaching staff argued that the Natalia offense had not set properly before the snap, and that therefore the play shouldn't have counted. The referees disagreed, and the Tigers went to the locker room ahead at halftime by a count of 19-6.

The Tigers scored on their opening drive of the second half. They took over near midfield, but couldn't move the football, so on 4th and 9 they lined up to punt, BUT, Natalia was penalized for roughing the kicker, making it merely a 4th down and 4, no cakewalk, but a lot better than 4th down and nine.

The football, which had been

intended for the punter, never made it that far. Instead, it was plucked from the air by upback (on this occasion) Fermin Villanueva, who raced all the way to the Mustang 30. Travis Bonner took it in from the seven, and the Tigers led 27-6 (the two-point conversion worked).

Afterwards, special teams snafus nearly did the Tigers in. On a 4th and five, punter Guy Rigby attempted to field a bad snap, and got planted back at his own 27-yard line. On the next play, RJ Rodriguez zipped the ball to receiver Joe Rivas at the goal line. Rodriguez took it in himself from the one, and the Brackett lead had been reduced to 13, 27-14, advantage Tigers.

A bit later in the game, the Tigers had a 4th and 8 at their own 43. The punt was blocked, and Natalia went to work at the Brackett 33. Again, the pass combination of Rodriguez to Rivas paid dividends as the quarterback delivered goal-line strike to his favorite receiver. Thankfully the Mustangs coughed up the football on 1st and goal, and tackle Joe Anthony Sanchez alertly recovered.

The Tigers had the ball back at about their own 1-foot line but couldn't earn a new set of downs, and lined up to punt on 4th and 1 at the nine. Travis Bonner went back to do the honors this time, but it wouldn't have mattered if Raiders great Ray Guy (yeah, I know, I'm dating myself) had been the punter, as the ball and the entire Natalia student body arrived in the backfield at about the same time. Bonner shanked it, and the ball went straight up into the air, landing about where it had began its ascent, at around the 9-yard line. RJ Rodriguez hooked up with John Martinez on the very next play, the two point conversion worked, and Brackett, nursing a five-point lead, led 27-22, with about two and a half minutes left in the game.

Brackett recovered the onside kick, but fumbled it away on a 4th and 4 near midfield. Natalia took over, but the Brackett D rose to the occasion. On 1st and 10 Rodriguez was flushed from the pocket, fired an incomplete pass and was leveled by Jacob Schroeder. Same result on 2nd down (an incomplete pass) and on 3rd down Rodriguez was wrapped up in the backfield as time expired, final tally Tigers 27, Mustangs 22.
