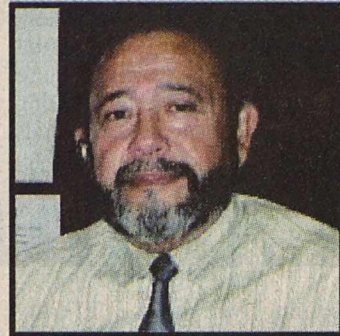

New city secretary hard at work

At the Regular Brackettville City Council meeting on Tuesday, March 11, the new City Secretary/Manager Henry

Garcia presented several suggestions to reallocate budgeted money for much needed improvements in the City.

Garcia suggested the \$12,500, allocated for the fire department be moved into other areas of the operating account including training and travel for employees.

He suggested \$13,550, from the Municipal Court and \$43,500, from the Police Department budget be moved to the Utility Account.

The council also gave Garcia the go ahead to start working on plans for improving the newly abandoned garage, and upstairs meeting room. The garage

which once housed the fire trucks, would be turned into a work room and meeting room for the maintenance department and the upstairs meeting room would be updated for the possibility of holding city council meetings.

City resident Genie Robinson questioned the ownership of the upstairs building and asked if the City had a deed.

According to documents filed at the Kinney County Courthouse, the land, Lot number 12, in Block A, Maverick Addition belongs to the City of Brackettville. At press time, TBN, was not able to further clarify Robinson's question.

Council voted unanimously

to hold a public hearing on rezoning vacant lots next to Julie's Restaurant, in Section (I) from Industrial/Commercial to Residential.

The public hearing will be held on April 15, further information will be available at City Hall.

Garcia was given permission to hire two temporary maintenance personnel, providing the funding is available.

During the City Manager's monthly report, Garcia and Mayor Pro-tem discussed the possibilities of qualifying for certain grants including street paving and equipment for recycling.

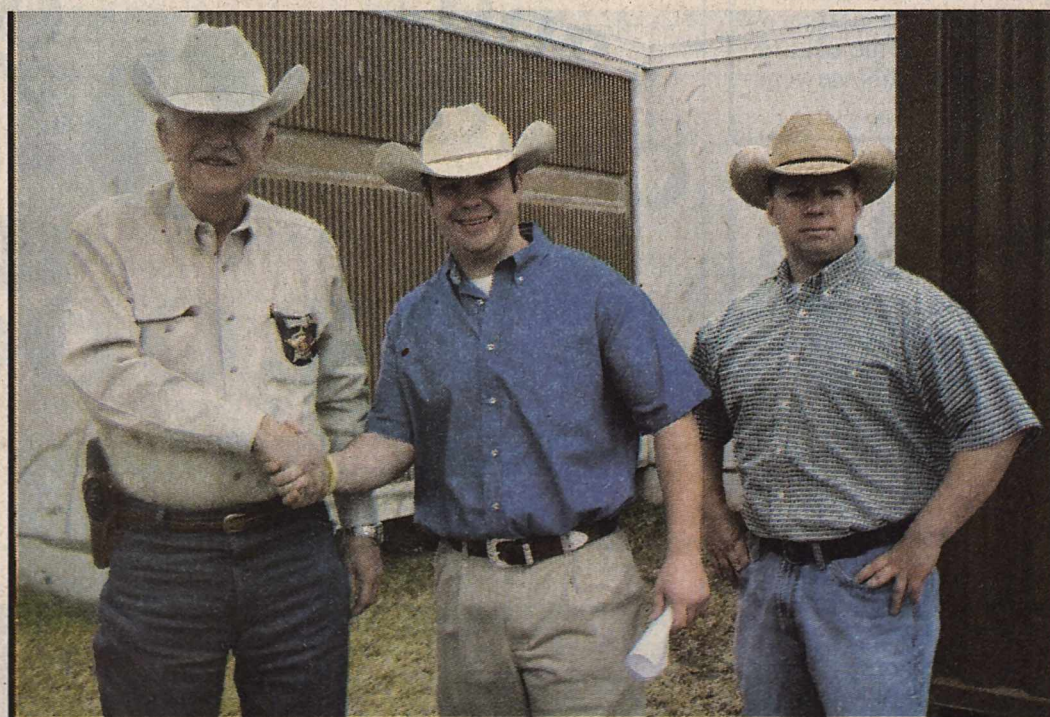
Brackett ISD will hold the first UIL track meet in over 10 years, today, Thursday, March 13, at the newly remodeled track field.

(Almost) Everything You Wanted to Know About Bonds

In the financial world, stocks tend to get most of the attention. But if you're going to make progress toward all your long-term goals, you need to be aware of all types of investments - and bonds can be an important part of your portfolio. Many people, however, don't fully understand how bonds work. So, before you invest in them, familiarize yourself with the "bond basics." Here are a few of them:

Bonds are "debt" instruments. When you buy shares of stock, you're actually becoming an owner - although one of a great many - of a company. But when

you purchase bonds, you are, in effect, loaning money to whom ever issues the bond - a business or the government. If you hold the bond until it matures, you'll get your principal, or "par value," back (provided the issuer doesn't default) and, along the way, you'll receive regular interest payments. A bond's interest rate is known as the "coupon."

Bond prices will fluctuate. Your bond's interest rate will not change over the life of the bond. However, the price of your bond can fluctuate, an important factor to keep in mind if you plan on selling your bond before it matures. A bond's price will move in response to several variables, chief among which is interest rates. Bond investments are subject to interest rate risk such that when interest rates rise, the prices of bonds can decrease and the investor can lose principal value. For example, suppose you own a \$1,000 bond that pays a 4 per-

cent interest rate. If new bonds are issued at 5 percent, no one will pay you the full \$1,000 for your 4 percent bond, so, if you wish to sell, you will have to offer it at a discount. Conversely, if market rates fall to 3 percent, your 4 percent bond will become highly desirable, so you could sell it for more than the \$1,000 par value.

Different bonds have different "ratings." If you buy a corporate bond, you'll have a choice between investment grade bonds - those receiving the higher "grades" issued by rating agencies, such as Moody's or Standard & Poors - and "junk" bonds - those getting the lowest grades. The higher-quality bonds carry less risk of default but pay a lower interest rate than the "junk" bonds, which must offer the higher rates to attract investors who may be worried about default risk. Generally speaking, you're probably better off by sticking with "investment grade" bonds

and staying away from the "junk."

Some bonds can be "called." A callable bond is a bond that can be redeemed - or "called" - by the issuer before its maturity. If interest rates have declined since the bond was originally issued, companies will call bonds and reissue them at the lower, prevailing interest rate, thereby saving money on interest payments. As an investor, this could be cause for concern, because if your bond is called, and you wanted to reinvest the proceeds in a new bond, you'd likely have to accept a lower coupon rate. Consequently, you may want to look for a bond that offers "call protection" - a promise that a bond can't be called before a certain time.

To determine if bonds are appropriate for your individual situation - and, if so, what type of bonds - see your financial advisor. By adding bonds to your portfolio, you may well give yourself a broader platform for success.

Big words naming a muscle that is frequently overlooked as a cause of lower back pain. Of all the low back muscles, the QL (easier to say!) is the only one under active tension during walking, sitting and lying down.

Being in a slumped position, such as driving a car, sitting at a desk or reading a book places particular stress where this muscle attaches to the bone. The QL not only helps in breathing, but with lumbar spine movement and stability.

Acute strain of the QL may result from a quick bending and twisting, stooping, turning over in bed, rising from a chair, coughing or sneezing and when climbing stairs may be caused by this muscle.

Pain at rest, especially at night, may be severe, and in the

morning there may be difficulty getting out of bed, sometime even causing one to have to crawl on hands and knees to reach the bathroom. Oftentimes there is pain on taking a deep breath.

Pain around the waist to the groin area, pain in the buttocks and sacroiliac joint, the hip and even the side of the leg may be felt.

Some associate this pain with sciatica, a nerve entrapment problem. In fact, all of this may be attributed to problems in the muscle tissues called trigger

points, caused in part by stress to the muscles due to unbalanced body biomechanics.

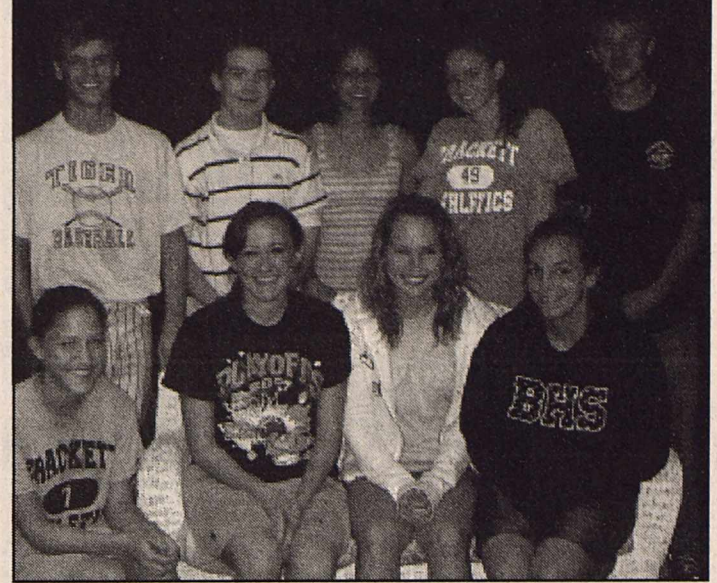
One Act Play presents Frame 312

Frame 312 is that infamous moment in the Zapruder film - the 22 second clip of President Kennedy's assassination that was captured by a bystander, Abraham Zapruder, which points to more than one shot being fired at the President but a released doctored version of the frames shows only one gun shot and one assassin, Oswald. Lynette, based on an actual person, is a suburban housewife with a terrible secret. 30 years prior she was a secretary at Life Magazine in New York City. She was entrusted with the original 30 mm Zapruder film of the Kennedy assassination and would be only one of three people to know the truth about that dreadful day in 1963.

Interspersed throughout the play are flashbacks to 1963 that dramatize how Lynette came to have her troubling knowledge. 30 years later, she greets her children for her 50 something birthday in her backyard. Kinney County Historical Commission Acquires Fort Clark Movietone Newsreels

The County Historical Commission announces the acquisition of a screening DVD from the Newsfilm Library of the University of South Carolina which contains 18 minutes of newsreel footage filmed at Fort Clark in 1926, 1934, and 1943 by 20th Century Fox for the studio's signature "Movietone News" series.

The Fox Movietone Newsreel Outtake & Unused Stories Col-

lection was donated by Fox to the University of South Carolina, and consists of 11 million feet of 35mm camera original news and slice of life footage shot between 1919 to 1934 and 1942 to 1944. The outtakes are much richer in content and longer in running time than the severely abridged fragments used in actual released newsreels. A released newsreel would include approximately 6 to 8 different stories to make up the normal running time of 7 minutes shown in theaters.

The Fort Clark newsreels and outtakes feature the 5th Cavalry in 1926 and again in 1934 including charges across Las Moras creek, monkey drill, jumps through a burning hoop, and mule trains passing in review at the airfield. The 1943 newsreel of the 2nd Cavalry Division highlights the last of the Buffalo Soldiers on parade and in action with both horses and tanks.

To at last see "moving pictures" of Fort Clark is a truly remarkable experience according to Bill Haenn, chairman of

the CHC. "These films were probably shown only once and then went back in the can, not to be seen again until now, some 65 to 80 years later."

The County Historical Commission intends to share these extraordinary images from Fort Clark's past with a "premiere" showing at the Fort Clark Post Theater in early April. Be sure to watch for the official announcement so you don't miss this unique piece of local history. You have never seen anything like this before!

Finally, he was a resilient man who led a long full life. He was so resilient, I would not have been surprised if he had licked the cancer, and taken another cruise! The world was a better place with him in it. I will miss him. Good bye, my friend.
