

Students took the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) reading test on March 5 and passed with flying

Third and Eighth grades were 100 percent passing and fifth grade was 87 percent passing.

13 children in third grade had a commended performance and 11 children in fifth grade also had a commended performance.

According to the Texas Education Agency (TEA) website, a Commended Performance means the student performed at a level that was considerably above the state passing standard and showed a thorough understanding of the knowledge and stills tested.



Don't listen to your priest about having sex outside of marriage, don't listen to your parents when they NO sex whatsoever, don't listen to the sex ed teacher when they say that taking the pill prevents pregnancy and using condoms prevents pregnancy (and some of the diseases you teenagers are passing around to each other like Skittles). Do you think a boy's attention will fill the gap your absent FATHER left behind? Do you enjoy the sex so much that you'd put your future success in life in the trash to be with a guy that has no desire to raise a kid with you. Did you really think that "hoping" you wouldn't get pregnant would be enough to prevent you from having a baby? Or did you just want to have a baby? How do you plan on paying for this baby? Do you have a job and health insurance? Or did you have to sign up for WIC and Medicaid? Where will you live? Will you live with your parents or get a government apartment? Are you going to finish high school? Is a college degree out of the question? Who will watch your child so you can work? Your mother or grandmother? What skills do you have? Can you type? Can you operate a computer? Can you flip a burger? What will you do? Will you have to depend on the government "benefits" to get by? Think I am 16... What will become of me and this child when I am 26, 36 and 46? Will this child live to age 18 on welfare? Do not think that just because politicians are telling you welfare is good that the rest of the world is not looking down on you, believe me, even your friends and family are talking about how you can't get it together and get off the system. Having UN-PROTECTED sex outside of marriage is stupid at any age.

Parents: just because you had your child baptized in church statement "that if the court didn't ten or documented. and you've told them not to have sex and they're telling you they're not having sex doesn't mean they are not having sex. Our child, at an established price. To fund the sale of the business, you take out an insurance policy on your life, with your child as a beneficiary. You could choose term insurance, which will be fairly inexpensive, but you also might want to consider "whole life," which has higher premiums but offers the potential to

build increasing cash value. Family limited partnerships You could also transfer ownership of your business through a family limited partnership. Here's how it works: Well before you retire, you decide to transfer interests in your business to a family limited partnership, creating general partnership shares and limited partnership shares. You hold on to the general partnership shares and give the limited shares to your

At this point, you are still responsible for managing the company. And, at the same time, you are reducing your family's estate tax liability because you are removing assets (the limited partnership shares) from your estate. Furthermore, for gift tax purposes, you'll get a "discount" on the value of the limited partnership shares because, as "noncontrolling" interests, they are theoretically worth less to the recipients.

When you die, only the value of your ownership interest will be included in your taxable estate. And your child can then take formal responsibility for running the business.

Get professional help Both a buy-sell agreement and a family limited partnership are considerably more complex than described here, so you will need to work with an estateplanning attorney before you launch either of these arrangements. Your attorney can also advise you on other businesssuccession alternatives. Start your preparations soon. Even if you are many years from retirement, it's nice to know you - and your family - will be ready.
