## Laws; Coe elected for School Board Schuster voted Board President

The Brackett ISD (BISD) School Board of Trustees met Tuesday, May 13 to canvass the results of the May 10 Election. Citizens running were Steve Stafford, Dr. Greg Stone, Brad Coe, Louis (Hershey) Gerardo and Dan Laws.

Coe was elected to one of the

two open positions with 206 votes and Laws was elected to the other open position with 155 votes. Vacating these positions were Board President Henry Lutz and Ronnie Hobbs. Both trustees served nine years on the Board.

Lutz thanked the parents, teachers and the community for electing him into his nine years of service.

Stone received 121 votes, Stafford received 111 and Gerardo received 101 votes.

179 people participated in early voting, 210 participated in Election Day voting and 3 people mailed in their ballots.

John Paul Schuster was voted in as the new Board President 5-2. Sondra Meil was voted in as Board Vice President and Dan Laws was voted in as Board

Secretary.

After a lengthy discussion on school flex days, the board voted to approve flex days with the guidelines set forth by the State. These guidelines stated "at risk" students will not be eligible. Flex days will be five days at the end of the first semester and five days at the end of the second semester.

Superintendent Paula Renken gave an update on the current construction projects around campus. The covered play area should start taking going up sometime next week, the elementary office expansion will be completed in approximately three weeks and the concession stand at the football field was taking shape. Paving should also be started around June 1.

In closed session the Board accepted a letter of resignation from teacher Laurel Plunk and a letter of retirement resignation from Pam Melancon. Catherine Kepler was hired as an elementary teacher and Jason Archer was hired as the Band Director.

The next regular Board meeting will be held on June 9.

## Feagley defeats Esparza in race for Mayor

Brackettville resident Charles Feagley defeated Incumbent Eduardo Esparza in the race for City Mayor by 26 votes.

Incumbent Matt Bland was defeated by Stephanie B'Ann Gomez Buitron with 118 votes to 163 for Place 2.

Incumbent Francisca Chica Garza Hernandez kept Place 4 beating out Anita Ertle, 158 to 121 votes.

Place 5, being vacated by Lydia Tipps was filled by Demetrius Williams with 207 votes over Sylvia Torres with 65 votes.

The Council approved the results of the election at a Regular Meeting Tuesday, May 13.

Candidates-elect are scheduled to take the oath of office at a Special Called meeting on Friday at 6pm in the City Annex.

**Farms, Ranches Seeking Recognition For More Than 100 Years Of Ag Production Encouraged To Apply Now**  
AUSTIN - Commissioner Todd Staples is encouraging families who wish to apply for the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program to get started on their applications now. The Family Land Heritage Program recognizes farms and ranches that have been in continuous agricultural production by the same family for at least 100 years or more. "Since its inception in 1974, the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program has honored more than 4,300 Texas farms and ranches in 233 counties," Commissioner Staples said. "This is proof Texas has a rich history of agriculture." Applications, which are due Sept. 15, will be accepted for farms or ranches established in 1908 or earlier that are still owned and operated by the descendants of the founder, either through blood, marriage or adoption. The land must also fit the old U.S. Census definition of a farm: 10 acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year; or if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year. The owners must reside in Texas and actively manage the everyday operation of the farm or ranch. If all the land has ever been rented or leased to someone outside of the family, it will not qualify. If only a portion was leased, and as much as 10 acres were retained in the family for agricultural production with sales of at least \$50 annually, the property will still qualify. I am responding to the letter to the editor from Megan Reinhold, our Brackettville girl stationed in Iraq with the US Army.

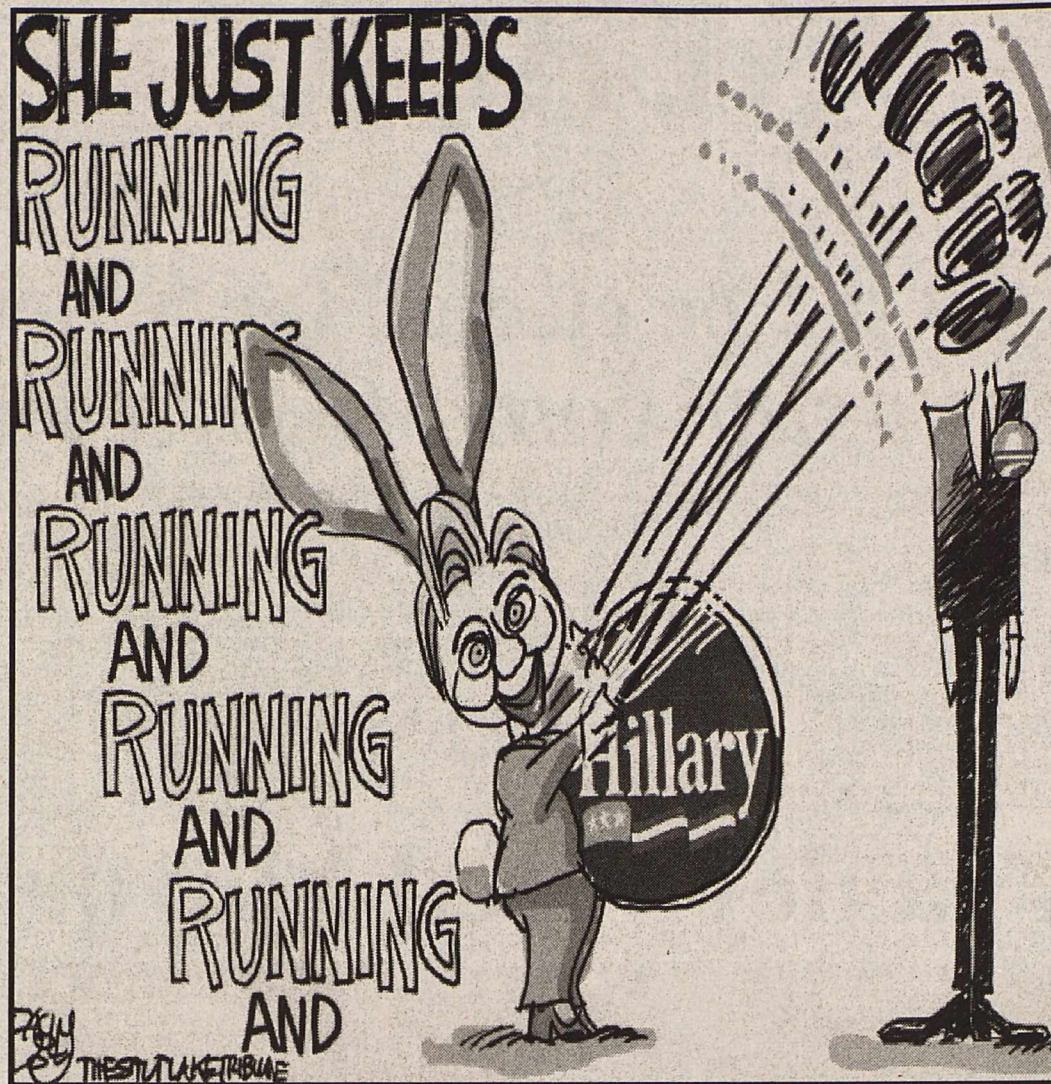
I am a member of the Frontier Baptist Church and we decided to respond to her request to send school supplies for the Iraqi children. Our congregation elected to expand this mission project county wide.

### Financial Strategies for Small-business Owners

If you're a small-business owner, you put your heart, soul - and most of your time - into your business. Unfortunately, sheer hard work doesn't always translate into financial security - so you'll need to take some additional steps.

Here are a few to consider:

**Protect your business against the loss of a key employee.** If you have an employee with valuable management or sales skills, and this person were to die unexpectedly, your business could suffer. That's why you may want to write a "key-person" life insurance plan on this employee. In its simplest form, key-person coverage pays cash to your company, which is usually the policy beneficiary, when the designated employee dies or becomes disabled. Key-person insurance also can be structured to fund deferred-compensation arrangements or buyout agreements between partners.

**Avoid "raiding" business coffers to pay for personal expenses.** Try to keep six to 12 months' worth of living expenses in a liquid account. Once you have established this "emergency fund," you'll be less likely to tap into your business' income or assets to pay for unexpected personal expenses, such as a new appliance, a costly car repair or a large medical bill.

**Create a retirement plan for yourself.** As a business owner, you're responsible for establishing your own retirement account. Fortunately, you have some attractive choices, including the following:

- SEP-IRA - You can contribute up to 25 percent of your compensation - as much as \$46,000 - to a SEP-IRA. Your contributions are tax deductible and your earnings have the potential to grow tax-deferred until withdrawn. This plan offers you significant flexibility in making contributions for yourself and your employees. Plus, as an employer, you can generally deduct, as business expenses, any contributions you make on behalf of your plan participants.

- SIMPLE IRA - You can put in up to \$10,500 - or \$13,000 if you're 50 or older - to a SIMPLE IRA. As is the case with the SEP-IRA, your earnings have the potential to grow tax deferred. You can match your employees' contributions dollar for dollar, up to three percent of compensation, but no more than \$10,500 (or \$13,000 for employees 50 and over). Alternatively, you could contribute two percent of each eligible employee's compensation each year, up to a maximum of \$4,600, regardless of whether the employee contributes or not. Contributions to your employees are tax deductible.

- "Owner-only" 401(k) plan - If you have no employees other than your spouse, you can establish an "owner-only" 401(k) plan. Between salary deferral and profit sharing, you can contribute up to \$46,000, in pre-tax dollars, to your owner-only 401(k), or \$51,000 if you're 50 or older. Like a SEP-IRA and SIMPLE IRA, a 401(k) provides the potential to accumulate tax-deferred earnings. But if you open a Roth 401(k) your earnings have the potential to grow tax free, provided you've had your account at least five years and you don't start taking withdrawals until you're at least 59-1/2. (However, you make Roth 401(k) contributions with after-tax dollars.)

Your tax or financial advisor can help you decide which retirement plan is right for your business.

But don't wait too long to choose one, or to make the other moves necessary to help you make progress toward your financial goals. When you own a business, time flies - so make the right moves today.

## Swinson takes silver at State

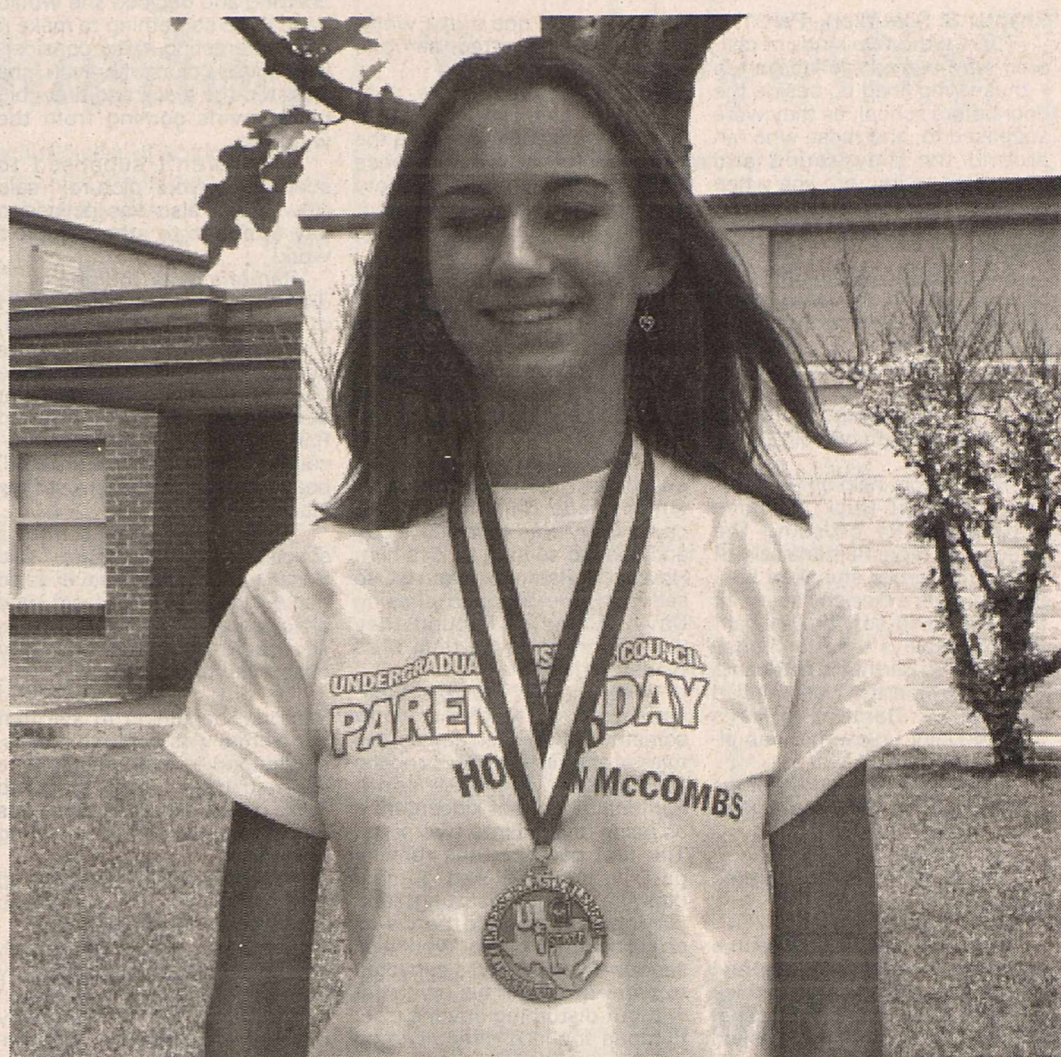

Ramona loved her teacher even more. "Well," she began, "that black isn't scribbling. It's smoke coming out of the windows."

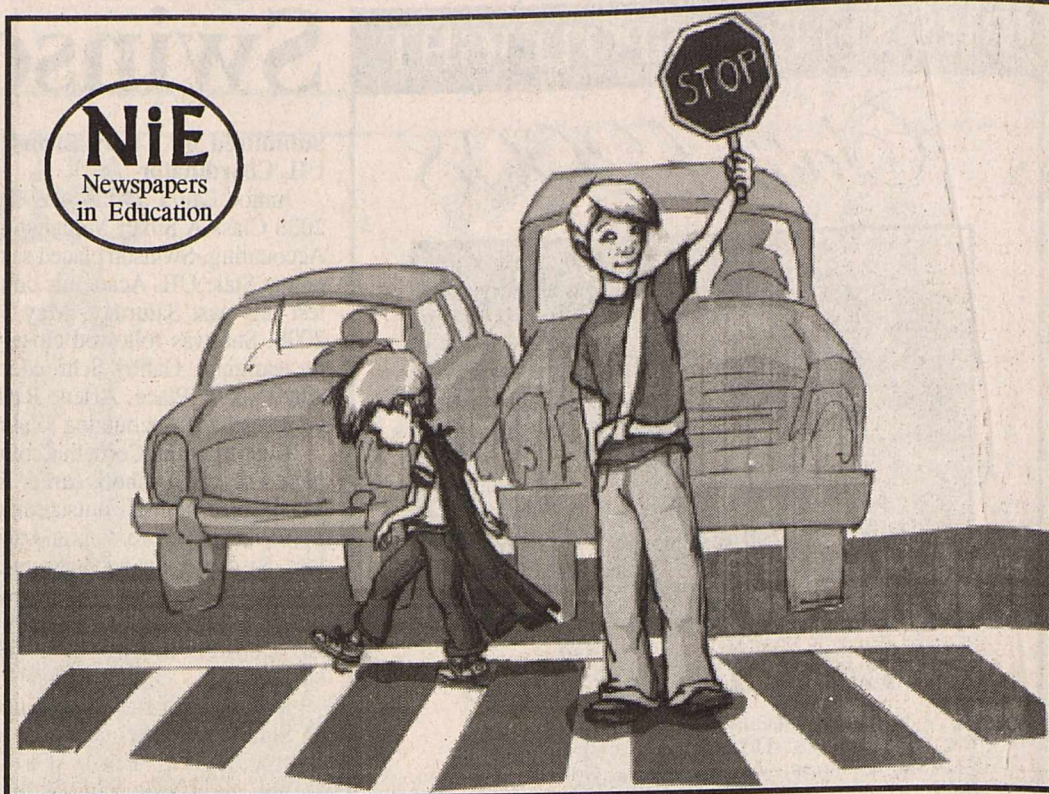
"And why is smoke coming out of the windows?" gently pressed Miss Binney.

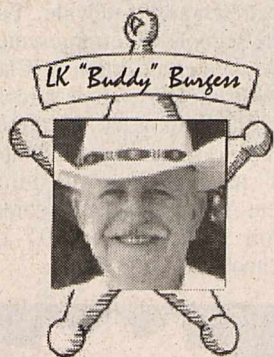

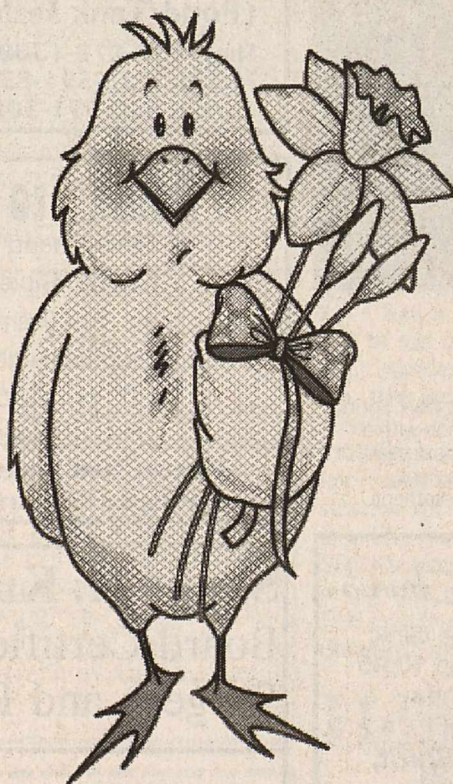

The Spring 2008 ceremonies

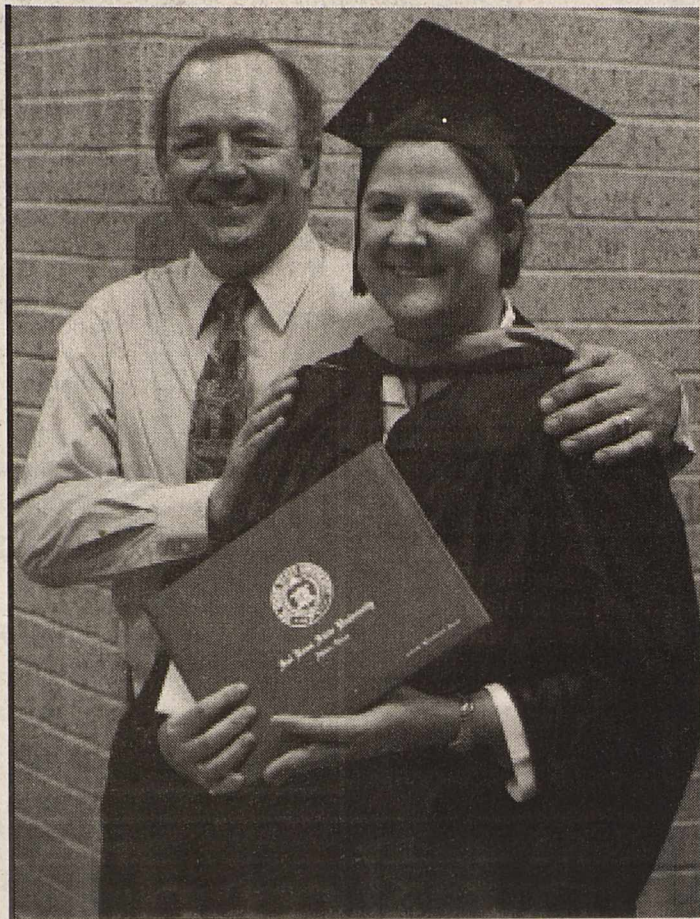
conferred 19 masters of education degrees and one master of business administration; 43 bachelors of arts, eight bachelors of business administration, and seven bachelors of science degrees.

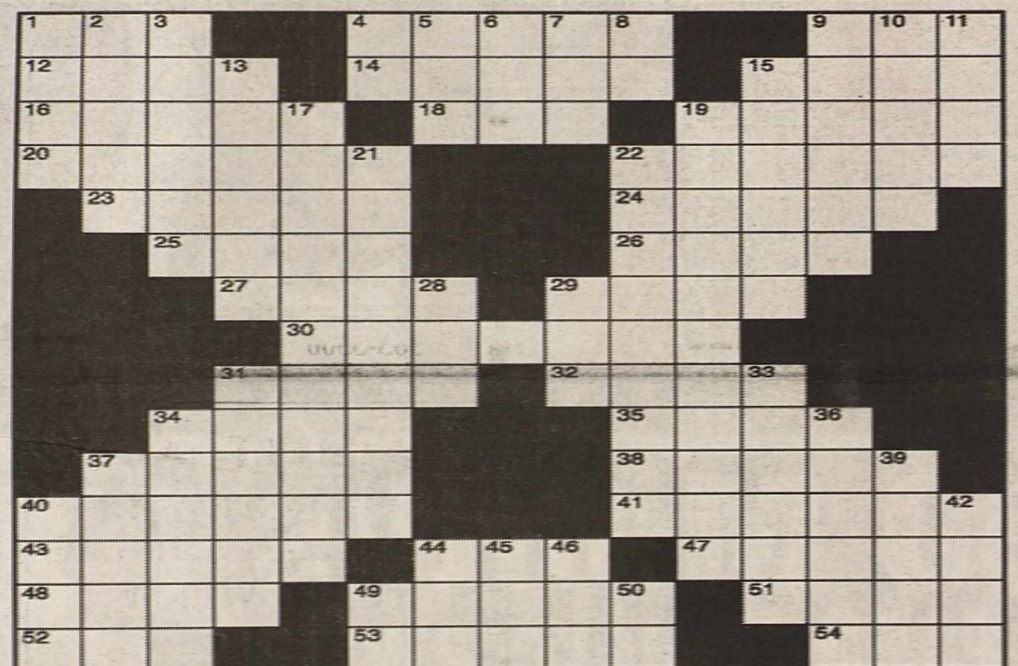

## Are you interested in being a paraprofessional at BISD?

To be considered for a paraprofessional (instructional aide) position with BISD, you must meet the requirements of the federally mandated No Child Left Behind. To be hired, applicants must meet one of the three standards:

- Have at least 48 hours of college; or
- Obtained at least an associate's degree; or
- Met a rigorous standard of quality and be able to demonstrate, through a formal state assessment, knowledge of and the ability to assist in instructing reading, writing and mathematics.

Regional Educational Service Center 20 in San Antonio has developed a five day workshop offered to meet NCLB requirements (# 3 above). BISD will offer transportation to the workshop for any interested applicants. The \$175 fee and meals will be the responsibility of the applicant. Upon successful completion of the course, the attendee will receive a NCLB certificate that is filed with the Texas Education Agency and is accepted by the district to meet the Highly Qualified requirements. *Obtaining this certificate does not guarantee employment with BISD, but it does allow the applicant to be considered for employment.* This certificate is generally accepted by all districts in Texas. The workshop is scheduled for June 16, 2008 - June 20, 2008 from 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. daily in San Antonio. Participants must be in attendance all five days in order to take the assessment. 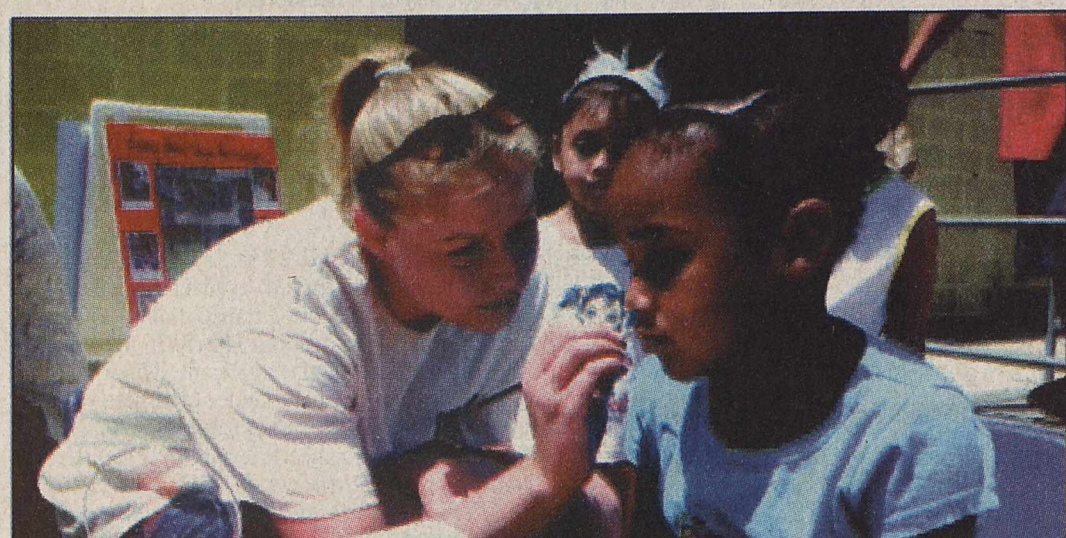

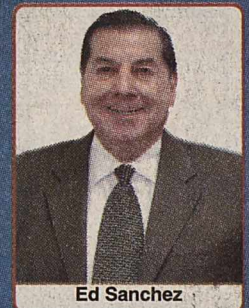
