as well as at parades here. Roping Club members are to be commended for their most recent boost for their com-





The historical sketch of the Bovina Post Office shows that it was established January 31, 1899. It was first located in a half-dugout near the XIT Ranch headquarters, which were north of the present Highway 60. Later, the post office was moved into the ranch headquarters. The first Main Street location was in a mercantile store owned by Frank Hastings and his partner. The post office remained there until the building was destroyed by fire. After the fire, it was moved to the Roy B. Ezell home a block south of Main on Third Street, Fire again moved the location to the south side of Main Street hear the present site of City Drug. Shortly thereafter, it was moved to the north side of Main Street and remained there for more than 40 years before moving to the present new location.

Former postmasters here and their dates of appointment include William L. Guy, January 31, 1899; George W. Winkler, March 9, 1899; John R. Armstrong, July 22, 1899; Ada W. Fields, December 16, 1908; Alba E. Poole, May 20, 1910; Eula Mc-Donald, September 7, 1912; Harriet P. Dean, May 22, 1916; Eula McDonald, January 26, 1918; Lola L. Rumfield, May 23, 1919; Madge B. Martin, May 12, 1920; Sam N. Martin, July 6, 1921; Roy B. Ezell, February 10, 1922; Della Ezell, March 10, 1922; Jeptha G. Flato, January 8, 1932; Johnny L. Stagner, September 19, 1933; Edmund T. Caldwell, April 19, 1935; Mrs. Alice B. Moore, October 1, 1945 and Marvin E. Ezell, June 1, 1947.

During the last two Congresses, your National government has taken great steps in improving education in the United States. Through these programs, we in Texas have been one of the main states whose educational opportunities have been improved by these numerous federal programs. That is because Texas was one of the main states that had been lagging behind Four district records were broken -- two of them by Bovina in education and with this federal aid we have been moving

But, now, many of these educational programs are bring any such crippling cuts of our educational programs at the very time when education is the most important factor in the pro-

The Bureau of the Budget has recommended across the board cuts in almost every educational program, and if these cuts were carried out, they would badly cripple our educational programs and our educational progress.

The Bureau of the Budget has recommended that the National Perkins were the champions of the fifth and sixth graders. Defense Education Act loans for college students, under which more than 800,000 students have received a college education in this country (over 40,000 of them in Texas), be cut from Wendol Christian, Bovina farmer, was awarded an honorary \$180 million to only \$30 million a year. I strongly protested such a move on the floor of the Senate earlier this month, because the private financing of student loan funds simply cannot take the place of the great NDEA loans.

The Bureau of the Budger has also recommended a cut of almost \$12 million in the land-grant college program. That would mean a loss of \$106,924 for Prairie View A&M and a Bovina firemen will give away a boat and trailer at the loss of \$320,774 for Texas A&M University. This would completely end this program for the support of land-grant colleges which was authorized by Congress in 1890. Through seventy-'ive years this has been a good program and I have opposed


The Impacted Areas law under which schools are given money when federal installations increased the enrollment would be cut by more than half by the Bureau of the Budget. This means that Texas, which has many military installations and federal installations, would lose monies in the impacted school districts. The total grants would be reduced from \$33 1/3 million to \$8 1/2 million, with the Texas school children the losers with no other place to get the needed money.

Under the Bureau of the Budget recommendations, the school lunch programs would be cut by \$19 million and the milk program for children in school would be cut from \$103 million down to only \$21 million. This is a reduction of \$82 million recommended by the Bureau of the Budget, Texas alone would be cut from \$3,818,000 to \$789,000 by this reduction in their milk for school children programs.

I am fighting these cuts that will so badly cripple our fine educational programs. I have co-sponsored a bill to maintain the present supply for the children's school milk program and I will fight any attempt to destroy the effectiveness of these programs by these drastic cuts by the bureaucrats. The elected Congress has set up these good educational programs but the bureaucrats wno don't get elected and don't go see the people are trying to cut them out.

These Federal programs of the past few years have been tremendous steps forward in the development of this great Nation, and we in the Congress must not let the Bureau of the Budget cripple them now.

I will fight these destructive efforts and I will support legislation to maintain our aid to land-grant colleges, our impacted areas, our school lunch and our school milk programs, and our student loan programs under the National Defense Educa-



On The Farm In Parmer County

With the warm daytime temp- overall quality. eratures lately, some farmers

slowly and the seedling will grow slow. Low quality seed require higher germination temperatures and root development is weak. Low quality seed are susceptible to attack by 15 soil-borne fungi and bacteria while non-deteriorated seed are susceptible to only 2 or 3 microorganisms.

Only about 20 pounds of high quality seed will be needed to plant per acre when an in-furrow fungicide is used. 3 or 4 cotton plants per foot of row should give maximum yields of high quality cotton. When seedling disease has been a problem, an in-furrow fungicide is recommended.

Farmers should not plant before soil temperatures are 60 degrees for several days at 4 to 6 inches of depth.

BAG WORM CONTROL

Bagworms are destructive pests on many evergreen and decidious shrubs and trees and sometimes on neglected fruit trees. April is the time to con-

All of the bags should be removed from the infested plants and destroyed. Then begin applying control measures when temperatures remain above 60 degrees for at least six to ten hours during the day. The pesticide applications should be continued at 7 to 10day intervals until the infestation is eliminated.

Selvin, chlordane, malathion, lead arsenate or toxaphene will effectively control the bag worm. Directions for mixing and applying the materials are contained on the labels of the containers and should be carefully followed.

The bagworm moth deposits 500 to 1,000 eggs in a brown, tapered bag attached to a branch of the plant in September. The eggs hatch in late March or April and the small worms, an eighth to a quarter-inch long, immediately begin to feed on the plant's foliage and bark.

The young worms or caterpillars construct a small, tapered bag of silk-like material and attach to it pieces of bark and foliage. The bag turns to a brown color.

A bagworm protrudes its head





Permanent Pastures Solve Soil Erosion

the ground wet, not moist, until

some seven miles northeast of Farwell in the Oklahoma Lane Community has gone far in solving many of the soil erosion problems which confront area farmers.

During the past few years, Garner has taken advantage of the government diversification program to convert some 105 acres of his farm to grassland, which is permissable under the program. He has high hopes of converting the entire farm to grass in the future and raising purebred Charolais cattle.

On the Garner farm are several kinds of grass, including a native grass pasture (12 acres), a dryland love grass pasture (26 acres), and irrigated pastures of Bermuda, Western wheatgrass, green springletop, sideoats Grama and Swi-

All waterways on the farm are seeded to Bermuda, with tailwater traveling through the waterways to ponds and tanks for watering the cattle. Cattle on the farm are rotated from





The female is a wingless moth and stays inside the bag until the eggs are laid. Then she leaves the bag and dies.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in the death of the plant or the heavily infested

Grass should be watered often after they appear or until well established. During the first year, while the grass is getting established, it should be sprayed at least four times for weed control. After the

grass has become well established it will need little spraying for weed control, as the grass can pretty well take care of itself once it is in good condition. Grasses should be planted on

marginal, sloping land (more than 1% slope) in shallow soil. Once the grass has been established it should be fertilized approximately three times each year, with 60 lbs. phosphate, 120 lbs. of nitrogen (put on in three applications) and 5 to 10 lb. potash. Garner says "I fertilize the grass when I get around to it or when I'm not busy in the other crops."

Garner keeps his pastures in good condition by rotating the cattle from pasture as the need arises. "Never over-graze," he emphasized, "and always keep cattle off the grass after it has been watered until it has had sufficient time to become dry enough so that the grass will not be damaged by the cattle."

Favorite grass for Garner is the Springletop, which he says is the fastest growing, most palatable and makes the finest hay. Garner says he will not harvest any of the grass this year as 60% of the grass is on layout land, However, two years ago when he did harvest and sell some of the grass seeds they were selling for a top price of a little over \$1.00 per lb.

Garner expresses himself as "well pleased" with the operation which has solved so much of the soil erosion problem, both from the elements and from tailwater. He issued an invitation to all or any who are interested in seeing the operation to drop by for a visit. "One of the things I especially like most about the operation is the fact that it takes far less work than does regular farming," stated Garner, who is assisted in the operation by his two sons (cattle herders) and his wife. He first began the conversion to pastures on his own but in recent years the Parmer County Soil Conservation Service has been of much assist-



for steam iron when only distilled water is recommended? If you have been doing this for a very long time you no doubt have deposits of calcium and other minerals which leads to sputtering irons and drops of water splattering on clothes. To correct the problem, follow these simple directions:

Dissolve 1 tablespoon of a non - precipitating packaged water softener in 1 cup of distilled or demineralized water. Fill the iron with this solution and let it steam for 5 to 10 minutes, shaking it constantly during this time. Empty this water and fill

the iron with a mixture of two tablespoons distilled white vinegar to 1 cup distilled water. Let steam again for 5 to 10 minutes, again shaking constantly. 
