# Black bear found dead

Kinney County Sheriff's Deputy Ramon Gutierrez found a dead black bear on the side of Highway 90 early Monday morning.

At around 7:25 a.m. on October 27, Gutierrez, patrolling the area of Kinney County where FM Road 3008 intersects with Highway 90, spotted what he believed to be a large black trash bag, however; as Gutierrez slowed his vehicle to get a closer look, he realized the bag was actually a black bear.

Gutierrez quickly determined the bear was deceased and called in Texas Parks & Wildlife Division (TPWD) Game Warden Rob Frets.

Frets believes the bear was accidentally hit by a motor vehicle and died at the scene located approximately 12 miles west of Brackettville.

The bear did not have any apparent external wounds, other than a small gash on his front right paw, but was bleeding from his mouth leading officials to suspect he died of massive internal injuries.

Frets took the bear to Mike O'Neal's Creative Taxidermy in Sabinal where a TPWD biologist later collected some data, including a DNA swab sample and some body feature measurements.

The only preliminary results released was the bear's weight of 147 pounds.

TPWD Region V, District II Game Warden Captain Gus Sorola said the information collected will be archived for use in studies related to the bear's existence in the state.

Sorola added once tests on the bear have been completed, the body will be mounted and used in the Operation Game Thief Educational Trailer.

The trailer is used as a tool used by TPWD to make the public aware of issues related to the management and preservation of wild animals in Texas.

The bear's death confirms recent sighting reports in Kinney County.

Kinney County Deputy and retired Animal Damage Control Agent Manuel Pena Sr. stated he had taken three separate reports of a bear sighting on Standard Lane in September.

The last reported sighting prior to this year was actually photographed by a visiting

hunter in December, 2006.

A San Antonio police officer was driving on FM Road 3008 when he thought he saw a wild boar running along a fence line, but when he realized it was a bear, he grabbed his camera and started excitedly snapping photos.

In 2006, Game Warden Henry Lutz explained the bears, once native to the area, were more commonly seen in Mexico. Over time and a change in conditions the bear's habitat has been pushed from the border up

into the mountainous areas just across the Rio Grande River.

Details on the bear's re-surgency into Kinney County were not confirmed at press time.

Kinney County Sheriff LK Buddy Burgess warns the black

bears are a protected species and hunters and ranchers are again cautioned not to shoot them.

# Mom arrested for smuggling

A woman claiming she was a Mexican National was arrested Sunday night for allegedly smuggling more than 30 pounds of marijuana into the United States.

Sonia Ibarra was magistrates at the Kinney County Sheriff's

Office (KCSO) on October 26 for possession of marijuana, more than five pounds, but less than 50 pounds.

The woman was traveling slowly in the eastbound emergency lane on Highway 90 when she came to the attention of a

Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper, officials say.

The trooper noticed several children moving about inside the vehicle and subsequently stopped the vehicle to investigate.

The DPS officer conducted an interview and the driver later consented to a search of the vehicle.

The trooper then found approximately 35 pounds of marijuana stashed in the lining of the rear seats.

The suspect and her four children, all under the age of ten, were then transported to the KCSO for processing.

Ibarra was transported to the

GEO correctional facility in Del Rio.

The four children were also taken to Del Rio and released into the custody of a relative.

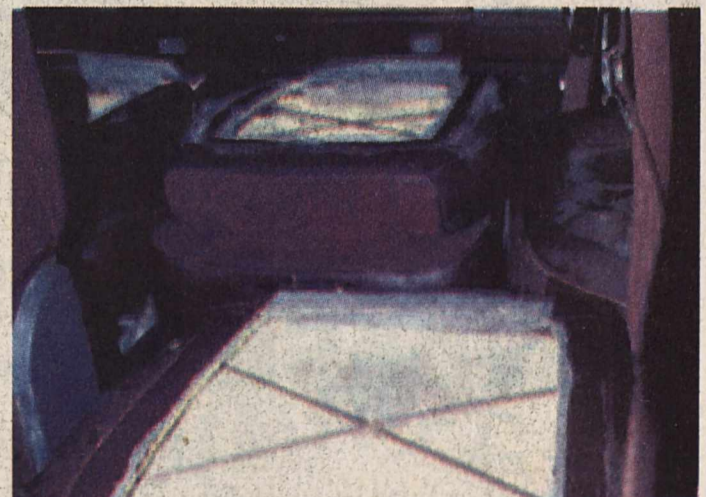
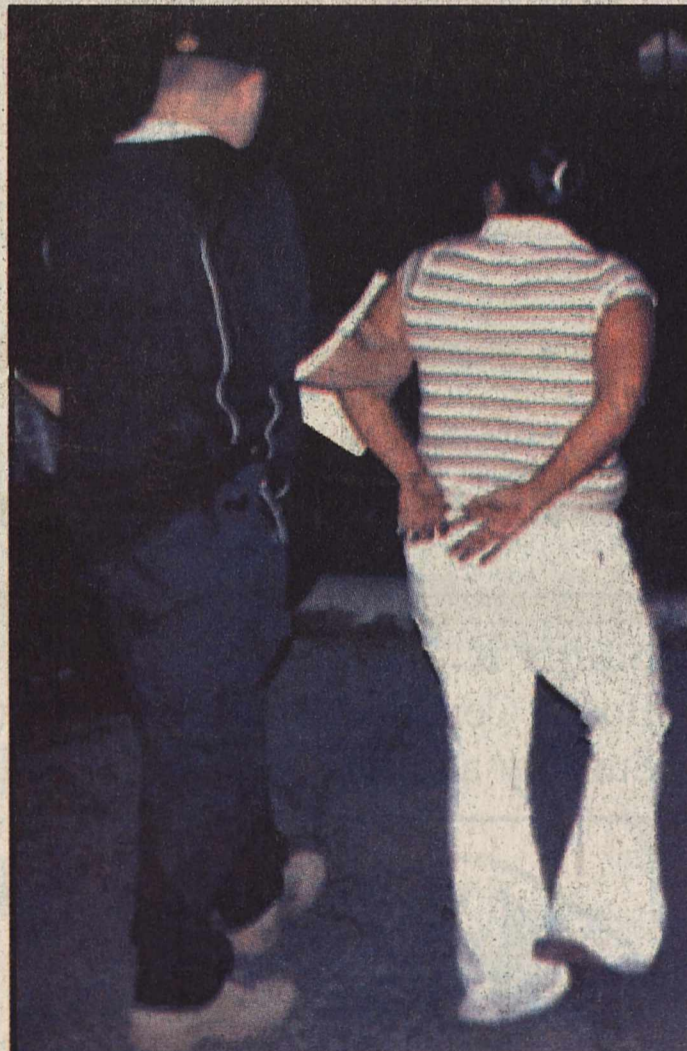
According to reports, Sonia Ibarra told law enforcement officials she was from Acuna, Mexico, but later gave Texas Child Protective Services a Del Rio address.

Questions about whether or not this was Ibarra's first time acting as a drug mule or if she is a participant in larger drug transportation ring remain unanswered as the investigation, aided by the Kinney County Sheriff's Department, is still underway.

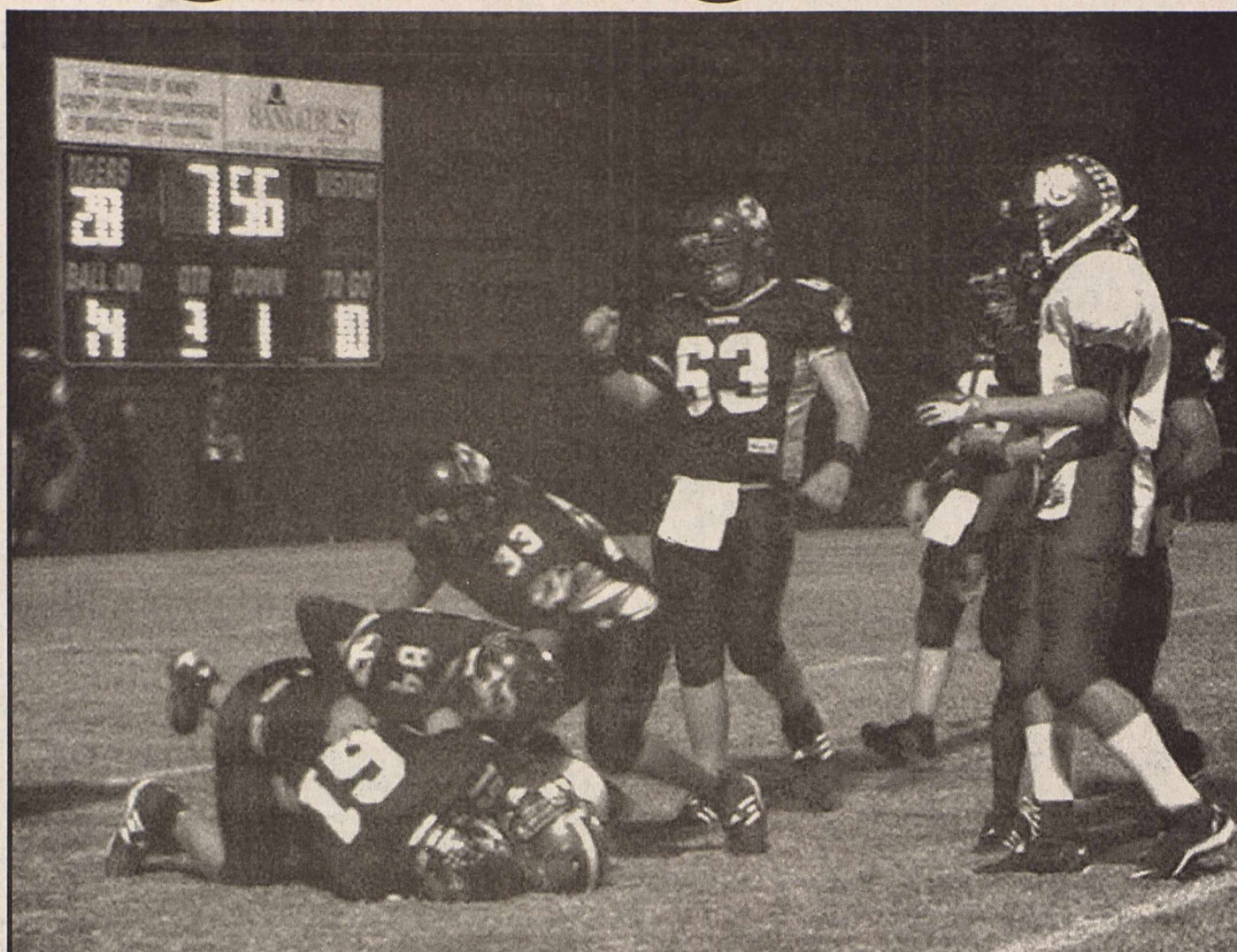

As expected, the Brackett Tigers made short work of Nueces Canyon Friday night, to the tune of 35-0. Not only did the Brackett defense post its second shutout in as many weeks, they also scored a touchdown at the end of the game, when senior Joe Anthony Sanchez stripped the ball from a beleaguered Nueces Canyon ballcarrier and sprinted into the end zone, the icing on the cake if you will.

Senior Jacob Schroeder set the tone for the evening. On first and ten at the Brackett 43 he took the hand off, drifted over

to the left side, and (57 yards later) made his way into the end zone. 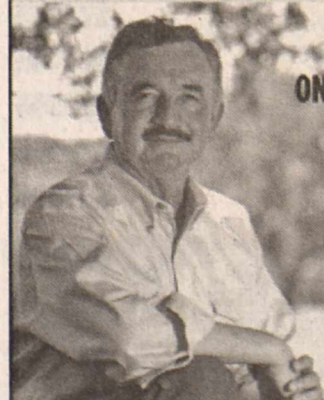

Candied citrus peel

Candied Citrus Peel 3 cups Citrus Peel (cut in strips) (Oranges, Lemons, Grapefruit) 12 cups cold Water 1 1/2 cups Sugar 1/2 cup Honey 1 cup Sugar Wash fruit and score peel into quarters.

Remove sections of peel with fingers; cut into uniform Strips (about 3/8in. wide). Put peel into cold water and boil (uncovered) 10 min. Drain and Rinse. Repeat process with fresh water. Combine 1 1/2 cups sugar, honey and boiling water; bring to a boil and boil one minute. Add Cooked, drained peel and simmer briskly till almost all of syrup has been absorbed (about 30 to 40 min.). Stir often to avoid sticking.

Transfer peel to colander and drain thoroughly. Toss drained peel with remaining sugar in a large bowl, coating well. Spread pieces of peel out on Waxed paper to dry. Store in tightly covered container.

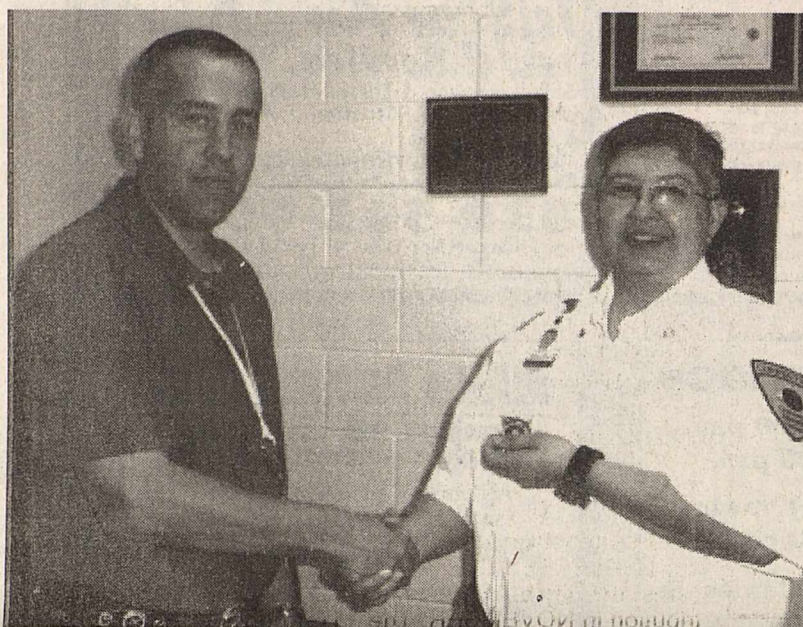

Fellow Residents and Voters of Kinney County,

Alot of talks has been spread recently saying there will be dire consequences for you and all landowners in Kinney County if the four incumbent board members on the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District (KCGCD) are not re-elected. The incumbent board members themselves have spread much of this talk around.

Groundwater is the most precious resource we have. Once it is pumped dry, it won't be coming back. Rather than responsibly manage this resource, the incumbent board members of KCGCD keep raising issues such as the minnow and their supposed success in taking the Board in a new direction the past two years. They have their facts wrong!!

First, on the minnow, this newspaper pretty well set the record straight in its September 25, 2008; report on the U.S. Fish & Wildlife local town meeting about the issue. At that meeting, the Fish & Wildlife representatives said they would not act to reintroduce any minnows into any stream without the voluntary agreement of the landowners. The Fish & Wildlife head people in Washington, D.C. have also specifically said they welcome local control in Kinney County on the issue. It is interesting that the KCGCD board members that are raising such a stir about the minnow were not at the town meeting to hear what was actually said. They are making a mountain out of a molehill.

SECOND, on the issue of protecting our groundwater, those who are up for re-election recently voted in favor of a new 5 year "groundwater management plan" than contains NO numerical limits on the amount of groundwater they can dole out in permits for pumping. They say they can do this because no one knows exactly how much total water we really have!

THIRD, this past summer, a majority of the current KCGDC board- including those up for re-election - issued over a dozen permits for very large amounts of groundwater. Some of the permits were to incumbents now running for re-election. At the same time they voted to authorize KCGCD to pay over \$500,000 dollars of District money to private lawyers who represented the permit applicants. THIS PAYMENT WILL BE COLLECTED FROM DISTRICT FEES IMPOSED ON EXPORTED WATER. ( View this agreement @ www.kcgcd.com). That is money that should be going to help conserve our groundwater and used to serve the needs of County and gone forever. These incumbents have also failed to impartially investigate and apply laws intended to prevent waste of our groundwater. They are giving away water, when they cannot guarantee that no over pumping will occur, resulting in the loss of this limited resource.

If you think this is responsible stewardship of our groundwater and government dollars, go ahead and keep these incumbents on the KCGCD Board. If you think it is time for a change, you think how to cast your vote.
