Members want more information about restaurant contracts



Fort Clark Board Meeting

Brackett News Photo By Katie Brown - The FCSA board room was full November 21 as members were anxious to discuss the status of the pending litigation against restaurant owner Billy Jack Dorris.

Tempers were held in check when the subject of Billy Jack Dorris and the restaurant situation was brought up at the Fort Clark Springs Association board meeting on November 21.

Patrick Kelly of Langley and Banack, the firm that represents the Fort in its case against Dorris for breach of contract, touched briefly on the recent proceedings presided over by Judge Lee in District Court. "We tried the case last Thursday and the judge had indicated that he would give us a decision this past Monday; however we have not received anything yet. And that's just on the Duck Inn," said Kelley. "The other suit involves the other two locations, Creekside and Dickman Hall. It was in September that suit was filed on those because of violations of the contract agreement. The JP recused herself and the case was assigned to the District Judge in Del Rio to appoint a new judge or figure out the procedure. Typically what happens when a Justice of the Peace (JP) cannot sit in a case it is transferred to the nearest JP in that county. However, since there is only one JP in this county, I believe that's what the holdup is in that suit. The District Judge doesn't know who to assign to sit on that case." Once a judge is assigned to that case it will be tried at the JP level and then depending on the decision rendered at that level it could go to County Court.

Members were invited to ask questions concerning the issues and the grounds on which the suits were filed. With Duck Inn, the contract required the facility to be opened by a certain date; he was not open by the specified date and the contract provided that unless he was open by that date the contract would be terminated. As Dorris did not comply with the terms of the contract the Fort decided to move to evict.

In regards to Dickman Hall

and Creekside, Kelley stated the Forts' position was that Dorris failed to comply with other matters in the contract that required him to take some affirmative steps; the main one being maintaining liability insurance on the premises. As that case has not been tried yet the attorney could not comment further.

By the questions that were asked, it was apparent that the many of the members present were not fully aware of the issues. One such question was, "Has the board received any money yet from Mr. Dorris?" The answer was that the contracts did not call for Dorris to pay the Fort anything other than rental fees of \$1 per facility per year for five years. Dorris has paid the Fort the five dollars, however, he owes a past due electric bill at Dickman Hall in the amount of \$4,042.68 July, 2009 to present).

The electricity, in Dorris' name at Duck Inn was turned off for non-payment.

Director Holloman requested a show of hands of those in favor of and of those against supporting Creekside and Dickman Hall and it was clear more were opposed to the present situation. Sentiment at the meeting was that a restaurant on the Fort should be an asset, not a detriment.

Dorris did not attend the meeting. Many questions went unanswered due to pending litigation.

Henry Garcia, Brackettville City Manager, addressed the board expressing concerns regarding the direction the relationship is going between the FCS Board and the City of Brackettville. "Garcia does not feel that General Manager, Felix Cerna, has a desire to work with the city. "To date there hasn't been one meeting that I have had with Mr. Cerna and Mr. Walker where he is not trying to charge the city a fee of

some sort," said Garcia. "Yesterday he sent Mr. Walker to my office to hand me an envelope and the envelope contained an agreement he'd already signed and a statement where he wanted to charge the City of Brackettville \$500 for the use of the burn pit." John Carlson, a former director on the FCS Board of Directors, wanted clarification as to the terms of the agreement at the time it was made. He suggested that a verbal agreement was in place whereby the City would take the Forts' cardboard and white goods in exchange for the Fort taking the City's stuff to burn. Former General Manager Genell Hobbs said the initial agreement for \$500 was with Bonnie Mayes, former City Manager, and was signed by Fort Clark and representatives from the City; that was strictly for brush. Cerna did not address any of the issues during the board meeting but later stated we do need to work with the city and he intends to come before the City Council on behalf of the Board of Directors at their next meeting. In reference to the landfill situation, Cerna stated that following a heavy rain such as the one last week, the landfill holds water and cannot be used. It costs the Fort \$1,400 (\$140 per ton) every time we have to send a 10 ton container full of trash to San Antonio. The Fort only charges the city \$89 per ton. Erroneously, the city was billed \$1,400 for 6.5 tons and that was later rectified.

Following the meeting, Bill Haenn officiated at the dedication ceremony for a Texas Historical Marker unveiled at Seminole Hall.

Seminole Hall was a Cavalry Barracks, built in 1932 on the site of the first Post Commissary which burned in 1892.

Directors O'Keeffe, Berleth, Holloman, Keys and Trautwein were present.

What Do Guidelines Do to the Detection of Breast Cancer Early?

When early detection of breast cancer from the use of mammograms is not available as a tool for screening changes in breast tissue, breast cancer will abound. It is does not take a research study to determine it. Limiting the access to the use of mammography will demonstrate it through lives lost and more extensive treatment of the disease. The research showed that there were false positives and unnecessary biopsies. Did these researchers interview the women who had the false positives? Were these women relieved that the false positives were not cancer? Research does not take into consideration the relief of knowing that it was not cancer. Cold hard facts are good for determining guilt or innocence, but not when it comes to saving one human life. For those cancers detected, many lives have been saved. It is the same with breast self examinations. For the women who do them regularly, the change in breast tissue and the finding of a lump, can speed the process of determining if it is cancer. Suggesting that women between 40 and 50 do not benefit from mammograms should not be made in a blanket statement. For myself, I can attest to the need for a yearly mammogram during these years. It was my insurance company that decided that mammograms every two years were adequate for detecting breast cancer. Unfortunately, I did not receive my mammogram at age 47, and when I had my mammogram at age 48, it showed breast cancer which had started putting feelers out, and by the time surgery was done, it was in my nodes, and it was a Stage 3 IIB. We will never know if the mammogram at age 47 would have detected it, and it might have been a Stage I. or Stage II. The amount of money that my insurance company has spent for surgeries, reconstruction, chemo, radiation, and doctor's visits may have been prevented. Until we find a better way for women 40-50 to be screened for breast cancer, the mammogram needs to be provided. For the women who are looking for a reason not to have a mammogram, the guidelines are a welcome excuse. One can only hope that they will not have to experience the chemo, radiation, surgeries, and the thoughts of recurrence. Women take charge of your medical care, and stand up for the early detection of breast cancer, and get that mammogram.
