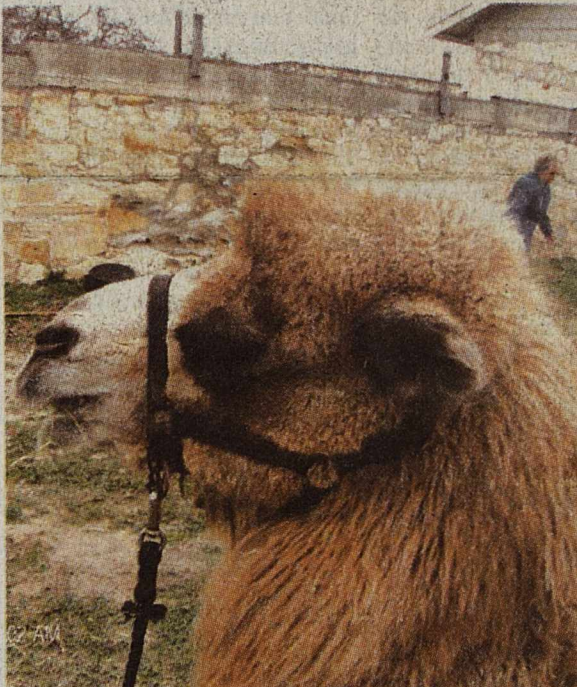

History of Fort Clark Celebrated

State Auditor says water board "not operational"

State Auditor John Keel released his Follow-up Audit Report on the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District last month and its findings call the District's stability into question.

"The State Auditor's Office (SAO) can provide limited-to-no assurance that amounts in this report are accurate and complete because the District was not able to provide complete and reliable information. Because the (Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District - KCGCD) did not provide assurances that the information provided to auditors was complete and accurate, the findings, conclusions, and supplemental information in this report are subject to that limitation."

Originally, the SAO conducted an audit in January, 2006 that covered the District's operations from September 1, 2001, through August 31, 2005. That audit identified 32 problems including the District's ability to meet its financial obligation and the fact its liabilities exceeded the assets by \$54,977, poor bookkeeping and use of escrow monies for daily operations. Darlene Shahan was the General Manager of the District at that time.

Now the SAO calls the District, "not operational because it has not achieved 80 percent of its management plan objectives."

The follow-up audit that covered September 1, 2005 to June 30, 2009, stated the District had

only fully implemented one of the 32 problems brought to light in 2006, and because of its continued failure to keep proper books, it has kept the directors from making timely decisions essential to its operation.

The current board has found itself without a general manager since January 2009 and many of the problems such as not having accurate budget and financial information, not having current audits performed, not properly recording financial transactions and not having documentation to support spending, have all led to a break down in the management of the district's day to day operations as well as its ability to issue permits.

The board attempted to hire a new general manager last month, but rescinded it after a background check revealed things that made the directors uncomfortable with their decision.

The board was also cited for not issuing new permits in a timely manner, not adequately monitoring water usage by permitted wells and not retain minutes from its monthly meetings.

The district agreed there were many areas that needed improvement and in their official response promised they have, "already found the means to accomplish some of the District goals despite the lack of professional staff available to perform the required tasks."

One of the applications re-

cently denied by the board was from Grass Valley, a company that wishes to export water from the county and represented by attorney Michael Booth, said the following, "We commend the State Auditor and his expert staff on the thorough and revealing audit of the Kinney County Groundwater District. The SAO's impartial and incontrovertible audit report exposed the KCGCD's systemic dysfunctionality and confirms many of the District's accounting, budgeting, financial and legal problems Grass Valley has brought to the Water District's attention over the years only to be ignored. These problems were compounded by the Board's continued refusal to issue groundwater permits most recently demonstrated by its failure to issue permits in accordance with its independent Hearing Examiner. The State Auditor decisively declared the District to be nonoperational in part because of the Board's insistence on spending taxpayers money on expensive litigation rather than comply with its statutory responsibilities. An SAO finding that a District is "nonoperational" is one of the few statutory triggers that authorizes the TCEQ to exercise its stringent enforcement powers under Chapter 36 of the Water Code up to and including possible dissolution of the District."

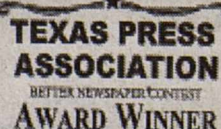

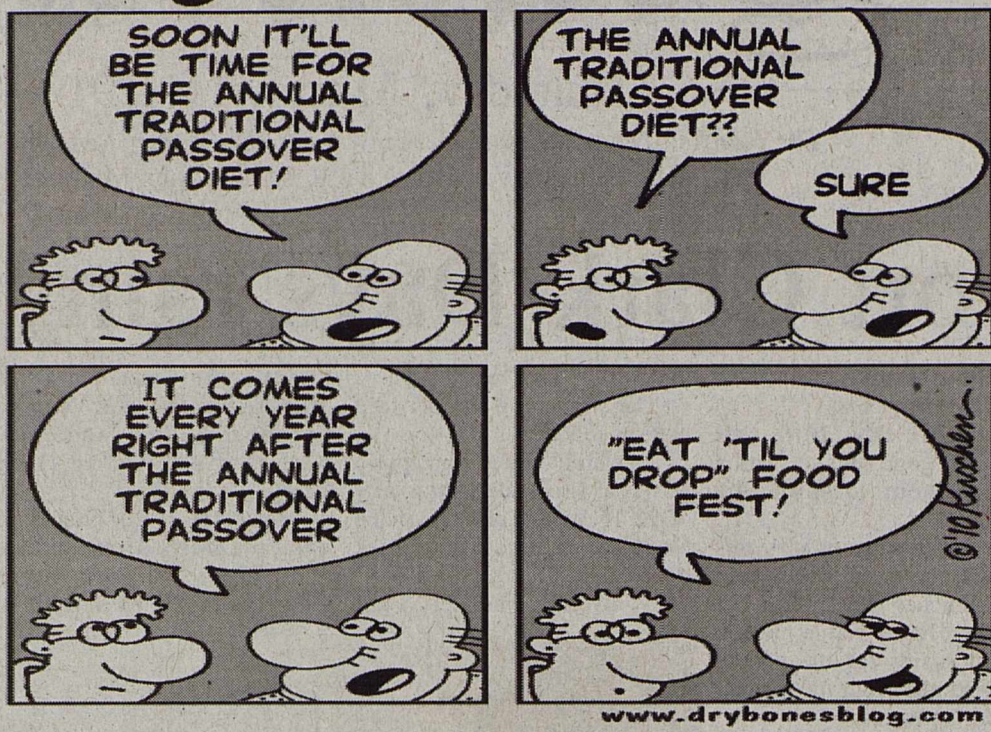

Sandwich generation needs to avoid financial squeeze

Are you a member of the "Sandwich Generation"? This designation which applies to people caring for their aging parents while supporting their own children may be applicable to you if you're either a younger Baby Boomer, born in the late 1950s or early 1960s, or an older member of "Generation X," born in the mid-1960s. But any way you slice it, being in the "Sandwich" group is probably going to present you with some challenges, particularly of the financial kind so you'll need to make the right moves. Basically, you should consider two areas of decision-making those affecting the future of you and your children and those affecting your elderly parents' lifestyle and legacy.

Regarding your future, and that of your children, you'll need to prioritize your goals. Some people, when weighing the merits of investing for retirement versus saving for their children's college educations, conclude that while loans are available for college, none are offered to retirees. Consequently, they focus more heavily on retirement. If you're in this camp, you'll probably want to contribute as much as you can possibly afford to your IRA and 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. However, if you feel strongly about helping your kids go through college relatively debt-free, you may want to explore some college-savings options, such as Section 529 plans and Coverdell Education Savings Accounts, both of which offer significant tax advantages. And while you're handling these issues for yourself and your children, you'll need to juggle the needs of your elderly parents. With luck, you won't have to contribute financially, but you may be required to put in some time and energy to help make sure your parents' situation remains positive.

This means you'll need to ask some questions. Where do your parents bank? Do they have a brokerage account? If so, do you know the name of their financial advisor? Have they taken steps to remain financially independent if they ever need to go to a nursing home or employ home health care assistants?

Have they drawn up a will, a living trust or other estate plan documents? Would they be willing to have you or another family member assume power of attorney should they become incapacitated? In raising these questions, you will have to approach your parents with tact and sensitivity. However, you may be pleasantly surprised at your parents' willingness to talk about these issues; after all, they almost surely want to avoid burdening you with extra financial responsibilities.

The best time to approach your parents is when they are healthy, both mentally and physically. It's especially important to be aware of even minor-seeming cognitive impairments, such as memory lapses, which can result in paying the same bills two or three times, forgetting to record checks or even falling prey to fraudulent investment schemes. If you suspect your parents may be having these troubles, you'll need to step in immediately. It's not easy being a Sandwich Generation member, but through diligence and proper planning, you should be able to help avoid getting "squished" while improving the outcomes for all your beloved family members.

In the top of the seventh and final inning, LaPryor broke open the game scoring two runs to take a demanding lead needing just three outs to win the championship.

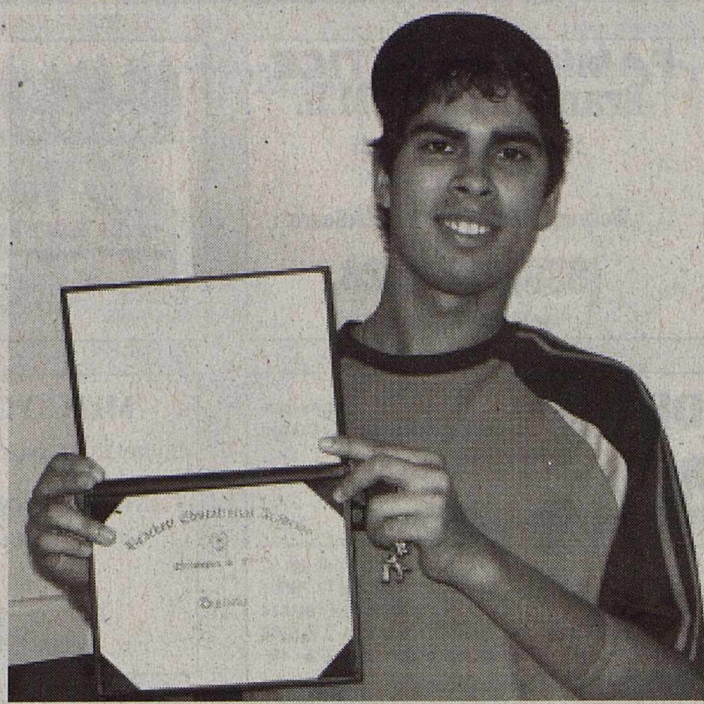
The Tigerettes had another idea, though, and fought back to tie the game 6 to 6, and take the game to extra innings.

The "Whole" Note

What is Texas music? That is not an easy question to answer! It has been influenced through the decades by Native Americans, African-Americans, Latinos, Spanish, and even Irish. It is a menagerie of styles and rhythms. When you think of the beginning of Cowboy music a picture may come to mind of cowpokes sitting around a campfire after a long cattle drive. They pull out their harmonicas, guitars, and banjos and tell a story to music. Texas music is rich with famous singers.

In the late 1800's Settlers to the American West wrote songs about their new life. Songs like "Clementine" and "Cattle Call", were made popular. The lyrics from "Cattle Call" go like this: When the new day is dawning I wake up a yawning, Drinking my coffee strong; Make my bed in a role, down

the trail I will stroll Singing this old cattle call. (yodel)

This brand of music eventually gave way to some of the great Cowboy singers.

In the 1930's and 40's Western movies and radio shows were popular. This introduced the American public to Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, and the Sons of the Pioneers. Known as the "King of the Cowboys" Roy Rogers played the guitar and the mandolin. With the help of his horse, Trigger, Rogers had his own TV show and produced many records, including "Ride ranger Ride" and "Don't Fence Me in". After marrying his singing partner Dale Evans, he continued to make music up until the 1980's when he penned the song "Ride Concrete Cowboy, Ride" for the movie 'Smokey and the Bandit II'.

Rogers main rival was Gene Autry, the most successful western actor of all times. Autry was born in Tioga, Texas. He was taught to play guitar by his mom. His first singing gig was in Tulsa where he billed himself as "Oklahoma's Singing Cowboy". He was the most popular singer of the 1930's and 40's with hits like "The Yellow Rose of Texas" and

"Tumbling Tumbleweeds". He appeared in numerous B Western Movies, and was elected to the Country Music Hall of Fame. He is also known for "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer", and "Here Comes Santa Claus".

No other state in the Union can profess a rich music history like Texas!
