Men sleeping on train tracks killed

Two adult men were killed after being hit by a train, ten miles south of Spofford on July 1, official Maverick County Sheriff's Department reports say.

Kinney County Fire Rescue (KCFR) was called to aid the neighboring county because Maverick County emergency personnel were unable to reach

the area due to the recent heavy rains and flooding from Hurricane Alex.

KCFR sent out a team of five to attempt to reach the area on all-terrain vehicles; however, these men were never able to make it to the scene.

A second team of two Kinney County medics were able to ride on a rail-equipped truck with Union Pacific Railroad employees and reached the scene, but

found the victims to already be deceased.

The men, identified as Samuel Zul Llanas, 19, and Vicente Zul Rubio, 49, both of Charcas San Luis Potosi, Mexico, were pronounced dead at the scene by Maverick County Justice of the Peace June Edwards at 9:15 a.m.

One man suffered from severe head injuries and right leg amputation and the other was completely severed in half.

The report states the Maverick deputies were dispatched to the Kickapoo Nation Ranch and it was later determined the victims were, "sleeping on the tracks when the accident occurred."

Kinney County Sheriff LK Buddy Burgess says undocumented immigrants believe if they sleep on the tracks they will avoid being bitten by rattlesnakes and this type of accident

happens often, with the last one in Kinney County being only last year. Burgess said the rattlesnakes do not avoid the tracks because they can easily chase rats there. Adding to the danger, said Burgess, is the fact the men are tired from walking and fall into a deep sleep and the ribbon rails do not make the noise the old trains used to.

The Mexican Consulate was notified of incident.

Hurricane Dodge

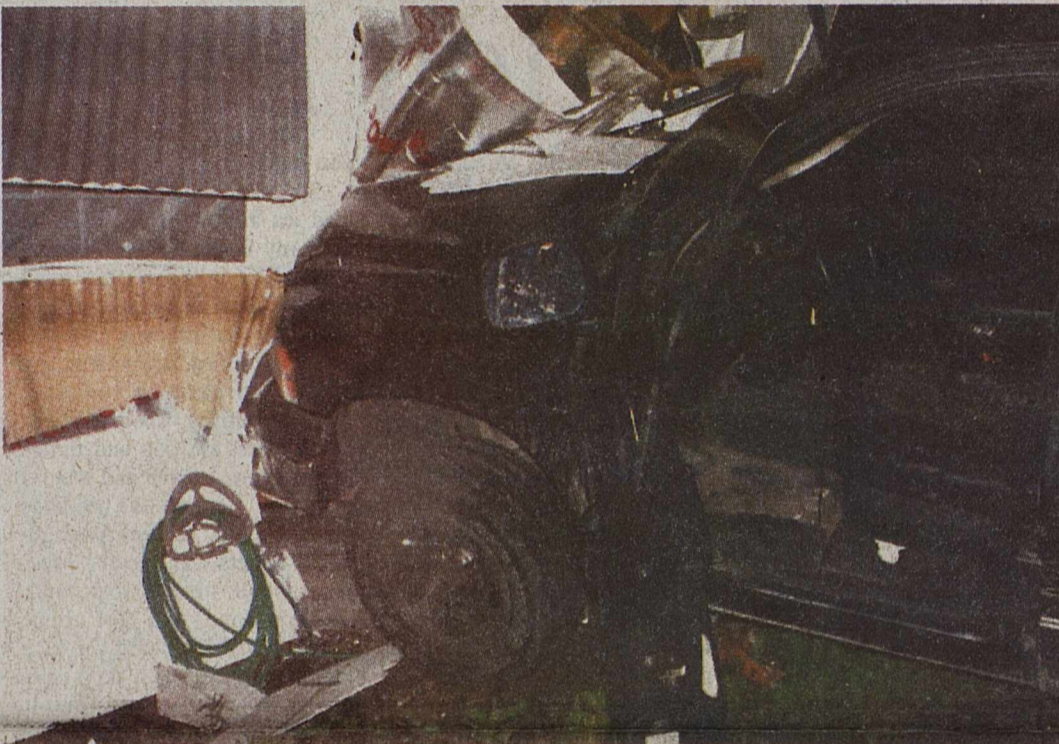

New water district GM getting his feet wet

Kenneth Carver, hired by the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District as the new general manger, got down to business on Thursday, July 1.

Carver, one of the two candidates interviewed for the position, said, "I love doing groundwater work and I have been in the business for 33 years."

A Texas Tech graduate with a degree in agricultural education, Carver says he started out in the lowest position at the High Plains water district and worked his way up to his most recent position as the general

manager at the Permian Basin water district.

The water district formed here in 2001, has been overwhelmed with controversy and lawsuits and in February of this year, the State Auditor's Office declared the district as, "non-operational"; however, with his calm, confident demeanor, Carver explained he was able to aid the Permian Basin district out of their non-compliant status and will do the same for Kinney.

"It's just a process," said Carver commenting on how the current board has done, "a tremendous job to get it to the end."

The new GM says he will now begin educating himself about the

aquifer and go through the process of getting the necessary background information and technical data to get started.

When asked about the controversy surrounding Kinney County and the marketing of its water to other larger cities, Carver said, "It's not my objective to market all the water, or to save all the water. My objective is to manage the district according to the district rules and the laws of the State of Texas." He went on to say the board is responsible for making the policy decisions that reflect the will of the people.

The water board meets today for a Regular meeting at 9 a.m. at the County Library Annex.

Catholic church burglarized

St. Mary Magdalene Catholic Church in Brackettville was burglarized over the Independence Day weekend.

A church caretaker said he discovered a broken window on the west side of the church when he arrived on Monday, July 5 around 6 p.m., the Kinney County Sheriff's Office Incident Report stated.

The caretaker said he opened the door, saw the glass on the floor and then called the sheriff's

department.

It was discovered that another small window on the south side of the building was also broken. The Kinney County Sheriff's deputy investigating the incident believes the perpetrator attempted to go through the small window on the south side, but gained full entry on the west side of the church.

Inside the church, a wooden collection box and the lock to the stereo equipment cabinet were broken; however, nothing was reported missing.

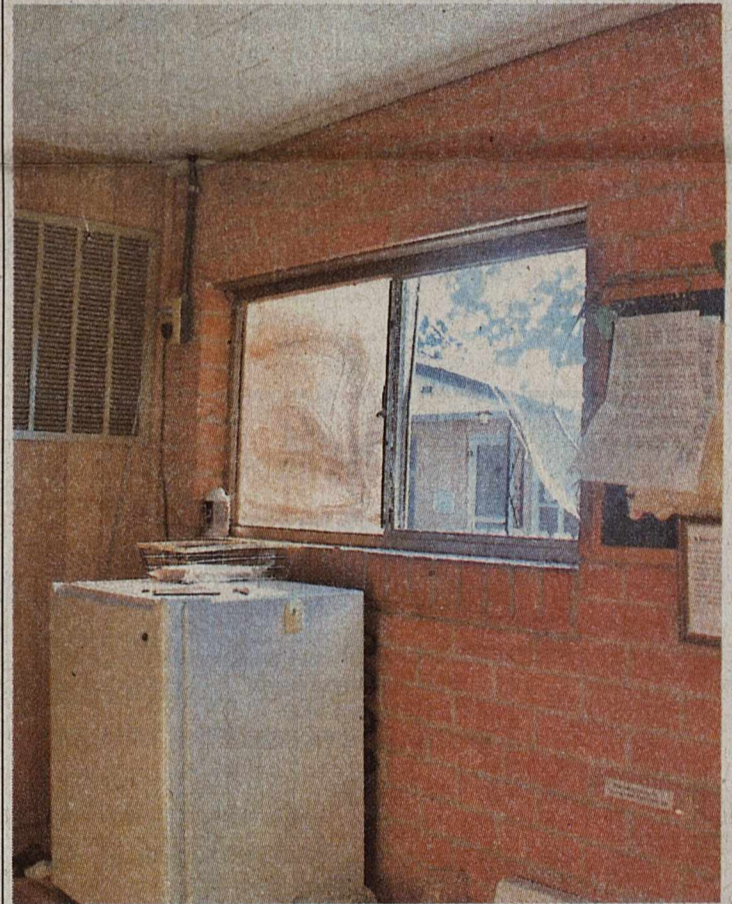
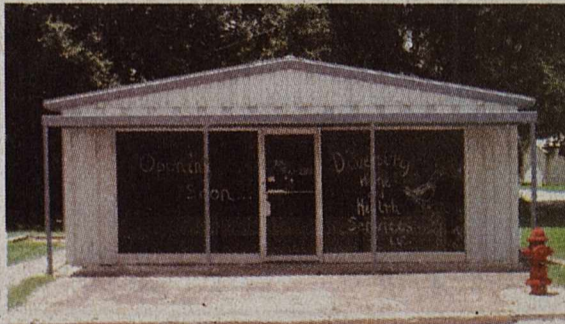
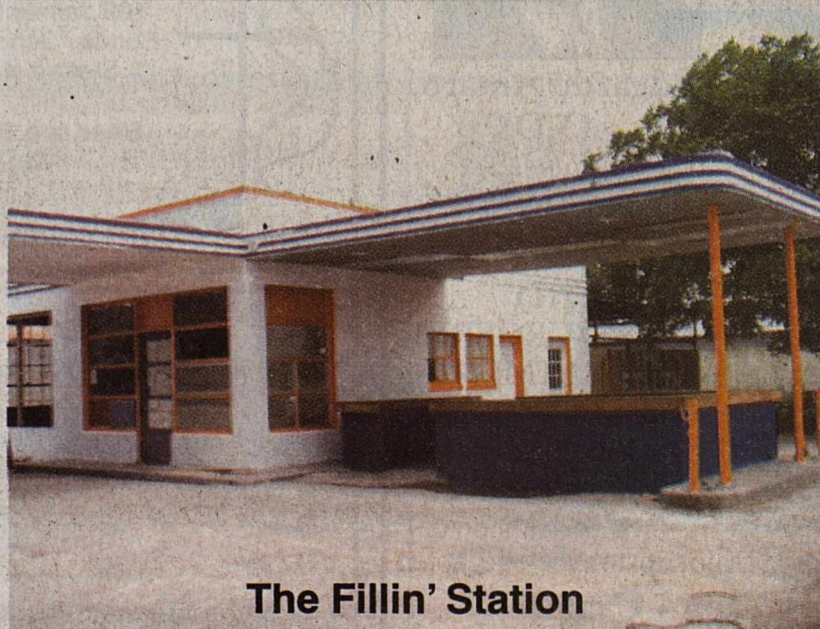

ing to develop a new business. Martinez spoke openly about her love for the community, but did not reveal her plans for the property, although she said she has enjoyed entertaining the many, many ideas suggested to her by people who have stopped by.

Moving into the old Brackett Cleaners building will be Diversity Home Health. Local resident Laura Gammill, along with nursing partners Maria Juarez, Juan Balderas and Lindsey Herrera are waiting to complete their licensing process before opening their doors located on East Spring Street across the street from the County Library. According to Diversity's website, www.diversityhomeandhealth.com, they will offer medical and non-medical services to private patients at their homes or assisted living facilities who are getting older, are chronically ill, recovering from surgery or disabled.

We hope to see you all in the parade. It would be nice if the Mayor would participate in the parade. Once again, Thanks and hope to see you all there.

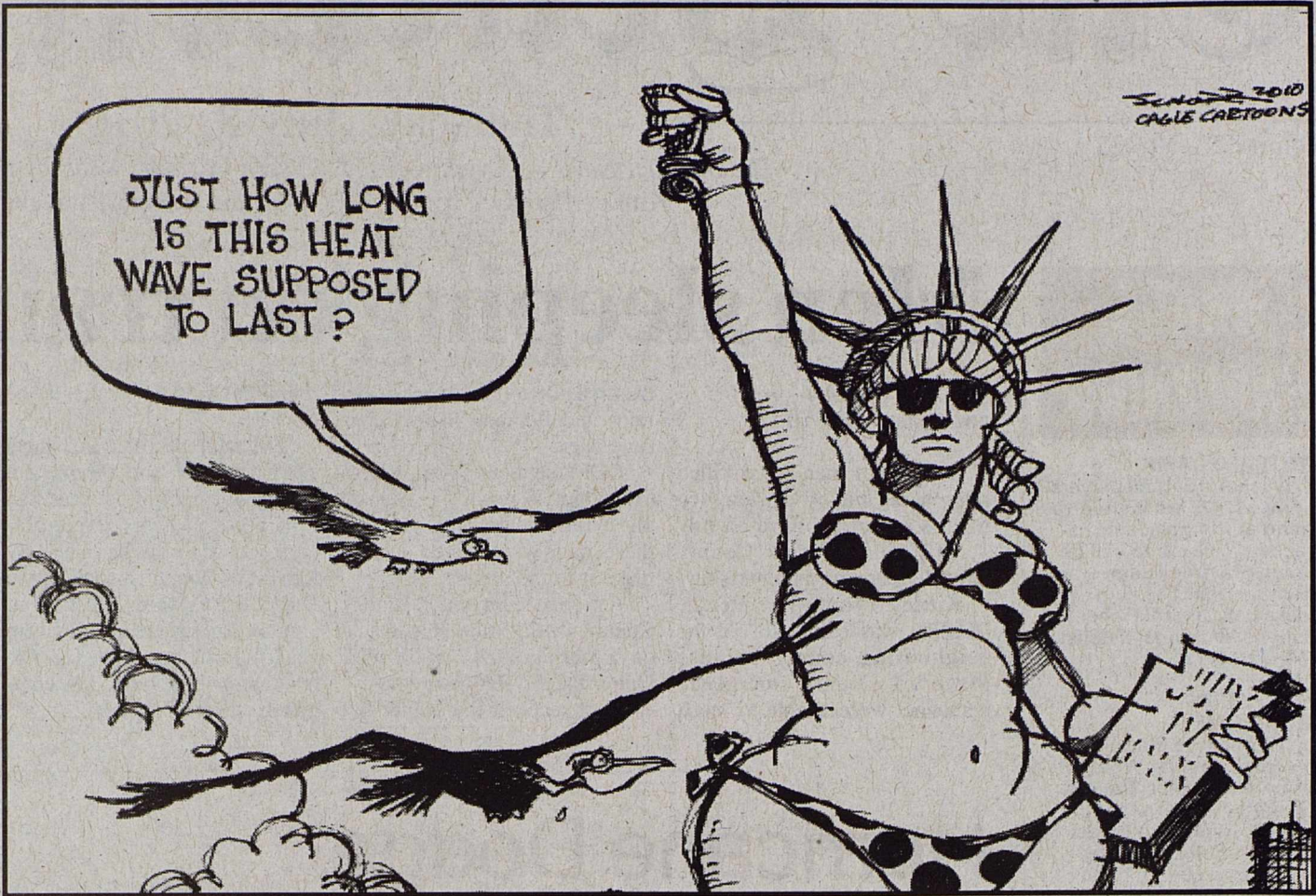

during the year. Michele, my assistant and I have gotten this down to a science. It is always fun to get away from home for a little while, but there is nothing much better than sleeping in your own bed after several days of travel. You know that feeling you get walking into a fresh clean hotel room. I want you to have that same feeling when you return home after your journey. You can do this very easily by not being rushed and little planning. Let's first think about the way you want to come home to your castle. Walking in the door and being greeted with a clean home will make it all worth it. Then crawling into a bed that has fresh clean sheets; these things have to be done before

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) uses the PSAT/NMSQT to initially screen approximately one and a half million program entrants. After the first screening applicants are further evaluated

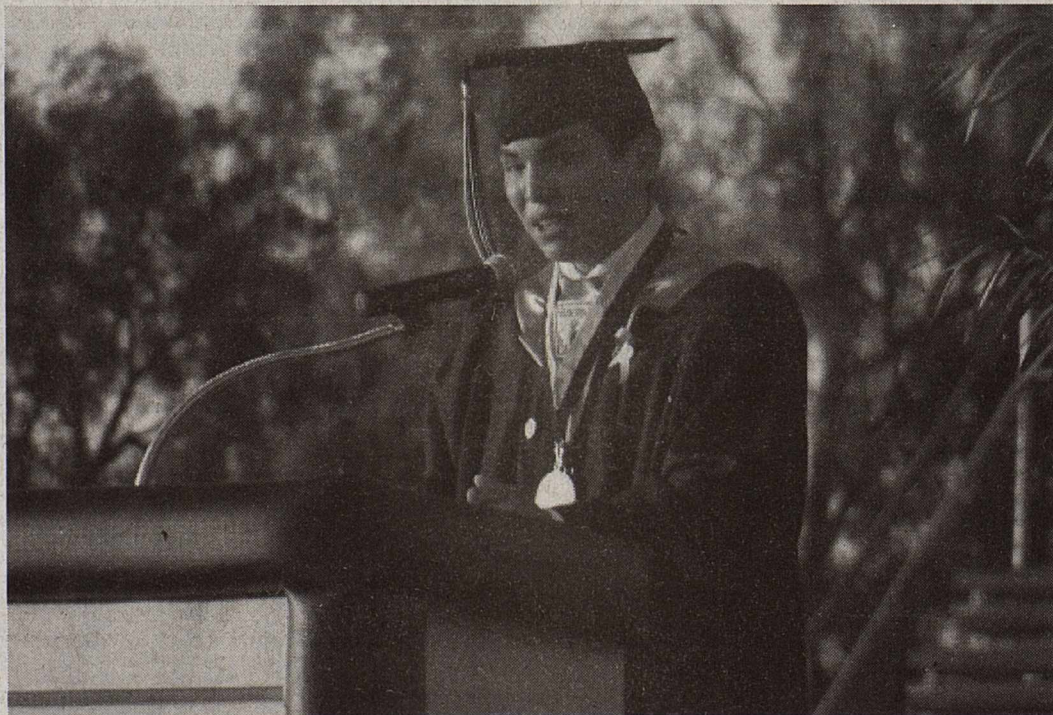
based on many attributes including SAT scores, high school courses taken, grade point average, extracurricular and volunteer activities, and a self-descriptive essay.

The subsequent evaluation moves the applicant through the semifinalist and finalist rounds. Approximately 8200 students in the nation receive National Merit Scholarship awards after this very competitive process.

"Victor is an outstanding student and young man and we are

pride of him for this great achievement. Victor has set very high goals and I am sure that if he maintains the commitment that he has shown in the past he will be very successful in the future," said Frank Taylor, Brackett High School Principal.

Victor plans on attending the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in Boston, Massachusetts and studying chemical engineering and afterwards going to medical school.

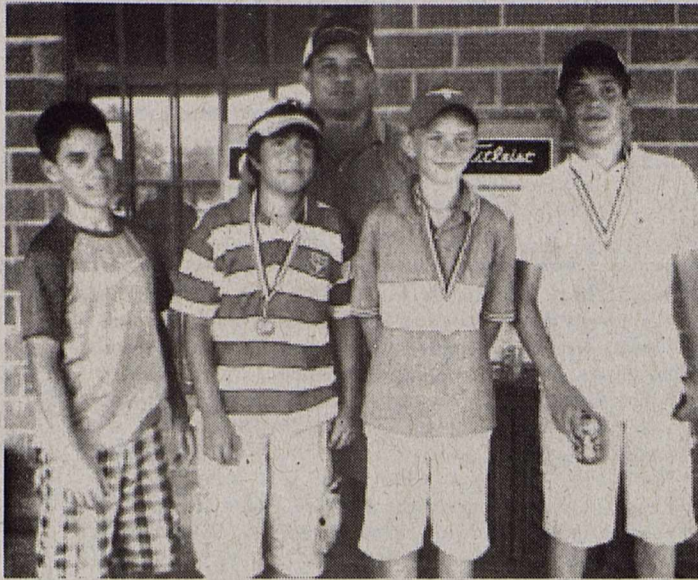

The young Finn Frerich, daughter of Mitch and Michelle Frerich, nearly drowned at the Fort Clark Springs pool on June 7, but even as word hit the news room desk, I was on the popular social networking site, Facebook.com, letting my readers know I had received some information about a possible drowning and would report back as soon as possible.

A few phone calls later and I knew the name, rank and serial number of the people involved, but was a little leery about broadcasting everything over the internet, so I just put out as little information as I could and

requested that people who pray start doing so and to, "get this child and her parents on some prayer trees right now."

Within minutes there were responses from people all over the country. There were people promising to pray for Finn, and family members posting constant updates.

Finn is still reportedly in the intensive care unit at a hospital in San Antonio, but responsive.

It seems a few different posts on Facebook by a few different people created a nationwide prayer chain for a pre-schooler in a tiny town in the middle of nowhere, Texas.

The power of the press? The power of the internet? Or the power of prayer?

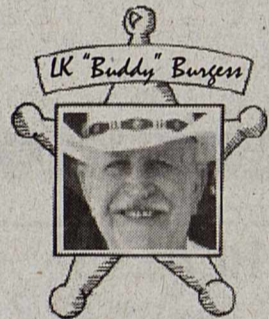
