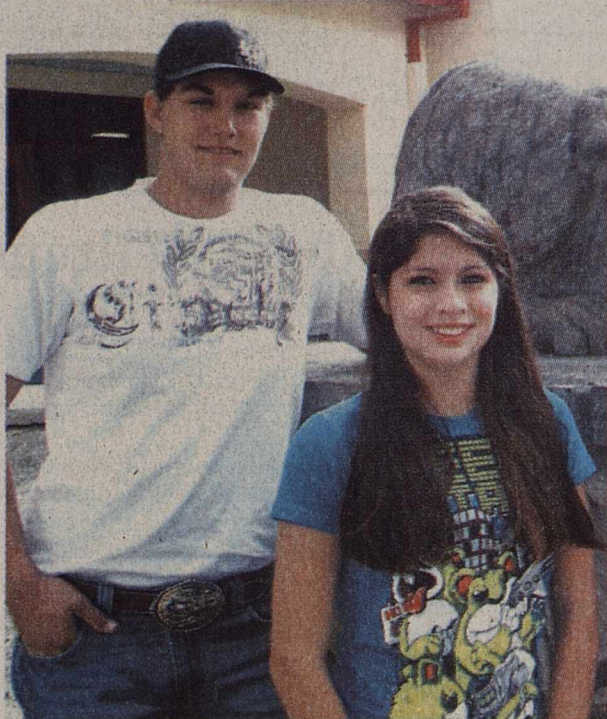

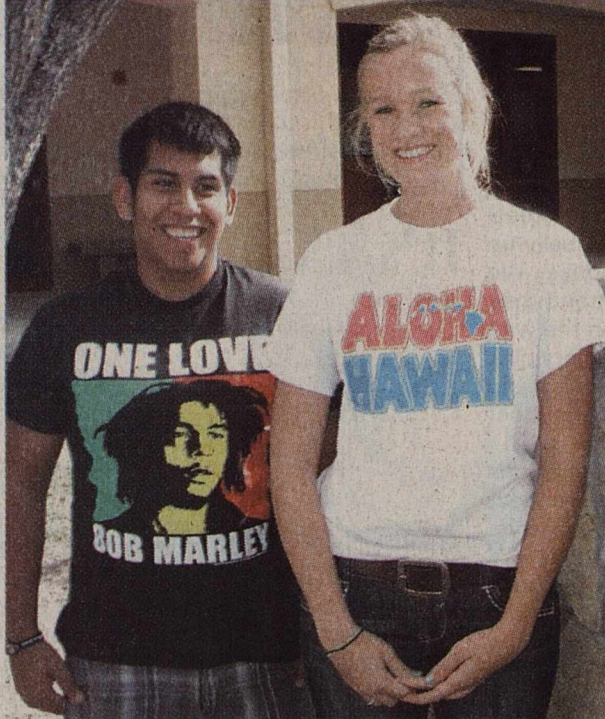
TURKEY SHOOT

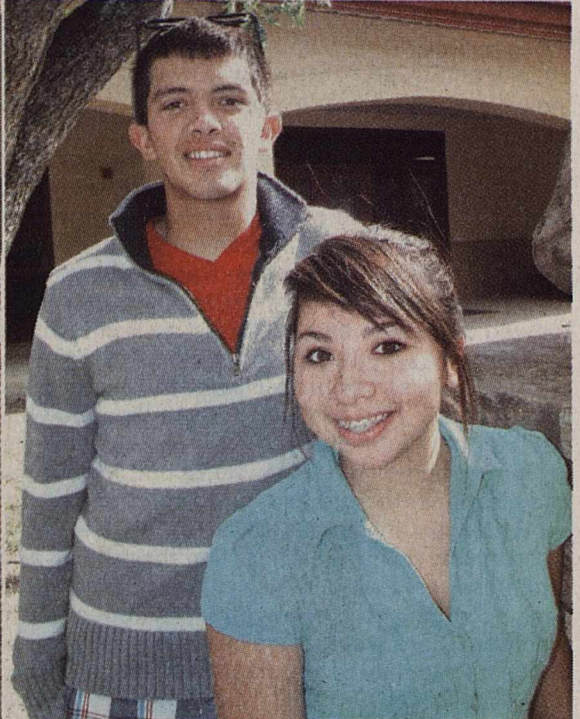

Redistricting plans move Brackettville to 74

A redistricting plan mapped out by the 82nd Legislature proposes to move Kinney and Maverick counties from Texas House of Representatives District 80, currently being served by Tracy O. King (D), into District 74, currently being served by Pete P. Gallego (D).

The changes are scheduled to take effect in 2013, however, pending litigation could possibly change the final look of the

map. Currently, District 74 includes Uvalde, Edwards, Val Verde, Terrell, Pecos, Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Reeves, Loving, Culberson and Hudspeth. The proposed District 74 would include Val Verde, Terrell, Pecos, Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Reeves, Loving, Culberson, Hudspeth, Kinney and Maverick counties. Uvalde County would move to District 80; Edwards County; District 53; and Ward County;

District 81. Pete P. Gallego recently announced he will not run for re-election for the Texas House of Representatives, however his Austin office confirmed Wednesday Gallego has filed to run for Texas U.S. Representative District Congressional District 23. The Congressional District 23 is currently represented by Francisco "Quico" Canseco (R). Tracy O. King confirmed Wednesday that he will run for re-election in District 80.

4 more grand jury indictments released

The Grand Jurors for Kinney County unsealed four more cases this week. Of the twelve cases originally presented to the jury on September 1, ten indictments were returned and two cases were transferred to County Court.

Jose Luis Flores, Case No. 2275, was indicted for causing bodily injury to a female family member by choking her around the neck with his hands and for using a deadly weapon, his hands, in the commission of an

assault on June 15. Bond for Flores was set at \$7,500.

Samuel John Zapata, Case No. 2278, was indicted for intentionally failing to register with local law enforcement authority in the county on August 29, where he resided or intended to reside for more than seven days because of a reportable conviction for sexual assault of a child. Bond for Zapata was set at \$5,000.

Cases for Samuel Fernandez, Case No. 2273, and for Rogilic Fernandez, Case No. 2276, were both transferred to County Court.

Farmers and Ranchers must get sales tax registration number

Farmers and ranchers in Kinney County will now have to apply for a sales tax registration number to make tax exempt purchases as stated in a new law, H.B. 268, passed by the 82nd Legislature.

According to the State Comptrollers Office, beginning January 1, 2012, farmers and ranchers who sell agricultural products to others, persons engaged

in aquaculture (fish farmers) and apiculture (bee keepers), custom harvesters (companies that harvest crops as a service), persons engaged in agricultural aircraft operations (crop dusters) and commercial nurseries engaged in fostering growth of plants for sale (growing stock from seed or cuttings) must apply and receive a registration number in order to continue to make tax exempt purchases for the production of agriculture products.

People or companies that en-

gage in home gardening, horse racing, florists, wildlife management and/or land conservation, maintenance or operation of hunting and fishing leases, horse boarding, trail rides, commercial fishing, dog breeding and pet kennels are not eligible for a sales tax exemption registration number.

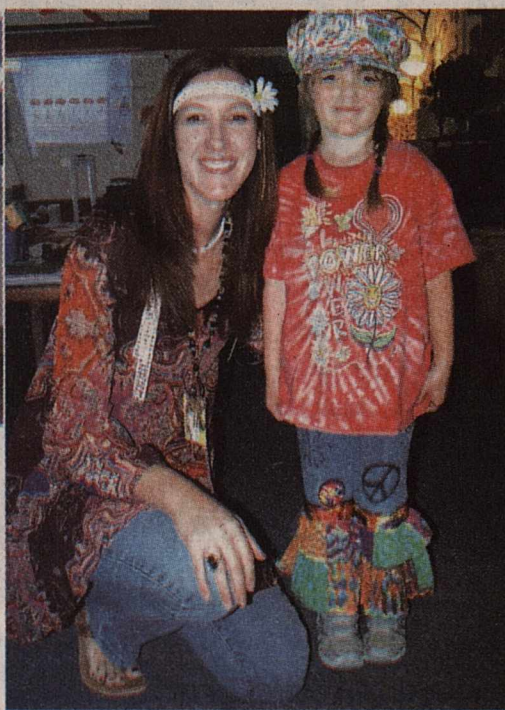

Letter To The Editor:

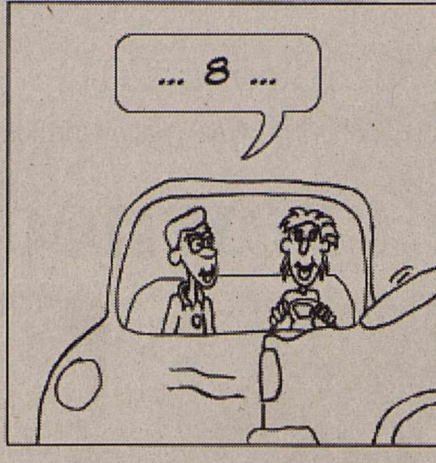

It's a Good Week to Think about Retirement Savings

You may not see it posted on your calendar, but Oct. 16 - 22 is National Save for Retirement Week. • Determine how much you'll need in retirement. Try to define the lifestyle you want during retirement. Will you travel the world or stay close to home? Will you work part time or spend

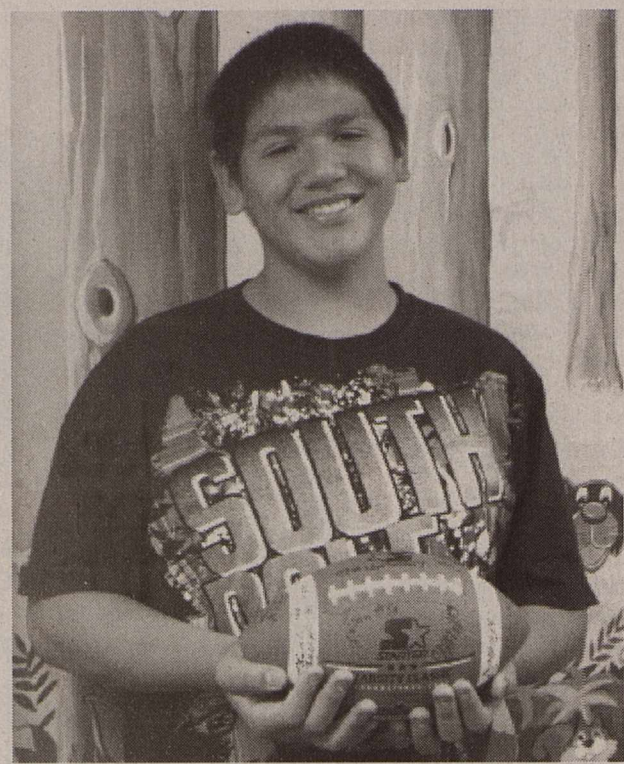

The Public School Funding "Game"

Newspaper headlines throughout that state tell of the coming lawsuit that will be filed in the near future. Because of the historical problems with the school finance system, coupled with the actions of the 82nd Legislature, many believe now is the time to pursue legal action because we must have a system that is fair to all Texas children, taxpayers and districts.

In 2005, the state implemented the Target Revenue system. Basically, this system says the combination of local taxes and state aid will equal a certain figure per student. If property taxes go up, the state aid would go down, keeping the figure constant. Brackett ISD's Target Revenue is in the bottom five percent in the state. With it being October and in the middle of football season, I thought it would be interesting to see how we "stack up" against the other public school districts we are playing football against this season.

I know lots of folks who enjoy picking up a newspaper on Saturday mornings and checking the area and even statewide football scores. I thought it would be interesting to see how well we

"score" in our Target Revenue (T.R.) versus the public school districts we are playing this season. These figures reflect the 2010 - 2011 school year. Each district's T.R. has been reduced approximately 6% this school year.

WADA - Weighted Average Daily Attendance. Student "Weights" recognized certain characteristics of a student. For example, students taking career and vocational courses carry extra weights as do students with special needs. Our WADA is over 1,000 students. For simplicity, I used a WADA of 1,000.

Lost Revenue - If BISD were funded at the same Target Revenue as our opponent, we would have generated this much additional revenue to our district. Since we are funded at a lower level, this is our "Lost Revenue".

As you can see, when we compare funding, we lose every "game". However, this is not a game. The better question is why does the state of Texas value your children, my children, OUR CHILDREN less than the vast majority of all the other children in Texas? The system must be fixed. Our children deserve the same educational opportunities as every other child in the state. Anything less is unacceptable.

Tigers to host Badgers during Homecoming

Brackett High School's varsity football team is now 1-5 after losing another close ball game on Friday 21-14 to D'Hanis. Both Jonathan Quiroz and Charlie Resendez scored on two-yard runs.

Quiroz was the Tigers' leading rusher with 136 yards on 23 carries. David Ortega ran the ball 16 times for 64 yards. Resendez carried the ball eight times and gained 52 yards. Also running the ball were EZ Rivas (one carry for eight yards) and Jonathan Pinales (2-4).

Pinales also had a reception of 10 yards and Resendez caught

Also making stops were EZ Rivas (seven), David Ortega (six), Jonathan Quiroz (six), Daniel Falcon (six), Rolando Gutierrez (four), Charlie Resendez (four), Jonathan Pinales (three), Cesar Castillo (three) Saul Talamantes (two) and Bradley Edwards (one).

"It was a close contest, but we made too many mistakes to win the ball game," Head Coach Greg Voyles said on Monday. "We committed too many turnovers and penalties and you cannot do that against a quality

team." The Tigers will play in their final pre-district game of the season when they host Ben Bolt during 'Homecoming' at 7:30 p.m. on Friday.

Voyles wants his team to put together four full quarters in their non-conference finale. "We are looking for a little more consistency as far as our overall offense and defense," Voyles said. "We want to continue getting better but just need to be more consistent."

Brackett has a bye next week (no game on Friday) before commencing District 14-A competition against La Pryor on October 21. At the start of this week, Voyles and his staff were considering letting their players get

a little breather before polishing up on the basics.

State encourages Texans to get seasonal flu shot

The Texas Department of State Health Services is urging everyone over 6 months old to get a dose of seasonal flu vaccine as soon as possible.

"Even if you had a flu shot during the last flu season, it's time to get vaccinated again," said Dr. David Lakey, DSHS commissioner. "The protection provided by the vaccine decreases over time, so everyone needs to be immunized each year."

DSHS has already seen an increase in flu-like illness in Texas over the last few weeks. Vaccination is encouraged now because it takes about two weeks for the vaccine to become effective.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends everyone at least 6 months old be vaccinated against seasonal

flu. The CDC also says that children ages 6 months to 8 years who did not get at least one dose of the 2010-2011 flu vaccine should get two doses of the vaccine this season.

A nasal spray vaccine is an option for healthy people ages 2 to 49 who are not pregnant. There is also a high-dose vaccine designed for people 65 and over and a new intradermal shot with a much shorter needle available for some adults.

The flu is caused by various influenza viruses. Symptoms include fever, coughing, sore throat, aches, chills and fatigue. Most healthy people recover without problems, but people 65 and over, pregnant women, young children and people with chronic health conditions are at higher risk for serious complications and even death. It is especially important for people in

those high-risk groups to be vaccinated.

Flu vaccine is reformulated each year to match the influenza viruses expected to circulate. Experts anticipate continuing to see the same types of flu as last year, so the vaccine will again protect against the strains A/California/7/2009 (H1N1), A/Perth/16/2009 (H3N2) and B/Brisbane/60/2008.

Getting an annual flu vaccine is the best way to prevent flu from spreading. Also, cover all coughs and sneezes, wash hands frequently with soap and water or hand sanitizer and stay home if sick.

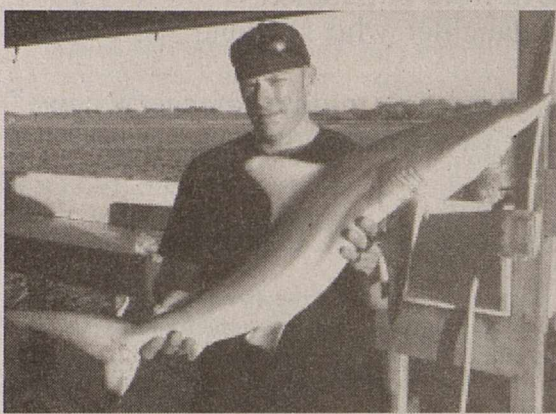

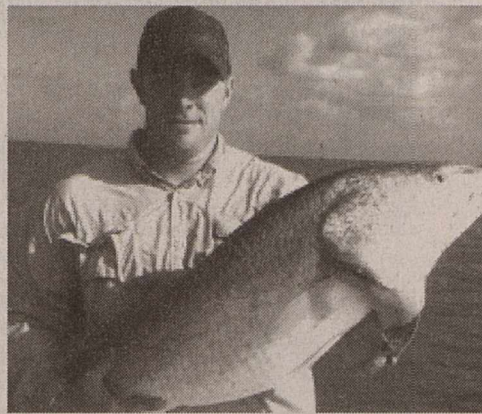

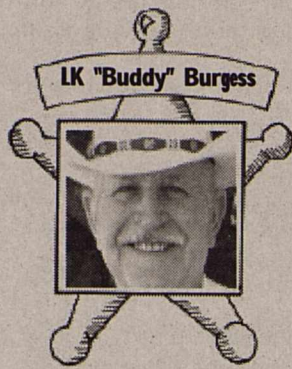
