Ditching Machine at Work.

The big ditcher digs a trench over two feet wide to a depth of about nine feet and is walking through the dirt

The ditcher is a simple, yet wonderful piece of machinery. A steam boil-Threshers are in Full Blast and Many et is set on wheels at the front part of the machine and not only furnishes the power for cutting and elevating matically forward as the ditch is dug. the dirt, but moves the machine auto-From the rear of the platform extends a steel frame from which is suspended a massive wheel fitted on its circumference with plows or knives for cutting the earth, and behind each of these is a scoop shaped receptacle for catching the dirt. This wheel revolves in cogs set in the frame, which is lowered or raised to the depth of the excavation by an apparatus that is practically automatic. As the wheel revolves the dirt is dumped onto a belt which carries and drops it in a pile along the side of the ditch. The machine is now being used for digging the sewer for the lateral line running from the connection with the main line in the alley between Scott and Lamar avenues. As fast ts the ditch is dug the pipe layers will follow and the trench will be covered as fast as the pipe is laid.

For the deeper excavation between the business part of the city and the place where the sewer emplies into the river, it is probable that a machine even larger than the one now in operation will be brought here.


