END THEIR SESSION GRAND JURY ADJOURNED THIS MORNING AFTER INVESTIGATING LAW INFRACTIONS. FOUND MANY TRUE BILLS Indictments Number 31—18 Charge Felony—13 Misdemeanors—Officials are Censured. From Tuesday's Daily. In District Court, Wichita County, June Term, 1903. To Hon. A. H. Carrigan, Judge of said Court—We, your grand jurors for the above named term of Court, having finished our labors, beg leave to submit to you the following report: We have been in session twelve days and have found and returned into court thirty-one true bills of indictments, eighteen being for felony and thirteen for misdemeanor. We have not kept a record of the number of witnesses examined before us, but we have carefully investigated all matters brought to our attention, and, so far we were able to do so, we have investigated both sides of all cases where parties are accused of crime to the end that we might do equal justice to all. At the beginning of our term, on account of hearing complaints as to the condition of the county jail, we examined that building and found it to be in a very unsanitary condition, and poorly kept. The prisoners complained of vermin in the cells, and the stench in the jail was very bad. The roof was leaking in the heavy rains at that time. When the subject was mentioned to him, the sheriff of the county complained that the commissioners court had not furnished him with proper financial support in the maintenance of the jail. With a view to ascertaining where this responsibility should lie, and who is to blame, if any one, for the existence of such conditions, we have made a careful investigation of the facts, and we find that the commissioners court has appropriated sufficient funds to keep the jail in better condition than it has been kept in heretofore and that the court has been very liberal in making appropriations for the jail. We also examined the jail again during the last week and we find conditions very much improved. The roof has been repaired and the jail is very clean and most of the poor conditions discovered at our first visit have been remedied. Complaint is made, however, by some of the prisoners, that they have not been fed and cared for as they should be and we recommend that the sheriff, in the future, exercise a greater degree of care in regard to this, as well as to the sanitary condition of the jail. Common humanity demands that the persons charged with crime and unable to give bonds be treated as well as is possible consistent with their safe detention while awaiting the action of the courts. There is the usual lamentable lack of harmony among our peace officers in the county and city, a fact which militates seriously against the enforcement of the law; if all would stand together and work together for the enforcement of the law better conditions would prevail. We find that in some instances men arrested for offenses and confined in jail have been liberated by those having the jail in charge, without authority of law and yet under circumstances as to render it difficult to ascertain just who is responsible for the immediate act, owing to the loose way in which the business has been conducted. Much as we personally regret the necessity of doing so, our responsibility to the public compels us, under our oaths, to say we cannot approve of the character of public service rendered by our sheriff, especially in the particulars mentioned herein. The statement recently made in the public prints to the effect that there is a harmonious feeling between the sheriff and the county commissioners court in regard to the affairs of his office is, in our opinion, not borne out by the facts. We find that the local authorities are making an effort to rid the city of its dens of vice; the county attorney has assured us that he intends to rigidly apply the provisions of the "disorderly house" law to them and in his efforts along this line we hope he may have the active support of all law-abiding citizens. We believe that all the laws should be enforced as they are written, and if they prove to be bad laws they should be repealed. We recommend to the court the appointment of a finance committee to audit the finances of the county and report at the next term of the court. 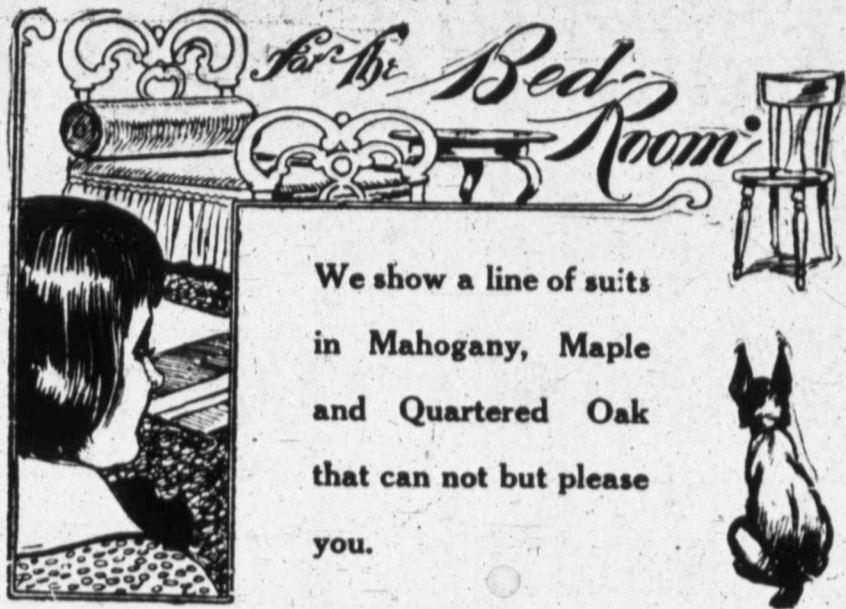

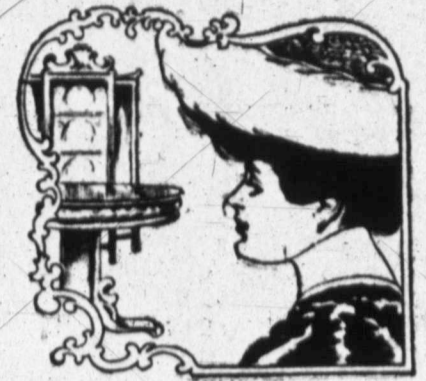

NUMBER OF FEVER CASES EXAGGERATED

DuVal said to a Times reporter: "Reports as to the number of typhoid fever cases in Wichita Falls have been greatly exaggerated. I was talking with a man the other day who had been told that there were fully three hundred cases of fever in the city now. This is very far from the truth and is doing the town an injury. "You can state," continued the doctor, "that there is not more than the usual number of cases of fever for this season of the year and that the town is no worse off in this respect than the great majority of Texas cities. There are few places that are more healthful than Wichita Falls and I don't believe it is right to let such exaggerated reports go abroad without contradiction."

BRYAN'S ADDRESS STATIONS BURNED

EMPHASIZES HIS GRATIFICATION THAT UNION LEADERS ARE PLEASED.

NEW CABINET OFFICER

Praises Plank for Establishment of Department of Labor—Talks About Trusts and Labor Unions.

Lincoln, Neb., July 18.—In an address before the Central Labor Union last night, Mr. Bryan said:

"Gentlemen of the Central Labor Union: I am very grateful to you for this generous expression of confidence and this pledge of your support. The resolution is the more pleasing to me because it comes from you, among whom I have lived for now a little more than twenty years.

"It is true that our platform indorses a number of remedial measures, and I am in hearty sympathy with the platform indorsements. There is not a line in that platform's declaration in favor of the laboring men that does not have my cordial approval.

"This is not the time or place to elaborate upon those planks. There is one plank there that I was very anxious to have in the platform; it was in the platform of eight years ago; the plank that proposes a new cabinet position, a department of labor with a secretary at its head. I have for many years believed that the great body of our population who as wage earners ought to be represented in the councils of the chief executive. I have long believed that you ought to have a representative of the toilers in the shops and factories, a representative sitting at the president's table, sharing in his deliberations and speaking for them on those questions in which labor has an especial interest. And I am very much gratified that that plank is there.

"I think, too, that it is very important that we should have an amendment to the anti-trust law that will draw a distinction between those who assemble together for mutual benefit and those who associate themselves together in an industrial corporation for the purpose of monopolizing some article of commerce. These is a distinction so broad between these two classes of organizations that it seems to me that everyone ought to be able to see it, and that the distinction ought to be drawn by law. I am glad that it is in the platform.

On Injunction.

"I am glad that there is a provision in there in regard to a trial by jury in cases of indirect contempt.

"I am glad, too, that we are able to agree upon an injunction plank that was satisfactory to the leaders of the laboring men and the members of the resolutions committee. I was much gratified and I think the plank in which the party's position is stated upon that subject ought to be satisfactory to all. You will find that there is no attempt to interfere with the legitimate use of the writ of injunction where there is real occasion for it, but that the platform provides that this writ shall not be issued in labor disputes under circumstances that could not justify its use were there no labor disputes, ought to be satisfactory to all."

NIGHT RIDERS COMMIT FRESH OUTRAGES IN CHRISTIAN COUNTY.

REVENGE THEIR MOTIVE

Illinois Central Railway Permits Soldiers to Camp on its Property and Torch is Applied.

Louisville, Ky., July 22.—Night riders last night burned the Illinois Central stations at Gracey, Otter Pond and Orlean Springs in Christian county.

The object in the destruction of the stations is supposed to be revenge for allowing the Madisonville soldiers to camp on the Illinois Central property at Cobb during the recent disturbance.

At Gracey shortly after 1 o'clock this morning twenty masked and armed night riders captured the telephone exchange and took the two operators with them to the station, where they set the house on fire and then rode away.

At Cerulean the burning was quietly accomplished.

At Cobb, after the building was fired, the night riders shot their guns and pistols and then rode away.

MRS. STEVENS BOUND OVER TO GRAND JURY

Frederick, Ok., July 21.—Mrs. Margaret Stephens, charged with criminal negligence in allowing her grandson to die from a snake bite without medical attendance, has been bound over to await the action of the Tillman county grand jury as the result of her preliminary hearing before County Judge Griffin at Frederick.

Mrs. Stephens has given bond for her appearance and it is expected that if the grand jury finds an indictment that the case will be fought to the last ditch by the Christian Scientists of Oklahoma.

Mrs. Stephens' case is being followed with deep interest by the people of Oklahoma.

OLD GUNS OF ALAMO UNEARTHED IN SAN ANTONIO.

San Antonio, Tex., July 17.—Ancient cannon used in defending the Alamo have been unearthed at the corner of Houston street and Alamo plaza. The foundation for a sky-scraper is being dug there, and when a depth of about twenty feet was reached the cannon were uncovered.

They are very large, cast iron, and there is no doubt that they are the old Alamo guns, as these relics were buried by the Texans many years ago. They are the property of the Maverick estate, but will probably be given to the State for the purpose of mounting at the Alamo in their original place.

The site of the new skyscraper is at the corner of the original wall enclosing the old Alamo.

The excavation for the new addition to the federal building will be on the site of the old graveyard of the Alamo, and many bodies will have to be reburied when the foundation is placed. When the present building was erected more than 100 skeletons were revealed.

Stockdale Taken Back to Indiana.

Stockdale, the thief and burglar, who, some two years ago, broke into Halton's jewelry store, was on Sunday last taken to Indiana, where he escaped from the penitentiary. He was conveyed back by Sheriff Watson. Two other officers were with them when they left Bowie. Stockdale is an old offender. He is of large physique, of German descent, and is about 45 years of age.—Bowie Cross Timbers.

Stockdale, it will be remembered, was under indictment here for burglary, but broke jail and was caught in Oklahoma. The Montague county officers got hold of him, but in the meantime it was learned that he had escaped from the Indiana penitentiary and he was taken back to that State.

NEW ORLEANS CANNOT GET RID OF THE RATS.

New Orleans, La., July 22.—The city board of health today announced the failure of experiments at poisoning rats as a means of ridding New Orleans of rodents. The poisoning tests have been under way several weeks and were undertaken on account of the health conditions of South America, where the bubonic plague is prevalent. The board has now begun an experiment of cleaning up all sorts of refuse in a selected city block and is watching the effects of this process as an exterminator of rats.
