A WARNING NOTE

AGAINST FEDERAL ENCROACHMENT ON STATE RIGHTS.

GOVERNMENT WILL FALL

Its Weight If Tendency Toward Centralization is Not Checked.

By Associated Press.

Gettysburg, Pa., May 30.—James A. Tawney, chairman of the house committee of appropriations, sounded a note of warning here this afternoon against the tendency of the states to surrender their powers and functions to the federal government. He said: "The states today not only seem inclined to do so but in many instances are anxious to do so. To the federal government the discharge of duties and the exercise of powers reserved by the Constitution to them, especially when the exercise of these powers and privileges involves the expenditure of money. They are also today either soliciting or acquiescing in a federal supervision over their domestic affairs to an extent that less than half a century ago would have led to revolution had the federal government attempted to force upon them such supervision."

"If it is not checked, and the states continue to surrender to the federal government the exercise of their reserved powers or fail to exercise them in harmony with the interests of their state states, then the federal government as a dealer resort may be compelled to assume practical control over the states and the domestic affairs of their people. In that case, with the vast and varied local and national interests of a hundred or a hundred and fifty millions of people, how long would it be before the task and burden of government would be so complex, so stupendous that of its own weight our splendid system of government would fall."

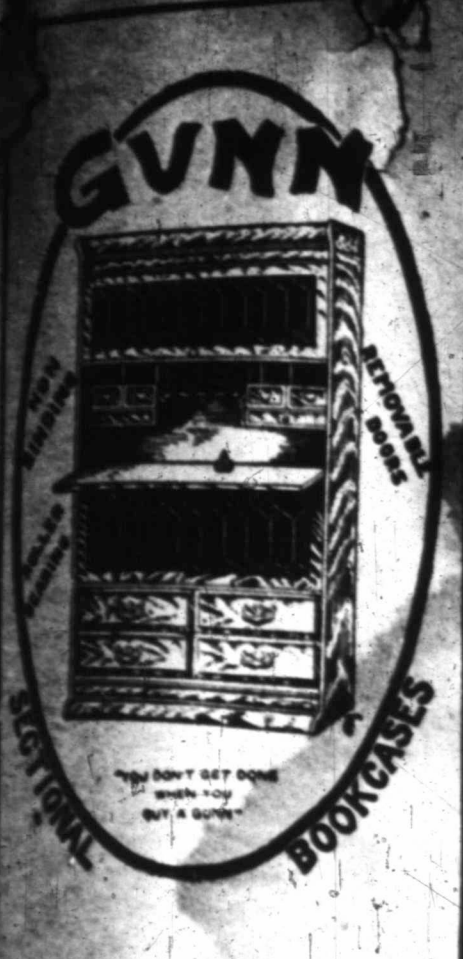

GRIZZLED VETERANS PERFORM RITES OF LOVE.

MANY THOUSANDS MARCH

In the Parades in New York and Chicago.

By Associated Press.
New York, May 30.—With three parades of veterans and escorts and special exercises tonight in Carnegie hall, at which Governor Hughes will be present, and the unveiling of twelve tablets, with orations by Governor Hughes and Governor Guild of Massachusetts, there will be more features of the memorial day exercises this year than usual. The main parade today was reviewed by General O. O. Howard.

Seven-Thousand in the Parade.
Chicago, Ill., May 30.—Memorial Day was marked by the largest parade in Chicago's history. It is estimated that more than seven thousand men marched past the reviewing stand. Governor Deussen reviewed the parade.

Bryan Orator of the Day.
Norfolk, Va., May 30.—William J. Bryan was orator of the day at the celebration of "Patrick Henry Day" at the Jamestown Exposition. "Taxation without representation is tyranny" was his subject.

Impressive Ceremonies at Washington.
Washington, D. C., May 30.—With solemn, impressive ceremonies, Memorial Day was observed in the National capital on a more elaborate scale than usual. Exercises perpetuating the memory of the dead were held in the eight National cemeteries in this city. The principal exercises took place in the National Cemetery at Arlington, where 18,000 graves were strewn with flowers. A touching feature was the decoration of the graves of Confederate dead.

Wreath on Lincoln Monument.
Chicago, Ill., May 30.—General Kuroki, the hero of Yalou, took part in memorial exercises and in view of the hands of spectators, placed a wreath upon the monument of Abraham Lincoln in Lincoln park.

THOUSANDS HEAR ROOSEVELT.
Trip to Indianapolis Was a Continual Ovation.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 30.—The "Big Four" train, carrying President Roosevelt, Vice President Fairbanks and the members of the presidential party arrived here at 10:48 a. m. The party was met by a large reception committee and was driven to the home of Vice President Fairbanks, where luncheon was served.

At Monument Place nearly twenty thousand school children were massed to greet the president. All business was suspended. Every building was decorated.

Following the luncheon at Vice President Fairbanks' home, began the march to the court house grounds for the ceremonies of the unveiling of the monument to Major General Henry W. Lawton. The procession moved two miles through a solid mass of people. Surrounding the monument the streets were packed for many squares. The weather was pleasant. On the platform were seated Mrs. Lawton and three daughters. The program included an address by Governor Hanley, the reading of a poem by James Whitcomb Riley and the president's address.

The president's trip was a continuous ovation all the way from Bellefontaine, Ohio, where he first appeared in public today, to Indianapolis. At all stations great crowds pressed around the president's car. At several places the president made brief remarks and everywhere he shook hands with as many as could get near him.

TO PREVENT SMUGGLING.
Border Strip Sixty-three Feet Wide is Reserved.
By Associated Press.
Washington, D. C., May 30.—The president has issued a proclamation creating a reservation six feet in width along the entire northern border of Mexico, including the State of California and the territories of Arizona and New Mexico. The purpose is declared in the presidential proclamation to be the suppression of smuggling across the international line. Private entries in this line projected for the reservation and such portions of it as are needed for roads are reserved from the operations of this order. Since the abolition of the old "Zona Libre," or the free zone between Mexico and the United States, it has been found increasingly difficult to prevent smuggling across the boundary, hence this order.

Should Guard Ourselves Against Envy. In his closing words the president said:
"Let the man of great wealth remember that, while using and enjoying it, he must nevertheless feel that he is in a sense a trustee, and that a constant misuse, whether in acquiring or spending his wealth, is ominous of evil to himself, to others who have wealth, and to the nation as a whole. As for the rest of us, let us guard ourselves against envy as we ask that others guard themselves against arrogance, and remember Lincoln's words of kindly wisdom: 'Let not him who is houseless pull down the house of another, but let him work diligently and build one for himself, thus by example assuring that his own shall be safe from violence when built.'"

DRY FOR TEN DAYS.

Absolute Prohibition in Whole State For That Period.
Austin, Tex., May 29.—There will be at least ten days of absolute prohibition over the entire State of Texas, according to an opinion from the Attorney General's Department. No drinks will be sold during the ten days following July 12 and longer in some remote places. It is held that every saloon in Texas will have to close for a period of from ten to twenty days following July 12, the date when the Baskin-McGregor liquor bill goes into effect.

This is the effect of the bill, according to an opinion rendered today by Claude Pollard, Assistant Attorney General. As soon as a summary of the opinion can be printed, the controller will send statements to the county judges, tax assessors and county clerks of the various counties to the effect that the persons engaged in a saloon business must obey the law.

The Baskin-McGregor bill repeals the present liquor law and the new law goes into effect on the date this law is repealed. Saloon keepers cannot begin a procedure to secure a license under the new law until the new law goes into effect. This will require at least ten days and in most instances it will require much longer before a new license can be procured.
