## TRY TO IMPEACH

### STATE'S WITNESS RECALLED TO BE ASKED IMPEACHING QUESTIONS.

## STILL STICKS TO STORY

### Witness Clears the Way to Discredit Orchard and Tear Down Story.

Boise, Idaho, June 25.—When the Fairwood trial was resumed this morning, Orchard was recalled in order to get a few additional impeaching questions to him. Attorney Richardson questioned him. He wanted to know if Orchard had not told Max Mallich in a Turkish bath establishment in Denver that Steunenberg was responsible for his being a poor man and that he intended to kill him. Orchard said that he had been to the baths with Mallich, but denied any such conversation. He denied that he knew John D. Elliott, who was in court, and when confronted with him, still denied that he had ever met him. Richardson asked him if he had not told Elliott that capital was determined to get rid of union labor and would begin with the Western Federation of Miners and that some thing would soon happen. Orchard denied this; also that he had talked with Elliott about Steunenberg. The witness admitted knowing D. C. Copley, but did not remember talking with him in San Francisco about the blowing up of the Bradley home and saying that Bradley got what he deserved, but denied that he had told Copley that Steunenberg had driven him out of the country and that he intended to kill the governor.

Orchard was next confronted by Charles A. Sullivan, a miner from Cripple Creek, who said he knew Sullivan, but the witness denied a conversation with him in which he said Steunenberg ought to be killed and if he was not killed that he (Orchard) would kill him himself. Orchard successively denied similar conversations with Fred Hough of Wallace, James Rainey, a stage driver, and Lottie Day, a woman he had known in Denver. He also denied that he had made threats against the governor to David Coates, F. R. Dodd, W. B. Easterly and W. F. Davis. The defense offered in evidence two negative gallery pictures of Orchard, taken after his arrest for the murder of Steunenberg, showing Orchard in a garb resembling a tramp, unshaven and unkempt. Richardson compared the appearance with the Orchard of today. The photo was admitted, and another picture which showed Orchard

in a group of three men, one holding a smoking revolver. His companions were Andy and Peter Christensen. Orchard said the picture was taken as a novelty.

### The First Witness for the Defense.

The first witness for the defense was Mrs. Maty J. Kling, an elderly refined woman, who conducted a boarding house at Cripple Creek. She said she had several sons who are miners, but are not now and never were members of the union. K. C. Sterling, chief detective of the Mine Owners' Association in Colorado, lived at her house in Cripple Creek during the strike in that camp. She saw Orchard visit his room seven or more times, usually in the evening. Sterling engaged and

## STORY OF BUTCHERY

### REFUGEES ARE FLEEING FROM SOUTH CHINA, WHERE REVOLUTIONISTS HOLD SWAY.

## REBELS WELL ORGANIZED

### Their Army Modeled After European Methods—Standards and Banners are Sprinkled With Blood.

Victoria, B. C., June 25.—Refugees were fleeing to Hong Kong from the districts affected by the revolution in South China when the steamer Empress of Japan, which arrived yesterday, left Hong Kong. All reported the rebel movement as a most pretentious one, with an army organized after European methods. War notes, which the rebel leaders promised to redeem at twice their face value after the fall of Canton, were being issued. Proclamations were posted and everything was carried out in form. Most of the arms used are French quick firing rifles and machine guns smuggled in during the past three years by way of Amoy and Canton. After capturing towns on the way to Swatow, the rebel forces moved again northward, seemingly making toward Canton. Huichou, on the Kow-keen mainland opposite Hong Kong, was captured, the imperial troops being badly worsted. France is taking advantage of the outbreak to press a French expedition to be sent to Canton to protect that city, and the Peking officials are reported as strenuously opposing such a move. Large quantities of supplies for the rebels are arriving at Hong Kong in the name of foreigners. Some bloody incidents are reported. At Swatow the civil and military officials were butchered as in other cities. Yang custom officials were killed by a band of rebels and their standard was sprinkled with blood, as were some of their banners. Families of some of the officials were forced to drown themselves in wells. The refugees are arriving in bad condition, many having abandoned everything, even the sick and children in their precipitate flight. Outbreaks have also been reported from Hunan and Szechuan.

## RIOTING MINERS

### BURN BUILDINGS AND DESTROY PROPERTY IN JAPAN.

## ONE MILLION DOLLARS

### Estimate of the Damage Done by the Rioters—Chief of Police is Killed and Soldiers Attacked.

Victoria, B. C., June 25.—Following the recent labor troubles at the Ashie copper mines and miner collieries, serious disturbances are reported at the Ashie copper mines near Milanoshita, Japan. Ten thousand strikers burned the mine buildings, destroyed much

property, killed the chief of police at Suimoto and attacked a regiment of soldiers sent to quell the rioting. The miners armed themselves with rifles and ammunition taken from the mining company's mine, which they destroyed. Dynamite cartridges were also used by the rioters. Many scenes of violence were enacted and a number of fatalities have been reported. The ring leaders of the strike movement are said to be socialists, who are also alleged to have fomented the trouble at the Ashie mines. The damage done to the mines is estimated at one million dollars.

## PLAY A CLOSE GAME

### AMATEURS HELD PROFESSIONALS TO A CLOSE SCORE.

## LOCALS SHOW GOOD FORM

The Game Was Anybody's to the Close. Score 4 to 3.

The Wichita Falls amateurs gave Manager Lucid's professionals a race to the wire in the opening number of the season at the ball park yesterday afternoon. Lucid's men cramped through to a victory, by the narrow margin of 4 to 3, and the game appeared to be anybody's all the way through to the close.

The Wichita youngsters made a surprisingly good showing and held the seasoned professionals even at all points. The sentiment of the fans seemed to exultation over the showing of the home lads rather than any disappointment over the work of the players brought here to defend Wichita's honor upon the diamond. This was the first time the professionals had been together and they put up a good game, even if they didn't play with the accuracy and precision of clock work. When everything is taken into consideration the fans cannot but be satisfied with the game put up by the team.

The regulars lined up in the following order: Winn, s. s.; Lucid, 1st b.; C. Smith, 2nd-b.; Earthman, 3rd b.; Parker, 1. f.; Brockman, c.; Lucke, c. f.; Smith, p.; Black, r. f.

The line-up for the locals was: Brown, c.; W. Huff, 1st b.; A. Huff, c. f.; Collier, p.; Fligo, 3rd b.; Bilderbach, s. s.; Jones, 1. f.; Smith, 2nd b.; Hodges, r. f.

The opening session was devoid of stirring incident. The locals were first to wield the willow. Smith was generous with the first man up and gave Brown a complimentary to first, where he was caught napping a few moments later by Backstop Brockman. W. Huff made three futile sweeps through the ambient atmosphere and his brother Arthur did no better.

The professionals started off their half very nicely when Winn whanged a single past short, and there were cries for Marshal Gwinn when he stole second and third. In the meantime, however, Manager Lucid hadn't set a good example for his men and had struck out. Winn still lingered at third while Smith and Earthman went out on flies to Collier and Hodges.

The second round likewise contributed nothing but circles for the scorer.

The third inning was prolific of scores for the professionals. Smith, the first man up, got a pass. Black whacked one out to left, Smith scoring on an attempted sacrifice of Winn, which was not handled fast enough to catch Winn. Lucid again struck out, but Smith binged one of Collier's offerings into deep center and Winn and Black scored. This bad round for the locals was ended when Smith of the locals stopped a bounder driven into his territory by Earthman, putting out runner Smith at the second station and whipping the sphere to first in time to catch Earthman.

Lucid himself was probably to blame because the professionals didn't score in the fifth. Winn opened, with a nice drive to the right garden, and Lucid ripped one inside of first, while Huff's attention was centered on the runner. Smith got his base on balls, but when Huff made a sensational pull in of Earthman's liner to center, Lucid was caught off the sack at second. Parker went out on a grounder to third, ending an inning of suspense.

The sixth was eventful for the locals. Brown went out on a fly to Black, but Huff drove one out of the reach of the nimble right fielder and was resting safely at second when the ball got back to the diamond. He stole third and

romped in home when A. Huff rolled one between third and the slab station, which Smith attempted to get to first, but failed to catch the runner. Collier grounded and was safe on Lucid's error. He stole second and went to third on an error and came in home on Bilderbach's sacrifice. Jones flew out to Parker, ending the inning with three scores to the credit of the locals.

Lucid's men annexed another in the eighth. Earthman got a pass, stole second, and went to third on Parker's grounder. He scored on Lucke's drive to center. The locals were unable to show anything in the eighth and ninth.

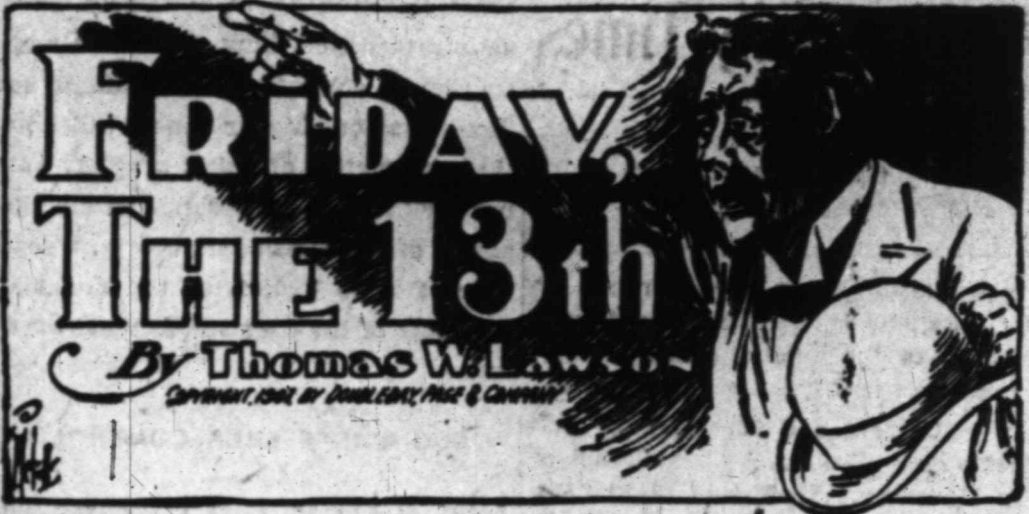

turned my spinal column into a mercury tube. He began to speak:

"Men of Wall street: You have just witnessed a record-breaking slaughter. I have asked permission to talk to you for the purpose of showing you how any member of a great stock exchange may at any time do what I have done today. Weigh well what I am about to say to you. During the last quarter of a century there has grown up in this free and fair land of ours a system by which the few take from the many the results of their labors. The men who take have no more license, from God or man, to take, than have those from whom they slich. They are not endowed by God with superior wisdom, nor have they performed for their fellow-men any labor or given to them anything of value that entitles them to what they take. Their only license to plunder is their knowledge of the system of trickery and fraud that they themselves have created. No man can gainsay this, for on every side is the evidence. Men come into Wall street at sunrise without dollars; before that same sun sets they depart with millions. So all-powerful has grown the system of oppression that single men take in a single lifetime all the savings of a million of their fellows. To-day the people, 80,000,000 strong, are slaving for the few, and their pay is their board and keep. I saw this robbery. I felt the robbers' scourge. I sought the secret. I found it here, here in this gambling-hell. I found that the stocks we bought and sold were mere gambling chips; that the man who had the biggest stack could beat his opponent off the board; that his opponent was the world, because all men directly or indirectly played the stock-gambling game. To win, it was but necessary to have unlimited chips. If chips were bought and sold, on equal terms, by all, no one could buy more than he could pay for, and the game, although still a gambling one, would be fair. A few master tricksters, dollar magicians, long ago seeing this condition, invented the system by which the people are ruthlessly plundered. The system they invented was simple, so simple that for a quarter of a century it has remained undiscovered by the world at large—and even by you, who profess to be experts. No man thought that a free people who had intended to allow all the equal use of every avenue for the attainment of wealth, and who intended to provide for the safeguarding of wealth after it was secured, could be such dolts as to allow themselves to be robbed of all their accumulated wealth by a device as simple as that by which children play at blindman's-buff. The process was no more complex than that employed by the robber of old, who took the pebbles from the beach, marked them money, and with the money bought the labor of his fellows, and by the manipulation of that labor and by turning pebbles into money he took away from the laborer the money which he had paid them for the labor until all in the land were slaves of the moneymaker. These few tricksters said: We will arbitrarily manufacture these chips—stocks. After we have manufactured them, we will sell the world what the world can pay for, and then by the use of the unlimited supply we still have we will win away from the world what it has bought, and repeat the operation, until we have all the wealth, and the people are enslaved. To do this there was one thing besides the manufacturing of the chips—stocks—that was absolutely necessary—a gambling-hell, the working of whose machinery would place a selling value upon such chips; a hell where, after selling the chips, they could be won back. I saw that if these tricksters were to be routed and their 'System' was to be destroyed, it must be through the machinery of this stock exchange. I studied the machinery, and presently I marvelled that men could for so long have been asses.

and receive pay for, because there is not money enough in the world to pay for what under this same rule can be bought and sold in a single session. This is because there have been artificially created by these few tricksters many times more stocks than there is money in existence. The amount of stock that any man can sell in one session of the exchange is limited only by the amount that he can offer for sale, and he can offer any amount his tongue can utter; and he is not compelled and cannot be compelled to show his ability to deliver what he has offered for sale until after he has finished selling, which is the following day. You will ask as I did: Can this be possible? you will find the answer I found. It is so, and must continue to be so, or there will be no stock-gambling. Mark me, for this statement is weighted with the greatest import to you all. A member of this exchange can sell as many shares of stock at one session as he cares to offer. If any attempt is made at the session he sells at to compel him either before or after he offers to sell to show his ability to deliver, away goes the stock-gambling structure, because from the very nature of the whole structure of stock-gambling the same shares are sold and resold many times in each session and the seller cannot know, much less show, that he can deliver until he first adjusts with the buyer and the buyer cannot adjust until after he has become such-by buying. If a rule were made compelling a seller to show his responsibility before selling, every member would have every other member at his mercy and there could be no stock-gambling. When I had worked this out, I saw that while the few tricksters of the 'System' had a perfect device for taking from the people their wealth, I had discovered as perfect a means of taking away from the few the wealth they had secured from the many. With this knowledge came a conviction that my way was as honest as the 'System's', in fact, more honest than theirs. They took from the innocent, I took from the guilty what had already been dishonestly secured. I determined to put my discovery into practice.

"I might never have done so but for that Sugar panic in which I was robbed of millions by the 'System' through Barry Conant. In that panic the 'System,' with its unlimited resources, slich from the people by the arbitrary manufacture of stocks, and by their manipulation did to me what I afterward discovered I could do to them, without any resources other than my right to do business on the floor of this exchange. You saw the outcome, in the second Sugar panic, of my first experiment. In a few minutes I cleared a profit of \$10,000,000. This was easy, because Barry Conant, not knowing of my newly invented trick, could buy only what he could pay for on the morrow, or, at least, what he believed his clients could pay for; while I, not intending to deliver what I sold—unless by smashing the price to a point where I could compel those who had bought to resell to me at millions less than I sold at—could sell unlimited amounts—literally unlimited amounts. When Barry Conant had bought all that he thought he could pay for, he was obliged to beat a retreat in front of my offerings, and I was able to smash, and smash, until the price was so low that he could not by the use of what he had bought, as collateral, borrow sufficient to pay me for what I had sold him. Then he was compelled to turn about and sell what he had bought from me, and when I had rebought it for ten millions less than I had sold it for, the trick had been turned. I had sold him 100,000 shares say at 220. He had sold them back to me say at 120, and he stood where he had stood at the beginning. He had none of the 100,000 shares. Both of us stood, so far as stock was concerned, where we had stood at the beginning, but as to profits and losses there was this difference: I had ten millions of dollars profits, while Barry Conant's clients, the 'System,' were ten millions losers—and all by a trick. The trick did not differ in principle from the one in constant practice by

On next Monday Tax Collector Davis will make his final report of collections to the county commissioners. His report shows that larger collections and fewer delinquencies than ever recorded in Wichita county.

Former reports were turned back to the tax collector and every effort has been made to get all the taxes which could possibly be collected.

Wichita Falls, Texas June 25th, 1907.

In his recent tilt with Senator Foraker of Ohio in the Brownsville affair, former captain of the Texas ranger force, W. J. McDonald, had the backing of all loyal Texans, and when the Ohio fire eater made that sarcastic reference about our own "Captain Bill" not being afraid of anything and would "charge hell with a pail of water," the people down this way, to a man, were willing to enlist on the ex-ranger captain's side of the controversy. Since that time, however, Capt. McDonald, as the State revenue agent, by the issuance of his general order to tax assessors throughout the state to the effect that they must assess all property for taxes at its full value, has raised a question that many taxpayers in this part of the State are differing with him on. In fact, so strong is the sentiment that our State revenue agent has exceeded his authority in this particular, that many counties, through their commissioners courts, have issued instructions to their tax assessors to pay no attention to the order of the State revenue agent, but to proceed to assess taxes as had been the custom in those counties for years, which is at about two-thirds of the actual value. In Wichita county the values were raised in compliance to instructions from the State revenue agent, but in order to offset this raise in values the commissioners court has lowered the county tax rate. It is not in the power of the commissioners court to lower the State tax rate, and to that extent Wichita county will pay State taxes over and above the amount collected last year in proportion to the raise in values. The records show that for the past several years Wichita county has paid considerably more taxes for school purposes than was returned to it by the State for the education of the children of this county within the scholastic age, and so far as this tax is concerned, the raising of the taxable values will benefit no citizen of this county, unless it be the tax assessor and the tax collector, who are paid on the percentage basis for the assessing and collecting of taxes. The office of tax assessor has always been the best paying office in the county, and the man who is so fortunate as to be honored with it is well paid for all his time, when as a matter of fact, he is not required to put in more than one-half of it. The excess of school taxes collected from property in Wichita county has been appropriated for the education of children in the more thickly populated counties. As this paper views the matter, the counties which have resisted the order of

State Revenue Agent McDonald have done the proper thing and if the matter should come to a final test, it believes that our higher courts will hold that the matter of fixing property values for taxation purposes is within the power of commissioners courts, whose duty it is to look after the financial interests of the counties they are serving.

### SOCIALISTS SEEK CONTROL.

**Fight is On in Miners' Convention, Which Threatens to Disrupt The Federation.**

Denver, Colo., June 25.—The crisis in the fight against acting President C. E. Mahoney of the Western Federation of Miners was reached today when the clause of his report in regard to the Industrial Workers of the World was taken up in the Federation convention. Vincent St. John led the attack upon the acting president. It is conceded that the fight is incident to the struggle for control of the Federation by the socialist party. Acting President Mahoney and Acting Secretary J. Kirwin have the support of President Charles H. Moyer in the fight which has disrupted the Industrial Workers of the World and threatens the same fate for the Federation. This was indicated today by a letter from Moyer, upholding the position taken by Mahoney and Kirwin. The debate will last at least two and probably three days, longer.

She saw Orchard go to Sterling's room at least a dozen times. She also saw McKinney, the man accused of the spike pulling, in Sterling's room, following his release from jail.

C. W. Adler of Leadville, Colo., formerly a telegrapher in the employ of the Florence and Cripple Creek railroad, told of seeing Orchard, K. C. Sterling, and D. C. Scott, the detective of the railway company, together in Scott's room at Cripple Creek. Saw him there twice before the attempted train wrecking. Adler's recollection was somewhat hazy as to dates and the time of day, but said he was sure about it being Orchard.

violated the Sherman anti-trust law in a conspiracy in restraint of trade. The president has as yet ordered no investigation and has given no indication of his probable action in the matter. No other labor organization than that at Washington; has as yet joined in the appeal to the president, although it is said that some action would be taken by all the leading labor organizations in the United States.

### FORCES ARE READY FOR ACTION.

Guatemalan Government Reported as Prepared to Meet Invaders.

New Orleans, La., June 25.—A special from Port Barrios, Guatemala, today says:

The forces at the east coast ports held in readiness to repel invasions number five hundred men at each place, each battalion of this size having six rapid fire guns and six siege guns. The dispatch also confirms the reports that coast fortifications are being erected at several ports. The Guatemalan government is reported to be negotiating to buy a 400 ton steamer of 18 knots speed to be armed with eight rapid fire guns and used as a man-of-war.

### Denver Trains Delayed.

All south bound Denver trains are running from three to six hours late on account of excessive rains in Colorado and the Panhandle. There was a slight derailment on the road today, but not serious enough to delay traffic. No trains except the one sustaining the derailment were delayed on account of it.

### FERROUL ARRESTED.

Leader of Winegrowers, However, Not Caught.

Paris, June 20.—M. Ferroul, the striking mayor of Narbonne, and, next to Marceline Albert, the most prominent figure in the winegrowers' revolt in the south of France, was arrested at his residence at Narbonne early Wednesday, and hurried away to Montpellier. Before daybreak all roads leading to M. Ferroul's house were held by cuirassiers in strong force. His body guard of winegrowers, among whom are many women, which had been nightly watching over the safety of their leader, was on duty as usual, but when the winegrowers found themselves surrounded by armed forces of the government they did not attempt any resistance.

When M. Ferroul appeared in the custody of police commissary the crowd momentarily threatened to resist, but the mayor begged that there be no conflict with the troops. He was placed in a carriage, and escorted by 150 cuirassiers, taken to the railroad station at Narbonne, where a special train was awaiting, and started immediately for Montpellier. Intense excitement prevailed at Narbonne, but the people thus far have been overawed by the military display.

At Argelliers state and police authorities, escorted by an imposing military force, raided the headquarters of the central committee of the winegrowers' organization at daybreak with warrants for the arrest of Marceline Albert and members of the central committee, but they found the leader of the movement and several of his lieutenants had fled. Only three committeemen were captured. They were sent to Montpellier.

Strong forces of troops are scouring the country, hunting fugitives. Their escape is facilitated by the fact that the people burned the bridge at the entrance of Argelliers, making a long detour necessary, and delaying the arrival of the government's representatives.

### TEXANS IN MONTREAL

A NEGRO, AN AMERICAN FLAG AND A WICHITA HORSE MAKE THEM FEEL AT HOME.

### DR. MACK FIRST TO CROSS

Texans Backed Him Liberally at 3 to 1 and Made a Cleaning.

Montreal Canada, June 14, 1907. Editor Times:—

After our arrival last night the Montreal bankers chartered enough special cars to take all of our party out to the Dominion Park, which is about eight or ten miles from the heart of the city. Most of the way was along one long street.

Montreal has something like 350,000 people, and the majority of them are said to be of French descent and still speak French.

Many of the stores have their signs in both English and French.

The Dominion Park has all of the various kinds of amusements common in the pleasure resorts of the great cities. Scenic railways, shoot the chutes, bump the bumps, Chinese laundry, Venice by Moonlight, etc. Having tried a few of these at Chicago, the party thought Montreal would be a little tame, but the French spirit of the people in some cases made their amusements thrilling enough to suit even the most daring. The aerial airships in particular were pretty wild, as there was nothing to hold the airship steady except the strength of the chains.

After going through such of these sports as suited each individual, we went back to our train about midnight. Everywhere the British flags were flying and "Old Glory" was nowhere in evidence.

On our arrival at the hotel the night before, which our party had reached in a rather tired out condition, while eating dinner the musicians played "Red, White and Blue" and "Yankee Doodle," which our people had cheered vigorously both in Chicago and Detroit, and no one moved or indicated the slightest interest.

Some one then evidently put the musicians on, for at a signal from the leader the familiar sounds of "Dixie" were heard and the Texans came alive and clapped and cheered so vigorously that the people in the lobbies came into the dining room to see what was the matter.

Next morning we were carried over the best portion of Montreal and around "Mount Royal" in the most beautiful sight-seeing street cars we have seen anywhere.

We had expected cold weather at Montreal, but the day was clear and sunny and the air very pleasant. The trees were all in full leaf, but the fruit trees were here also just in full bloom.

While out we noticed a great pile of dirty snow piled up on the street, being not yet melted entirely. In cleaning the streets the city authorities had piled it very high at this spot.

We would not judge the people harshly, but to our eyes the people of Montreal seemed to be very leisurely, as if the English spirit of conservatism had captured the whole people.

The banks of Montreal, however, seem to do an enormous business, are well equipped with good buildings, strong vaults and have the reputation of being very solid.

In the evening our Canadian friends carried all who would go out to the race course to witness the races. We were a trifle late in arriving and two of the seven races were over. On the way out it was discovered that a Texas horse, "Dr. Mack," was entered for the third race and natural State pride made everyone feel interested. The odds against "Doctor Mack" were 3 to 1, but a good many took a little flyer on the "Doctor" anyway. In a few minutes the horses were put in the ring. There were seven entries and all

of the jockeys were white except the one who rode "Doctor Mack," who was a coal black negro from Ireland. We suppose his name was "Murphy."

In Canada even a negro looked none like to Texas eyes. Moreover, amid numerous little English flags, one large United States flag floated to the breeze and the negro and the flag together made us feel as if we were still in reaching distance of home.

This third race was a six furlong race—a running race, where every horse is free to get there if he can. All the horses got a fairly good start, but until they made the turn and started on the home stretch we could not tell the horses nor jockeys nor the colors they wore. As they neared the finish, however, we could see that of the three horses in the lead that Murphy was riding the one in the rear of the three leaders and that he was going fast and passing first one and then the other. "Dr. Mack" crossed the line the winner. A hundred Texans sprang to their feet and cheered and yelled for "Dr. Mack" and Murphy, and then Fred Fry, the irrepressible, led off with "Long Horn Cattle, Short Horn Wheat, Texas horses can't be beat. Texas! Texas! Every day! Texas! Texas! T. B. A." and all Montreal found that Texas was in town.

The Montreal Gazette next morning said: "The Texans seemed very enthusiastic over the success of 'Doctor Mack' and shouted their war cry very vigorously." This horse, "Dr. Mack," is a Wichita county horse, having been raised by Burk Burnett. The other four races showed up some good horses and were watched with great interest.

At night, after presenting a cane to Mr. Knight, the Canadian bankers who had charge of affairs, carried most of the party to the "Summer Theatre," where all sorts of acrobatic feats, hoop juggling and other like performances were going on.

After spending the night in Montreal we started at 7 a. m. on Saturday, June 15th, for a daylight ride through the famous "Green Mountains" of Vermont and White Mountains of New Hampshire en route to Boston. R. E. H.

## ONLY ONE SURVIVOR.

Ninety are Believed to Have Perished in the Wreck of the Santiago.

By Associated Press.

Santiago, Chile, June 25.—It is officially announced by the Pacific Steam Navigator Company that only one passenger was aboard the Santiago, which was wrecked in the heavy squall fifty miles north of Corral, and he drowned. The only survivor was the fourth officer. All the rest of the crew, numbering ninety, and including twelve English officers, are said to have perished. Only one boat was launched and it was dashed to pieces on the rocks, after drifting for several days.
