CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ELECTS PERMANENT SECRETARY AND WILL BEGIN AGGRESSIVE

CAMPAIGN

And the Splendid Country Surround ing and to Exert Intelligent Persistent Effort for Town's Ad-

vancement. A movement was inaugurated yes terday having for its purpose the growth and continued prosperity and pre-eminence of Wichita Falls as a commercial center.

The movement is to be undertaken by the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce which is to be revived and reorganized, its membership increased and the organization placed upon an effective working basis.

In response to a call issued by the president, Charles W. Bean, some thirty members of the Chamber of Commerce met in the organisation's new headquarters over Robertson's drug store on Indiana avenue and perfected a permanent organization. In the absence of President Bean, R. E. Huff acted as chairman of the meeting.

After a liberal discussion, it was decided to increase the membership, to employ a permanent secretary, have permanent headquarters and to raise a fund for advertising the advantages and resources of Wichita Falls and the surrounding territory.

Upon a vote, Mr. Miles was selected secretary at a salary of \$100 per month and the place of the meeting was selected as the permanent headquarters. T. R. T. Orth was elected a new member of the executive committee of the organization and it was decided to get to work at once and secure new members and to raise a fund to advertise the town and country.

The minimum membership subscription was placed at one dollar a month and every man having at heart the welfare of the town will be asked to join the organization.

Some advertising matter has already been ordered and the advertisement of the town will begin in an intelligent, systematic and persistent manner.

The next meeting is to be held on August 1st and in the meantime Secretary Miles and the members of the executive board hope to secure a membership of fully two hundred and fifty business and professional men.

The Times believes that right now is a mighty good time for every man in town to take hold of this proposition and help in the good work.

MANY OF THE COLUMBIA'S PAS-SENGERS WERE RESCUED.

TEACHERS AMONG DEAD

Many on Board the Steamer Had Been Attending Convention at Los Angeles.

San Francisco, July 23 .- The arrival of the steamship Pomona from the north is anxiously awaited today as she is known to have a number of the survivors of the steamer Columbia on board. It is hoped that the loss of life will not be as large as was first reported. It is known that of the 188 passengers on the Columbia, 97 were saved by the Geo. W. Elder, which towed the San Pedro to Eureka. There were sixty in the crew of the Cilumbia sengers and the crew leaving the total death roll at 98. So far only one boat has arrived at Shelter Cove. It is said that before the steamer sank, one boat and three life rafts were Colorade River New Under Control launched. These are yet to be accounted for and it is expected that steamers passing up and down the coast will succeed in picking up many who escaped. Not a few passengers on the Columbia were teachers and friends who had been attending the National Educational Association at Los Angeles.

Decatur, Ill., July 23.-Mrs. George E. Keller and three daughters whose names are included in the list of dead in the Columbia disaster were the wife and children of George E. Keller, Secretary of the Decatur racing association, one of the wealthiest stock men in Centarl Illinois.

Wichita Falls, Texas, July 23. To the Times:-

The remarks of a local merchant, quoted in your issue of yesterday and the numerous questions as to the matter which I, in common with other lawyers, am requested to answer, suggests to me that it would perhaps not be amiss for me to say a few words in regard to the new anti-trust statute so bitterly complained of. I was astonished to see such papers as the Dallas News and others give publication to the matter in "scare-head" style as an act threatening an innocent merchant who happened to handle trust made articles, with imprisonment in the penitentiary for from two to ten years. 'An inspection of the act as published in Saturday's News, did not bear out such a construction from Attorney General R. V. Davidson, the chief law officer of the state, which thoroughly explodes the "scare" and explains the true and legitimate purposes of the act. He says:



The Case of Joe Levan.

We are obliged to our esteemed contemporary, the Charleston News and Courier, for the simple story of Joe Levan, a negro barber of Sumter, South Carolina.

It is the rule of the Post never to permit an episode like this to pass without calling attention to it and we hope every reader will look elsewhere in today's Post and carefully peruse the story. It is especially desirable that the negroes of the younger generation read and ponder it. The lesson is too good to be lost.

Joe Levan died in Sumter the other day at the advanced age of 75 years. From emancipation to the day of his death he conducted an humble barber shop in Sumter and was patronized by the best people of the town. No rival could alienate his customers from him. When he died the white people atended his funeral by the hundreds and after the mound of clay had been raised above his dust the same white people, without solicitation, raised money and erected a monument to his memory, setting forth this eloquent tribute: "He was faithful as a slave and respected as a freeman. This stone is erected by his white friends as a tribute to his worth."

It was said of him: "He never performed a single spectacular service, but was simply faithful, courteous, honest and industrious throughout his life. He asked no favors from any man and was content to earn an honest living at his trade. In manner, he was polite and respectful, without a trace of severity; reserved and dignified in deportment and his word was better than many a white man's

It is a great deal to so live as to exact that kind of tribute from one's neighbors, and the man of whom such words may be truthfully spoken, be he white or black, has not lived in vain. They show, however, that the way of life for the American negro lies in fidelity, courtesy, honesty and industry. No negro will ever lack for friends who lives as Joe Levan lived. It is a regretable fact that few negroes of the younger generation ever regard the examples of these splendid negro characters to which the white people are always eager to render homage and respect.

There is nothing in vulgar self-assertion, indolence, immorality and impudence. There are millions of young negroes who are proving that every day. There is everything in honor, honesty, truth, courtesy, industry and self-respect. And our Northern friends, who are eternally concerned about the negro question, might well pause and ponder such cases as Levan's and many others like it which come to the surface nowadays whenever these courteous and industrious old negro gentlemen fall by the wayside to embrace death's eternal slumber.-Houston Post.

The treasury department is preparing to provide bankers in every part of the country with the new \$10 gold certificates in July. The new certificates were issued under authority of the Aldrich act in order to supply the demand for more currency of small denominations. Like the \$20 gold certificates, the back of the new note is printed in orange ink and there is some color on the face of the bill. LAST OF "LORD BARRINGTON."

With this week the career of the most remarkable and versatile criminal of recent years will come to an end, unless Governor Folk interferes. Next Thursday is the day set for the execution of Frederick Seymour Barrington at St. Louis. He is an Englishman, the son of a coachman, but he has always posed as a man of noble birth. When only 7 years of age he was sent to prison for five years for arson. Since that time he has served terms in prisons in Germany, France, Spain, India and the United States. His crimes ranging from petty larcency to murder. He first made his appearance in the United States in 1888, when about 30 years of age and masqueraded as "Lord Barrington England," Within a year he had married Celestine Miller, the daughter of a wealthy Brooklyn family and after squandering her fortune, left her penniless in London. Soon after he married a wealthy Canadian girl, whom he deserted after spending her money. la 1902 a Philadelphia heiress became his bride, only to be deserted soon after she had settled a large part of her fortune on her worthless husband. Nothing more was heard of Barrington until he appeared in St. Louis. in June, 1903, he was arrested, charged with the murder of James P. Mc-Cann, a St. Louis horseman, who had befriended him. He was convicted. but fought the case at every turn. In the end, however, his sentece was affirmed by the Supreme Court of the United States. His only hope now is that Gov. Folk may interfere at the last moment in his behalf.

SPEED IN CITY LIMITS MUST NOT EXCEED EIGHT MILES AN HOUR.

Specific Instruction for Auto Owners as Provided by the New Law.

Wichita Falls is acquiring a goodly number of automobiles and as there has been some speculation as to just what the new law as passed by the last legislature provides concerning the owners and users of these vehicles, the Times publishes the bill relating to them in full.

An act to regulate the running of automobiles and motor vehicles, and the requiring of the owner of such machine to register his name and the number of his machine with the county clerk of the county in which he resides, for the violation of which a penalty is provided.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the legslature of the state of Texas: All owners of automobiles or motor vehicles shall before using such vehicles or machines upon the public roads. streets or driveways, register with the county clerk of the county in which he resides, his name which name shall be registered by the county clerk in consecutive order in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall be numbered in the order in of their registration. and it shall be the duty of such owner or owners to display in a conspicnous place on said machine the numre so registered, which number shall be in figures not less than six inches n height. The county clerk shall be paid by such owner or owners a fee of 50 cents for each machine regis-

Secoth 2. No automobile or motor rehicle shall be driven or operated upon any public road, street or driveway at a greater rate of speed than eighteen miles an hour, or upon any public road, street or driveway withthe built up portion of any city town or village, the limits of which shall be fixed by the municipal officers thereof, at a greater rate of speed than eight miles an hour, except where such city or town may by ordinance by-law allow a greater speed, provided the speed limit shall not apply to race courses or speedways.

Section 3. No person in charge of an automobile or motor vehicle on any public riad, street or driveway shall drive the same at any speed greater than is reasonable or proper, having regard to the traffic and use of the public road, street or driveway by others, or so as to endanger the life or limb of any person thereon.

Section 4. All drivers or operators if automobiles or motor vehicles are prohibited from racing upin public road, street or driveway.

Section 5. Any person driving or operating an automobile or motor vehicle shall at the request, or signal by putting up the hand, or by other visible signal from a person riding a horse or horses or other domestic animal, cause such vehicle or machine to come to a standstill as quickly as possible and to remain stationary long enough to allow such animal to pass.


