At the time of the first conflagration six or seven thousand acres in the heart of the forest were swept bare of its foliage. This fire did its damage one mile east of the home of the for-

Saturday evening a fire was discovered in the western part of the preserve and before the flames were extinguished nearly seven hundred acres of fine hay land was ruined for the season. The other fires were in the eastern part of the reserve.

No other regulation of forest pro visions are more often violated than that of setting or leaving fires burning on or near the reserve. In this manner many of the fires which play havoc with the government property, grown and cared for after many long years of hard labor, are started.Lawton

AGAINST ICE CREAM SUPPERS.

Archbishop Glennon Scores Plan of Raising Money for Churches.

Archbishop Glennon, in his dedicatory sermon at the new Church of the Blessed Sacrment, King's highway and Northland avenue, yesterday expressed disapproval of the raising of money for the erection of churches by giving ice cream suppers and dancing parties.

He declared that church building and maintenance was a duty that should be met by the parishioner in accordance with the dignity of the responsibility.

"Some build churches by dancing," the prelate said, "others by giving ice cream parties, suppers, picnics and various other means by which people are cajoled and humored into giving. I do not like the sideways and byways of getting money for worthy causes.

"The only way in which to properly build a church is for the parishioner to estimate its cost and pay for it, not by giving 10 cents for a dish of ice cream and 5 cents to the church.

CONDITIONS ON MARS.

Days and Years and Light and Heat on the Red Planet.

The days in Mars are of about the same length as ours-24 hours, 39 minutes, 23 seconds. Mars makes her orbit around the sun in a little more than 686 days; therefore the seasons are almost twice as long as they are with us. The atmosphere of Mars is rich in watery vapors. Oceans can be seen, and at the poles thick ice, which melts when summer comes. The variations in temperature are extreme. Mars receives only half as much solar heat as our globe does. The sun appears half as large, and the nights receive their light from two moons, which are smaller than ours-Deimos and Phobos.

The weight is such that one of our kilograms would only weigh 376 grams there. A man is only able to carry his own weight on his back. Transported to Mars, he could carry three times as much, something like 225 kilos. In taking observations of Mars through the telescope one can see a distinct red disk, marked with more or less brilliant spots. Some of the spots which are greenish are the oceans; other very red ones are the continents, greater in extent than the oceans, which is the opposite to the way the earth is disposed. The most brilliant spots are the ice covered regions of the poles, and the clouds are almost equally bright. The atmosphere of Mars is more transparent than ours, and its sky is incomparably clear.

The waters of Mars are more divided and distributed in inland seas joined by long arms, which are sometimes incurving, but oftenest almost rectilinear, and which mark the brilliant surface with dark lines, just as the line of lead divides the panes of glass in our church windows. All these dark lines form a pattern which is relatively symmetrical and which does not seem to have been made by chance. A plan so regular must have been designed, and for a long time the observers of Mars have been disposed to consider these lines as canals dug by the inhab-itants of the planet for the needs of their civilization.-Charles Torquet in Metropolitan Magazine.

## Ads COINS THAT ARE BASE

Metals and Methods Used In Making Counterfeits.

HOW THEY MAY BE DETECTED

Spurious Coins Cannot Stand the Three Tests of Weight, Diameter and Thickness-Gold Pieces That Are Sweated, Plugged or Filled.

The most dangerous counterfeits are struck from a die and are usually tuiltations of gold coins. Molds of various kinds are extensively used, but counterfeits so made are inferior to those made with a die.

In counterfeits made from a mold lettering, milling and reeding are usually poor and weight defective. The coins lack the sharp and clear cut appearance of genuine colu. Most counterfeit silver coins in circulation are made from molds, as it is an inexpensive form of counterfeiting. Some fair specimens have been produced in this way, but usually they are much lighter than the genuine and if of required weight differ in diameter or thickness

Various metals are used by counterfeiters, principally platinum, silver, copper, brass, antimony, aluminium, zinc, type metal, lead and their numerous compositions.

Among the most dangerous counterfeits of gold coin are those of a composition of gold, silver and copper. They are a low grade gold, and the acid test shows they lack the fineness of standard gold used by the United States mint, which is 900 fine, or 21.19 carats. These counterfelts average from 400 to 800 fine. Platinum counterfeits are dangerous, as the metal used gives required weight, and they are heavily gold plated. When they have been in circulation for a time the plating wears off, especially on the

The most dangerous counterfelt of silver coin is made of a composition of antimony and lead, the former metal predominating. These counterfeits are of the dollar, have a fine appearance, are heavily silver plated, with fair ring, and some are only slightly below the standard weight.

Some pieces among the smaller coins are made of brass, struck from a die, and when heavily plated are fair imitations. They lack required weight, except in a few instances. Counterfeits of type metal, lead and other compositions are much lighter than genuine. Those having required weight are much too thick.

Genuine coins of all kinds, for the sake of gain, are tampered with in various ways. These operations are confined almost exclusively to gold colus, which are sweated, plugged and filled.

Sweating is removing a portion of the gold from surface of coin. The process does not interfere with the ring, and as the portion removed is gen? erally slight the coin is left with a very fair appearance, weight only being defective. The principal methods of sweating are the acid bath, filing the edges or reeding, the operator finding a profit in the small quantities of gold removed from numerous pleces. The average reduction in value of coins subjected to these processes is from one-twentieth to one-tenth.

Plugging is done by boring holes in the coin, extracting the gold and filling the cavity with a cheeper material. The larger coins-double eagles and eagles (twenty and ten dollar pieces)-are used for this purpose. The small surface of the plugging material, where it shows on the edge of the coin, is covered with gold and the reeding retouched with a file or machine. The average loss in value to coins treated in this way is from one-eighth to one-sixth. Coins of this kind are very dangerous, as they are perfect in appearance, only the edges having been tampered with.

Filling is most commonly done by sawing the coin through from the edge or reeding, removing the interior portion and replacing it with a cheap metal. Coins of all denominations from quarter eagle to double eagle are subjected to this process. When platinum is used to replace gold extracted the coin has same weight as genuine. By this process coins lose four-fifths of their value, as the original surfaces are

left only of paper thickness. When edges have been covered with gold and reeding restored the coin has the appearance of being genuine, have ing correct size and weight and a fair ring. Sometimes the covering of gold on edges is so thin that filling can be distinctly seen. When other and less costly filling than platinum is used coins are of light weight and have a bad ring. If of correct weight they are too thick.

Another method of filling is sawing the coin partly in two, from edge of reeding, on one side, leaving a thin and thick portion. The thin side of the coin is turned back and the gold extracted from center of thicker portion. 

## LACK OF BIG MEN

REPUBLICANS ENFOLD MEN WHO WOULD BE DEMOCRATS.

### SOLID SOUTH BREAKING

Missouri, Kentucky and Maryland Are Gradually Slipping Out of the Democratic Fold.

Washington Court House, Ohio, Aug. 26.—Senator Benjamin Tillman of South Carolina, by word of mouth, has divorced the democratic party from its union of strength in Maryland, Kentucky and Missouri. The senator, discussing political conditions generally, declared those three States, hitherto democratic in national politics, except in the one instance of Missouri's lapse to Roosevelt, would soon be as strongly republican as they were democratic. He said:

"If things keep on at the present rate, the States of Missouri, Kentucky and Maryland, long democratic by reliable majorities, will be as reliably republican. If not in the next election, then in the next two or three. The influx of colored republicans from States further south, whence they come to work in the coal and other mines, is responsible for the transformation of these States from the democratic to the republican column.

Nothing to Offset Change.

"The democratic party seems to have nothing to offer by which to offset this increase in republican voting strength. In the north there is only one democrat of calibre and that is William Jennings Bryan. Where is there another Northern democrat who is worthy to unlatch his shoes? The republican party weaned us from the young men who naturally would be democrats by the opportunities for advancement, political and otherwise. There are no Allen G. Thurmans, Tenator Voorheeses and other democrats of that type in the North these days.

"The young man entering politics realizes in the North that if he ever expects to hold a political office or reap any reward or become distinguished as a statesman or politician, he must proceed to identify himself with the repulican party. Usually he does, for the republicans have gained many from the democrats who later have become big men in the republican party. It is this buying of the young man of the North that has stripped us of our big men at the North."
