ROCK-RIBBED FOUNDATION.

Money is Generally Distributed and Financial Storms in Wall Street Do Not Disturb.

That there is a slight tightening of money circles in the East in readiness for the approaching presidential campaign, is the unqualified statement made by Osmer Alexander, a New York banker, now in San Antonio on his way to Mexico to examine into certain Mexican railroad securities which Mr. Alexander's firm holds.

That this stringency will probably or even possibly reach Texas is scouted by the financier. He asserts unqualifiedly that the Eastern flurry cannot penetrate the Southwest, and says that Wall street and Eastern money centers are now powerless to cause flurries in the great stretch of virgin country such as go to make up the Lone Star

"Whoever or whatever is responsible for your insurance law passed by the last Legislature," said Mr. Alexander, "it has certainly had one wholesome result; it will absolutely ward off all money panics in your state. As long as the farmers of Texas derive a reasonable agricultural yield from their land and so long as the revenue from that yield is spent at home, Texas cannot suffer.

"I cannot deny the fact that heretofore it has been the practice to consolidate the money of the country in Wall street, thus empowering the New York bankers to that extent that they could close their figures, bringing on a cry for money all over the land. This has been particularly true in the South. In the years past, the money of the country has flooded eastward, draining the great producing States, leaving them at the mercy of the boys on Wall street, one of whom I am not. With growing facilities and industries in Texas requiring the residence of capital at home, I cannot see that Texas need even fear a stringency, and as for a panic, such as that of 1893, they are things of the historic yesterday. With your insurance funds invested in Texas, where it is on call by the people of Texas, it looks good for you

"Tight money is due to vast concenrations of capital in financial institutions and the refusal on the part of the officers of those institutions to release at call, through fear of collateral, prevailing conditions, fall in stock and real estate values, etc. If this money is not consolidated, but is generally distributed in the banks of the country there is no tightening and the farmer can get what he wants by putting up his horse or his cow or his land, as the case may be, and as for the merchant, tne banker, the doctor, the lawyer, and those who live in the cities, they never get tight run for money until the farmers and cattlemen get tight run. From my travels over the Southwest it looks as if the money is pretty generally distributed, and I defy Wall street to affect you if every dollar in the National City bank goes into retirement for a span of fifty years."

"To what do you attribute the condition in Eastern circles?" Mr. Alexander was asked.

"Undoubtedly to the approaching presidential campaign and the uncertainty of the outcome. On the one hand is the Roosevelt-Taft organization, with its quasi anti-corporation policy and its quasi-proposal to revise tariffs, and on the other side is the Cannon crowd proposing to leave the tariffs unchanged. The tightening is part due to fear on the part of Wall street of the presidential outcome and partly due to a desire on the part of the same crowd to administer a severe SEVENTH STREET.

A WATCH PROBLEM.

Telling the Time In the Dark With the Hands Removed.

Some time ago a poor old peasant

who had invoked the king's wrath was seized by the king's soldiers and placed In a dungeon, says the Scientific American. His majesty was present and lad the old man searched before being incarcerated. All his personal property consisted of a cheap watch, a small penknife, a shilling in cash and a lead pencil. The poor old man begged for mercy, but his pleadings availed him nothing, and he finally asked to be granted the privilege of knowing the length of his sentence. In reply the king took his knife and watch, which lay on the table, and, after taking the knife and prying the hands off the watch, returned to him his watch, saying, "When you have learned to tell the time correctly by this watch in your dungeon cell you will be liberated." The poor old man, knowing that the king meant a life sentence, staggered into his cell and wept bitterly. Nevertheless he was liberated in twenty-four hours, having accomplished the wonderful task of telling the correct time in the dark with a watch without

hands. How did he do it? A watch derives its power of motion from the recoil of the mainspring, and the recoil is governed by the balance and lever. For instance, if it takes twenty-four full turns of the stem to wind the watch and the watch runs twenty-four hours when fully wound. then for each turn of the stem it will run one hour.

A more simple method is to hold the stem firmly between the fingers and turn the watch around. In winding the watch to run for one hour the ratchet on the mainspring will click, say, thirty times, which proves that this watch runs two minutes for each click of the ratchet which is attached to the mainspring. We will suppose it was 12 o'clock noon when the watch was last wound up and you now wish to know the time. Beginning to wind it up, you count the clicks and find that before it is again wound up fully the ratchet clicks 130 times. By dividing this by thirty we get four and onethird, or four hours and twenty minutes, which added to 12 o'clock makes A. NEWBY, Vice President. the hour 4:20 p. m.

While watches are not all exactly alike, the principle is the same, and it is simply a case of mental arithmetic in order to be able to tell the time. But you must always remember the time of the starting point or first winding and after that the time at the

In point of fearlessness and courage it surpasses any other animal that roams the chapparal of the southwest. It is one of the few wild animals that does not hesitate to attack man. It is feared by every deer hunter who visits this region. Innumerable instances are known of hunters having been forced to seek refuge in trees to escape javelins. President Roosevelt, when police commissioner of New York, made a trip all the way to Texas to hunt javelins, and spent two days on a ranch near Uvalde.
