TRAGEDY IN THE PRESENCE OF MANY GUESTS.

SNAPPED THE REVOLVER

From Which Chamber Had Been Removed—Cartridge Had Slipped Into Barrel.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 12.—William Landerson accidentally killed Miss Edna Calloway at the home of J. M. Ellis at 1451 Madison street last night in the presence of many guests. Both Anderson and the girl he killed lived in Kansas City and were visitors at the Ellis home.

According to the story told by Ellis, he and Miss Anderson were down town until 11 o'clock, when they returned home and found that several young women friends had called and in fun had hidden the pajamas belonging to the two men. He secured an automatic gun and remarked to Anderson that he would remove the magazine, so there would be no danger of a cartridge. However, a cartridge had slipped into the firing chamber, and when Anderson playfully pointed the gun at his sweetheart and demanded his pajamas, he pulled the trigger and sent a bullet into her head.

REPORT BY WIRELESS

LUSITANIA 150 MILES EAST OF SABLE ISLANDS LAST NIGHT.

HER SPEED IS DECREASING

Vessel Moving Slower, Probably on Account of Fog, But is Expected to Lower Records.

New York, Sept. 12.—Judging from the latest wireless report received from the steamer Lusitania, reporting the vessel 150 miles east of Sable Islands at 11:20 last night, it looks as if the big Cunarder will not reach Sandy Hook until about 7 a. m. Friday. If she does this she will beat the record of the Lucania and Deutschland, but not so much as was expected yesterday. There seems to be a marked decrease in the speed of the steamer yesterday, probably due to a fog.

WELLMAN SENDS WORD.

On Aug. 31 Prospects for His Airship's Start for the Pole Were Unfavorable.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 10.—A special cable to the Record-Herald from Spitzbergen, dated Aug. 31, via Tromsø, Norway, Sept. 10, signed by Wellman, says:

"The airship has been waiting for a fortnight for an opportunity for a trial trip and start to the Pole. It is ready to depart at any hour. Strong winds have been blowing constantly from the North for three weeks, and it is impossible to take the ship from its anchorage without causing instant destruction."

It has been the stormiest summer known in Spitzbergen in thirty years. The winds during August have averaged about the same velocity as during August last year.

Nearly all are from the north and a blizzard is now brewing. We shall wait a few days more for favorable weather for starting. After that the sun will be too low to permit a voyage."

If the America starts the crew will consist of three men, Wellman, Vanisman and Riesenberg. Major Hersey will be left out because of illness.

THE CZAR IN DANGER

IMPERIAL YACHT WITH ROYAL FAMILY ABOARD AGROUND.

MASSES WITHOUT NEWS

Authorities Forbid Newspapers to Publish a Word on the Subject.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 12.—No official announcement was made up to 1:30 this afternoon regarding the grounding of the imperial yacht Standart off Horseshoe, Finland, yesterday. News has been withheld from the masses and the newspapers are forbidden to publish a word on the subject. The Associated Press, however, learns that the grounding of the yacht, on board of which were Emperor Nicholas and Empress Alexandra and family, occurred yesterday afternoon. The Standart lies in a most unfavorable position upon some rocks which are submerged at high tide. News of the disaster was telegraphed to the naval authorities and several ships hastened to the scene. The imperial family left the yacht at 10 o'clock last night.

WAS ORDERED BACK

VANCOUVER'S MAYOR WARNS CAPTAIN AGAINST LANDING ASIATIC LABORERS.

UNIONS SERVE NOTICE

Employers of Asiatics Threatened Strikes and Boycotts—Attempt to Land Hindus Delayed.

Ottawa, Canada, Sept. 12.—Advices from Vancouver state that the mayor of Vancouver warned the captain of the steamer Montague, which has on board 114 Japanese, 149 Chinese and 941 Hindus that he would be unable to guarantee safe landing there, because the unionists had expressed a determination to resist the immigration of any more Asiatic laborers. The vessel turned back to Victoria, where the Asiatics were landed.

Must Replace Asiatics With Whites.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 12.—A special from Vancouver says that with a subscription started by Mayor Bethune it was planned yesterday to ship to Ottawa on a chartered train the 941 Hindus who arrived on the steamer Montague. Fearing trouble here, the steamer was turned back to Victoria. The Japanese on the steamer were landed there yesterday. Last night an attempt was made to land the Hindus. An immense crowd gathered and the officials, fearing to let the Hindus face the crowd unprotected, held them on the vessel all night, announcing that they would be landed today. The labor unions yesterday served thirty days notice on the employers of Orientals to replace the foreigners with white labor. A refusal is to be met with strikes and boycotts.

Tokio Papers Deplore the Incident.

Tokio, Japan, Sept. 12.—In a leading editorial to be published tomorrow, the Hochi greatly deplores the fact that an incident similar to that of the San Francisco affair occurred at Vancouver, which is a part of the territory of an ally of Japan.

The Jiji believes the trouble at Vancouver was occasioned by the increased arrival of Japanese laborers from Hawaii after the enforcement of the exclusion measure by the government at Washington, coupled with contagion of anti-Japanese sentiment rampant on the Pacific coast of the United States. This had fanned the anti-oriental sentiment which had existed for several years in British Columbia and had only been prevented from assuming legal form by the attitude of the Dominion government. The paper, however, emphasizes the fact that the outbreak at Vancouver, like the trouble at San Francisco, is only local.

The Hochi publishes the experience of a high Japanese official who visited a place near Vancouver, where the Japs are engaged in salmon fishing. He went in company of the Japanese consul and men interested there, and states that the Japanese laborers insulted the party, saying, "You have no business here; run away or receive our fist." The paper quotes this Japanese official as saying that the Japanese were the roughest and rudest he had ever seen. They were totally ignorant of common politeness and he did not wonder they had become the object of hatred.

WILL GO TO ST. LOUIS.

Davidson and Lightfoot Will Attend Meeting of Attorneys General.

Austin, Tex., Sept. 11.—Attorney General Davidson and Assistant Attorney General Lightfoot will leave Austin the latter part of the month to attend the convention of Attorneys General to be held in St. Louis on the last day of September and the 1st of October. Judge Lightfoot is down on the program for a paper on remedial legislation, his work in the Waters-Pierce Oil and other trust litigation having attracted the attention of the prosecuting officers in other States.

The Attorneys General will confer as to co-operation in the matter of prosecutions for violating the anti-trust laws and the program is to arrange for the distribution of data and evidence gathered against a trust which operates in other States and provide for concerted attack. Since the preliminary conference and the suit against the harvester trust the attorney general of Kansas sent an assistant to Austin, who conferred with Messrs. Davidson and Lightfoot for three days. As the harvester company is on the gridiron in Kansas it is presumed that this was the topic and possibly other concerns which operate in Kansas and Texas.

FAVORS AMENDMENT

NEBRASKA'S GOVERNOR WANTS POWER OF FEDERAL COURTS LIMITED.

POWER OF INJUNCTION

Right to Enjoin State Officials From Enforcement of State Laws.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 12.—Because of a restraining order granted by Judge Munger of the federal court, to prevent the railway commission from promulgating the grain rate schedule, Governor George L. Sheldon today declared himself in favor of a constitutional amendment taking from the federal courts the right to enjoin State officials from enforcing the State laws. He believes the federal courts have abused the privilege of injunction enough to justify such action. He said: "Too many State laws have been tied up by the interference of the federal courts. I don't believe the makers of the constitution ever contemplated such a use of the injunction in the hands of the federal courts."

TO GRADE PUBLIC ROADS.

Business Men of Stamford Want \$10,000 and Raise Half.

Stamford, Tex., Sept. 10.—The business men of Stamford are raising money by subscription among themselves to grade and improve the public roads leading into the town and have already secured over \$4,000 and expect to make it \$5,000 before they stop. They realize that nothing will help the town more than good roads, and cannot wait for the county to do the work under the present road law. Farm lands are getting valuable and are being cut up into small farms, and good roads are absolutely necessary to meet the demands.

AN IMPORTANT SUIT

VALIDITY OF THE FOURTEENTH AMENDMENT WILL BE ATTACKED.

GEORGIA RAILROAD CASE

State Will Raise Issue in Railroad Rate Litigation Now Pending in Courts.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 11.—The State of Georgia will attack the validity of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States in the pending railroad rate litigation that has been instituted in both the State and Federal courts. The State will also make the point that the defendants in the suit have nothing to do with the enforcement of the reduced passenger rates. The two issues will be raised through demurrers now being prepared.

The Central of Georgia Railroad's suit to prevent the enforcement of the new rates is set for hearing Sept. 16 before Judge Newman or, some other United States Judge, and that of the Atlanta and West Point has been set for the same date in the Fulton County Superior Court.

Although questioned by many the validity of the Fourteenth Amendment has never been attacked in court. In the pending rate litigation the railroads seek protection of the Federal Government under the Fourteenth Amendment, alleging that the order of the Georgia Railroad Commission is confiscatory, because it denies them equal rights under the law. The point at issue in the Fourteenth Amendment is in the first paragraph, providing that " . . . No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws."

New York, Sept. 12.—The epidemic of infantile paralysis in this city is assuming alarming proportions, according to reports of the hospital physicians, who have the disease under observation in the hope of discovering the germ supposed to be responsible for the infection. There are now under treatment in the hospitals nearly four hundred children who have the disease in a well developed form and most of them will be hopelessly crippled the rest of their lives.

LAPPS ON DECREASE

AND WITH THEM THE REINDEER IS GROWING CONSTANTLY SCARCER.

SELL HERD FOR DRINK

Nomadic People Rapidly Diminishing, But No Other Nation Can Take Their Place.

The Lapps are decreasing in number. The most sanguine estimate of the numbers of the entire race in Norway, Sweden and Russia does not place them above 54,000. By some the number is placed far lower on the strength of trustworthy data. In Norway the number of Lapps is 3,000, of whom 2,500 are nomad Lapps and 500 settled. Since a certain number of Lapp families have abandoned their wandering habits, have built habitations here and there, and have endeavored, with more or less success, to imitate the life of the Swedish settler.

That the race must die out eventually is certain, and its diminution may be very speedy, though its complete extinction may be still far off, since there is no race that can possibly take its place on the high reindeer fjell. Yet even here we come upon a factor which has, perhaps, hardly been reckoned with. We mean the decrease of the herds of tame reindeer.

This has been going on in the last quarter of a century with striking rapidity. In one district alone in the last twelve years the reindeer have diminished from an estimated 30,000 to an estimated 7,000. This decrease is explained variously. The commonest and most plausible explanation, which carries the authority of men well qualified to judge, is the demand for reindeer flesh, which has been brought nearer to the Lapp by the opening of the Bohemian railway, has tempted them to part with their deer at a rate too rapid for their production.

The herds of reindeer which are taken off the high fjell down to their winter quarters, are now within four or five days of Stockholm, and there is a good demand for reindeer flesh. It is said that the Lapp, who is no more able to resist strong drink than any other half-civilized man, is plied freely with brandy, and in that state will part with his reindeer for a trifling sum, or even for a fresh bottle of spirits or two. And he goes back to his fjell stripped of half his herd, and with nothing to show for it.

But there is another cause also alleged, and that is by equally good authorities. It is said that Swedish state education is having upon the Lapp the effect which not uncommonly follows the early stages of learning. Every autumn Swedes and Lapps alike send down their children to the nearest national school, where they remain for the winter months, the Lapps in most cases having "seminaries" to themselves. And it is declared that in the case of both races alike, after a few years of this training, the youngest generation, when it comes to the age of choosing its way of life, shows an unwillingness to return to the hard out-door life of the homes of the interior.

Meat Market Laws.

The rules and regulations recently passed by the legislature governing the sanitary conditions of public buildings, coaches, etc., lays down some rigid laws for the meat markets, and it is said that Dr. Brumby is making every effort to see that the laws are strictly enforced. The rules pertaining to the meat markets are as follows, and are now effective:

"In every meat market, each room wherein meat is handled or stored shall be completely screened at doors, windows and other openings with not coarser than 14-mesh wire gauze, and such gauze when rusted or otherwise rendered pervious to insects, shall be removed and replaced with impervious gauze. Scraps of meat, offal and other organic matter shall not be left exposed to the atmosphere of the room, but must be kept in a closed receptacle, which same must be emptied at least once a day. Also the meat for sale shall not be kept exposed to the air except in such quantities as are needed for immediate use, but it shall be kept in refrigerators or ice chests.

"Every market must have a refrigerator or ice chest of suitable size in use which shall be scoured and aired thoroughly at least once a week, and oftener if necessary, so that it will be kept sweet and clean at all times.

"The floor of every meat market in this State shall be scrubbed once daily with water and concentrated lye, or other equally good disinfectant, said scrubbing to extend not only in front of the counters, but also behind the counters, and all floors covered with sawdust or sand, or in any way encumbered, so that scrubbing shall be changed, and said scrubbing must be done daily.

"No person suffering from tuberculosis or other infectious or contagious diseases shall knowingly be employed in any capacity in any meat market. All meat that is or becomes tainted or attacked by putrefactive bacteria, shall be either tanked or removed from the premises at once, and said meat shall not be stored in any ice chest or refrigerator. Chopping blocks shall be scraped once daily and counters thoroughly scoured. Knives, saws and other implements must be scalded and washed thoroughly daily.

"The penalty for violating any of these provisions is a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200 for each offense."

IN CONNECTION WITH TRAGEDIES

Four Men Arrested Following Mysterious Oklahoma Crimes.

Lawton, Ok., Sept. 11.—Four men, Henry Anderson and three sons, Geo., Mike and Royal Anderson, were arrested in their bunk car, in the Rock Island yards at El Reno, today in connection with the killing of the unknown and unidentified victims of the box car tragedies, which have caused so much mystery in Oklahoma. The bodies of the dead men were horribly mutilated, having the ears cut off. One was found in a Rock Island car at Chickasha and the other at Oklahoma City.

United States Marshal John Abernathy made the arrests, assisted by Rock Island detectives Darnall, Durbin and Beardon. The men were taken to Oklahoma City to await a hearing.

The International Paper Company, capitalized in 1898 at \$18,000,000, and operated under a charter granted by the State of New York, is controlling the paper market of the United States. Until every State in the Union passes a law making it impossible for a trust to collect a debt, the people will get but little relief. Such a law may not sound exactly right to some people, but it would only be paying the trusts back in their own coin. They resort to extortion, which, to use a harsher term, is nothing more than stealing, and if the laws of the United States legalize that sort of theft they might just as well go a step further and put the stamp of approval on the other kind.



Prof. Parnell sang a solo, "The Books Will Be Open," with good effect, and the sermon was up to the usual high standard. The "Old Book" was made to appear a more precious book than ever. No one who would reason and be fair could have listened to the sermon and not have said, "Surely the Bible is from God, and we can trust its promises and follow its directions with assurance that it will lead us to heaven and to God."

Brother Lockhart said no one felt afraid where the Bible is read and followed. Since the evacuation of the Acre, the section described has become the most notorious rendezvous for desperate negro criminals in the city. Scarcely a night passes without some crime or fight in the settlement.

Within the past three months five serious shooting affrays have occurred in this section and the police have named it the "Bucket of Blood." Three of the shootings resulted in murder cases and more than thirty arrests have been made there. The police have begun to look upon that locality with a feeling of apprehension and don't care to investigate any reported trouble there without the presence of fellow officers.

It was in the Bucket of Blood district that Vestus Patislo, a negro, fired on the police and was himself badly wounded last Saturday night in a pistol battle with Patrolmen Alken, Turner and Waller. As a result of this shooting affair Commissioner Mulkey has decided to assume personal charge of the cleaning out of the district and compel the habitues from the district to provide ample proof of an honest method of livelihood.

In speaking of the neighborhood on Tuesday morning, Commissioner Mulkey explained that the majority of the restaurants and saloons in the vicinity were nothing more nor less than blinds and pitfalls for the unwary stranger and unsuspecting youth, with the result that the present police protection was wholly inadequate toward stemming the tide of crime and providing ample protection. Chief of Police Maddox, upon receiving the orders, said that they would be carried out to the letter and that regardless of excuses the habitues of the vicinity would be compelled either to leave the city or else engage in respectable business.
