TAKING TESTIMONY IN A SUIT TO TO DISSOLVE THE STANDARD OIL COMPANY.

Has Been Introduced-Company Will Fight the Production of Its Books.

New York, Sept. 18 .- The taking of testimony here in the government's suit to dissolve the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey was resumed today before Special Examiner, ex-Judge Ferris. Frank D. Kellogg, the government's counsel, has already shown that the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey received reports regularly from nineteen subsidiary companies and that there was an exchange of stock certificates to the number of 972,000 between the main company and others. It's likely that a strenuous fight will be waged over the production of the books of the company, which Kellogg believes contain the minutes of the meetings at which the trustees issued shares of the Standard Oil Company in exchange for certificates of other companies

In 1899 the latter company's balance sheet showed the ownership of 2,747 shares of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company stock, valued at \$3,067,892. Fay was questioned about certain Central Trust Company certificates held by the Standard Oil Company between 1899 and 1904. His statement showed that stock of the National Storage Company was sold in exchange for Lehigh Valley railroad bonds and deposited with the Central Trust Company, which issued certificates in exchange. In 1905 these Central Trust Company certificates were exchanged for \$100,-000 cash and \$500,000 worth of four per cent bonds of the Lehigh Valley railroad company.

Profits Were Many Millions. Profits of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana in 1906 were \$11,516,082, and in 1904 were \$8,753,410. This corporation is capitalized at a million dollars, which was fined \$29,240,000 by Judge Lanids in Chicago, These figures were brought out in the hearing in the action by the federal government against the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey here today. The statement as presented shows that pany of Indiana was greater than the profits of any other company whose figures were given, except the Standard Oil Company of New York.

CROPS AROUND ELECTRA.

H. Cook Tells of Yelds and Conditions There.

Fort Worth, Tex., Sept. 16.-R. H. REPRESENTATIVES OF WATER Cook, of Electra,, Tex., who resides at the Waggoner colonoy, is in the city. He has just shipped seven cars of this season's crop of corn from his locality to McKinney.

"Our section will produce 100,000 bushels of corn for sale this year above what is consumed locally," said | Another Analysis Will Be Made to Mr. Cook tonight. r'The yield amounts to forty or fifty bushels per acre.

"Our wheat crop is also fine. Electra is the first place on the Denver railway from which any wheat has been shipped. We have already shipped 8,000 bushels and will ship as many more this season. The farmers were paid 95c per bushel for their wheat. We have also shipped from there this year 3,000 bushels of oats, for whch the farmers received 55c per bushel. Electra is the beginning of the only strip of country in that section of the State on which any grain whatever was produced this year. From there to the New Mexico line it has been free from the ravages of the green bugs.

"From Wichita county west up the Denver Railway cotton prospects are fine. We had an excellent rain last Monday morning. Cotton is fruiting nicely now with no insects to bother it. Republicans Elect Three Congressmen.

Oklahoma City, Ok., Sept. 18 .- The election returns so far received indicate that the Constitution has been adopted by a large majority, but the result of the vote on state wide prohibition may not be known for some time vet. For congress the following appear to be elected: First District, Bird S. McGuire, republican; Second, Thomas B. Ferguson, republican; Third, Frank Hubbard, republican; Fourth, C. D. Carter, democrat; Fifth, Scott Ferris, democrat. Both sides claim the election of governor, with Charles N. Haskell, democrat, apparently leading by a safe majority over Governor Frank Franz, republican. The election of a democratic legislature, which now seems probable, means the election of ter, said the fight for a new charter T. H. Gore, "the blind orator," and R. I. Later Returns.

Oklahoma City, Sept. 18.-Returns of yesterday's election throughout Oklahoma and Indian Territory indicate the profits of the Standard Oil Com-that the constitution has been adopted by a majority of at least 40,000 and that Haskell, Democratic candidate for Governor, will have a majority over Franz, republican, of 25,000. COMPANY MEET WITH THE CITY COUNCIL.

Test Method of Clarification Used By Laundry.

At a called meeting of the City Council last night Messrs. Henry Sayles, J. A. Kemp and R. C. and Charles Malone were present to discuss the water question with the memhers of the council.

Mr. Sayles spoke for the water com-

He said that the stockholders in the water company were as solicitous as any member of the council could be to furnish pure, clear water, not only for the increased revenue they would derive, but as a matter of pride as well. Mr. Sayles said that he had spent several months investigating the proposition. The water, he said, was a stained water, the color being an inseparable composition, which could be eliminated only by chemical action. This elimination could be accomplished only by the use of sulphate of fron and lime or alum. Sulphate of iron unfitted the water for boiler uses and alum rendered the water injurious to

These were the conditions which the company found by its investigations. They were willing and anxious to clear the water if some safe method could

Mayor Noble reported that the laundries got clear water and that probably their method might solve the problem. It was found upon investigation that the laundrymen used a certain brand of soda. It was decided to send samples of the water clarified by this method to competent chemists for analysis to see if it contained injurious MA properties, the representatives of the water company pledging that if the water was not injurious after this method had been used that they would adopt the same. No further action was taken in the matter.

Illegal Sales of Cocaine.

Frequent items in the daily press relate the arrest, trial and conviction of persons found guilty of illegally selling cocaine-not for medicinal use, but as a drug which furnishes a potent and easy form of exhiliration.

In this State, as in others, stringent laws regulating the sale of this powerful agent have been passed. They should at all times be rigidly enforced. Useful though it is in the hands of a skilled and conscientious medical practitioner, cocaine is a deadly curse in the hands of those who employ it for self-gratification. Pleasing in its effects, it eventually dulls the mental faculties, destroys the sense of right and wrong, and leaves its habitual user a complete and pitiful wreck if its ravages are not checked in time.

No person who willfully and knowingly sells it for illicit purposes is entitled to leniency from the courts. Such individuals are practicing the trade of slow poisoning for filthy gain; they should be made to suffer severely whenever they are caught.

COUNCIL CONTRACTS WITH EN

Employed to Make Estimates, Etc. and Supervise Work at Five Per Cent of Contract Price.

The City Council last night voted that the city enter into a contract with the J. W. Maxey Engineering and Construction Company of Houston and Dallas for a survey, plans, profiles, specifications for the proposed new sewerage system, also for the service of competent engineers to supervise the construction of the same.

The engineering company was represented at the meeting las night by Dwight T. Horton. Under the terms of the contract with the company, it is to make the survey, estimates, etc., and supervise the work for five per cent of the contract cost of the sewer. If for any reason the sewer is not built, the company is to receive two and one half per cent of the estimated

Mr. Horton says that he will have a corps of engineers here within the next ten days to make the survey.

The Saber Toothed Tiger Was a Formidable Creature.

The most remarkable of all the extinct feline animals are those known to naturalists as the saber toothed cats or tigers, a group comprising the greater part of all the fossil forms. They date back to the earliest times of which we know anything about the family in North America and reach down to the time of man himself. A large and powerful species described from the Indian Territory by Cope contemporaneously with the hairy mammoth, as evidenced by the commingling of their skeletons. There can be little or no question but that the hairy mammoth was contemporaneous with man in North America as well as in Europe. Its geological range is from the close of the eocene to the latter part of the pleistocene.

The chief peculiarity of the animal is the extraordinary elongated canine teeth. The tail is of unusual length and the legs are short. The animal measures about seven feet in length aside from the tail. The lower jaws have a downward projection in front, due to a flangelike widening of the jawbones, which doubtless served as a protection to the teeth, preventing their injury or loss. In some of the larger forms from South America this flange was not present, while the canine teeth were even more elongated than is the case with this species, attaining a length of over six inches and protruding far below the Jaws when

A FAMOUS ROAD:

India's Tree Bordered Highway 1,200 Miles In Length.

The road I have in my mind is in ndia and stretches 1,200 miles from Lanore to Calcutta, It is the famous Grand Trunk road. Let me explain its nature, though one cannot do so by comparison, for there is no road of five miles in England that is anything like it. It is level, Indeed, there is not above a mile the whole distance where even a lady need dismount to walk. The material with which it is made is called kunker, and if you care to turn that word into concrete you have an idea of what it is tike. It is exceeding ly hard and as smooth as a prepared pavement. There is no dust. When I first got on this road and enjoyed the luxury of easy traveling I said, "This is magnificent, but in a little time I suppose it will become gritty and uneven." I went 50, 100 miles, 200 miles, 500, 600, 700 miles, and it was always the same, with not even a small stone to give a jog. Nearly the whole of the way is lined with a double row of majestic trees.

"A lumber famine is confronting the United States," the secretary went on to say. "We have in the country now 150,000,000 government acres in forest reserves, and, with scientific forestration, this timber will be protected. There is great waste outside of the reserves, and the tendency is for lumber to go higher in prices. Private owners are not guarding against fires in the way they should. Last year only \$79,-000 of timber value was destroyed by fires in all the government reserves, while in the State of Washington alone \$350,000 of damages was caused by timber fires. These coast States contain the great future lumber supply of the entire country, and it should be scientifically guarded."
