CENTERED IN CEREMONIES AT THE BRUTON PARISH CHURCH

Presents Gift-Bishop of London Delivers Sermon-Statue of Colonial Minister Unveiled.

Williamsburg, Va., Oct. 5th.-With the Bishop of London preaching in the Burton Parish church, the oldest church in point of continuous use of the Anglecan-American denomination in the United States, the services here today attending the presentation of a vesture from President Roosevelt and a bible from King Edward were of a purely historical interest. It was by far the most imposing of the ceremonies in connection with the triennial convention of the Protestant Episcopal church in the United States now

A bronze relief memorial given by the church in memory of the life and service of Rev. Robert Hunt, the minister of the colony which landed at Jamestown May 13, 1607 was installed in the tower of the church and was exhibited for the first time today.

They report that the flame of the gas radius of more than eight miles about the well and since the well has been struck the citizens of Petrolia and the workers in the field have discarded their lanterns and can work at night as in the day time.

> A new string of drill rope 2700 feet n length is now in this city awaiting transportation to Petrolia.

> Work will be resumed Monday on the well which is already sunk to a depth of 1540 feet. It is planned to sink the well 2200 feet if a good flow of oil is not struck before that depth. Everybody at Petrolia confidently

> expects that the well will produce an oil gusher of such importance that Petrolia will at once become a leading center in oil production.

Local capitalists are already looking toward Petrolia as a gas producing territory and there is some talk of organizing to construct a ppe line to this city to furnish fuel. for local consumption.

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

Some liberal minded people will admit to you that a slight preliminary training is required before a serious attempt is made to criticise music, but, almost anybody with eyes is willing to embark buoyantly on the job of tearing a picture to pieces. This seems to be because the picture will stand without hitching. Moreover, it will patiently submit to all the verbal harpoons you find time and strength to throw, and the average friendly critic will find sufficient of both to make even a reasonably good painting look like a cross between a fourteenth century St. Sebastian and a hedgehog.

Music, on the contrary, is both prolonged and evanescent, and by the time the composition is finished and the applause has quieted down the critic has forgotten most of the good things he intended to say to its detri-

But the picture stays, irritating you by its mere passive endurance to the point where after awhile you feel that if you don't say something to destroy ward good than shutting them out from its smug self complacency it will go on

Peace in Central America Baltimore Sun.

Secretary Root's tour through South America and the Pan-American Congress at Rio Janeiro brought forth many evidences of the present cordial relations between the United States and the Southern republics.

The signing of a protocol in Washington a few days ago that will form the basis of a complete settlement of the debt problems that grew out of the secession of Panama, will remove the one remaining cause of friction with Colombia.

The task to which Secretary Root is devoting his immediate attention is to bring about a permanent peake in South America. The numerous dip lomats in Washington indicate that they are all willing to join in a peace compact. But, fearing to sacrifice its dignity, no one of these countries is willing to take the initiative. They look to the United States and Mexico to act as intermediaries, and this lends unusual importance to the coming visit of Secretary Root to President Diaz. Never were the relations between the United States and Mexico so intimate and cordial, and if Mr. Root can devise some plan, either in the form of a treaty or a federation, that will put an end to the perpetual wars in Central America, he will be likely to secure the hearty co-operation of President Diaz, and a feasible plan, put forth jointly by these two great powers, is likely to be adopted by Salvador, Honduras, Guatemala and Costa Rica, Though President Zelaya has the ambition to conquer his rivals and himself become the head of the United States of Central America, the other powers could bring to bear such pressure that Nicaragua would be forced into the agreement.

With assured peace and stable government the maintenance of the Monroe doctrine becomes easy and Latin-America presents the most inviting field for investment and development. If Secretary Root succeeds in bringing this about his fame is assured.
