



# FORMER IOWA MAN IN LOVE WITH GREAT LONE STAR STATE

### Hon. Cato Sells, of Cleburne, Talks of His New Home and Says Texas is a Land of Unlimited Resources and Boundless Opportunities.

The Cedar Rapids (Iowa) Evening Gazette prints the following interesting story:

Hon. Cato Sells, former United States district attorney for the northern district of Iowa, now president of the Texas State Bank and Trust company of Cleburne, Texas, who returned to Vinton a few days ago to close up some important legal matters in Benton county district court, was in the city Saturday evening, en route from Vinton to the western part of Benton county, on business. When Mr. Sells removed to Texas less than a year ago it was predicted by his many friends throughout Iowa that he would not completely sever himself from his old associates and interests, the result of years of active professional life, his close relations with several of the most successful financial institutions of Benton county and his acknowledged leadership in the Democratic party of the state, but his friends will now learn with regret that he has become wholly devoted to the Lone Star state, enthusiastically imbued with the unlimited future of the great Southwest, and fully determined to cast his lot permanently with his few friends and associates. Iowa will watch Mr. Sells' career in Texas with much interest. The man who has become a power in the state and national councils of his party, who enjoys to the fullest possible degree the intimate friendship and confidence of such men as William J. Bryan—the man who has been notably successful both as an attorney and as a director of the great business affairs through his unusual ability, his great energy and high sense of honor, must eventually become actively identified with the affairs of his adopted state.

#### Is in Love With Texas.

Agreeable to a promise made during a hurried call upon his return from Texas a few days ago, Mr. Sells on Saturday evening gave the following interview to a Gazette representative:

"About Texas? You ask me to tell you something of my new home. In the first place I could not if I would, and I would not if I could, say anything against my native state. I did not leave Iowa with the idea of finding everything better. Iowa is a great State. Perhaps it has a greater per cent of tillable land in proportion to the number of acres than any other State in the Union, and nowhere is the soil more productive or the people more patriotic and intelligent or more universally contented and happy, but the Southwest in general and Texas in particular now offers greater opportunities than any other section of the United States.

"I have been a Texan for something like eight months and when I say I am delighted with Texas and Texans, I am speaking with moderation. Texas is the west of the old South and for that reason Texans are largely Southern people and Southern conditions and Southern ideas prevail.

"You may not know that I am of Southern extraction. My mother was a Kentuckian and her parents were Virginians. While I love my old home and have thousands of friends in Iowa who are near and dear to me, I know everyone of them will congratulate me on the fact that I am now realizing the dream of my life. Since my babyhood when my mother each day told me the story of the sunny South, of the old plantation home and of its lovable people, it has been my irresistible impulse to live among and share in her love for the Southern people. I am now experiencing it all and I am gratified even beyond my highest expectations.

"Truly Texans are splendid specimens of good citizenship. Brave, brainy and generous, always ready to stand with unflinching devotion to con-

vicition, ever able to sustain themselves intellectually and never indisposed to concede to the force of logic or decline chivalrous courtesy to friend or foe. They are at once as brave as they are aggressive. A law-abiding, industrious, patriotic home-loving and devoutly Christian people.

#### Carpet Bag Rule.

"From their standpoint reconstruction, as administered, was altogether the most unwarranted cruelty of the Civil war and who will not justify them in that? All that the ravages of war brought upon the Southland is as nothing compared with the years of carpet bag rule following, and yet with all that this peerless people have come out from under the awful spell with a prosperity, under such conditions, unprecedented in the history of the world. Today they vie with every other good citizen, without regard to section, in their love for Old Glory and a universal desire for a reunited country, that shall know no North, no South, no East, or West, but a reunited country in fact as well as in name.

"Thousands upon thousands of Northern people are emigrating from Iowa, Illinois, Missouri and other middle Western States to Texas and they are being received with open arms. Northern people and Northern capital are not only welcome but thrice welcome and when they are in every way encouraged and given opportunity. It is the land of opportunity for both men and money. 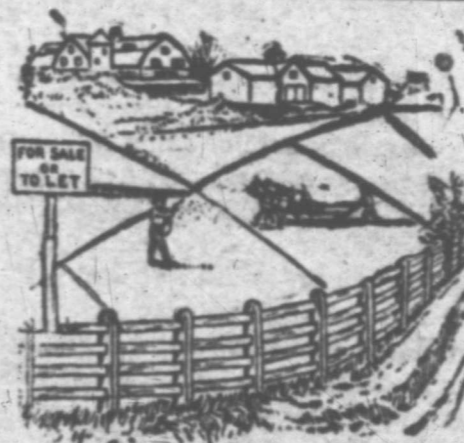

The police commissioner requested the officers to refrain from eating onions while on duty.

United States Attorney John Embry of Guthrie, acting in behalf of the Kiowa, Comanche and Apache Indians, interested in the sale and disposition of the big pasture reserve, this morning gave notice in the district court that he would appeal the Kell injunction matter to the supreme court.

Judge Gillette dismissed the case of the temporary injunction made by the government against the railroad town of Kell and John W. Fields, the original owner of the quarter of land on which the proposed town is located, upon a demurrer today. The court held that the petition of the United States does not state facts sufficient for a cause of action. When the demurrer was sustained the injunction was dissolved. Judge Embry asked of the court that the injunction be held in force, pending the appeal to the supreme court. Hearing on this will be held late this afternoon.—Lawton Democrat.

**A BUSINESS LESSON.**

**How Peter Cooper Taught One Man the Value of Money.**  
Peter Cooper was one of the most successful, careful and prudent business men of his time. "Well, if you wish," said Mr. Cooper, "I will discount your note at that rate for three years."  
"Are you in earnest?" asked the would be borrower.  
"Certainly I am. I will discount your note for \$10,000 for three years at that rate. Will you do it?"  
"Of course I will," said the merchant.  
"Very well," said Mr. Cooper. "Just sign this note for \$10,000, payable in three years, and give your check for \$800, and the transaction will be complete."  
"But where is the money for me?" asked the astonished merchant.  
"You don't get any money," was the reply. "Your interest for thirty-six months at 3 per cent per month amounts to 108 per cent, or \$10,800. Therefore your check for \$800 just makes us even."  
The force of this practical illustration of the folly of paying such an exorbitant price for the use of money was such that the merchant determined never to borrow at such ruinous rates, and he frequently used to say that nothing could have so fully convinced him as this rather humorous proposal by Mr. Cooper.

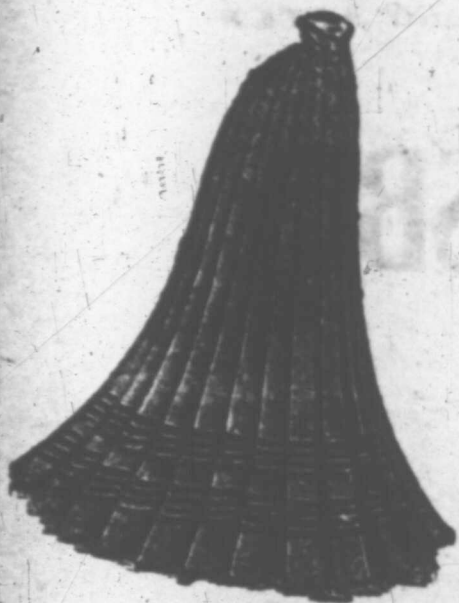

### PREIDENT KILLS BUCK.

**Weather Fine for Hunting—Roosevelt is Huntig Bob Cats Today.**

Stamboul, La., Oct. 10.—A courier who arrived from the president's camp on the Tenasas late this evening, reported that the president had killed a fine buck, but otherwise the hunt today was barren of results. The animal was brought down from a long distance and fell after the first shot.

The condition of the ground is much improved since the rain and the weather is still cool enough to render the exercise delightful to the president.

The president will continue his bear hunt tomorrow and next day in order to go after catamounts. A fine pack of fifteen dogs belonging to Dr. Miller of Greenville, Miss., with the doctor himself in command, arrived at Alsatia tonight and with them will go to the camp early in the morning. Major A. K. Amacker of Lake Providence, a prominent lawyer and sportsman, will join in the catamount hunt with the president.

### Value of Lime Water.

Lime water, being easy and inexpensive to prepare, should be kept in every household. To make it, place a piece of unslaked lime the size of an egg in an earthen vessel and pour over it one quart of clear, pure cold water. Allow it to stand a few hours, then filter through blotting paper, rejecting the sediment. Put into a clean bottle, cork and keep in a dark, cool place where it can be easily found when required. Lime acts very energetically on water and a teaspoonful of lime water put into a cupful of water or milk almost entirely destroys any deleterious substance there.
