The negro Johnson was twice sent to the penitentiary, once for an assault on a girl of his race.

The crime that cost him his life at the hands of an enraged people was an attempt to criminally assault a young girl who had gone on a visit to a neighbor's home. It was shown that the negro saw her go, waited two hours for her to return and then attacked her, threatening her with a gun he carried. After a struggle with her assailant the girl escaped before he succeeded in the completion of the

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IN LETTER TO PEOPLE OF TEXAS ATTORNEY GENERAL REPLIES TO SENATOR BAILEY.

Sarcastic References Made to Bailey's Charges-In Own Defense He Cites Fees Paid Senator.

Austin, Tex., Nov. 5 .- Attorney General Davidson yesterday made public his reply to Senator Bailey's latest communication. The communication of Attorney General Davidson is not addressed to Senator Bailey, but to the people of Texas.

General Davidson begins by declaring that in spite of the efforts of certain parties to discredit efforts of his departments its efforts with trusts have been crowned with successes. Continuing, General Davidson says:

"The assertion has been made in some newspapers and in public speeches and interviews that I entered into contract not to prosecute the Standard Oil Company, and in support of that charge Senator Bailey in his Abilene speech is quoted."

Here General Davidson reproduces that part of the senator's speech in Everything in HARDWARE which Senator Bailey said that the attorney general has entered into an agreement not to prosecute the Standard. In answer to this General Dav-

"The papers making this same charge published Gruet's testimony in their columns. Senator Bafley heard his testimony and had a copy of the same, yet notwithstanding that fact they assert that which he did not testify, but what he emphatically denied.

"No other witness than Gruet assumed to testify on that point. Therefore all such statements are predicated upon the testimony which he gave. He testified that he had not entered into any contract not to testify against the Standard Off Company, that he had no agreement or desire to protect them, that he had no interest in the Standard Oil Company.

As to Gruet's Testimony.

"His sole request was that the Standard and the Waters-Pierce Oil Company be not joined in the same suit, that to do so would prevent the case being tried properly and brought to a finish,' and for that reason he would not have anything to do with the case if it was so complicated.

"Nowhere in his testimony, searching as was the examination, does it ap- for the proof. pear that he ever requested or that any agreement was ever made that the Standard Oil Company should not be prosecuted: in fact, his testimony shows beyond cavil that the department was looking forward to bringing suit against other branches of the Standard Oil Company and that it has ever had that purpose in mind will be shown later."

Takes Shot at Bailey.

In substantiation of this statement Davidson reproduces Gruet's testimony taken during the Bailey investigation, after which Gen. Davidson says:

"It is obvious that his testimony has been grossly distorted and it is quite apparent for what purpose. No explanation and denial was therefore necessary at my hands as no person of sound mind who understands the English language can possibly construe his language into meaning that the Standard Oil Company was promised or granted immunity from prosecution.

"The only request made was that the two be not joined in the same suit. The witness shows that he had no interest in or desire to protect the Standard Oil Company. He had witnessed the many difficulties encountered by Mr. Hadley in his valiant fight against the Standard, the Waters-Pierce and the Republic Oil Company occasioned 2 by first one and then the other delaying the proceedings by dilatory tactics. ROADS LAYING OFF SPECIAL EMPLOYES

The ratiroads begin laying off every ear at the commencement of winter practically all workmen engaged in construction and improvement operations. The reduction of these forces has now begun and, by the time that the weather becomes so severe as to prevent activity on the lines, all the extra or special employes will be out of service.

The managers of the Southwestern and Western roads are now considering the number of men to be laid off and the work to be stopped. How many men will be retained will depend, to a great extent, on the work that can be N. HENDERSON. pursued during the winter.

The lines operating out of St. Louis have had such heavy traffic all year that they have been compelled to defer certain betterments to tracks, roadways and terminals. All locomotives and cars are used in the regular ser- DR. H. A. WALLER vice, in order to avert freight congestion at different points. Efforts will be made by several roads to carry on operations which they would have proceeded with earlier had circumstances enabled them to do so.

Conservative Policy. No new work will be done in the winter. Plans for extensions will, as a rule, be set aside until the roads see a chance of disposing of securities at reasonable rates and obtaining funds. Construction work practically will be abandoned for months.

As the volume of traffic diminishes train crews will be laid off. Owing to the heavy business, the men in this service have had unusually hard work and long hours. The roads have been DR. BOGER, unable to get enough trainmen. The number of men in the operating department will be reduced to conform to the volume of traffic.

Not very many employes can be laid off by the Southwestern and Western lines. These companies adopted a conservative policy early in the year, as a result of the agitation against the railroads, and they have only made such extensions as were necessary or desirable. Investments were concenexpeditious handling of traffic.



Remarkable Experience In a Lock In Compressed Air.

AT FORTY POUNDS PRESSURE

The Way It Feels When the Valve Is First Opened and the Chamber Fills With the Inrushing Air and Fog. Why You Don't Collapse or Explode.

As the lockkeeper turns the valve, writes A. W. Rolker in Appleton's Magazine, there is a scalp raising screech as if your ear were next the safety valve of a locomotive blowing steam, and as the inrushing air expands it fills the tiny chamber with fog so dense that you cannot see your hand before your eyes. Wider and wider the valve is opened, the fog becoming even denser and the racket increasing until the air fairly drones and your eyes and eardrums and your. very scalp tremble with the air that is vibrating about you. For the first time in your life you realize that sound may inflict physical pain and that there is a possibility that it may

No sooner is the big valve opened than you feel the pressure against your eardrums. THE PENGUIN.

Comically Serious In Mating -- Ita Wicked Flippers.

It is probable that penguins pair for life, although nothing definite is known on the subject. When mates are chosen the process is as interesting as it is striking. As is the case with so many creatures, the males fight with each other for the females, might being right in the penguin code. The birds have regular fighting places, and one such battleground was found under an overhauging ledge. The results of innumerable encounters were present in the shape of great quantities of loose feathers surrounding the little fighting ring, which itself was clear of all debris. Although the beak of a penguin is so formidable a weapon when used on thin skinned enemies, yet their own skin and blubber are so resistant that they can inflict no injury by this means. The customary mode of fighting is really a kind of boxing, or "flippering," it might be called The two combatants proceed to the fighting place and then walk cautiously about each other, jockeying for an opening and ready to take instant advantage of a false step or move on the part of the opponent. All, however, is solemn and decorous, consistent with the rest of the life of these strange little beings.

When at last each secures a good grip on the neck or body of the opponent the real fighting begins. As ninetenths of the life of penguins is spent on the open sea, where they pursue and capture fish, swimming with great swiftness by strokes of the flipperlike wings, it can well be imagined that the strength of their wings is very great, and when the two fighters begin to belabor each other with rapidly vibrating flipper strokes each resounding whack must make a considerable impression even on the protecting coat of blubber fat. No one has ever recorded the finish of such an encounter, but it is not probable that they result fatally. The weaker of the two must soon succumb under such severe punishment and yield the field and the fair penguin mate to his stronger rival. The strength of the wing strokes can be tested by allowing a penguin to take hold of one's coat sleeves or, better. the back of the hand. The third or fourth stroke will draw blood, and one is soon fully satisfied as to the penguin's ability in this respect. The tough skin and the loose, rolling blubber beneath, besides breaking a fall and protecting the hird from the icy waters in which it lives, sometimes subserve another most important purpose.-New York Tribune.

THE WEST POINT CHAIN.

It Was Nearly a Mile In Length and Weighed Almost 200 Tons.

From an ironmaker's point of view the greatest achievement during the Revolutionary period was the making of the great West Point chain. This massive chain, which has probably never had an equal since the first hammer struck upon the first anvil, was stretched across the Hudson river at West Point to prevent the British fleet from making a second attack upon Kingston and Albany. It was nearly a mile in length and weighed almost 200 tons, many single links being as heavy as an ordinary sized man. To complete it in six weeks sixty men hammered day and night at seventeen forges, and the cost of it was placed at \$400,000. "The great chain is buoyed up," writes Dr. Tacher, "by very large logs, pointed at the ends to lessen their opposition to the force of the current. The logs are placed at short distances from each other, the chain, carried over them and made fast to -so strong that treachery was tried where force of arms had failed. When Benedict Arnold was plotting the surrender of West Point he wrote Andre and said, "I have ordered that a link be removed from the great chain and taken to the smith for repair." The chain, however, remained in place till the end of the war, and links of it are still to be seen in the museums of Albany, West Point, Newburg and New York.-Exchange.

Quinsy Sore Throat.

The following mixture will generally quickly bring relief in case of a quinsy sore throat: Thirty grains of chloride of potash, three drams of tincture chloride of iron, four drams of glycerin and enough distilled water to make four ounces. The dose for an adult is one tenspoonful every hour until relieved To avoid the constipating effect of the iron a good dose of some saline laxative should be taken.-New York World.


Interesting Happenings Expected at San Antonio Campbell Banquet.
