SANTA FE HEAVILY FINED FOR GRANTING REBATES

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 8.-Judge Olin Wellborn in the district court yesterday fined the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad company \$330,000 for rebating. The fine was what the court denominated an "intermediate the possibility of a maximum sentence, presidential boom. and yet sufficient intention of wrongminimum penalty. The Santa Fe company was convicted on October 11th last by a jury in the Federal court of granting rebates to the Grand Canyon Lime and Cement Company of Arizona. It was found guilty of all the sixty-six counts charged in the indictment after but an hour's deliberation. The rates which were given on shipments of lime and cement from Nason, Arizona, to Los Angeles ranged in amount from 35 cents to \$15. The company claimed that these amounts were not rebates on the regular freight rate, but were in the form of damages to goods which were allowed after such claims had been regularly presented and proved in each instance. RAILROAD PRESIDENT CLOSES LENGTHY MISSION OF "MEET-ING THE PEOPLE."

ASKS THEIR CRITICISMS

Addresses Various Commercial Bodies. Seeking to Cement Relations Into Closer Ties.

Preaching a doctrine of closer relations between railroads and the public, to the end that each might better understand the other, Frank Trumbull has just closed what has been in many ways the most remarkable tour of any railroad president over Texas prop-

Nine days were consumed by Mr. Trumbull and party, including Vice President D. B. Keeler, General Superintendent George F. Cotter, General Freight Agent W. F. Sterley of the Denver road and others, in inspecting! the Denver road, the Wichita Valley route and the Abilene and Northern road. This was an extremely slow inspection trip, but it afforded exceptional advantages for closely observing what is necessary to the improvement and betterment of the lines.

Stops were made at almost every

station of any importance and where President Trumbull did not make formal speeches to gatherings of business men, he mixed and mingled among them, generally "met the people" and invited their suggestions as to posible service betterments. At Wichita Falls, Childress, Amarillo, Stamford and Abilene enthusiastic-receptions were tendered him by bodies of business men and prominent citizens. In these towns he addressed assembled citizens, expressing renewed faith in Texas and giving reiterated utterance to his belief, expressed first to Fort Worth business men, and the explanation for at least some adverse railroad legislation is found in the fact that relations between the railroads and the public have not been as open and friendly as they should be. He advocated all legitimate publicity of railroad affairs and repeatedly declared hat when the public is informed on intricate railway subjects there will be no cause for uneasiness as to the

"State laws generally represent what legislators think will meet the approval of the masses of the people, he says, "and when the public is uninformed on the cost of railroad operation, etc., almost any kind of a law formed as to raffway affairs and to generally cater to the favor of public opinion, and with no antagonism existing, there need be no fear that railroads will not get a "square deal."

"Laws that injure railroads injure the public, because under hampered situations common carriers cannot give that service which conditions demand," is one way President Trumbull sums up the proposition.





Our Planet's Core Is Liquid, Ye It's as Rigid as Steel.

INDER ENORMOUS PRESSURE

Neither Rock Nor Metal Could Remain There In the State In Which We See It on the Surface-The Lava That Breaks Through the Earth's Crust.

The idea that the interior of the globe is composed of flowing lava has long since been abandoned, but the picture that modern science offers of the inside of the earth is hardly less ap patling. All investigations unite to prove that the heat increases as we descend deeper in the terrestrial crust at such a rate that forty or fifty miles down no substance with which we are acquainted could remain unmelted. And yet the same science tells us that the core of the globe is enormously more rigid than the hardest steel. This ap parent contradiction is due to the tre mendous pressure inside the earth. No rock and no metal can remain there in the state in which we see it on the surface. Its molecules must lose the adherence, characteristic of solid bodies in consequence of the heat, but still they are not free to flow like an ordinary liquid, because of the compression to which they are subjected.

The phenomena of earthquakes have given wonderful information about the internal state of the globe. All ob servations show that the shocks of earthquakes are confined to a thin upper shell. They originate at a depth of only a few miles at the most. But the vibrations which they set going are felt all through the earth, often extending to the antipodes. The great core, held rigid by the pressure, is extremely elastic, and it responds to a shock like a ball of steel or of glass. The density of the earth increases toward the center. It is only in the upper part of the crust that local movements can take place, causing shocks and changes of level at the surface. Deeper down everything is gripped and immovable, except, as already remarked, that the molecules of the rocks and metals there are subject to vibration like those of a bell against which a blow is struck

But this is not all. Whenever a local release from the pressure is brought about by changes near the surface the potentially liquid but effectually solid core at that point may suddenly become fluid and gush forth through a volcanic throat or other vent. But such effects cannot extend to any great depth. Nothing comes to us from the vast interior mass. That remains a perpetual mystery, far beyond the searching hand of science. Indirectly, however, we may learn much about it, Astronomical considerations throw a great deal of light upon the subject. We see that through the planetary system rotating globes are flattened at the poles. The same thing is true of the earth. Its equator bulges; its polar regions are drawn inward. Mechanical laws assure us that the cause is, to be found in the fact that the earth and the other planets have assumed shape under the influence of the centrifugal force of their rotation. That equator. Beginning as completed molten bodies, they have commenced to solidify at the surface after having assumed an elliflordal form due to their

Another very significant fact is that the shape of the earth corresponds with that which a globe rotating with its velocity would have if composed of materials arranged to their densitythat is to say, growing denser toward the center. The heaviest materials must be deep down in the globe; the lighter materials have remained at the surface. This again corresponds with the facts of observation. We know the total "weight" and the average density of the earth. It "weighs" six sextillions of tons, and its average density is five and a half times that of water. But the substances composing the crust of the earth have an average density of twice that of water. It follows that the heaviest things in the earth, on the average, exist deep within its exterior. For all that we can tell, its inner core may be wholly metallic. At the center there is probably an enormous aggregation of dense metallic substances.

An indication that the inner parts of the earth consist largely if not mainly or iron is to be found in the magnetism of the globe. The earth is a great permanent magnet. If we could learn the facts it might turn out that iron is the most abundant substance in the solar system and perhaps in the whole universe. The majority of the meteorites that fall upon the earth consist of solid iron. Blow the earth to pieces and in the resulting cloud of fragments the rocks that we are familiar with would be almost imperceptible. There would be a rain of iron and other metals descending upon the moon and upon any other attract-
