She admitted as much whenshe came here to see the body of the senator after the tragedy, before it was taken west by his children for burtal. It is said that Mrs. Bradley first learned of the engagement between the senator and Mrs. Adams a few days before the killing.

It is now nearly a year since the tragedy occurred in the Hotel Raleigh. where the senator was shot in his apartments by Mrs. Bradley after a stormy interview; At the emergency hospital where he lingered between life and death for several days, Senator Brown steadfastly refused to talk and refused all the opportunities of the police to make a statement of the affair.

Senator Brown's relations with Mrs. Bradley had extended over many years and were one of the causes that led to the separation from his first wife. Senator Brown came to Washington early last December on business. He registered at the Hotel Raleigh. Mrs. Bradley followed him a few days later and registered at the same hotel. She was analigned to a room on the same floor. Late in the afternoon of her arrival, after learning which was the senator's room, she went to it and rapped. After a short conversation, ies of the wounded man brought the notel employes to the room.

Mrs. Bradley admitted she had shot the senator and declared she believed e was justified in doing so. She enied that she had come to, Washington for the purpose of killing the sena-Tor.





RANTZ WON'T SHARE IN THE INAUGURA

Guthrie, Ok., Nov. 12.—Governor Frank Frantz put a new phase on the tangle over the inaugural arrangement tonight by positively refusing not only to ride in the carriage with Governor-elect Haskell on inauguration day, but to take any part whatever in the ceremonies.

The committee had expected Frantz to take part in the inauguration, even if a hitch did occur in connection with the carriage proposition.

"Under the circumstances I shall take no part whatever in the inauguration," said the Rough Rider Governor. "I do not believe that my position will be misconstrued." Denies He Will Walk.

Haskell today positively denied that he had made any such refusal as was credited to him or that he would do so. He stated whatever he might think of Frantz, he would not allow it to interfere with the arrangements for the inaugural ceremonies.

Frantz's position in the matter is considered to be due to the fact that Haskell, personally, at Shawnee, during the State campaign, attacked Frantz's personal character.



Insurance Expert on Fire Rules. The following is the piatform, boiled down to common sense, of the big fire insurance companies after years of study of the question. Read it and take warning:

The danger of fire loss is 40 per cent greater in the winter months than in the summer.

Even if you carry full insurance, fire loss means heavy loss to you-loss of time, loss of good trade.

Everyone is certain of his own carefulness, but are we careful? For instance do you use safety matches? Any other kind is prohibited by law in

The fire marshal of Ohio says that the "parlor" match is responsible for Uncle Harve Stearns this morning a greater loss of property than any lessness with these matches is a continuous performance, the average time Investigation showed that out of 1,396 fires in New York, 439 were at-

tributed to matches. Statistics showing the cause of fires best teach what to guard against:

1. Use only safety matches.

2. Ashes should be kept in metal receptacles.

3. Rubbish of any kind should never be allowed to accumulate anywhere about the building.

4. Oily rags or waste paper, damp sawdust for sweeping should be deposited in metal waste cans and burned each night.

5. Spittons or receptacles for oil dripping should be of metal and never contain sawdust.

6. Electricity causes many fires by wires getting out of order. Installation should be inspected at least once a year by an electrician
