# 'rogram **Targets** Youth

The largest simultaneous prayer meeting in Texas history was held September 12 when Christian youth gathered around the flag poles at hundreds of high schools and junior high schools across the state.

Rallying around a theme of "See You At The Pole," the youth prayed for spiritual awakening, for their fellow students and for God's power to overcome such negative influences as alcohol and drug abuse, sexual immorality, depression, suicidal tendencies and Satanic cult influences, said Chuck Flowers of Dallas, youth associate in the Texas Baptist Evangelism Division.

The statewide youth-led prayer meeting is an extension of "Shout It Out," a program which began with rallies to train youth and share their Christian faith.

In June, red wrist bands were given to a record crowd of more than 20,000 young people at the Texas Baptist Youth Evangelism Conference in Dallas and to 4,000 youth at Super Summer Schools of Evangelism at Baylor University, Waco, and Wayland Baptist University, Plainview.

The young people were encouraged to wear the bands


# **Mustangs Host Lorenzo Friday**



BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 6, 1990**

### **PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
