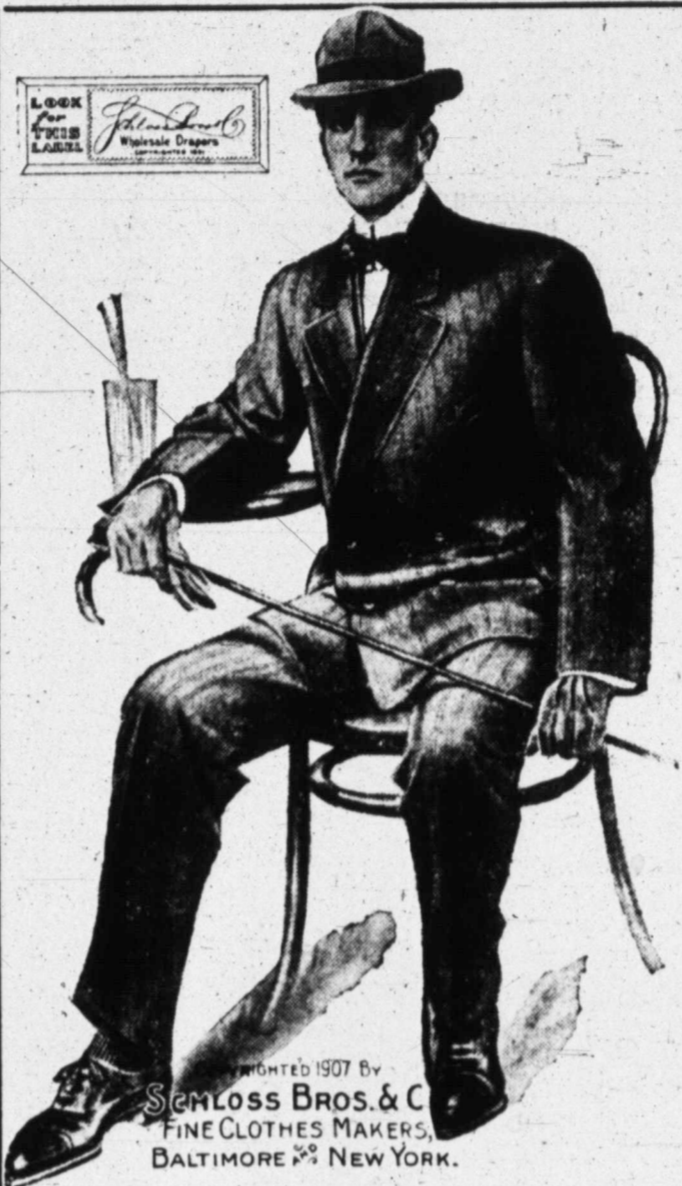

Saturday Was the Equinox.

Saturday was the vernal equinox. Equinox is the time of the year when the day and night are exactly equal. The length of the day is twelve hours the sun is ascending 6 hours and descending the same time. This is the case only twice in each year, once in the spring and once in the autumn, when the sun is on the equator. When the sun is in this situation, the horizon of every place is divided into equal parts by the circle of bounding light and darkness; hence the sun is visible everywhere twelve hours and invisible for the same time in each 24 hours. The vernal equinox is on the 21st of March and marks the beginning of spring; the autumn equinox is on the 24th of September, which is considered the commencement of autumn. At all other times of the year the day and night are equal in length of time. On the equator this inequality vanishes entirely, as there during the day which is equal to the night, the sun is always ascending six hours and descending the same time.

Many here who have taken cognizance of the equinoxes say that usually they mark the beginning of the season—either spring or autumn.

New Postal Cards.

Within a few days the newly designed postal cards adopted for sale by the government March 1st, will be placed on sale at the local postoffice. These cards show plainly the effect of the influences of the souvenir postal cards, the fad for which is now sweeping the country.

These new cards are the same as the postals used for the last few years with the exception that a third of the front side is divided off from the section for the address. This may be used for the letter or message, and gives a third more area to write over than the old style card permitted. On the old style postal cards the front side of the card was used for the address only. The new style promises to prove popular, and doubtless had their origin in the souvenir postal, which permits the writing of messages on a certain section of the address or stamp side.

THE PARTY OF HOPE.

Houston Post.

Before an audience of 10,000 people in Chicago Thursday night, Mr. Bryan answered the question, "Why Democracy?" by saying: "Because the democratic party is the only party sufficiently large to give hope of success and sufficiently democratic to give hope of relief after a victory has been won."

The answer is a clear cut enunciation of the reasons why the party, whose standard of leadership will later be formally placed in the hands of the speaker himself, is entitled to receive the support of every voter regardless of past affiliations, who is sincerely desirous of bringing about needed reforms in our government and his extended argument in support of this claim will undoubtedly receive serious consideration at the hands of all such voters. In that hope lies the prospect of assured democratic success in the coming contest.

Democratic promises will be specific and definite, as they have been in previous campaigns; while those of the opposition will be vague, indefinite and protractive, their force weakened by the party's past record of temporizing with and finally shelving all measures proposing real relief to the masses from present burdensome legislation. "The democratic party can claim the right to carry out these reforms, boldly proclaims Mr. Bryan, "first because that party is almost unanimous in favor of reform, while in the republican party there is a very large minority, if not an actual majority, against all important reforms. While the republican party is spending its time between reformers and standpatters, the democratic party is ready for action. Then, too, a democratic administration will, if elected, enter office pledged to specific reforms named in the platform, while the republican party will ask the public to trust it to carry out such reforms as may be outlined after the election. In the one case, the people know what to expect; in the other case they are left in uncertainty."

Inspired by a common impulse for a return to those safe paths of beneficent government marked out and trod by Jefferson and Jackson, the democratic party under the leadership of Mr. Bryan will enter the campaign united and pledged to immediate action in the carrying out of the reforms it boldly proclaims as essential to the life of a republican form of government in the fullest meaning of the term, and its past record of consistency, constituting the most glorious pages of American history, will appeal with irresistible force to the intelligent voters, having the best interests of the nation at heart, throughout the whole country.

GREEN BUG EXPERT INSPECTING FIELDS

C. E. Sanborn, a special agent from College Station, arrived here today to make an examination of the wheat fields near this city to see if there were any green bugs.

After completing his investigations here he will visit Vernon and other towns along the Denver in the wheat section.

Mr. Sanborn, who has made a special study of green bugs, says that while this is his first trip of inspection in this section this season, he does not expect to find green bugs in sufficient numbers to cause alarm concerning the wheat crop. There are many species of insects, he says, which prey upon the green bug and he is hopeful that these insects abound in such numbers as to preclude the probability of any damage by the green bugs to the wheat crop.

He drove out into the country this afternoon in company with R. M. Moore to inspect some wheat fields near the city.

BISON BACK ON PRAIRIE.

Former inmates of New York Zoo Doing Well in Oklahoma.
Uncle Sam's herd of fifteen buffaloes, which were taken from the New York zoological gardens to the Wichita national forest, Oklahoma, in the early fall, are doing well in their new home, according to advices which have been received at Washington from the supervisor's headquarters at Cache. Since leaving New York the herd has celebrated the birth of two fine buffalo calves, one of which has been named Hornaday, after the name of the director of the New York gardens which gave them to the government, and the other Oklahoma, after the new state which was also just born after the herd's arrival.
Keeper Frank Rush, an old western cow puncher and experienced buffalo man, who has handled the herd since it was taken from New York, says that alfalfa hay has put his charges in fine shape and that the big prairie beasts are again thriving in their native land. The buffaloes have an 8,000 acre fenced park in the Wichita forest, in which they can charge and snort. During the winter the animals will be fed alfalfa hay and protected from the weather and disease in a number of large shelter sheds which have been built in the inclosure. In the spring they will be let out to roam over the Wichita range, and gradually they will be encouraged to rustle for themselves, an instinct they have partially lost through years of domestication in city parks. Government experts figure that in time they will regain the prowess of their forefathers, who were kings of the plains before civilization made its march westward.

GIGANTIC TIMEPIECE.

World's Biggest Clock to Be in New York Skyscraper.
When the tower of the Metropolitan Life building in Madison square is completed, New York will have what undoubtedly will be the largest clock in the world, says the New York Herald. That distinction has belonged for many years to "Big Ben" in Westminster abbey, London, the dial of which is twenty-two and one-half feet in diameter, while that of the Metropolitan building clock will be twenty-five.
It will be a clock suitable in every way to be a part of the tallest permanent structure in the world, as the new tower will be. The tower will be forty-eight stories, 658 feet above the street, and the clock will occupy part of the twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth and twenty-seventh floors. The middle of the dial will be 346 feet above the street.
Notwithstanding the fact that the dial will be a little more than halfway between the street and the top of the tower, it will be far above all surrounding buildings. It will be fifty feet higher than the Flatiron building. The immense size of the clock will make it easy to tell the time from a great distance. The letters on the dial will be four feet high, and the hands will be twelve feet long.
No clock has been ordered for the building yet, and it is not known just how it will be run. Some of the largest clocks are run by electricity, while some of the newer ones use compressed air.

Invention to Eliminate Types.

An invention to discard the whole process of typesetting in the use of printing has been perfected by Gustavo Germani, a young Italian, who has been working upon his models for several years in Pittsburgh. Application has been made for patents covering his ideas. The invention is calculated to revolutionize the art of printing, says the Pittsburgh Dispatch. Type forms will be formed in relief on the metallic plates used on printing presses and consist of writing on the surface of the plate with "etching ground" and then subjecting it to the "cutting" action of acid whereby that portion of the plate which has not received the "etching ground" is eaten away, causing the type to stand out in relief. The reading of proof is made easy by placing the plate under a mirror inclined at an angle of forty-five degrees. Imperfections in the type are quickly discerned and can be corrected without trouble.

The Mania For Shopping.

One phase of the feminine mania for shopping is illustrated in John Foster Fraser's "America at Work." Speaking of the C. O. D. method of shopping and of the way in which it appeals to the woman with the slender purse, he says:
"If she has no dollars, that does not deprive her of the pleasure of shopping. She will walk into a big store, look over a dozen gowns and try on several before deciding. Then she will get a C. O. D. card and, visiting other departments, will buy a hat, rich underwear and a parasol. She will give a fine order. When the goods are delivered at the address she mentioned, it is found there is no such person as Mrs. Walker. True, she has put the store to a lot of trouble. Yet think of the morning of womanly delight she has had in her shopping."

the ballot in parallel columns and shall be numbered as follows:

No. 1, name; No. 2, name; No. 3, name; No. 4, name, and in the order certified by the chairman of the respective mass meetings and which shall be done by April 10th, 1908, to the chairman of the State executive committee.

In case any nominees shall refuse to serve, the chairman of the mass meeting nominating him may, within the time given for the preparation of the official ballot, certify another name.

The chairman of the State democratic executive committee shall prepare the form of ballot in accordance with these resolutions and shall certify such form to the chairman of respective county committees on or before April 15th, 1908. Said ballots shall be headed "Democratic Official Ticket" and shall be uniform throughout the State and no ballot voted upon any other than the official ballot shall be counted.

The State executive committee shall meet and canvass the returns of the primary election on the day to the assembling of the Fort Worth State democratic convention, which canvass shall be made in the manner provided for by the Terrell primary election law for canvassing the election of primaries for State officers. The candidate or candidates who shall receive a plural-

ity of the votes cast on such primary election over those candidates who bear the same number for the office shall be declared the elected delegates and alternates at large, as the case may be, by the State democratic convention to be held in Fort Worth, and the chairman of said convention shall certify such result to the National convention to be held in Denver in July, 1908.
