FAVORS RAILROADS

U. S. SUPREME COURT RENDERS DECISION WHICH KILLS RATE REDUCTION LAW.

JUSTICE HARLAN DISSENT

Characterizes the Opinion as Era-Making in the History of Court.

Washington, D. C., Mar. 23.—In refusing to grant to Attorney General Young of Minnesota a writ of habeas corpus releasing him from the penalty imposed by the United States circuit court for the district of Minnesota, on the charge of contempt of court, in attempting a proceeding the State court for the enforcement of the railroad rate law after the federal court had prohibited such a course, and in affirming the decision of Judge Pritchard of the United States circuit court for the Western district of North Carolina, discharging from imprisonment James H. Wood, a ticket agent of the Southern railway at Asheville, after he had been sentenced by the Asheville police court to serve a term on the rockpile on the charge of collecting for a ticket on that road a greater price than was permitted by the State railroad law, the Supreme Court of the United States today added another to the series of decisions which have rendered notable the present term of that court.

In both cases the right of the States to fix rates for railroad transportation was the issue, and both involved conflicts between the Federal and the State courts. The decision in each case was opposed both to the States and to their courts. The opinion of the courts in both cases was announced by Judge Peckham and, with the exception of Justice Harlan, all the other members of the court stood behind him in the announcement of the court's finding. Justice Harlan read a dissenting opinion in the Young case in which he took the view that the suit was practically a proceeding against the State, and therefore not permissible under the eleventh amendment to the constitution. He therefore characterized the opinion as era-making in the history of the court, said it had the effect of closing the courts of a State against the State itself, and predicted that the result would be disastrous.

The two cases were so similar that both were practically decided in one opinion. The principal pronouncement was made in the Minnesota case.

Brakeman's Sorry Experience.

It is currently rumored on the street this morning that a brakeman, who married an inmate of a house of ill fame in this city last week, was taken out last night by a party of fellow brakemen and was given a good beating with barrel staves, after which he was ordered to hit the dirt out of town, which order he obeyed without delay.

It is further rumored that the party made up a purse, which they gave to the brakeman's wife and also ordered her to leave the city.

NO WORKING EXPERIENCE.

Commissioner Colquitt Testified He Never Worked for Any Railroad.

Austin, Tex., Mar. 24.—The injunction suits of railroads against the State seeking to knock out the bookkeeping order of the railroad commission, was resumed today with Commissioner Colquitt on the stand. He admitted having no experience in working for any railroad. He called books on railroad-ing theoretical whims.

Four Killed in Wreck.

By Associated Press. Lexington, Ky., Mar. 24.—Four persons were killed and several injured in the wreck of a passenger train between Burgin and High Bridge early today on the Queen and Crescent railroad.

The injured were brought to a hospital here.

LETTER TO ABRAHAM LINCOLN.

New York Postal Authorities Puzzled As to Who to Deliver It.

New York, Mar. 23.—Whether some citizen of a land across the sea has just learned of the great American emancipator, Abraham Lincoln, or whether Fifth avenue shelters a wearer of that name, who has assumed sufficient distinction in the eyes of one abroad to be addressed with deference, is a problem the clerks of the New York postoffice are endeavoring to solve. While sorting the foreign mail which had arrived by Saturday's steamers, one of the clerks picked up a letter which bore the superscription: "Your Excellency, Sir Abraham Lincoln, Fifth Avenue, New York City, U. S. A."

The letter is now held at the inquiry division of the general postoffice awaiting an applicant who can prove that it should be delivered to him. If no claimant appears, the missive will be forwarded to the dead letter department in Washington, there opened and the mystery solved.

This is the first time since Mr. Lincoln's death that a letter bearing his name has been received at the local postoffice.

First Arrest Under New Ordinance.

The officers this morning made their first arrest under the new city ordinance, which makes it unlawful for a male person to be found in a public place, with a female known as a common prostitute.

The arrest was made at Mae Foster's resort on Mulberry Row and the man pleaded guilty to the charge and paid a fine in the corporation court this morning.

Some of the friends and admirers of Senator J. W. Bailey in this city are negotiating with the Fort Worth and Denver for a special train and a low rate for the Bailey meeting in Fort Worth Saturday. If arrangements are perfected for a special train it is expected that a large crowd from this city will attend the meeting.

PROHIBITION BILL

SIGNED BY HASKELL

Guthrie, Okla., Mar. 24.—The prohibition bill became a law a few minutes after 12 o'clock today. Governor Haskell signed the bill in the private chamber in the presence of a hundred people. He used seven pens in attaching his official signature. The law becomes effective at once. Not before 2 o'clock will any announcement as to the officers created by the act be made.

There were here today quite a number of aspirants for the stations of local dispensers contemplated under the law, among them being several ex-saloon keepers. The governor stated that in filling the places he would give preference to federal and confederate veterans. It is also understood that no ex-saloon man will be appointed. Several applications have been filed for the position of State agency superintendent, a lucrative office created by the law, and regarding the place the governor is besieged with telegrams of indorsement. This appointment, as well as that of enforcement attorney, will not be made before Wednesday.

Representatives of liquor houses and breweries were in the city today with a view of "taking the State's order."

The bill makes the governor and the State agency superintendent purchasing agents for dispensary liquors.

BOYCOTT IS GROWING.

The Chinese are Becoming Thoroughly Aroused Against Japan.

Hong Kong, China, Mar. 24.—The boycott crusade against the Japanese is growing. Envelopes are stuck on the walls, reading: "The Japanese are a barbarous humbug. The Chinese government does not love the people who are now weeping. The Chinese will cause a bloodless boycott against the Japanese immediately and can see the annihilation of Japan, which is expected in a few years."

TO START HOLY WAR

ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE STEVENS SAID TO BE RESULT OF CONSPIRACY.

KOREAN RIGHTEOUS ARMY

Proclamation Calls For Consecration of Loyal Koreans to Holy War Against Japanese.

San Francisco, Cal., Mar. 24.—Dr. F. H. Seumwalt, who made a very careful examination of the wounds of D. W. Stevens, the American diplomat whose assassination was attempted yesterday by two Koreans, says that the patient is in excellent condition considering the seriousness of his injuries.

Inspired By Manifesto.

San Francisco, Cal., Mar. 24.—The Call today says the attempt to assassinate Durham W. Stevens, the political adviser of the Korean council of state, it is now said was the result of a carefully hatched conspiracy, inspired immediately by a manifesto of the Korean "righteous army" calling upon loyal Koreans to consecrate themselves in a holy war to exterminate the Japanese. This manifesto reached San Francisco on the same ship which brought Stevens. The proclamation was signed by General Eyle Lin Ying, the general of the Korean "righteous army."

Japanese Papers Issue Extras.

Tokio, Japan, Mar. 24.—The newspapers are issuing extras giving accounts of the attempt to assassinate D. W. Stevens. Marquis Ito was very deeply affected by the receipt of the news and said through his secretary: "I cannot express my horror."

JOHNSON IS A CANDIDATE.

Minnesota Executive Issues a Formal Statement for the Newspapers.

St. Paul, Minn., Mar. 23.—John A. Johnson, governor of Minnesota, today gave an authorized statement to the press announcing his candidacy for the democratic nomination for president of the United States. This announcement is made so that his friends will not be misled by reports published that he had denied that he would be a candidate and would soon issue a formal statement forbidding the use of his name as a candidate against William Jennings Bryan, with whom it was claimed he had an understanding that he would not oppose the Nebraskan in his "fourth battle."

Aggressive, Not Receptive.

The governor is an aggressive candidate for the nomination at the Denver convention, not a receptive candidate, as has been reported. The governor and his friends are quietly working for the nomination, and one of the results of their efforts will be a solid delegation from Minnesota in the national democratic convention, who will place him in nomination there as "the man who can win at the polls."

FOG CAUSED WRECK.

Six Injured and One Killed When a Freight and Work Train Crash.

Memphis, Tenn., Mar. 24.—One man was instantly killed, another probably fatally injured and five others badly hurt in a rear end collision between a work train loaded with laborers and a freight train on the Illinois Central railroad early today. The accident occurred at New South Memphis and was caused by a dense fog which prevailed in this city early today.

DAVIDSON DENIES

ACCEPTANCE OF FEES

Austin, Tex., Mar. 24.—Attorney General Davidson today declared that the statements by A. M. Kennedy of Waco that he had received a fee from the American National Insurance Company during its suit at Austin, in which Davidson represented the State, was false. Davidson is a member of a Galveston law firm representing the company, but he shows affidavits to the effect that he received no part of the fee from this insurance company. Davidson's answer has caused a stir in State circles.

SHOT BY NIGHT RIDERS.

Negro Carried From His Bed and Riddled With Bullets.

Hopkinsville, Ky., Mar. 24.—Night riders numbering from twenty-five to thirty invaded Golden Pond, in Trigg county, last night and dragged Tom Weaver, a negro employed by the tobacco association, from his bed and carrying him to the road, commanded him to run. When he failed to obey, the night riders began firing at him. Two balls penetrated his body and he was found today in a dying condition. No cause for the crime is known.

DEMOCRATS GATHER.

Indiana Convention Will Be One of the Largest Ever Held There.

Indianapolis, Ind., Mar. 24.—Indiana democrats are beginning to gather in Indianapolis today for the State convention, which will hold its first session tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock. The convention will be in session two days and is expected to be the largest held by democrats in this State in recent years.

MAY HAVE PRIMARY

CHAIRMAN HUFF FAVORS SELECTION OF COUNTY TICKET BY THIS METHOD.

WILL CALL COMMITTEE

Meeting Will Be Held Soon to Determine Primary Question and Arrange for Bailey Primary.

C. C. Huff, chairman of the county democratic executive committee, will call a meeting of that body shortly after the Fort Worth Bailey meeting for the purpose of arranging for the holding of a primary election for the selection of four delegates at large to represent the wishes of the democrats of Texas at the national convention to be held at Denver in July and for the further purpose of arranging to raise the necessary funds for the holding of this election.

The members of the county executive committee, as appointed in August, 1906, are as follows:

Chairman, C. C. Huff; court house box, W. C. Sherrod, W. E. Skeen, C. B. Felder; city hall box, Edgar Scurry, T. B. Noble; Iowa Park, Dr. J. M. Bell, E. A. McCleskey; Beaver Creek, T. B. Stearns; Jenne, R. E. Moore, Nestorville, N. Weaver; Clara, J. B. Evans; Electra, A. A. Honaker; Denny, B. N. Ferguson; Allendale, A. E. Gwin.

There is one vacancy on the committee on account of the death of N. Weaver, who was a committeeman for the Nestorville or Burkburnett precinct.

Mr. Huff will recommend that primaries for the selection of candidates for county offices be held, instead of allowing them to make the race through to the general election, as was the case two years ago.

His reason for making this recommendation is that it will cause a heavier vote to be polled at the primaries, and as the convention strength of each county is based on the primary vote, it will give to Wichita county at least three votes in the convention. At present this county has only one convention vote.

All our present county officials were elected on the independent ticket two years ago. If a primary election for county offices is held, there will be a straight democratic ticket in the field.

Will Soon Have New Hearse.

LADY BUGS ARE FARMERS' FRIEND

In an inspection of two wheat fields near this city C. E. Sanborn, a bugologist from College Station, the State experimental farm, was unable to find a single green bug and on the other hand discovered lady bugs in considerable numbers.

"The lady bugs are one of the most destructive enemies the green bug has," said Mr. Sanborn, "and I do not believe that there is any danger of a serious green bug invasion where the lady bugs are present in such numbers as I found here.

"A good many people have the mistaken idea," he continued, "that lady bugs eat plants. They subsist entirely upon insect life and a single lady bug will often devour as many as fifty or sixty green bugs in a single day. The lady bugs also eat other kinds of plant lice, such as are sometimes found on rape, cabbage, grapes and plums, and the existence of some species of louse is absolutely necessary for their subsistence.

"There is also a form of parasite which is very inimical to the green bug, even more so than the lady bug.

"I believe that predatory insects and parasites are the most practical agencies for fighting the green bug invasion, and it is only a question of time, I think, until they will be bred and can be kept in readiness in considerable numbers for distribution in areas wherever the green bugs appear and in that way prevent any wholesale destruction of crops."

Mr. Sanborn left last night for Vernon and other points north of this city and before completing his inspection will cross the Red river into Oklahoma.

Now that primaries are to be held to select delegates at large to the national convention it is the duty of every loyal Bryan democrat to vote for no man as a delegate to that convention whose record as a democrat is not good. Remarkable Claims Made For a Stamp Vending Contrivance.

F. H. Brinkerhoff, an inventor of Sedalia, Mo., went to Washington recently to try to persuade the postoffice department to consider favorably his stamp vending machine. He says that his machine has decided human tendencies and inclinations because it makes a profit of a cent on every transaction.

The machine, with twenty-five others, has been inspected by a special committee appointed by the postmaster general. It does fifty different things, such as selling postage stamps in any sum desired, making the proper change, weighing and counting money, discarding spurious, defective or foreign coins and about everything that could possibly arise in a transaction of this nature. If you want money changed and do not desire to purchase stamps, this machine will gladly accommodate you, but it charges a cent for the favor. This fee it consistently deducts from the amount placed in the slot.

Finger Nail Pen.

Miss Lizzie Martin, an eighteen-year-old Red Lion girl, has devised a finger nail pen, with which she does all her letter writing, says a York (Pa.) dispatch. The sight of an old quill pen gave Miss Martin the idea of allowing the nail of the index finger of her right hand to grow to a proper length. TAFT'S CANDIDACY INIMICAL TO LABOR

Toledo, Ohio, Mar. 22.—At a union labor meeting attended by 2000 persons here tonight Congressman Isaac R. Sherwood of this city declared the presidential candidacy of Secretary Taft to be inimical to the interests of the working man. The congressman also condemned President Roosevelt for the presence of federal troops at Goldfield last winter. The purpose of the meeting was to protest against recent decisions of the supreme court of the United States and against the action of the State legislature against amending the initiative and referendum bill.

General Sherwood said in part:

"To William Howard Taft we are indebted for government injunction and the recent rulings of the supreme court on the questions of the boycott and the blacklist. Taft's decisions, while a judge in a case against a bricklayers' union in Cincinnati and the strike of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers on the Ann Arbor railroad later, have been made the basis for nearly all the recent decisions of the supreme court detrimental to organized labor.

"And Taft will continue to furnish future decisions if he is elected to the presidency. With the president lies the power of appointment to the supreme bench for life. In order to have a supreme court that is in sympathy with the people as a whole, you must elect presidents who are in entire sympathy with the people."

Representative Sherwood declared that his speech on the floor of the house of representatives on February 3rd had been misrepresented by press correspondents in Washington, when the reports charged him with holding the president responsible for the present financial crisis.

"I did not attack the president on that score," said General Sherwood. "What I really did was to denounce the president for using government employes to secure a private report on the conditions in Goldfield during the miners' strike.

"I did not condemn him for sending the troops at the call of the governor, but I did condemn him when, after learning by private report that the troops were not needed, he not only failed to make the report public, but also failed to rectify his mistake by withdrawing the soldiers from Goldfield."

GREEN BUG DANGER-AT END.

Sees Rosy Outlook for Wheat and Oats
in Texas.

Fort Worth, Tex., Mar. 23.—"Danger
to the Texas grain crop from green
bugs is at an end," said Secretary H.
B. Dorsey, secretary of the Texas Grain
Dealers' Association of Texas, Monday,
in discussing conditions affecting the
coming crops of wheat, oats, etc., in
this State.

"Crops have made an excellent start
and attained such a hearty growth that
even if the little pests put in an appear-
ance they will work no damage. But
the season for the green bug is now
closed and an excellent crop will be
reaped from the acreage planted."

Mr. Dorsey's great regret in the mat-
ter is the short acreage. This was
greatly reduced from last season in
spite of the effort of the association.
The work last year of the green bug
was the chief cause of the growers
planting a greatly reduced acreage.

Ravages of Green Bug.

As is generally known, the green
bug so devastated the 1907 crop that
it was a total failure. The planters
with this disaster in mind and the
high price of cotton before their eyes
have this season devoted to the fleecy
staple much of the acreage formerly
given over to grain. The high price of
seed was also a factor in causing the
grain acreage to be reduced.

"I estimate the wheat crop of Texas
at from 30 to 33 1/3 per cent of nor-
mal," says Mr. Dorsey, and but for
the large acreage increase in the Pan-
handle the average would not be near-
ly as high. The oat crop will be from
50 to 60 per cent of a normal yield from
an average acreage."

While on the face of these state-
ments it appears that conditions are
not favorable, the outlook, in compar-
ison with the situation prevailing last
year is so vastly improved that grain
growers, dealers and the general busi-
ness interests have every reason to be
pleased.

News is Welcome.

The grain crop of 1907 was practical-
ly a total failure and even the shortest
of crops this season will result in a
vast improvement in business condi-
tions throughout the State. How much
this means to the welfare of the state
