ENTHUSIASM IS HIGH

BAILEY CHEERED BY A GREAT CROWD ON HIS ARRIVAL IN FORT WORTH.

SPEAKS AT COLISEUM

Bailey, Kleberg, O'Neal and Brooks Will Be the Candidates.

Fort Worth, Tex., Mar. 28.—It has been learned that the three men besides Bailey who will be nominated for delegates at large will be R. J. Kleberg of Corpus Christi, Judges O'Neal and Brooks of Dallas.

T. F. Jones of Tyler called the meeting to order. Rev. R. C. Armstrong gave prayer and Colonel R. M. Wynne then spoke, praising Bailey and was loudly cheered. Senator Loney of Greenville and D. W. Odell of Cleburne followed. Cheers for Bailey were frequent and long. W. M. Imboden presided as chairman of the convention.

On the motion of Nelson Phillips of Dallas, a committee of eleven was appointed on credentials, a committee of seventeen on organization and a delegates committee of thirty-one to sit on the platform.

Fort Worth, Tex., Mar. 28.—Senator J. W. Bailey, returning to lead the fight against his opponents who are trying to prevent him from attending the National democratic convention as a delegate at large from Texas, arrived via the Santa Fe from Gainesville at 11 o'clock this morning, a crowd of 5,000 people cheering as his special train entered the depot.

The special consisted of twelve coaches, with many vacant seats in every coach, but the Gainesville delegation showed great enthusiasm. The senator was immediately driven to the Delaware hotel and a big crowd surged around the building. Senator Bailey held conferences with S. B. Burnett, Frank Hovencamp, Clarence Ousley and other prominent supporters for an hour and then proceeded to the Coliseum, where he is speaking this afternoon.

Competent judges and railway officials say that less than three thousand delegates are here attending the rally, but inclement weather has likely kept many away.

The delegates are wearing many Bailey badges with significant mottoes. Bailey shook hands with many of his admirers and in front of the hotel made a short address. He said: "God is my judge when I say that I have never betrayed your interests and when I have finished with that Waco aggregation they will wish they had never been born." Bailey also expressed his gratitude for the love and tribute shown him by the gathering here.

It was announced that he would avoid all bitterness in his speech, but evidently Mr. Bailey has decided different.

At the Coliseum the seats began to fill early, the delegates taking seats in front of the speaker. Several thousand Fort Worth citizens are present and the big building was one-third filled when the hand shaking began.

Bailey will speak again tonight.

Warmly Greeted at Home Town.
Gainesville, Tex., Mar. 27.—Senator Bailey arrived home this evening on the Missouri, Kansas and Texas train at 6:30 and was met at the train by a thousand or more people, who had climbed on top of box cars, telegraph poles and taken other means to see the senator as he left the train.

When he appeared a great yell went up from the people, which the senator recognized by a broad smile. The crowd followed his carriage to the hotel, where he made them a short speech from the second story balcony.

Mr. Bailey will accompany the Cooke county delegation on a special train to Fort Worth tomorrow, and it is expected a thousand delegates will go from this city.

FROM GULF TO ROCKIES.

Through Passenger Service Will Be Inaugurated Between Galveston and Denver.

Through passenger trains will soon be running from the gulf coast to the Rocky Mountains. Colonel B. F. Yoakum has planned toward this schedule for years and the plan is being finally executed through the agency of W. E. Green and D. B. Keeler.

The Fort Worth Record says: The train service, as indicated by the events of the past ten days, will originate in Galveston. From Galveston the train will traverse the Trinity and Brazos Valley to Dallas, and at the latter point it will pass over into the territory of another Yoakum property, the Rock Island. The tracks of the latter will be toured as far as Fort Worth. Here the Fort Worth and Denver will receive the train and carry it through the Panhandle and deliver it to the

ANTIS HOLD MEETING

PERMANENT ORGANIZATION OF THOSE OPPOSED TO BAILEY IS FORMED.

GOOD CROWDS ATTEND IT

Waco Delegates Endorsed—Mathis and Carrigan Speak.

The anti-Bailey convention called for this afternoon at 3 o'clock at the City Hall is in session as the Times goes to press.

The city hall is taxed to its capacity to hold the crowd, and many could not gain admittance. The meeting was called to order by Col. W. C. Sherrod and on motion of Judge A. H. Carrigan, he was made permanent chairman and Judge C. B. Felder secretary.

On motion of L. H. Mathis the action of the anti-Bailey convention held at Waco was endorsed, together with the nominees of the convention for delegates at large to the Denver convention.

A resolution instructing the delegates to the National convention to vote for W. J. Bryan for president as long as his name was before the convention, was passed without a dissenting vote.

After effecting an organization and passing resolutions as above indicated, Hon. L. H. Mathis was called upon to address the crowd and responded in an address on Baileyism, which was loudly cheered. As the Times closes its forms Judge Carrigan is addressing the large crowd in front of the City Hall.

There were about 100 or 150 men at the meeting.

HAS REACHED VICKSBURG.

Mrs. Roosevelt's Party Arrived There This Morning.

Vicksburg, Miss., Mar. 28.—Mrs. Roosevelt and party arrived over the Alabama and Vicksburg railroad today. The Mayflower is expected to leave with the party for New Orleans during the afternoon.

Two Men Killed in New York Riot.

New York, Mar. 28.—It is reported that two men were killed in a battle between the police and ten thousand men and women who congregated in Union Square this afternoon to take part in the "demonstration of Unemployed." The men were killed by a bomb which was thrown into the crowd by one of the demonstrators. Several persons were injured.

Mines Will Close Down.

Pittsburg, Pa., Mar. 28.—On Tuesday next all coal mines in this district will be shut down by mutual consent of the miners and operators and will remain closed for sixty days. Until negotiations are completed for new contracts, the mines will remain closed.

Leavenworth, Kan., Mar. 28.—The mine operators are preparing for the coming strike of the coal miners. All the mine mules are being offered for sale, apparently in anticipation of a long contest.

A ball game between a picked team and the high school was played yesterday afternoon, the score resulting in 3 to 2 in favor of the picked team. The batteries were Block and Stonecipher and Shafe and Smith.

SIX MONTHS IN WORK HOUSE.

Circuit Court Affirms the Sentence Against Lumber Men.

Toledo, Ohio, Mar. 28.—The circuit court today affirmed the decision of the lower court in the case of twenty prominent lumber men of Toledo who, last July, were sentenced to the workhouse for six months under the Valentine anti-trust law.

HAD NARROW ESCAPE

ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE BULKELY WELLS CAME NEAR BEING SUCCESSFUL.

BOMB PLACED UNDER BED

When Bomb Exploded End of House Was Blown Out, But Wells Escaped Serious Injury.

Telluride, Colo., Mar. 28.—Former Adjutant General Bulkely Wells narrowly escaped death at his home here today from a well planned effort to assassinate him.

A stick of dynamite prepared as a bomb was placed under or near General Wells' bed. General Wells was sleeping, as was his habit, on the outer porch of his house, and he was hurried with the debris many feet from the wrecked house. The side of the house was completely torn out and hardly a stick of the bed on which he was sleeping remained. Fragments of wood were scattered over the neighborhood.

Though badly shaken up and bruised to some extent, General Wells is said to have escaped without injury. General Wells took a leading part in the suppression of the labor troubles in this State in 1904-05 and was prominently identified with the prosecution of the officers of the Western Federation of Miners at Boise, Idaho, on the charge of complicity in the assassination of former Governor Frank Steunenberg.

Death of Hiram Hodges.
Hiram Hodges, one of Burk Burnett's most substantial citizens, succumbed to an attack of liver trouble at his home in that place at 2 o'clock Friday morning, after an illness of about four weeks.

Mr. Hodges, at his death, lacked only a few days of being 62 years of age. He was a native of Missouri and came to Texas about nine years ago. Two sons, James and Otto Hodges, who live at Burk Burnett, and a daughter, Mrs. Mary Heard, living in Wichita Falls, survive him.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon and the body was laid to rest in the Nestorville cemetery.

Cotton Crop Short.

It is now definitely known that the cotton crop of last year is short some two million bales as compared with the crop of 1906. The census bureau reported last week that the 1907 crop was only 11,265,161 bales, including linters. The crop of 1906 was 13,305,000 bales. That of 1905 was 10,725,000.

Now that a clearly defined shortage is apparent in the crop of last year, it only remains to await the evidence of the present planting season to prove beyond all question that the cotton growers of the South are determined to control the price of their labor. Some may ask why it is that with cotton in a strong statistical position that the price does not go up. We answer that the higher prices are not and never have been assured for cotton until the planting season has passed. Between this and the opening of the new cotton season the shortage, if any, is felt most keenly, because the weak cotton has been disposed of very generally in all parts of the South and there are no slaughter sales. Then the buyers must reckon with a strictly spot situation. In our judgment whatever increase in acreage there may be in cotton for Texas will occur in the newly settled counties of Texas, and of the South, there is too much old cotton on hand to warrant sensible men planting so freely this season as to increase the acreage. —Farm and Ranch.

Bitten By a Cat.

Copper Found Near Frederick.

Reports come from the section of country northeast of Frederick that vast deposits of copper ore has been discovered, and if the reports are true and they cannot be doubted, the north end of Tillman county may be converted into one of the richest copper mining districts in the Southwest.

Messrs. Amos and Crooks came into the Leader office Wednesday morning and verified the report, and in their offices they have numerous fine specimens on display, which are gathered from the surface and are indicative of rich and inexhaustible deposits below.

Dear Sir.—The copper ore showed on analysis 14.33 per cent, or nearly 200 pounds to the ton. It is VERY good ore. Hoping to serve you again, I remain,

The tract of land lies about twelve miles northeast of Frederick and about that far from the Wichita mountains, in a broken section at the head of a draw. There is a great upheaval of ore, where tons of copper can be scooped up from the surface. It is not a late discovery, but men with the enterprise to develop it have been lacking.—Frederick Leader.
